#### TO INJURE PARCEL POST

Congress has not enacted a law in many years that has been as much benefit to people on farms and in small towns as the parcel post. While our present system is far from being what it should be and what Postmaster General Burleson and his co-workers are trying to make it, it benefits many. It has opened new industries for the merchant in small towns and has given farmers a chance to sell their products direct to the consumer.

The vast volume of business now done with the aid of parcel post is of much benefit to this country. It has helped the post office department meet its expenses and has given farmers direct contact with people of cities and towns.

But the enemies of parcel post have never surrendered. They were able to prevent congress from passing a bill for many years. So long as the express companies had a monopoly on carrying packages people in rural districts could not take advantage of city markets. When parcel post even on a limited scale was enacted the business was greatly increased.

The enemies of parcel post are now active. They have succeeded in getting the house of representatives to adopt a rider on the post office bill which will limit the size of packages and take the control out of the post office department.

The senate must soon act upon the measure. Those who want the parcel post service enlarged and improved should write their senators at once. No time should be lost. The responsibility of the people was responsible for our present law and they must not neglect it now if it is to be improved.—Farm and Ranch.

## USING GOOD JUDGMENT

In no other occupation is good judgment of more importance than farming. The business man must use his judgment as to making investments, securing labor, marketing products, etc. He often finds after it is too late that his judgment as to certain transactions was poor. The only remedy is to be more careful in the future.

But where business men have a few risks and a few opportunities for using good judgment, farmers have many. There are more unknown quantities in the mathematics of farming than in the equations of the ordinary business man in the town or city.

At this season of the year the weather is often deceiving. A few bright, pleasant spring days may cause the planter to begin too soon. It sometimes happens that valuable seeds are lost by planting so early that a freeze kills the plants. Yet late planting may cause the plants to be injured by drouth, poor markets, insects or other enemies of the farmer.

Markets are now the most indefinite and uncertain of the farmer's problems. There are many factors with reference to markets not under the control of the grower. The producer is only one of the many that have a part in marketing farm products. But if the producer uses good judgment he has far greater opportunities for success.

In arranging the capital, in buying the things not raised on the farm, in cultivation, harvesting, storing, etc., the farm manager must exercise his best judgment. Poor judgment may mean considerable loss.—Farm and Ranch.

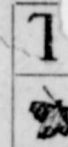

It is claimed that a plot has been unearthed at Chicago to assassinate all of the rulers in Europe whose countries are involved in the war.

The frost the early part of the week damaged the fruit crop in almost every part of north and east Texas and also injured vegetable gardens and corn.

A bad negro who shot and killed a police officer in Lawton, Okla., Saturday afternoon was taken from the jail at that place Sunday night by 200 unmasked men and shot to death.

A farmer at Drayton, N. D., believes the recent rains and floods are indicative of another flood and has builded an ark for the preservation of the lives of himself and his family.

Two police officers in St. Louis were mysteriously murdered a few nights ago and it is believed the crimes were committed by organized gangs of outlaws whose operations had been discovered or were being watched by the officers.

Petitions are being circulated over Texas asking the state Democratic executive committee to submit the question of submission of a prohibition amendment to the voters on the July primary ballots. If the petitions receive the necessary number of signatures, which they undoubtedly will receive, the question will be submitted to the voters. If a majority of the Democratic voters favor by their ballot the submission of a constitutional amendment for statewide prohibition the legislature will be required by law to prepare such an amendment to be submitted.

The state Democratic executive committee held a session at Hillsboro and decided to order a second senatorial primary for the second Saturday in August, provided none of the candidates for the United States senate receive a majority of the votes in the July primary. The expense of the second primary will have to be paid by the candidates or the members of the party, as the section of the law providing for the payment of the expenses by each county has been declared unconstitutional, which ruling is clearly correct. The nomination of a candidate is clearly a party matter and public funds should not be used for the expenses of any political party.

There need be no surprise over the treachery and double dealing of the Mexicans—it was to be expected. Carranza grudgingly allowed the United States soldiers the right to use the telegraph wires in the section where Villa is supposed to be, but has not given such aid in the way of railroad facilities as would indicate his sincerity of purpose in supporting this government in the hunt for the outlaw and his followers. The only difference between Carranza and Villa is that the former is more cunning and the latter is more open with his deviltry. They are both Mexicans and the only good Mexicans are those that have been given heroic treatment by the United States soldiers.

