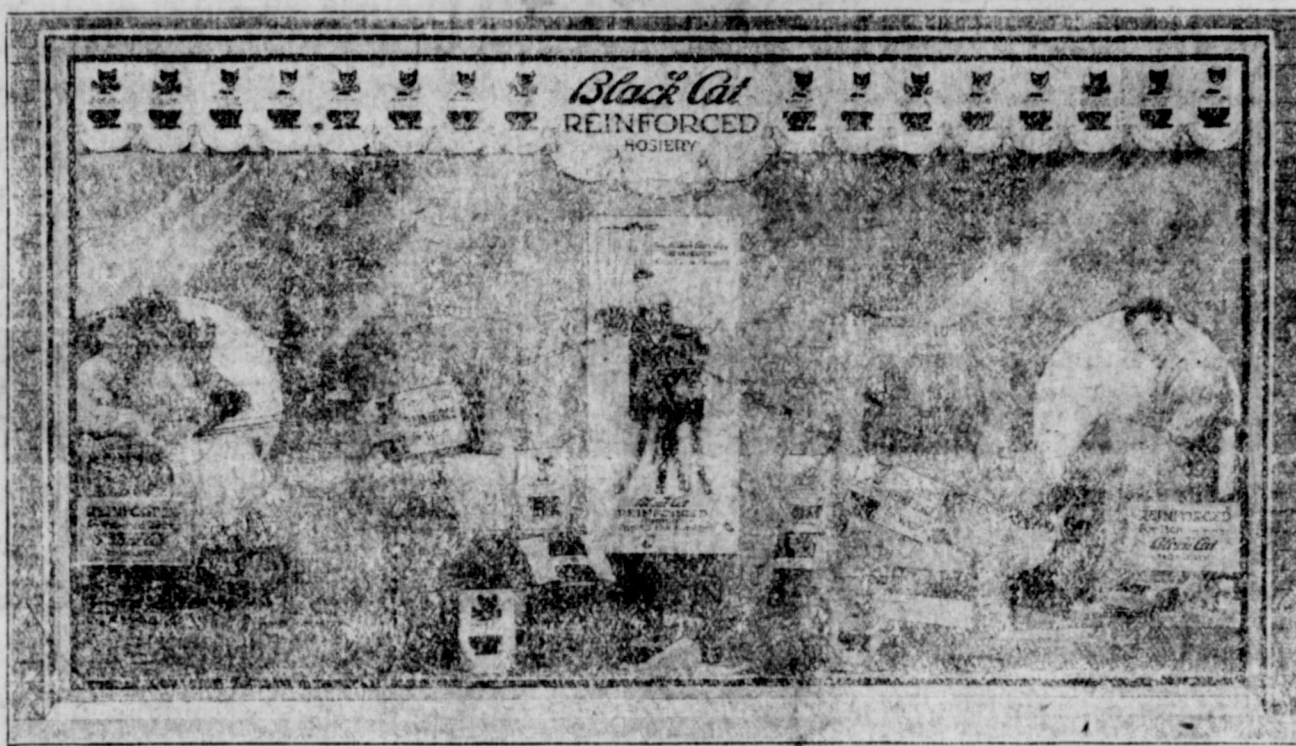

The first bale of 1916 cotton was marketed in Houston last Saturday, which was a record breaker as to time by seven days. The cotton was grown at Lyford, Texas.

A number of county attorneys of prohibition counties have sent to the state food and drug department samples of cider being sold in their localities and investigation has developed that the cider contains twice as much alcohol as is contained in lager beer.

Trouble and lots of it is brewing along the border. The Mexicans misunderstand the conditions in this country and really believe our forces are afraid to attempt to subdue them, when the truth is the knowledge of the terrible destruction that will be wrought by the American forces when once the word has been given to go after the green rackets those in authority from giving the word.

A report comes from Washington that immediately after the St. Louis convention President Wilson will launch a movement for peace in Europe. The plan, as understood by the Washington correspondent, is to submit a proposition to all belligerent nations to declare an armistice and hold a conference to endeavor to reach an understanding. There may be some grounds for the report, but there is mighty little reason to believe the nations involved in the war will give favorable consideration to the proposition.

