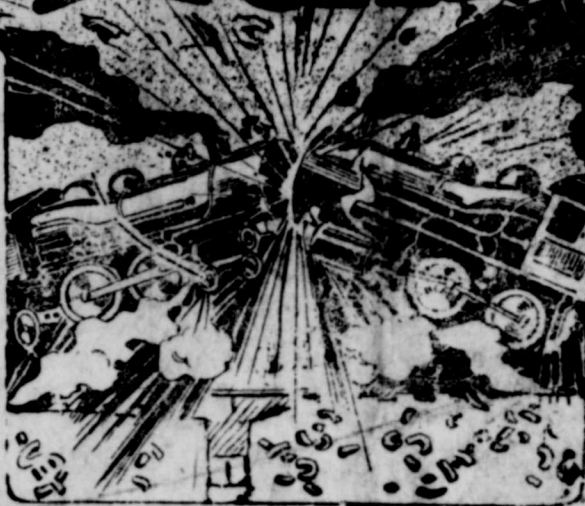

The diphtheria scare in the town has subsided, most of the supposed cases have been discharged and the children are in school again.

Jno W. Roberts of Rock Springs, chairman of the Democratic executive committee of this county, went to Dallas Thursday night to be present at the fair on Democratic day, which was yesterday.

Rev. J. C. Forester and his wife and little son left Tuesday for San Angelo to attend the annual conference. It is confidently believed by many of the Methodist people that Brother Forester will be returned to this work for another year.

The president of a big loan company of St. Louis announced this week that his company was preparing to invest ten million dollars in Texas and that the whole world was looking to this state for profitable investments.

Seven of the defendants in the "moonshine" case at Fort Smith, Ark., plead guilty this week to the indictments charging illicit distilling and illegally disposing of intoxicating liquors. Others named in the indictments are to be tried in January. In the list are several prominent men, some of them former government officers and revenue agents.

Ten Mexicans were killed in the Brownsville section as a result of the wrecking of the passenger train and killing two soldiers. They may not have been those identified with the murderous deed, but they were undoubtedly equally as bad and were ready to take part in a similar undertaking. It is to be hoped this last outrageous act of the savages coming into Texas from across the Rio Grande will cause the soldiers stationed along the border to do their duty and do it well. They should remember that all Mexicans look alike.

Mexican bandits wrecked a train on the St. Louis, Brownsville and Mexican road near Brownsville Sunday night and shot to death two United States soldiers, wounding another. They robbed the passengers and then burned a bridge to prevent aid reaching the passengers. The deed was carefully planned and could only have been conceived by Mexicans, as it was more devilish in its details than civilized people could have imagined. They drew the spikes that held the railroad track in place and attached wires to the rails. When the train was too close to be stopped they pulled the wires and thereby displaced the rails, derailing the train, killing the engineer, scalding the fireman and injuring others. The bandits all wore the uniform of Carranza soldiers.

One of the most disastrous and unremunerative speculations the average man or woman can engage in is the purchase of the proposed oil stocks that are being placed on the market at from \$1.00 to \$100 per share. Take the history of oil field developments in Texas and not one of these stock schemes in a thousand brings any real profit to the purchaser. A few instances are on record where during the excitement of the boom stocks in a company with three or four acres of land in a new territory where a company of \$25,000 or \$30,000 capital stock have advanced over the per price for a few days at last. Strange, though, those who buy oil stocks will hardly ever take their profits when they can get them. They want more and more. Generally speaking when a few acres of land are leased in a new oil field for \$500 or \$1000 per acre for drilling purposes and a \$25,000 to \$50,000 company organized and stock sold, if a real big roaring gusher was brought in, the stock would hardly bring par. If a dry well is brought the whole scheme is a dead loss and sometimes a small well is worse and more expensive to the stockholders than a perfectly dry hole. But this is a free country and those who have from \$1.00 to \$10.00, clerks, laborers, washer-women, widows, orphans, farmers, capitalists, bankers, millionaires, merchants and loafers can spend their money as they see fit. It is really nobody's personal business how much money is put in the proposed "get-rich-quick" schemes and the game will continue to work, day and night to the limit and over time, forever and a day.—Georgetown Commercial.