Men may voluntarily elect to play no part in the control of the affairs which may make up their daily life, and to play no part in the working out of the great questions upon which the prosperity of their country, the future of their children, and the welfare of the race depend; but they need not flatter themselves that these things are matters apart from them, or that they are leading free and independent lives. Abstention is impossible under the conditions of modern life and modern popular government. Men must either govern or be governed, they must take part in the control of their own lives, or they must lead subject lives, helplessly dependent in the little things and great things of life upon the will and power of others.—Ellis Root

## A FIRE MARSHAL ORDINANCE

An ordinance creating the office of Fire Marshal, prescribing the duties thereof, providing for his maintenance and prescribing penalties for violations.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas:

Section 1. The office of Fire Marshal is hereby created. Such office shall be independent of other city departments, the Fire Marshal reporting directly to the Mayor and City Council. Such office shall be filled by appointment by the Mayor, by and with the consent of the City Council, within ten days after this ordinance shall take effect. The said Fire Marshal shall be properly qualified for the duties of his office and shall be removed only for cause. He shall receive such salary as shall hereafter be fixed by the City Council.

Sec. 2. The Fire Marshal shall investigate the cause, origin and circumstances of every fire occurring within this city by which property has been destroyed or damaged, and shall especially make investigation as to whether such fire was the result of carelessness or design. Such investigation shall be begun within twenty-four hours, not including Sunday, of the occurrence of such fire. The Fire Marshal shall keep in his office a record of all fires, together with all facts, statistics and circumstances, including the origin of the fires and the amount of the loss, which may be determined by the investigation required by this ordinance.

Sec. 3. The Fire Marshal, when in his opinion further investigation is necessary, shall take or cause to be taken the testimony, on oath of all persons supposed to be cognizant of any facts or to have means of knowledge in relation to the matter under investigation, and shall cause the same to be reduced to writing; and if he shall be of the opinion that there is evidence sufficient to charge any person with the crime of arson, or with the attempt to commit the crime of arson, or of conspiracy to defraud, or criminal conduct in connection with such fire, he shall cause such person to be lawfully arrested and charged with such offense or either of them, and shall furnish to the proper prosecuting attorney all such evidence, together with the names of witnesses and all of the information obtained by him, including a copy of all pertinent and material testimony taken in the case.

Sec. 4. The Fire Marshal shall have the power to summon witnesses before him to testify in relation to any matter which is by the provisions of this ordinance a subject of inquiry and investigation, and may require the production of any book, paper or document deemed pertinent thereto. The said Fire Marshal is hereby authorized and empowered to administer oaths and affirmations to any persons appearing as witnesses before him.

Sec. 5. Any witness who refuses to be sworn, or who refuses to appear or testify, or who disobeys any lawful order of said Fire Marshal, or who fails or refuses to produce any book, paper or document touching any matter under examination, or who is guilty of any contemptuous conduct during any of the proceedings of the Fire Marshal in the matter of said investigation or inquiry, after being summoned to give testimony in relation to any matter under investigation as aforesaid, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor; and it shall be the duty of the Fire Marshal to cause all such offenders to be prosecuted. Any person being convicted of any such misdemeanor shall be fined in a sum not exceeding twenty-five dollars (\$25.00). Provided, however, that any person so convicted shall have the right of appeal.

Sec. 6. All investigations held by or under the direction of the Fire Marshal may, in his discretion, be private, and persons other than those required to be present may be excluded from the place where such investigation is held, and witnesses may be kept separate and apart from each other and not allowed to communicate with each other until they have been examined.

Sec. 7. The Fire Marshal shall have the authority at all times of day or night, when necessary, in the performance of the duties imposed upon him by the provisions of this ordinance, to enter upon and exam-

any building or premises where any fire has occurred, and other buildings and premises adjoining or near the same, which authority shall be exercised only with reason and good discretion.

