The building for the new creamery is completed and part of the machinery on the ground.

Some of our good citizens are making their arrangements to move to other parts and we want their places filled by others.

The new garage across the street from the bank is another new and useful enterprise belonging to Messrs. Claud and Lint Wilson, who have employed an expert machinist and gone to work in earnest.

The cotton which is very much lacking in quantity and quality, is coming in slowly. We hear them guessing from 700 to 1000 bales as the probable amount that will be ginned at Mullin.

The Temple Boosters, numbering 100 or more, stopped several minutes at Mullin, favored us with some good music, one speech, many handshakes and invitations to our people to visit Temple. The gentleman who made the speech emphasized the fact that they were not inviting us to come to Temple to trade unless it was for articles we could not get from our home merchants. His advice was "Trade at home." They regretted very much the lateness of the hour of their arrival here, but made good the time, entertaining and getting acquainted with our citizens.

Mr. Frank Eply and family have returned to Mullin to live. After several years' wanderings they decided that Mullin was the place to live and they are here heartily welcomed by our people.

Rev. Smith of the Christian church preached four able and very much appreciated sermons at the tabernacle Friday night, Saturday night, Sunday and Sunday night of last week. He is a good preacher, a good man and has a hearing when he comes to Mullin.

The ladies of the Home Mission Society of the Methodist church gave a nice entertainment of readings, songs etc and served ice cream at the air dome one night last week, which was well attended and receipts very satisfactory.

As to visitors there is no end. The young people have gone away to school and our young teachers, of whom there are many, will all leave in the next few days. We will put Mullin against any town of its size in the state for its number of school teachers and good looking girls.

The writer has a class of seventy young ladies and gentlemen in Sunday school and eleven of them will go away to school or to teach and we will still have two teachers left out of the six that remain.

We miss the news items of Joan of Arc, Kate and Dupli-kate, Mothers Dish Washer, Smiling Belle, Uncle John and others whose names we fail to call at present. Success to all of them and may they awake from their protracted silence to be heard from in the near future.

Many other birds are the good friends of man, cleaning trees from scale, and various injurious things that, unaided, he would be unable to cope with. Instead of killing every hawk or owl you see, learn about the birds and discover which among them are your friends. Few birds deserve death at your hand. Without the birds man could scarcely live at all, and if existing, would be deprived of almost every comfort and pleasure.—Milwaukee Journal

Full details will be given by the council before the time for the voters to pass on the proposition, in order that there may be no misunderstanding and every tax payer will have an opportunity to endorse or reject the plan.



Pay Up Week is sure to be a success and should be inaugurated in every community. Some have already decided upon some date in the fall, while others believe the first week in the new year will be the best time. Better make it some time in the fall season.

A mob in Tennessee took a negro from the jail at Dresden a few nights ago and prepared to hang him, but the husband of the white woman in whose room the negro had been found refused to act as executioner, so the prisoner was returned to the jail. Later in the night, however, the mob returned to the jail and took the negro out and hung him.

The conditions along the Mexican border are much to be deplored. While most of the trouble by the Mexicans is caused by their ignorance of the real situation and no serious thought is given by Americans to the invasion plans of the greasers, the bloodshed along the border is far greater than the public has believed. Occasionally an American is killed, but the blood of

many Mexicans pay for it. Just how the trouble is to be settled nobody seems to know.

President Wilson has been highly praised by the people of this and other nations for the careful and dignified manner in which he has conducted affairs of this government with the belligerent nations of Europe. He has not only maintained the dignity of this government, but has attained his aims without becoming involved in the hostilities. Even those who were formerly his political opponents are now coming to see the correctness of his views and acts.

A great many of the better class of county papers are now demanding pay in advance for subscriptions and they are eminently correct. The slipshod, catch-as-catch-can plan in vogue fifty years ago has been shown to be an illogical and unbusiness-like plan and should not be continued by large or small papers. The pay-as-you-enter plan is more satisfactory to the publisher and to most of his patrons and it cuts off the dishonest fellows who claim to have never subscribed after receiving the paper for years, or plead that they paid for one year and thought the other half dozen years they received the paper would be thrown in.

Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo announces that he will place five million dollars on deposit in the Federal Reserve banks of Richmond, Atlanta and Dallas and will follow this with another deposit of fifteen millions a little later. This money is to be loaned to banks on cotton certificates, provided such banks have not charged their customers more than 6 per cent for the money advanced. The local banks must endorse the certificate, however, thereby becoming responsible for the loan. The government proposes to place thirty million dollars in the reserve banks during the cotton season, but as this would not be 5 per cent of the total value of the cotton crop it will not likely be of much benefit.