The Republican convention in Chicago last Saturday named Judge Charles Evans Hughes of the United States supreme court to be the presidential candidate of that party in the present campaign, and Charles W. Fairbanks as a candidate for vice president. Both of the nominees have accepted and Judge Hughes has resigned his position on the supreme court of the United States. Judge Hughes was governor of New York prior to his appointment to the supreme bench by President Taft. He was a prominent and strong candidate for the presidential nomination in the convention that nominated Hon. Wm. H. Taft for the place, Mr. Fairbanks was vice president in Mr. Roosevelt's administration.

It is unfair to label every man a demagogue who claims to advocate measures he believes to be for the betterment of his fellow men, but when these measures are untenable and unreasonable it is pretty safe to conclude that the one who offers them as a reason for the support of the voters at last is not over conscientious. Some of the measures being advocated by a number of public men in making bids for the suffrage of the people cause one to wonder if they are really attempting to mislead the people or are so shallow they can not see the unreasonableness of their own propositions. A mighty safe rule to follow is to ascertain what such men have really accomplished rather than what they have sought to accomplish.

Those who vote in the July primary will have an opportunity to vote on the question of whether or not the Robinson insurance law shall be amended by the legislature and also whether or not a prohibition amendment shall be submitted by the next legislature to the voters of Texas. The Democratic executive committee in session at Dallas Monday ordered the two subjects submitted to the people, the first one being for the purpose of ending the controversy as to the desire of the people regarding the investment feature of the law which requires insurance companies to invest in Texas three-fourths of the legal reserve funds from collections in the state. The prohibition amendment question was placed on the ballot in obedience to the law which requires that the question of amending the constitution shall be submitted to the people when 10 per cent of the voters of a party petition for the submission of such question.

There is, of course, no doubt that the Government has been made to pay exorbitant prices for armor plate. So much, in fact, is virtually admitted by those who have practiced the extortion. The proof of it is that they cut their prices something like 25 per cent when the threat of a Government plant seemed on the eve of realization. That was followed by the offer to allow the Government to name its own price. Now the likelihood of the erection of a Government plant looms large. The Tillman bill appropriating \$11,000,000 for this purpose has been attached to the naval appropriation bill as an amendment. It must be admitted that the Government has had ample provocation for adopting this policy. The plea of the armor plate manufacturers, that this action will destroy the value of their investment would be more persuasive if one could be free of the suspicion that they long ago recovered their investment in the excessive prices charged the Government. But although the government has ample provocation, it is not so clear that it has equal reason for engaging in the manufacture of armor plate. The legislation is prompted by a spirit of resentment, and while the resentment is abundantly justified, resentment is often a foolish than a wise counselor. -Dallas N.Y.

THE PLAINS OF NEW MEXICO

Claude, N. M., June 11th, 1916.
Editor Eagle:

I left Goldthwaite about sundown May 31st. Ate supper at Brownwood, breakfast at Clovis, speeded 16 miles north in John Shipley's big car to the Shipley Bros. Ranch, where my son Ernest is for man.

Shipley Bros. live in Clovis. They are bankers and cattlemen. They attended school in Mullin when Prof. Merchant taught there. They have only Herefords on this ranch. They have a larger ranch where they keep the common cattle.

There was a barbecue here on this Hereford ranch on June 6th, under the auspices of the Bankers Association—the plains bankers. Four heaves were barbecued, coffee, bread and cowboy's mulligan were served. Foping, branding and broncho riding by the cow-boys on the prairie. Old Mills county's old baseball stunts. 235 automobiles came out from Clovis.

These registered Herefords are a show to me, but Mills county's big steer—the Burnett steer, is still ahead.

This is the first time I ever crossed a state line. The great staked plains are much like I had imagined, only I don't see the stakes—just the horizon where the prairie and the sky meet. I haven't seen any prairie dogs, rattlesnakes and coyotes yet.

The grass seems short but there seems to be a solid turf. Cattle are fat. Corn and milo maize are only a few inches high. There is more corn raised here than I had thought. I have helped feed ensilage most every day to a herd of bulls. This ensilage was corn cut in the roasting ear stage. They sure had tons of roasting ears last year on this ranch. If the July and August rains come just right they may have corn again, though the prospects seem slim at present.