NEIGHBORING NEWS

Items of Interest Cull'd From Local Papers of Towns Mentioned.

HAMILTON

Uncle Will Moore had another stroke of paralysis last Friday and great uneasiness has been felt for his condition. He is resting easy but the family fear a change for the worse at any moment.

Mrs. J. D. Martin had the misfortune to get her arm broken Sunday night and has been suffering a great deal. She was leading a calf and it ran, and the rope got wrapped around her wrist and she was jerked over on the ground, with the result stated.

On last Friday morning about 2 o'clock the beloved wife of Robert E. Lee of Shive was called away by the hand of Death and her body was laid to rest in the Shive cemetery the following afternoon, Rev Bruce Summerford conducting the funeral services.

The total tax values in Hamilton county for the year 1915, as shown by the assessor's rolls, are \$9,654,010. In 1914 they were \$9,733,300. The total amount of state and county taxes assessed in Hamilton county in 1915 is \$1,011,641.26. In 1914 the total assessment was \$85,345.88.

Mrs. Alice McCain, accompanied by her niece Miss Alice Price, went to Waco Sunday to consult an eye specialist. She had become almost totally blind a day or two before, and Dr Kooker had been called in. He examined her eyes and found the optic nerve almost destroyed and at his suggestion she decided to consult other specialists. The doctor in Waco could not give her much encouragement, so she decided to go to Dallas.—Herald.

LAMPASAS

Mrs. W. H. Porter, aged about 35 years, died Monday at or near Nix, and the body was buried at Nix Tuesday afternoon. She was a native of Alabama, and was married there to Mr. Porter a few years ago.

The election Saturday of last week is said to have cost the county about \$500. Robert G. Eckhardt, of Taylor, is now senator from this district, in place of T. H. McGregor, who resigned to accept a more permanent position with the state. There was a very light vote polled throughout the four counties which compose the Twentieth senatorial district.

Little Florence, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. H. Bean, died suddenly Thursday afternoon, Oct. 7. Six months ago she inhaled a small bean which passed as thought into the lungs, and for many weeks she lingered between life and death. Recently she was much improved and strong hopes were entertained of her final recovery.

Workmen have about finished the stone and brick work on the new postoffice building, and the rafters for the roof have been put in place. Soon the roof will go on, and then the floor and plastering work, as well as the inside partitions will be put in, and it is said by the contractors that the building will be ready for the transfer of the postoffice property by the first of the coming month.

The neat and well furnished home of J. H. Litton was destroyed by fire Sunday afternoon, the alarm being sounded about 4 o'clock, and the fire department going at once to the place. Nearly 1000 feet of hose was laid, and then the water pressure appeared weak, but afterwards the direct pressure was put on and the water supply was good and of great force. The fire had made so much roadway that the department could do little towards checking it, and the house with a large part of the furniture was completely destroyed. It is not known how the fire originated.—Leader.

BARN BURNED

Duke Clements' barn was destroyed by fire Thursday afternoon and the proximity of the barn to the residence and other buildings caused much anxiety, but hard work on the part of citizens prevented the spread of the flames. The barn contained a considerable amount of corn, hay and other feed stuff, while a nice buggy was in the shed adjoining the barn and was also lost.

The fire is supposed to have spread from a burned hen nest in the buggy shed. Mr. Clements' fowls had been afflicted with mites and he thought to get rid of the insects by burning out a hen nest. He was careful to prevent the fire reaching the barn, but it is evident some portion was overlooked, for the barn was discovered on fire in about an hour after the burning of the hen nest.

The loss was complete, there being no insurance on the building or contents, but some of the feed stuff was uninjured.

