The state board of medical examiners in session at Austin this week has had an unusually large number of applications for examination for license to practice medicine. It is explained that a great many of the applicants are physicians who have been practicing their profession in Mexico and have come to Texas on account of the war in Mexico.

A report from Washington dated Monday says: "In a decision so broad that it probably will annul the 'grandfather clause' enactments in every Southern state which has adopted such laws, the supreme court today held invalid Oklahoma and Maryland legislation aimed at restricting the negro vote. The decision was unanimous. The decision, in short, was that it is a violation of the fifteenth amendment for a state to select arbitrarily a date such as 1866 and provide that persons not qualified to vote on that date or whose ancestors were not qualified, are barred from voting, or must submit to voting tests not required of others. The court further held that election officials who sought to enforce such clauses could be held amenable to law for denying persons a right to vote and that such officials could not disregard the fact that the fifteenth amendment had stricken out of the state law the word 'white' as a qualification of voting."

ENTOMBED FOURTEEN DAYS

Rescue Party Reaches Miners Too Late—Men Found Dead.

Postmaster P. H. Clements received a Telegram Thursday evening from the mayor of Joplin, Mo., stating that the two entombed men, one of whom, Donald Hardendorf, was his nephew, had been reached by the rescue party but were found dead. A special from Joplin has this to say of the sad occurrence:

"Rescue workers, after fourteen days of night and day toil, penetrated the clogged drift of the Longacre-Chapman mine at 2:30 this afternoon and on top of a pile of timbers found the bodies of Donald Hardendorf and Reed Taylor. The two men apparently had been dead several days from starvation."

The sympathy of all who know them goes out to Mr. Clements and the other relatives in their sad bereavement—the more so because hopes of rescue had been entertained so long, only to be finally dashed to the ground.

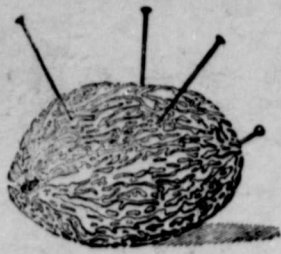

### STEEL THAT WILL STAY BRIGHT

A steel that will neither rust, nor tarnish has been discovered, and is being made commercially in the United States. The importance of this invention can hardly be exaggerated. Rust and corrosion are the great enemies of iron and steel. Cut through a lemon with your pocket knife and it comes out tarnished—corroded; stop the street cars, even for a few hours, and the rails are yellow with rust. Various more or less clumsy expedients have been adopted to fight this condition. For fine tableware the metal is silver-plated, galvanized or painted. Sooner or later the coating fails, then rust and corrosion start their work of destruction. The loss of steel through rust in the United States has been estimated at 1,000,000 tons a year, valued in the crude, semifinished state, from \$30,000,000 to \$40,000,000. The new stainless steel need not be plated or otherwise coated, and it stays bright under all conditions of weather and usage. For years scientists have been seeking such a metal for tableware, pocket knives, watchcases, for certain parts of typewriters, guns, sewing machines, automobiles, bicycles and for countless other uses. Table knives forged of this metal can be used with impunity to cut acid fruits with no fear of stain, and the knife will remain bright without incessant scouring that is a bugbear to every household.—Iron Trade Review.

### MAKING A SURVEY

A representative of the One-1 Engineering Co., of Dallas is here making a preliminary survey of the streets on which water mains will run, provided the taxpayers approve the plan of installing a system of water-works. He is not seeking the lime light, neither is he sensational in his official acts, but his devotion to duty draws the public confidence to him all the time.

It is not only in military, but it is all through the public service, that self-interest is active for itself. It often happens that the people are paying the expenses of persons who are engaged in schemes for plundering them. It is strange that it so often happens that when a person is honored with some public position he goes to work immediately to magnify his place and push for more money to sustain it. It is getting quite time when men elected to office should use their time in performing public duty and not be rushing around bent on various projects of self-interest. That is going on all the time. Many men don't do half the work they are paid to do.—Ohio State Journal.

The sentence of death imposed upon Leo Frank of Atlanta, Ga., charged with the murder of a girl who worked in the factory where he was superintendent, was commuted to life imprisonment by Governor Slaton of that state this week. Some of the people of that state were enraged because of the governor's act and the militia was summoned to guard the residence of the chief executive to prevent mob violence. Just why they should have been so thoroughly convinced that the Jew was guilty of the murder and should have been willing to disgrace their state forever by laying violent hands upon an officer who had performed his duty it is hard to understand. Thousands and thousands of the best people on the face of the earth commend the governor and honor him for his stand in the face of personal danger as well as political danger. State legislatures and men and women of the highest character who would be far from asking or desiring that a criminal escape just punishment have petitioned the governor of Georgia to commute the sentence, believing that in time the testimony of the negro ex-convict would be proven false and the real murderer of the girl discovered and punished. There is entirely too much doubt about Frank's guilt for the governor to allow him to be hanged.

