

A negro trusty in the Illinois penitentiary has been convicted of the murder of the warden's wife and his punishment fixed at death. It will be remembered that Mrs. Allen was killed in the warden's apartments last June and several convicts made their escape.

A most mysterious murder case has developed in Dallas. A lady of good family and standing was missing from her home for ten days or longer and then her body was found in the suburbs of the city, where it had been carried after the murder was committed by strangulation.

The postoffice department has sent out notices to postmasters that parcels addressed to points in Germany or Austria-Hungary can not be forwarded by mail and are to be rejected. The department gives as a reason that the steamship companies will not undertake delivery of such parcels.

Governor Ferguson left the first of the week for a trip to Chicago, where he is to deliver an address. He will go from there to Washington to hold a conference with President Wilson over the Mexican situation and will likely visit New York before he returns home. During his absence Lieutenant Governor Hobby is acting governor.

Henry Ford will sail for Europe today, accompanied by many advocates of peace. They expect to exert an influence over the crowned heads of Europe to induce them to settle their differences speedily and discontinue war. Mr. Ford is enthusiastic with the hope of bringing about the much desired results and says he will spend his entire fortune if necessary, to bring about peace in Europe.

A special from New York says: "American publishers of the Bible are this year for the first time selling Bibles in the British, French, Russian, South African and Australian markets. The publishers estimate that the number of Bibles printed in the United States this year will exceed the normal by fifty per cent, an unprecedented increase. One of the largest Bible houses reports the publication and sale of a million Bibles within a year. Bibles for the Christmas trade are being published in 980 different styles and will sell for from twenty cents to \$50 a copy.

The idea of a bank as a place to put money should be encouraged. It is usually looked on as merely a place to get money, to borrow, and not a place to put money. When men begin to save part of what they make, or invest it in profit-bearing things the sooner will the farmers begin to understand what thrift means. Thrift is essential to any community if it is to do well. A community may devote its energies to borrowing all the time and never to saving, and destroy itself. Living at home will enable many men to put money in the bank instead of borrowing money at the bank.—Greenville Banner.

Mr. Bryan is vociferously positive that preparedness for war is unchristian. But China is so unprepared for war she couldn't tie a can to dog's tail, yet China is the most unchristian of all the big nations. The fact is that Christianity and preparedness are not opponents, nor are Christianity and unpreparedness friends. It isn't a question of religious ethics. It is a question of whether or not we really wish to turn the other cheek when smitten on the nearest one. Perhaps Mr. Bryan is in favor of accepting the smite in humility, but Mr. Wilson, who is accounted as sincere a Christian as he is a sincere American, is in favor of being in a position to avoid the first smite. That is the essence of preparedness—to make smiting look too hazardous.—Dallas News.

## NEIGHBORING NEWS

Items of Interest Culled From Local Papers of Towns Mentioned.

### LOMETA

A business change of considerable interest took place Wednesday when W. A. Dykes purchased the Busy Bee Cafe and Bakery from J. M. Dent.

Mrs. Henry Barefoot died at her home on the McAnelly farm in the Bend country Tuesday night, death resulting from tuberculosis.

Last Tuesday night Manager Page gave a grand free opening of his new opera house. The performance was one of unusual interest, and was witnessed by a large crowd.

The first regular meeting of the Thirteen Club was with Mrs. W. H. Walton on Thursday, and for this hospitality Mrs. Walton welcomed Misses Kirby, Horn and Alexander and Mrs. T. J. Proctor as additional players also Mesdames W. T. Moore and J. T. McCarson as new members.

The many friends of W. H. Walton regret to know that he was forced to undergo an operation in Temple the first of the week for the removal of the third finger on his right hand. A short time ago Mr. Walton stuck a barb in his finger and it was thought he had recovered from the injury when the finger became inflamed, causing him such pain that he consulted a doctor. He was told that blood poison had set up, and immediately left for Temple. The Reporter, in common with Mr. Walton's many other friends, trusts he will soon be fully recovered from the injury.—Reporter.

### COMANCHE

Collis Aaron, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Aaron, died at the home of his parents last Saturday, November 20. He had been an invalid, suffering from tuberculosis.

The Commissioners' Precinct No. 4, usually spoken of as the DeLeon Precinct is soon to vote on a road tax of 15c on the \$100. The election is ordered for Saturday, December 4.

J. C. McNear, buyer for the Herrington Mule Co. of Kansas City, tells us that during the past five days he has shipped one hundred and two mules averaging \$140 per head or \$16,280 worth of mules out of this section.

While coming into town from the Schauer ranch last Sunday evening, alone, Tom Holmsley, in some manner lost control of his car and striking a bump in the roadway the car turned completely over, catching Mr. Holmsley beneath. Ralph Watson and family coming down the road a few minutes later found him pinned beneath the car. He expired, his neck having been broken by the force of the fall and his body badly mashed by the weight of the car. Mr. Watson was unable to get the car off of him but hurried to town and secured help and went back and got him.—Chief.

## NEW COURT HOUSE PROPOSED

The project to rebuild, remodel or add to the present Brown county court house is still only a project, the Commissioners Court not yet having made up its mind as to what course to pursue. There are three plans under consideration, and the Commissioners will thoroughly investigate each plan before deciding how they will solve the problem.

In order that there may be a general expression of opinion on the subject, the Commissioners are anxious for their constituents to discuss the proposition with them during the coming two weeks. On Monday, December 13, the Commissioners will meet in regular session, and at this time will expect to meet with all who are interested in the proposed court house changes, in order that there may be a full discussion and that the best plan may be the one adopted. This meeting will be wide open to the public, and all are invited.

There are three plans under consideration. The one which was first taken up was to build a two-story annex to the present court house, to provide the room and vaults necessary for the county and district clerks. The second plan is to remodel the present court house, by making the building square and enlarging it somewhat in size. The third plan is to build an entirely new courthouse, sufficiently large to meet all requirements for several years to come.—Brownwood Bulletin.
