

G, B ckham, held in connection with the killing of George Horton at Zephyr Saturday night, was released late Tuesday afternoon under \$5,000 bond, following an exam. ining trial before Justice of the Peace G. B. Cross, The examining trial was conducted behind closed doors, and the nature of the testimony introduced is not known. It was intimated, however, that no new facts were developed in the hearing further than have already been made