Early peaches are now being marketed and only a few weeks remain till Mamie Ross and Elberta will be on the market. Truck crops and berries have yielded well and livestock are in excellent condition.

It has been pointed out that the acreage of cotton has been reduced considerably, and the encouraging feature is that the reduced cotton acreage has been planted in food and feed crops. Wheat and oats are now bringing excellent prices; corn and hay will probably bring fair, if not large prices; livestock and livestock products are holding up reasonably well. The gloom and discontent that was so evident at the beginning of war is seen no more. It is too early to predict what our corn and cotton crops will amount to, but our small grain crops have been produced and most of them harvested; there is an abundance of feed and food crops; the people are hopeful and there is no difficulty in financing business in the Southwest.

Farmers have been very conservative in buying, cash buying being more common than for many years. This means greater saving in the cost of living and more cash for improvements and for the things that bring comfort and convenience.

As a result of crop prospects and increased confidence, business during the last week or 10 days has increased very rapidly. The cities and towns of the Southwest are now active in expanding business operations, all because our farms have produced wealth.—Farm and Ranch.

## INTENSIVE CULTIVATION

Not in many years has there been a season so favorable for late planting and not in the memory of many have farmers taken advantage of favorable circumstances for continuous cultivation and successive planting as they have this year. With a late season to begin it was found necessary to continue planting later than usual. And it now seems that late planting and second crops are to be favored by the season, for in most localities crop prospects could hardly be better.

Farm and Ranch has spoken often for many years on the advantages of using the land in a systematic but intensive way to produce two or more crops of certain plants. Occasionally one would give his experience in producing late crops to verify these facts. But it seems that the practice this year has been quite extensive and if the season shall continue favorable the results will be far-reaching.

We have not made full use of our opportunities for intensive farming. Here in the Southwest we have long growing seasons and soils adapted to many kinds of crops, or even three in extreme instances, each year. True the second crop will sometimes fail, it may be light often, yet the opportunities for increasing the cash income by planting the second crop are by no means small. Suffice it to say that intensive farming is being tested in the Southwest this year.—Farm and Ranch.

## APPRECIATED KINDNESS

Several correspondents have sent in letters this week to help the management to keep the paper up to standard and we appreciate the kindness very much. Some of the writers intimate that offense might have been taken by some writers because of the suggestion by the Eagle a few weeks ago that some writings were most too personal. We trust there was not misunderstanding over the matter, for certainly the Eagle meant no offense to its friends who were writing, but rather desired to save them from embarrassment and hard feelings.

Texas steers sold for \$9.25 per hundred weight in Kansas City the first of the week. This was the highest price ever recorded in the open market in that city.

An attempt was made by burglars to rob the safe of the federal reserve bank at Richmond, Va. Sunday night. They were discovered by a watchman and frightened away.

Property owners in Texas will pay the largest tax rate for 1915-16 that has ever been fixed in this state. An ad valorem tax of 29c is predicted which, with a school tax of 20c and a constitutional tax of 5c levied for the purpose of pensioning the Confederate veterans, will bring the total tax rate assessed for all purposes up to 54c.

The cry has been made in Texas and our governor joined in it, that Texas farmers were paying more interest for money borrowed than were the farmers of Oklahoma, which is a much younger state. Governor Ferguson submitted letters and telegrams to substantiate his statements. He was making a fight for the passage of the Gibson bill, which if ever enacted, will repeal the Robertson act, and that will mean the loss to Texas to start with of more than a million back taxes owed this state by the old life insurance companies that refused to obey the law and left the state seven years ago. But here are some figures that we get from the bureau of statistics in the department of agriculture. Of course, the Times can not say whether they are correct or not, but generally speaking statistics that are compiled and published under the supervision of the general government can be relied on. Here's what these figures show: "Interest rates paid by farmers in 1912: In Texas 10.3; in Oklahoma 12.19; in 1913, in Texas 9.97 per cent; in Oklahoma 10.58 per cent." Now, it is a well known fact that Oklahoma has no Robertson law, and that being the case, will some one who favors the Gibson bill please tell why the figures furnished by the national government show that farmers of Oklahoma in 1912-1913 were paying a greater interest rate than were the farmers of Texas.—Wichita Times.

I watch the sunset as I look out over the rim of the blue Pacific, and there is no mystery beyond the horizon, because I know what is over there. I have journeyed in those lands. Over there where the sun is just sinking is Japan. That star is rising over China. In that direction lies the Philippines. I know all that. Well, there is another land that I look forward to as I watch the sunset. I have never seen it. I have never seen anyone who has been there, but it has a more abiding reality than any of these lands which I do know. This land beyond the sunset—this land of immortality, this fair and blessed country of the soul—why this heaven of ours is the one thing in the world which I know with absolute, unshaken, unchangeable certainty. This I know with a knowledge that is never shadowed by a passing cloud of doubt. I may not always be certain about this world; my geographical locations may some times become confused, but the other world—that I know. And as the afternoon sun sinks lower, faith shines more clearly and hope, lifting her voice in a higher key, sings the voice of fruition. My work is about ended, I think. The best of it I have done poorly; and any of it I might have done better, but I have done it. And in a fairer land, with finer material and a better working light, I will do better work.—Robert Burdette.