The guests were Mesdames Jesse Cockrum, Omer Weatherby and A. J. Harrison.

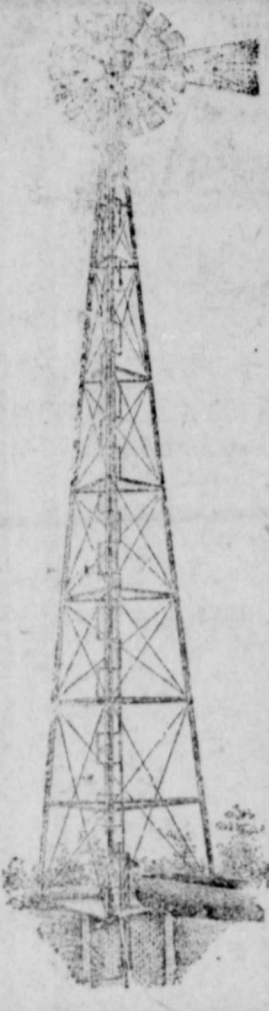

GINNERS REPORT

The ginnners report reached us last week too late for publication in that issue. The reports made by the Mills county ginnners to the federal bureau show that 1788 bales of cotton had been ginned in the county up to Sept. 25, as compared with 4134 bales to the same date in 1914.

COTTON RECEIPTS

Cotton receipts up to the time the Eagle was put to press were: At the public yard 1993 bales, against 5956 on the same date last year. At the Farmers Union yard 1590 bales had been received, against 2552 on the same date last year.

The claim that "times are hard" and money hard to get is not supported by the practices of the people. The Dallas fair and all other fairs are having unusually large attendance, while many have hied away to the Panama-Pacific exposition at San Francisco. The railroad equipment is being taxed to the limit to provide transportation for the traveling public. There must be some mistake about "times being hard."

Beyond a doubt the greatest and most immediate threatening danger of the United States is immigration. The next session of congress should take up the matter and promptly pass a law restricting or totally prohibiting immigration except under very favorable conditions. A mere declaration should not entitle a foreigner to vote at all until he takes out naturalization papers and has lived in this country not less than ten years. Every loyal citizen, whether native born or foreign, should give this matter serious consideration.—Farm and Ranch.

The trade territory of a town is not dependent upon the distance to the neighboring trading points. The trade territory depends upon the enterprise of the merchants and the residents of the town. If a town does not reach after the trade, it will grow as it is forced to. But if the merchants go after the business in the surrounding country, advertising in every possible way, and making good every word of their advertising, trade will come from an ever increasing radius, the town will gain a reputation for being awake and it will forge to the front. It is the men in the town, and not altogether the men living within a certain number of miles from it that makes the town.—Girard Reporter.

The European war has caused those entrusted with the military defense of this country to take notice of our utter unpreparedness to defend our country against foreign invasion or force a recognition of our rights by belligerent nations. Plans are being formulated for a large increase in the national defense, as is shown by the following special from Washington: "The administration program for national defense to be recommended to the forthcoming session of Congress, proposing a total expenditure for the army and navy next year of about \$400,000,000, was practically completed tonight. Secretary Garrison's plan, approved by the President, calls for an increase of \$75,000,000 in the War Department's annual appropriation to be used for augmenting the regular army to 140,000 men and the creation of a new continental army of 400,000 men, which, together with the militia of 125,000, would give the United States a military force in time of need of 665,000.

PLAN FAVORED

Indications Are the Vote on Water Works Bonds Will Be Favorable.

While the outcome of an election can never be foretold with certainty, there is every reason to believe the proposition to issue city bonds to install a system of water works will be endorsed by a large majority of the property taxpayers of the city. Some good citizens have seen fit to oppose the water works, but it is hoped and believed they will look further into the matter and decide they can not afford to cast their ballots against a move of so great importance to the whole people. Every person in the city is interested in water works to a greater or less extent and the system is so absolutely necessary to the well-being of the town that those who are tempted to cast their votes against the system should think carefully.