## BETTER STAPLE

Cotton growers of the South and Southwest lose much every year because of poor staple cotton. Every grower informed on cotton grades knows that poor staple does not receive a price in proportion to that given for a good staple. In other words, buyers do not want poor staple at any price, but are anxious for the best even if it costs a little more than quotations indicate.

Much of the poor quality in cotton could be traced to carelessness in handling. Too often the cotton is piled on the ground without shelter in the field till ready to be ginned. It may be damp and stained and gin very badly, thus injuring the staple. Then the bales may lie on the ground in the ginyard or at the grower's home for several weeks, absorbing moisture and getting further stained. This damage is deducted and the grower must lose it.

This is not all. Many use gin-run seed with no thought of purity or variety and quality of fiber, hence the grower has little idea as to what kind of staple he has. This gives the designing buyer a chance to defraud and it also loads the market with products in which there is little competition.

The cotton grower with good staple has many advantages in the market. Buyers usually have contracts calling for good cotton and they are anxious to buy and pay a good price for it. This increases competition for the grower's products and enables him to sell to advantage.

Now is the time to select seed cotton for next year. By selecting the best bolls from the best plants of an excellent variety, the cotton grower may by starting a seed plant improve his yield and the quality of the staple by a few years of diligent selection.—Farm and Ranch.

**EARTH'S RICHEST AND SAFEST SPOT**

Since the official estimate of our national wealth three years ago exceeds \$187,000,000, total today must now have passed beyond the two billion point. These figures are colossal beyond compare. They represent more than double the wealth of the United Kingdom, our closest competitor, and they very nearly match the combined wealth of England, France and Germany.

Our wealth is ten times that of Italy, eight times that of Austria and four times that of France. These leading European countries are now tearing at one another's vitals and destroying property much faster than they can create it. Hence all Europe is today actually moving backward, while the United States is sweeping swiftly forward to a state of still greater opulence. Ours is the land of plenty, of peace and of opportunity. These three factors are individual investors of Europe to hold fast their American securities, since here is the spot where their capital will be freest of perils and curst of winning a large reward.—Philadelphia Ledger.

The experiments with Sudan grass have now covered four years. Yield for the past three has been 6.22 tons per acre. Although this is smaller than the average yield for Sumac sorghum grown under similar circumstances, the Sudan grass has been found superior in other respects. The finer quality of the hay results in its being more easily handled, and there is less waste in feeding. It is also earlier to mature than Sumac sorghum, being ready for the first cutting in from 70 to 85 days after planting. Seeding is best done with a grain drill, using from 20 to 25 pounds to the acre. Planting in rows and cultivating produces good yields, but the cost of production is greater and the quality of the hay coarser.—U. S. Agricultural Bulletin.

Buyers disregard the samples and cut the cotton in the same old way to ascertain its quality, while the farmer has to pay the ginner for the extra work and "red tape" required by the law.

Mr. Bryan told the Friends of Peace, during their meeting in Chicago, that "this country ought to be thankful that its President loves peace and is trying with every means at his disposal to preserve the country's peace." Doubtless, this praise deserves to be called generous, and yet it could have been made more generous if it had included an acknowledgment on Mr. Bryan's part that he misjudged the wisdom of the President's course when he resigned as a means of expressing his dissent, as well as his fears of the dangers which he thought the President was inviting. However, there is in this acknowledgment of the President's success an implied admission that Mr. Bryan was unduly apprehensive as to the dangers of his course. But it is entirely possible for Mr. Bryan to claim some part of the credit for the success of the President's diplomacy. The beginning of the change of Germany's attitude dates pretty closely from the time of Mr. Bryan's retirement from the Cabinet, and it is at least arguable that it was Mr. Bryan's resignation, or at least the President's acceptance of it which disillusioned the German mind of the notion that the Lusitania note was meant chiefly for "home consumption." The Austrian Ambassador, it will be recalled, somehow got his absurd notion from something that Mr. Bryan had said to him, and proceeded to inform his Government to that effect.—Dallas News.

**KNOW THY STATE**

POSSIBILITIES OF THE SILO.  
By H. G. Harvey.



