CITY COUNCIL

The city council held a called session Monday night for the purpose of canvassing the returns from the recent bond election and declaring the result. It was found that 108 votes were cast in favor of the proposition to issue \$31,000 in bonds to install a system of water works for the city and 46 votes were cast against it. The order recently adopted requiring oil companies to move storage tanks out of the city limits was reiterated and ordered enforced.

The council announced a determination to have work begin on the water works system as soon as possible, the first work to be the sinking of a well to be sure of sufficient water.

MULLIN

Pay Me That Thou Owest.

It is certainly anything but pleasant for an honest man to become involved and wake up to the fact of his inability to pay, but such has been the lot of many good men, whose ideas of financing failed to pan out as they contemplated when making the venture. We are not ready nor are all inclined (as the manner of some is) to condemn a man and call in question his honesty because he becomes involved and can't meet his debt obligations. We believe some very poor men have as high ideals of honor, as do men in the highest places in the gift of man. We further believe that there are many such men whose lives have been touched by the Divine and whose heart strings are attuned to the music of the skies and whose praises go up daily to Him who spoke as never man spake.

It is not always the loud, ready to speak, who enjoy communion with God, but often the still quite life goes down to deeper depths, where the boisterous waves of sin and disobedience fail to disturb the peace that lies beneath these depths.

So it is with an honest man who has unfortunately become involved financially beyond his ability to pay. Deep down in his heart beyond the reading or interpretation of those he owes there is a burning desire to be liberated from the toils of debt, for having heard what has been said about others who couldn't pay their debts being dishonest, he could but feel the same accusation lay in store for him.

The death of Booker Washington, the celebrated negro educator, occurred at Tuskegee, Ala., Sunday morning. He was one of the most noted members of the black race and for many years exerted an influence for good among the black people, but in later years his influence for good was lost.

Bell county was placed in the dry column in last Saturday's election by a majority between 400 and 500. The campaign in that county was hard fought on both sides and even Governor Ferguson and some of his appointees made speeches in the county and exerted the influence of the administration on the side of the anti's. No doubt the efforts made by the governor and some of his friends to make his administration an issue in the campaign influenced many voters.

Again has President Woodrow Wilson demonstrated that he is a great man—one above the small ways of small people. An employe of a post-office in Illinois criticized the president for his marriage so soon after the death of his first wife and for this criticism the employe was discharged. When the matter was brought to the attention of the president he promptly issued an order requiring that the man be re-instated. A man's opinion of Mr. Wilson's private acts certainly has no bearing upon his ability in the public service and it should not be a test of his party fealty.

The whiskey or cigarette breath are very poor recommendations for a young man seeking a reputable job. It is a pity that so many splendid young men are being discounted in the business world on account of the useless and harmful habits. In the "Help Wanted" columns of the newspapers all over the country the provision "no cigarette fiends or roozers wanted" is becoming more popular. Business men want clear-headed, vigorous young men whose good morals, and the best class of customers, to look after their affairs. Such men will always find the best jobs, for the best jobs are looking for them.—Kerville Advance.

The person that stands on the street corner looking around for something to gossip about or to find fault with, can always find what he is looking for. But what a life he lives. His soul shrives and withers until it is shown in his manner and looks. For such a life has lost its savor. It becomes sour, misanthropic, whining. He passes from bad to worse and sees no good in anybody. His taxes are always too high, no matter how low they may be, and he blames his neighbor because his neighbor is prosperous and enjoys life. In fact, he hates himself, is a menace to a town's prosperity, a foe to God and no good to the devil.—Lubbock Avianche.

Every concern doing business in a community is under obligation to give to that community the very best service possible in exchange for the local patronage received and expected. A concern that gets its support from the people is under obligation to help that people maintain the best conditions possible, and to fall in this matter is equal to forfeiting the claim to public patronage. We hear a great deal about trading at home, and the Herald thoroughly believes in it; thinks home people should, as far as possible, trade with the local people, but it also believes the local concern should give value and should be interested in local matters. There is a common interest in community life, and all must meet this interest and have part in it if the community is to advance.—Palestine Herald.

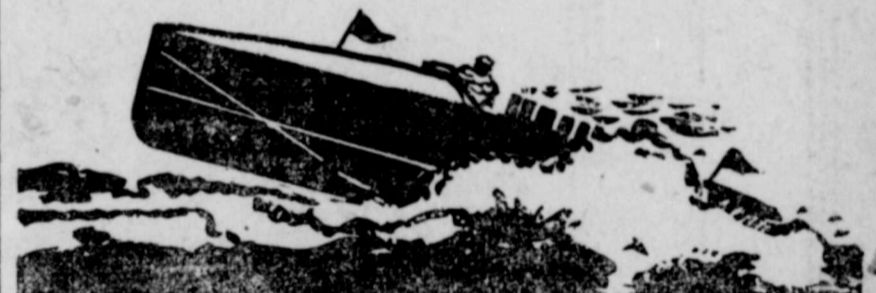