Sec. 8. The Fire Marshal, upon complaint of any person having an interest in any building or property adjacent and without any complaint, shall have a right at all reasonable hours, for the purpose of examination, to enter into and upon all buildings and premises within the city, and it shall be his duty, quarterly or more often, to enter upon and make, or cause to be entered upon and made, a thorough examination of all mercantile, manufacturing and public buildings, together with the premises belonging thereto. Whenever he shall find any building or other structure which, for want of repair, or by reason of age or dilapidated condition, or for any cause, is especially liable to fire, and which is so situated as to endanger other buildings or property, or so occupied that fire would endanger persons or property therein, and whenever he shall find an improper or dangerous arrangement of stoves, ranges, furnaces or other heating appliances of any kind whatsoever, including chimneys, flues and pipes with which the same may be connected, or a dangerous arrangement of lighting devices or systems, or a dangerous or unlawful storage of explosives, compounds, petroleum, gasoline, kerosene, dangerous chemicals, vegetable products, ashes, combustible, inflammable and refuse materials or other conditions which may be dangerous in character or liable to cause or promote fire or create conditions dangerous to the fireman or occupant's, he shall order the same to be removed or remedied, and such order shall be forthwith complied with by the owner or occupant of said building or premises. Provided, however, if the said owner or occupant deems himself aggrieved by such order, he may, within five (5) days, appeal to

the Mayor, who shall investigate the cause of the complaint and unless his authority the order is revoked, such order shall remain in force and be forthwith complied with by the owner or occupant.

Sec. 9. Any owner or occupant of a building or other structure or premises, who shall keep or maintain the same when, for want of repair, or by reason of age or dilapidated condition, or for any cause, it is especially liable to fire, and which is so situated as to endanger buildings or property of others, or is especially liable to fire and which is so occupied that fire would endanger other persons or their property therein, shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) nor more than fifty dollars (\$50.00).

Sec. 10. Any owner or occupant of any building or other structure or premises, who shall keep or maintain the same with an improper arrangement of a stove, range, furnace, or other heating appliance of any kind whatsoever, including chimneys, flues and pipes with which the same may be connected, so as to be in the matter of fire or safety of persons or property therein; or who shall keep or occupy any building, other premises with an improper arrangement of a lighting device or with a storage of explosive, gasoline, kerosene, vegetable products, ashes, inflammable materials, or with any other conditions which shall be dangerous in character or liable to cause or promote fire; or who shall be in the matter of fire or safety of persons or property therein; or who shall keep or occupy any building, other premises with an improper arrangement of a lighting device or with a storage of explosive, gasoline, kerosene, vegetable products, ashes, inflammable materials, or with any other conditions which shall be dangerous in character or liable to cause or promote fire; or who shall be in the matter of fire or safety of persons or property therein, shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten dollars nor more than fifty dollars.

Sec. 11. No prosecution brought under Sections 9 and 10 of this ordinance until the order for in Section 8 be

the party notified shall fail or refuse to comply with the same.

Sec. 12. The penalties provided for herein shall be recovered by the city in the same manner as provided by law for the enforcement of fines, forfeitures, and punishments for offenses against the city.

Sec. 13. Every day's maintenance of any of the conditions prohibited in any of the foregoing sections shall be a distinct and separate offense.

Sec. 14. All misdemeanors herein provided for shall be prosecuted, and all fines and forfeitures herein provided for shall be recovered and enforced, in the same manner as provided by law for the enforcement of fines, forfeitures, penalties and punishments for offenses generally against the city.

Sec. 15. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Sec. 16. This ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage.

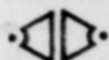

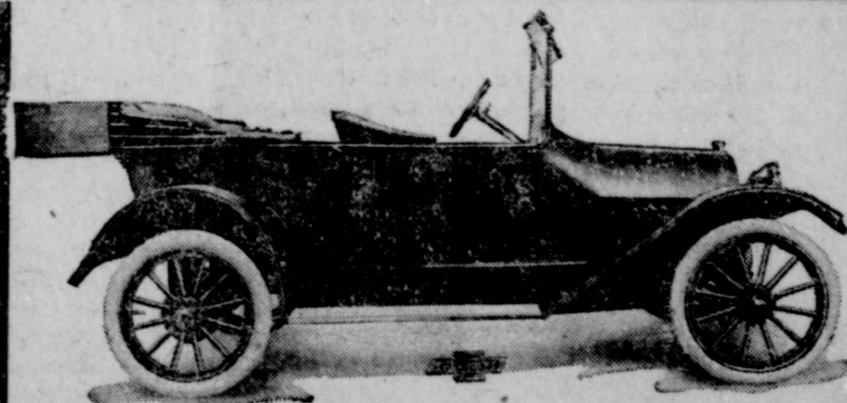