Mr. H. G. Harvey, head of the Texas Division of the Kalamazoo Silo Company, at Fort Worth, when asked to enumerate some of the advantages of the silo to the Texas farmer, made the following statement:

"The prompt action of the financiers helped the Texas farmers out of their difficulty when the European war caused the bottom to fall out of the cotton market but we are still clinging to the 'one crop' idea. To get rid of that idea is the biggest problem facing us today. The European situation showed us how wrong it was. What the Texas farmer wants to know now is: 'How can I fortify myself against a similar contingency in the future?' The 'cattle idea' is the logical one. It is the only reasonable way in which to diversify the output of this state. It is a sort of a business reinforcement of the most profitable kind. The average Texas farmer contends that cattle don't pay in Texas. That is because he is speaking without the facts. The majority of them will admit that there is little money to be made in feeding cattle up to the finishing point. This is not the case. The majority of the cattle consumed in this country are not grass fed animals. The most money is made in feeding finishing cattle but it is not made according to the old hit or miss feeding and maintenance methods.

Not long ago Texas raised practically all the beef consumed in the United States. Why does she not even raise enough for herself today? The solution of the whole thing lies in the one word—silo. It solves the feeding problem, the fly problem, the mosquito problem and the tick fever problem. If the Texas farmer had silos he could have the best and cheapest feed in the world for all manner of cattle at all times but particularly when the pasture had given out. He could mature and fatten cattle regardless of the weather or conditions of any kind. There would be no Texas cattle sent out of the state for finishing. Texas soil would get all the fertilizer and it needs it. A silo should be properly constructed and should be built of the right kind of material if it is to be a success in Texas. It must be adapted to Texas conditions, Texas climate and Texas needs. Forty-two years of successful experience in building silos has proved beyond the shadow of a doubt that the Silo, made from Texas clay, in Texas, by Texans and for Texans is the best silo for use in this state. 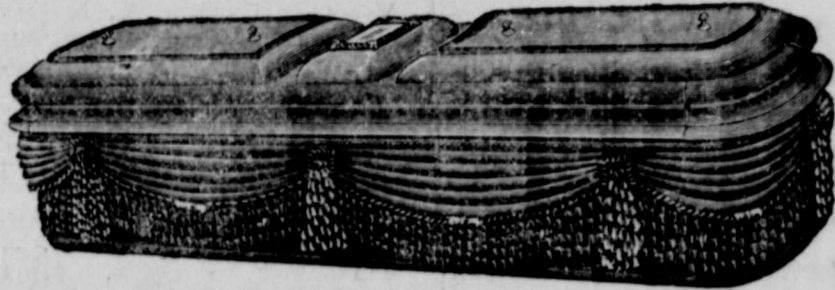

## STEWARDSHIP OF TIME, ABILITY AND MONEY

"The Earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof, the World and they that dwell therein."

God has made each of His children a steward in His kingdom. The stewardship of one may be over one thing and that of another over another thing, but everyone is a steward of his time.

Many sigh and their hearts are heavy because they have so little time to give to the Lord's work, but this is a mistaken view, for every little task, even though it be very humble, may be done with a cheerful, fervent zeal, heartily as unto the Lord and the Lord looks down upon you with favor and sees that you are faithful to your trust. I would not belittle the work of men and women who give a large part or the whole of their time to what we term the work kingdom. God called them into the work and has made it and them a blessing to the world, but if we are denied that pleasure let us give our time faithfully to God in the place to which we are assigned.

**The Stewardship of Ability.**  
God has given some ability to every individual and to me the saddest thing in the world is the waste of ability, the failure to recognize our stewardship. God never gave talent or ability to a man that it did not carry with it a tremendous responsibility. When we see a fine intellect undeveloped or unused, when we see a fine physical form given to useless and unprofitable uses or wrecked by strong drink, when we see the gift of social abilities frittered away in meaningless and unprofitable pleasures, when we see the ability for leadership exerted to lead men and women downward, our hearts are made sad and we deplore the waste of ability with which God has endowed men and women to advance the work of the kingdom.

**The Stewardship Of Money.**  
Money is necessary for the work of the Kingdom and also for the affairs of this life, but God's children should hold themselves always as stewards and the money as well as our time and ability belong to our Master. Money is a curse when used for any purpose that will not in some way contribute to the advancement of the Kingdom of God or the uplift of humanity and betterment. Let us as servants of our King so consecrate our time, our ability, our money and our lives to the service of our God that He will commend our faithfulness over little things and give unto us opportunity for greater usefulness and service for "Ye are not your own, ye are bought with a price."