This is a cool country compared with old Mills. It is almost impossible to exaggerate these winds. There are two windmills in front of the Shipley ranch house here, a 14 and 18 ft. These giant mills lift an immense amount of water. This water is stored in four circular and one square concrete reservoirs. There is an earth tank for the surplus. The wells are about 350 feet deep.

Once I saw an old man who said he "would rather be dead on the plains than alive and doing well in east Texas." I am not yet so enraptured and you need not be surprised to see me back in the geographical center of Texas. Mills county's old brush clad hills, coves and valleys are dear to me.

There were present at the Panhandle and New Mexico Bankers Association barbeque people from Kansas City, Amarillo, Canyon City, Ft. Worth and Dallas. Hon. W. F. Ramsey was here. There was a lady from Missouri had a kodak and wanted a typical cowboy's picture, Ernest with his chaperones on posed as the 'Simon Pure.'

Corbett Edmonson is here on this ranch. Corbett is R. J. Edmonson's son. Corbett is from Ridge, Texas.

On this ranch there are 500 head of pure bred Herefords. There are 12 herd bulls worth \$500.00 each. They have just bought 2 two year olds at a cost of \$900.00 and \$650.00 besides the cost of shipping.

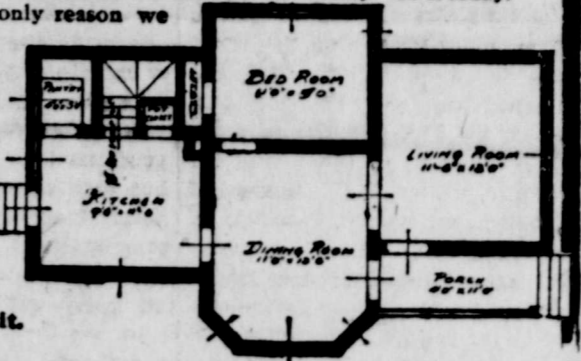

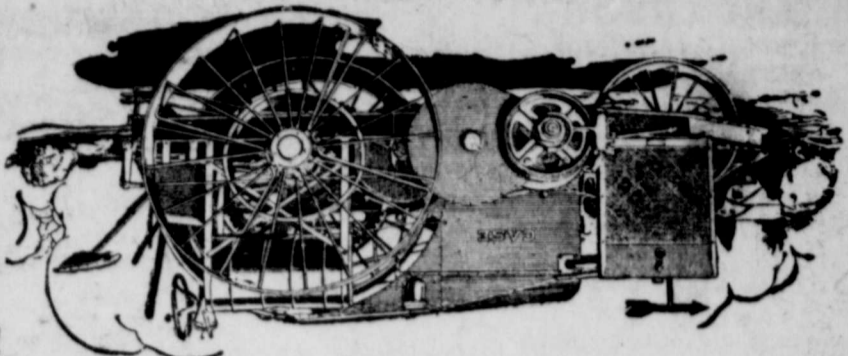

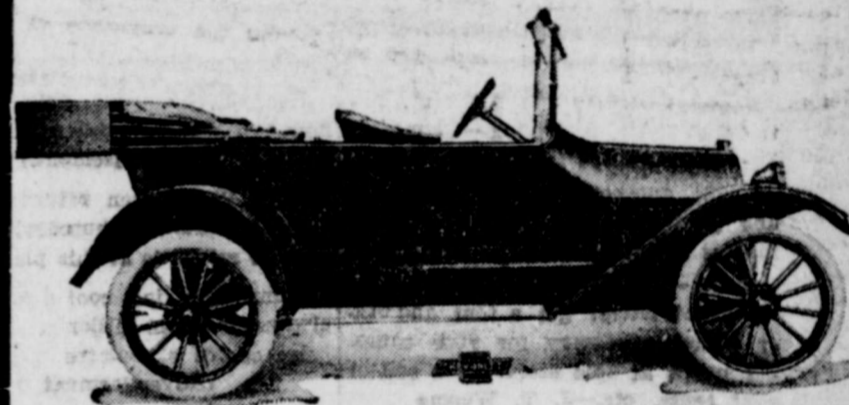
