WATER WORKS FOR GOLDTHWAITE

Goldthwaite, Texas, Oct. 15, 1915.

Editor Eagle:

If you will grant me space in the Eagle for a short communication I desire to express to the citizens of Goldthwaite my views on the proposition to issue bonds for a system of water works.

To begin with I will say that at first thought I was opposed to the bonds, because of the fact that the water mains will not reach every portion of the town and for the further reason that I am only a householder in the city and have no financial interest in any business or business house in the city, while I own my own water system, which is sufficient for domestic purposes and my property lies beyond the limits prescribed for the water mains, according to the profile of the system now on display and said to be the one prepared by the engineer.

After mature deliberation and much thought on the subject I have decided that I can not afford to oppose the progressive movement inaugurated by our city council and advocated by many of our best citizens. While I own no business here, as I stated before, I have an interest in the town for my home is here and all of my earthly possessions are here. My interest may not be as much financially as some others, but I feel that as a patriotic citizen I can not oppose the plan proposed for the protection of the property of my neighbors and friends, as well as the property of schools and churches, which would be given some protection from fire loss. This is not all the benefits to accrue from a system of water works. Our property will be increased in value and to that extent I will be benefitted personally. Then, too, the water can be used for street sprinkling and the goods in the stores can be protected from dirt and dust that now blows in clouds through the streets and into the stores. None of these goods belong to me, to be sure, but when my family and myself need supplies of any kind we must select from these same goods on which the dust has settled. Then in the interest of the cleanliness and good health I am interested in street sprinkling and in providing for such sprinkling.

The objection that the mains do not reach all parts of town is met fully, in my mind, by the assurance that the mains will be extended as rapidly as possible and that all water works systems are built on the plan of expansion and few cities have been able to install at the first a water system reaching every nook and corner of such city, but the systems have grown and expanded. I have faith in my fellow men and officers of the city and believe they are honest and true in their assurance that they intend to expand and extend the system as rapidly as possible.

The rate of taxation was a 'boog-ahoo' to me until I made some investigations and I found that only 25 cents on \$100 property valuation would be necessary to install the system proposed by the council. This rate will increase my taxes \$3.00 per annum and while I am not a rich man and the money for the taxes must be earned by my labor, I feel that I can afford to invest \$3 per year in an enterprise that some of the leading business men and best financiers say will be a good thing for our town. If they should prove incorrect I will not make a serious and costly mistake in supporting the plan, while if they are correct in their conclusions I would make a grievous and perhaps irreparable mistake in opposing the plan.

I have lived in Goldthwaite long enough to see enough property destroyed by fire to install several such water systems as the one proposed and I hope by my vote and a small amount paid in taxes to prevent a repetition of the calamities that have visited the town in the way of fires in years gone by. I hope all those who have felt to oppose the water works bonds will come to look at the proposition as I do and that Goldthwaite will soon join the ranks of the best towns in Texas by installing a first class system of water works.

Ward, the state's attorney for this district, being on hand to look after the evil-doers, if there are any in Mills county. A large number of people were in town and the Blade's circulation was extended to a good many Mills county homes. We have our friends, A. J. Harrison of Goldthwaite and T. J. Goldthwaite is a good town of about two thousand people. It has large mercantile concerns, good banks and a good county paper with an up-to-date plant and an enterprising publisher. The Eagle has been there with R. M. Thompson in charge for a long time and many papers have been started there and then quit the field during that time. Like Tennyson's brook, the Eagle runs on forever and grows better as it gets older.

There is one particular in which the town is very much behind, and that is it has no system of water works and wind mills are in evidence in every direction. But we learned that a water works plant is among the things the town is going to have before long.

Mills county farmers seem to have made good grain and feed crops this year, but all complained of short cotton crops. Many of them reported serious damage to cotton by boll weevils and said that boll weevil had even damaged pecans in places. Some with whom we talked said they had good pecan crops, while others said theirs had been almost ruined.

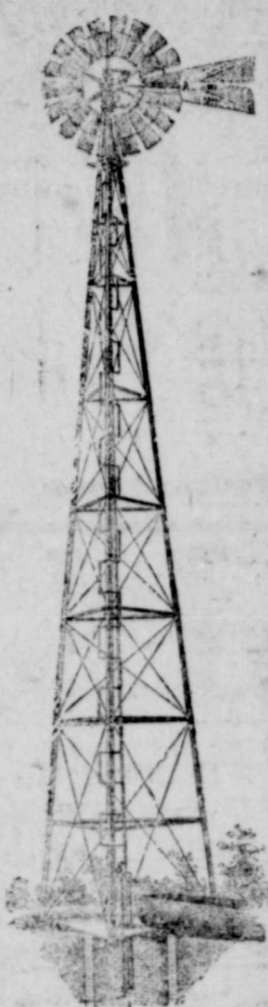
