Members and guests continued to arrive until after 12 o'clock and when all had assembled in the beautiful grove in Mr. Lunsford's pasture dinner was spread and it was indeed a bounteous feast. While there were cakes, pies and many other good things, the large dishes of fried fish attracted the attention of most of the company and those charged with the arrangements had anticipated this condition and had provided an abundance of fish, so that all were supplied to their complete satisfaction. For a long time he was engaged in different lines of business, but for the last few years he made his home with his children. He was in the 76th year of his age at the time of his death and up to his last illness he was very active for one of his age.

His wife and several of his children preceded him to the better world, but he is survived by two daughters and three sons, one brother and four sisters. His children are: Mrs. Jno. W. Roberts, Rock Springs; Mrs. W. W. Fowler, Dallas; George Strickland, Coppers Cove; Ollie Strickland, Hamilton; C. E. Strickland, Goldthwaite.

Capt. Strickland was a good citizen, a true friend and a kind neighbor. He was loyal to every principle and faithful to every trust and all who knew him were his friends. His burial in the cemetery at Goldthwaite Tuesday morning was largely attended and the burial service was conducted by the Masonic fraternity.

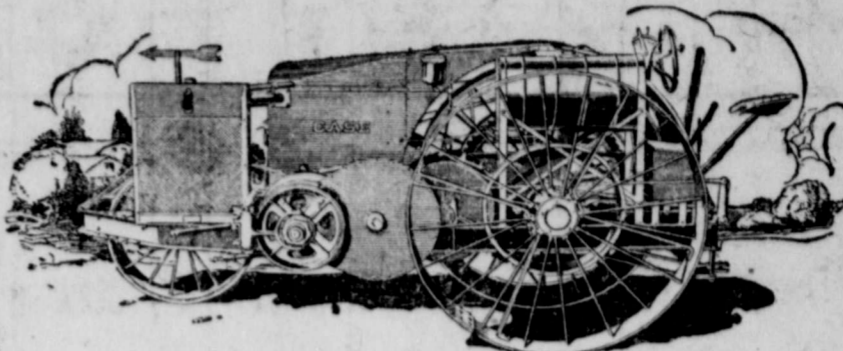

### TO THE VOTERS OF HAMILTON AND MILLS COUNTIES

In entering the race for Representative, I do so, not at the instance of any cliques or faction, but at the solicitation of all classes of citizens of Hamilton county.

I have nothing sensational to offer in the way of platforms or political remedies. I am making the race on the plain common sense platform of looking out for the vital interests of the people, particularly the agricultural, stock raising and laboring class for when they prosper all other business prospers. I deem it my duty as it is the duty of every candidate, to state briefly how I stand on certain matters that concern the people.

At public meetings, and in other ways, I may enlarge on these, as well as add my views on other things.

1. I am in favor of the strictest economy in all departments, and I will favor no appropriations, except such as are shown to be absolutely necessary. I am in favor of cutting down all useless clerks and officers, and requiring a full day's work from all employees. It seems to me that by looking carefully into all appropriations, the tax rate, which is extremely high, could be reduced.

2. I am opposed to the main features of the 'Warehouse Law' because it is impracticable, and expensive.

3. I have no knowledge of law, but the observation of many years convinces me that our court system is cumbersome, inefficient and expensive. I shall favor any bill tending to its reform, that will make the system more efficient, with less technicalities, delay, and expense to the state and litigants.

The Supreme Court, I am reliably informed, is from three to five years behind with its work, and many cases, particularly by big corporations, are carried there merely for the delay. It amounts in many instances, almost to a denial of justice. I shall favor any sensible method that may be presented that will remedy this state of affairs, for the state owes it to the people to provide a remedy for injustice done or damage inflicted.

4. I believe that Insurance Companies should be compelled to invest a large part of their Texas earnings in Texas investments, because it is a protection to their Texas policyholders, and a benefit to the state, because it keeps Texas money in Texas. Under the Robinson law, investments by insurance companies have increased from about \$8,000,000 to about \$40,000,000 and I am therefore in favor of retaining the Robinson law.

5. The Elementary Schools should be the special care of the state for they are of benefit to the great

mass of children who cannot attend the University and other higher institutions.

6. I am in favor of barring delinquent taxes after four years, and a law requiring officers to collect them as they become due. A delay of 25 or 30-years is an injustice to purchasers.

7. The interest rate is too high, and I believe our Usury laws are too commonly violated. I believe that the rate should be lowered to eight per cent, at least. And there should be penalties that will make the law really effective.

The above is respectfully submitted to the consideration of my fellow citizens; I expect, if elected, to fill the office as a servant of the people, with no motive of selfish ambition, or pecuniary reward.

B. Cross. The examining trial was conducted behind closed doors, and the nature of the testimony introduced is not known. It was intimated, however, that no new facts were developed in the hearing further than have already been made public.

Beckham readily gave the required bond, which was signed by Sol Baker, Earl Day, J. B. Day, J. A. Hallmark, R. E. Bowles, W. F. Timming, P. C. Cobb, M. N. Cobb, T. E. Lancaster, R. L. Cable, H. E. Cobb, Marvin Coffey and A. B. Driskill. Following the filing of his bond Beckham was immediately released and returned to his home in Zephyr. Mrs. Beckham has been critically ill since the tragedy of Saturday night.

#### Particulars of the Killing

The particulars of the killing in brief are that Mr. Beckham, who is postmaster at Zephyr, shot and killed George Horton in the yard at the Beckham home in Zephyr about 10:45 Saturday night. Beckham at once surrendered to the constable. A Brownwood Bulletin reporter interviewed him and he gave the following information:

"I came upon the men and my daughter in my yard. I was expecting someone to be there, and carried a 20-gauge shot gun in my hand. Yes, I was looking for someone, but did not know who the man was. As I came upon them, it was dark and I couldn't see what they were doing. I spoke to the man, and said 'You had better leave here quick if you don't want to get hurt.'

"The man started toward me, and I raised my gun. Just as I fired he turned to run. The load of shot struck him in the back. Another man was with him, who I understand was a man named McDuff, a brother-in-law of the dead man. He ran away when I fired. I don't know which of my daughters was with the man. I have two daughters, Opal and Mildred. I never saw Horton before the shooting, and did not know who he was. But I knew some body was there and I was looking for whoever it was."

Horton was about 26 years old. He had been working in a barber shop at Mullin for about two weeks, according to information received by telephone from Mullin early this morning. Letters in his pocket indicated that he had a wife and child in Brownwood and that they were expecting him to join them in this city soon. He was a brother of Lee Horton, who lives at Brooksmith. The load of shot that caused his death struck Horton in the center of the back, at the place where his suspenders crossed.—Brownwood Bulletin.

### MARRIED AT BROWNWOOD

Seymour B. Lee of San Benito and Mrs. Mamie Moss of this city were married at the home of Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Jones in Brownwood on Wednesday afternoon. Immediately after the ceremony the happy couple came to Goldthwaite in their auto and left the following morning for their home at San Benito, where Mr. Lee owns a ranch.

Mrs. Moss, nee Mamie Rahl, is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jas. Rahl and was reared in this city, where she has a great many friends and well wishers. Mr. Lee is a stranger to most of the Goldthwaite people, but he is highly recommended.

Mr. and Mrs. Lee have the sincere good wishes of everybody and the Eagle joins in extending congratulations to them.