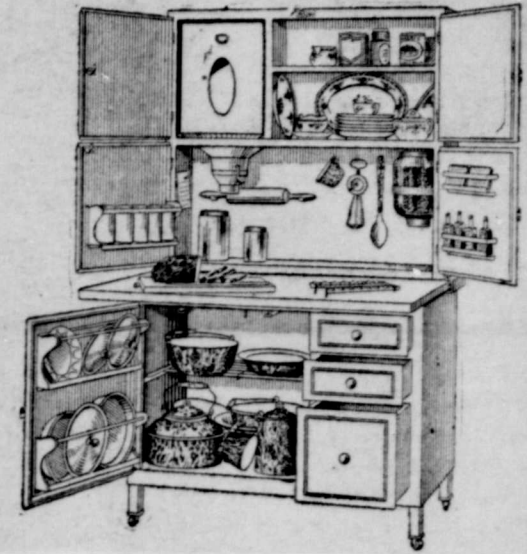

**COTTON CORPORATION MATTERS**

The Cotton and Oil News gave a report of the proceedings before the referee in bankruptcy in the matter of the Southern States Cotton Corporation that will probably interest some people in this county.

After giving a list of claims allowed to attorneys and others for services, the News says: "The net amount for distribution to the creditors after allowing the above accounts would be about \$85,000.00, or about 4c on the dollar.

Acting for the creditors, Messrs N. T. Blackwell, Mr. Semple of Bonham and Mr. Bromberg of Dallas introduced a resolution that all scripholders indebted for notes might offset their notes to the extent of their scrip.

Protests were filed against the allowance of the fees as above stated by Messrs. Yeary and Semple. A request for modification of all fees, was filed by N. T. Blackwell. All these gentlemen represented creditors.

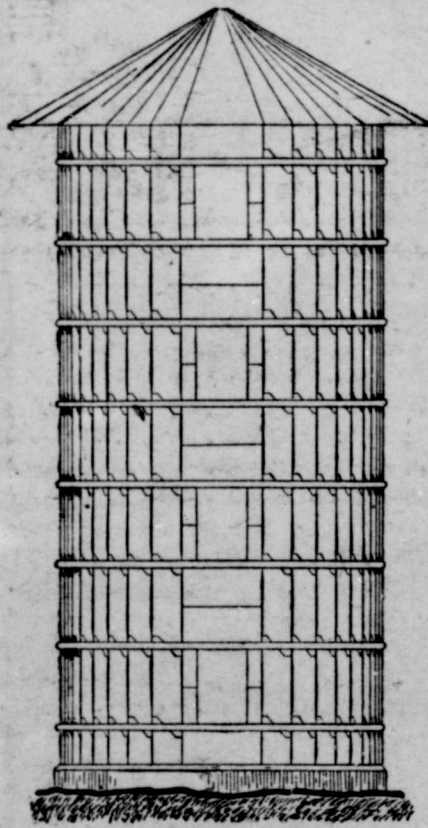

Lists of the school land for sale will be ready for distribution about July 1. As the land will be for sale September 1, this will allow prospective purchasers two months in which to decide which tracts they may desire to purchase. One who wants a list may obtain it by writing to me at Austin.

Land that is situated in the rough mountainous portions of the western counties may be purchased without condition of living on it. Such land is unfit for agricultural purposes and is generally so broken by mountains, rocky hills, canyons and gorges as to be unfit for human habitation. The smooth land there has been sold. It may be that some would want it for trading purposes. Sale with or without settlement is fixed by counties.

Such land as is supposed to be susceptible for agriculture will be for sale to those only who will become actual settlers on it. There will be some 60,000 acres of this class. This is the chance for the one without a home. Heretofore those who lived within five miles of the land could buy it by living on his other land. Not so now. The purchaser must live on the land he buys when it is situated in a county where such tract of land must be sold on condition of settlement. The settlement purchaser pays one-fortieth cash and three per cent interest; the purchaser without settlement pays one-tenth cash and five per cent interest. Each has forty years to pay the balance. Thus is the home builder favored.

**SCHOLASTIC CENSUS**

The scholastic census of the county for the school year 1915-16 has been completed and the reports made to Judge Dalton, ex-officio county superintendent, show a considerable increase over the last school year. The figures show there are in the rural districts a total of 2030 scholars, of which number 1039 are boys and 991 are girls. In Goldthwaite independent district there are 363, of which number 183 are boys and 180 are girls. Mullin independent district has 200 scholars, 101 boys and 99 girls.

Last year's report to the county superintendent's office showed there were 1999 scholars in the rural districts, 346 in Goldthwaite independent district and 182 in Mullin independent district.