Thousands upon thousands of dollars worth of property have been destroyed by fire in the business part of the town and yet we have never before undertaken to secure water works to give protection from the flames. True the matter has been frequently discussed and always there have been so many different plans suggested that it was thought best to wait and attempt to get the people all of one mind. After years and years of waiting without attaining the desired results the city council procured the services of an expert in the matter of putting in water works systems, a careful survey was made of the city and an estimate made of the amount of pressure from a reservoir fed from wells. This plan works satisfactory elsewhere and will work satisfactorily in Goldthwaite.

There may be a more excellent way to secure the water system, but the people will not accept it and the indications are they will endorse the plan outlined by people who know and have experience in installing water works.

Some people have expressed the fear that the well will not supply a sufficient amount of water for domestic purposes and street sprinkling, while adequate pressure is kept in the reservoir for fire protection. This is a very reasonable suggestion and is worthy of careful consideration, but the council has wisely made a provision in the contract with the engineering company that a well is to be sunk and a test made of the flow of water before any further expense is incurred. If the flow proves too small for the requirements and a supply of water can not be secured from any other source the entire plan is to be dropped and the only money expended by the city will be the sinking of the well. Surely the city can afford to dig a well in an endeavor to secure water works. Surely the doubt about the well supplying the water will not deter citizens from voting for the water works bonds when they know there will be no further expense than the sinking of a well if their fears prove correct.

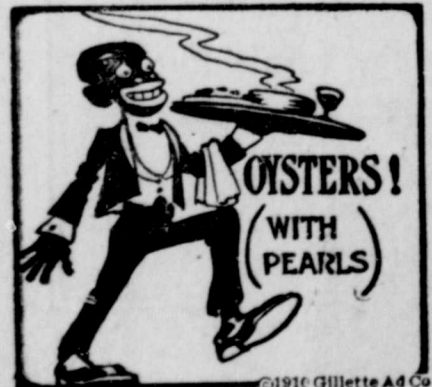

A CLOSE CALL

A Collision Between a Railroad Locomotive and a Hack.

MORE STUDY—LESS WORK

The average farmer works too hard and fails to take enough rest and recreation. It may and often does happen that in certain seasons such as winter, when he is not pressed with work, little may be done. But this is exceptional, as there is generally work in repairing, making improvements and other work not directly connected with cultivating the soil. Hence there is too great demand made upon the physical strength and endurance of the farmer and his family.

At the factory everything that can be done to save labor is carefully done. Whenever a machine is found that will save labor it is generally installed, even though the expense is considerable. The manager regards the machine as part of his investment and is satisfied if it takes some time for it to pay for itself in the cost of labor.

This is suggestive to managers of farms. It is not at all necessary for an implement or machine to pay for itself in one or even two or three years, yet many of them will. The object should be to save labor, which is profit after the machine or implement pays for the original cost.

There is, of course, one advantage the manufacturer has over the farmer; the manufacturer can usually borrow capital, if he hasn't it, at a very low rate of interest, while the farmer must pay a high rate if he is able to borrow at all. But conditions that handicap the farmer in securing the capital must change. When cash buying is the rule and when the farm is made to yield sufficient cash to permit deposits at the banks, then will credit be more easily and cheaply obtained and the farmer may secure credit upon satisfactory terms.

Most manufacturers find it more profitable to work no more than eight hours per day. More than this number of hours per day is illegal in many states because it has been found that people need rest and recreation and it is not economical for either the employer or the employed to work longer. Yet in the busy season farmers and their children work 10 or 12 hours per day often and many wonder why they are not more efficient.

More mental work and less physical labor would be a good motto for next year. As the mental faculties are trained, labor becomes easier and the laborer more efficient as a producer. It would be profitable for every farm manager to reduce his hours of physical labor, but at the same time increase the number of hours for study. This will mean greater efficiency and hence larger profits.—Farm and Ranch
