Great interest is now manifested in the movements in the Balkans, since it has become almost positively known they will go into the European war. Bulgaria will be on the side of Germany and Austria, while the others will be on the side of the allies. No definite move has yet been made, but the outlook is for an early ending of the suspense.

The announcement is made in Washington that President Wilson will be married the first week in December to Mrs. Edith Galt, widow of Norman Galt, a Washington jeweler. Since the death of her husband eight years ago the widow has continued the business under management of her brother. President Wilson's wife died in August, 1914, and has, therefore, been dead fourteen months. The bride-to-be is a close friend of the president's daughters and it is through her friendship with them she has been much in the president's society since the death of his wife.

Almost every week other county papers are added to the list requiring payment of subscription in advance and soon all of the "old timers" who play at catch-as-catch-can with their subscribers will come to see the error of their way. The small amount of subscription charged could be paid in advance as well as at the end of the year or later. When the rule is universally adopted the dishonest fellow who takes a paper as long as the publisher will trust him and then claims he "never subscribed" will either become a respectable citizen or discontinue reading his county papers.

It has been evident for a long time that the banditry that has been going on along the Rio Grande on the Texas side was due to the fact that there has been an easy and safe asylum for the bandits on the Mexican side. Whether they were alien or domestic bandits—and they have been of both varieties—they had only to make their way across a narrow and not very deep stream to be exempt from pursuit. General Naffarste, in command of the Carranza forces at that point, has done so little either to prevent these incursions or to capture the criminals seeking asylum in Mexico as to suggest that he connived at their activities as a means of venting feelings of resentment against the United States. Apparently Carranza has taken note of General Naffarste's delinquency; at all events, the announcement comes that General Naffarste is to be removed, which justifies the expectation that his successor will co-operate with American officers in their efforts to capture these bandits. It is to be hoped this expectation will be realized. If it shall be, these criminal activities will subside quickly and furthermore, Carranza's chance of being recognized as the de facto President of Mexico will become much brighter. Carranza, for once, seems to have unbended.—Dallas News.

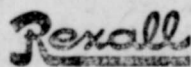
Not all of us would agree upon what is meant by making good. It means one thing for one person and quite a different thing for another. But perhaps all would agree that to make good each of us must be successful enough in what we undertake to meet our own approval, at least, under the existing circumstance in other words, we must be in a measure satisfied with our achievements to make good.

But success in farming means more than is generally meant in other business. Not only must large crops and adequate profits be made one year, but the land must be left capable of producing equal or larger crop the following year, and the other years that swiftly follow. Enough feed and food crops must be produced to run the farm while another crop is being produced. The buildings must be kept in the proper repair, the implements must be replenished, suitable power and machines bought and the home kept in order. Livestock must be raised to consume the surplus feed, to provide work teams and to supplement the revenue.

But these are not all. Every farmer is a part of the community. He owes his neighbors, his county and state something. In addition to making good in producing a competence on the farm we should take an interest in rural society, the schools, churches, roads and moral tone of the community will demand some consideration at our hands. To make good as a highly respected and progressive citizen, we must devote some thought to helping our neighbors build up the community. Unless we do this it will be hard to approve our own efforts at the end of the year when the harvest is finished. Make good as a neighbor and citizen.—Farm and Ranch.

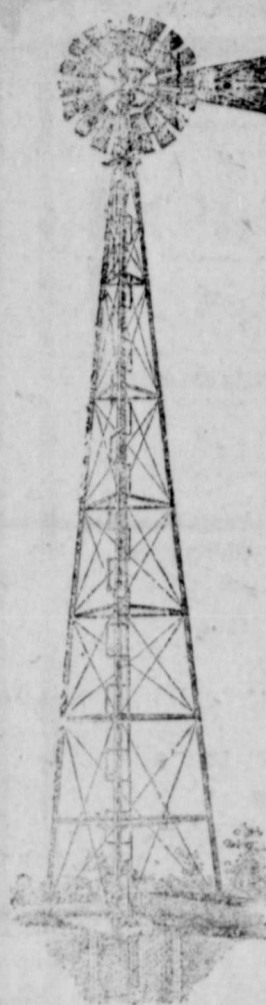

Dress up week, buy it in Texas week, buy it in October and many other movements have been started to improve business conditions and they are all good and show an enterprising spirit.

The manager of a coffin company at Chattanooga, Tenn., was arrested a few days ago on a charge of violating the federal law by shipping intoxicating liquors in coffins from his factory to customers.

The trial of Judge Frye, formerly county judge of Young county, on a charge of forgery resulted in a verdict of guilty and the assessment of a two years sentence. The case was tried at Wichita Falls on a charge of venue.

The liberty bell will only be allowed to remain in Dallas two hours. A special railroad track will be built thru the streets of the city in order that the bell may be viewed from both sides of the streets by the multitudes that will be there to see it. The effort of Mayor Lindsley of Dallas to have the bell remain in Dallas a full day did not avail.

The jury in the lunacy trial of the brakeman Meyers, convicted of the murder of Superintendent Montague of the Fort Worth terminal, found the brakeman sane. This was an unusual case in that it was not claimed the man was insane at the time he committed the crime, but brooding over the fact that he was to be hung had made him crazy.

The killing of Dr. Saylor by Mrs. Joe Kirkpatrick at Hillsboro Saturday afternoon was a second chapter in a tragedy in which they were concerned. The physician was under indictment for killing the woman's husband at Bynum. The tragedy occurred a few feet from the stand from which Wm. J. Bryan had addressed an immense audience a few moments previous to the shooting.

A reduction of \$91,000 in the appropriation of the national government for the Texas National guard for the ensuing year, has been announced by the government. Thus the guard will get \$9,000 instead of \$100,000. It is claimed the reduction was made because a large amount of equipment was stolen and sold to the Mexican revolutionists. Three men were indicted at San Antonio in connection with the charge of defrauding the government in the uniforms and other equipments provided for the volunteer soldiers.

President Ripley of the Santa Fe Railroad company has notified the authorities at Ardmore that his company will pay damages for the loss of property and life in Ardmore by the explosion of a gasoline tank on the railroad track there last week. A commission has been appointed to adjust the claims for damages to be paid. Property loss was a half million dollars or more, forty-seven people were killed and others were injured. The Santa Fe company voluntarily assumes the payment of all this damage, estimated at fully a million dollars.

Folks used to think that the only real gold-r was the man who marched away to the sound of fife and drum, to shoot and kill and destroy. It is not so.—Farm Life.

Several cases have been disposed of by the court, but only one of sufficient consequence to attract attention and that was a suit by Wm. Olesen vs. Wm. Grille et al. It was for partition and trespass to try title and the court rendered a judgment for the defendants.

Judge Robinson, District Attorney Ward and Stenographer Monteith left for their homes in Belton Thursday night and will return in time to open court Monday.

Next week there will be several jury cases before the court and perhaps the proceedings will be of more general interest. The jurors have been notified to appear at 9 o'clock Monday morning and the court will likely begin business early in the day.
