### EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

#### Candidates Assessed and Names Placed on Ticket—Nominations By Plurality

The county Democratic Executive committee held a meeting in the court house Monday afternoon for the purpose of arranging for the primary election.

Several voting boxes were not represented, but a large majority of the committee membership was in attendance.

The names of candidates were placed on the ticket by lot and the names of district, county and precinct candidates will appear on the tickets as shown in the announcement column of this paper. In the arrangement of the senatorial candidates R. L. Henry will appear first and O. B. Colquitt last. The name of Chas. Morris appears first on ticket for governor, Cooley and Firmin are the two first for congress-at-large, and Jas. L. Slaydon is the first for congressman for the 14th district.

It was decided to make nominations for county and precinct offices by plurality vote, therefore having but one primary election for such nominations.

A second primary was ordered in the SENATORIAL RACE ONLY. The law requires that a second primary be ordered in this race, and assessment was made on the local candidates to pay the expenses of the second SENATORIAL primary, the understanding being that should the opinion of the supreme court be that the local candidates should not be assessed for this purpose the amount so assessed would not be collected, or where it had been collected it would be returned. On this basis the assessments were fixed as follows: All state and district candidates \$1 each; candidates for county judge \$23; for county attorney \$15; sheriff and tax collector \$45, county clerk \$45, dis-

trict clerk \$18; tax assessor \$45, treasurer \$23, surveyor \$12, weigher at Goldthwaite \$12, commissioners \$14.50, justices of the peace at Goldthwaite and Mullin \$6. One half to be returned if court held assessment illegal.

No charge was made for justice at other places than Goldthwaite and Mullin and no assessment was entered for constables anywhere. Each committeeman was made presiding judge at his box and was instructed to secure such help as required to hold the primary. Instructions were also given to pay the helpers full price for their services in the first primary and induce them if possible, to serve free of charge in the second primary.

Chairman Roberts appointed W. J. Jones, Wm. Dennard, Frank Hines, E. F. Casey, R. C. Johnson and J. M. Traylor to serve as a primary committee to arrange the supplies for the primary election. This committee is to meet the second Monday in July to prepare the supplies.

It was decided that the test on the primary tickets should be statutory which is: "I am a Democrat and agree to support the nominees of this primary." Every presiding officer was instructed to ask each voter personally to agree to the test and those who refuse to state or to agree are to be refused a ticket.

Candidates have until next Monday June 26, to pay the amount assessed against them and those who fail to pay by that time can not get their names on the tickets.

### MORE WEALTH FROM FARMS

What agriculture in the South-west needs to make it more remunerative is larger flocks and herds. When every farm has all the animals it will maintain economically and every manager arranges his rotation of crops to suit the animals, then will more wealth be produced and soil fertility be stored up at the essentials for larger crops and better profits.

The time may never come when every farm will be well supplied with animals. Some farmers do not wish to take the risk of the greater investment livestock production will require. Far greater intelligence must be used in animal production than in crop growing. Some will not be prepared for mixed farming. But our hope is that the number who will see the opportunity in livestock will increase from year to year till a large per cent of the farmers are animal husbandmen.

Livestock breeding and feeding reduces risk on account of drought and other unfavorable conditions. Crops often fail, or markets may be very poor. But if one has animals and depends upon them for income, feeds may be bought when the season is very poor. The animals will sometimes be more profitable when feeds are scarce and thus the man who has animals and animal products in such seasons will not lose like the farmer dependent upon crops for market.

There is more incentive for good farming when animals are raised and feed produced for them. The need of plenty of feed, pasture and shelter will stimulate progressive methods, safe management and diligence in provision for the future. Even the non-progressive grower is likely to change his methods when he begins with a few pure-bred animals.—Farm and Ranch.

The order of the president calling out the militia of all the states to do service on the Mexican border and in Mexico if necessary was the beginning of the war excitement this week. The order indicated that this government had decided to change its watchful waiting policy.

President Wilson gave old Carranza a strong reprimand for his part in inciting trouble between this country and Mexico. The President cites conclusive proof that the old greaser has never been sincere in his professions of attempting to give protection to the Americans in Mexico or to those living along the border. The old reprobate has 'double crossed' his own people as well as this government.

A "straw" vote was taken by the newspaper people attending the Texas Press association meeting at El Paso to ascertain the status of the senatorial race in the different sections of Texas represented there. The question was not the individual preference of the editors, but the winners according to their judgment. The result may not be anything like the outcome of the July primary, but the editors guessed Brooks first, Culbertson second, Colquitt third, Campbell fourth, Henry fifth, and Riddle sixth. In the runoff between Brooks and Culbertson, the two high men, Brooks defeated Culbertson.

A Mexican brute assaulted Mrs. W. Q. Kuykendall in a savage manner Monday night in her home in Brownwood. She was cut across the face and throat, but will likely recover, while she will be badly disfigured. The greaser was a servant in the home and it is supposed he committed the crime because of the fear Americans. Mrs. Kuykendall was hated of the people of his country sleeping with her children on the sleeping porch of her home when attacked and when she ran from the house screaming for assistance the Mexican ran away, but was pursued and killed about ten miles from Brownwood Tuesday morning.

The strike by railroad employes which is to be called in the near future will be more far reaching in its consequences than any strike of recent years, because of the industrial and business conditions existing throughout the country. The railroad companies offered to submit the contention to arbitration or to the interstate commerce commission, but the organizations refused the offer and at once commenced to take a strike vote, which will undoubtedly result in the strike being ordered. The men do not demand shorter hours, in fact, but extra pay for the hours they do work. In short, the demand is for price and a half for all over eight hours per day. The railroad companies will not grant this demand and will attempt to fill the places of the strikers with non-union workmen.

If the United States government is forced to pacify Mexico with bullets rather than diplomacy it should be made a great country and under the direction of Americans no country on the globe would be more productive and prosperous. Had the Mexicans and Indians been content to pursue their ways without interfering with their big neighbor on the north there would have been few found who favored interfering with them in any way. True, the fact that a continuous gorilla warfare has been in progress there for years and that there is in reality no form or semblance of government in the beleaguered country appeals strongly to humanity, but the savages of that country have only been engaged in pursuits most agreeable to themselves and most Americans would have favored allowing them to continue their pleasant pastime had they confined their operation to their own country.

**SECOND SENATORIAL PRIMARY**

The ruling of the state Democratic executive committee that local candidates shall be assessed to pay the expense of a second senatorial primary election is manifestly unjust, for the candidates for local office can have no more interest in the senatorial election than other Democrats have in it. Just why the committee should have decided to order this assessment in preference to soliciting public contributions or some other plan is not clear, but the order was made and the county executive committee very properly levied the assessment, with the understanding that the amount paid by candidates for the second senatorial primary should be held in trust and returned to the candidates in case the supreme court holds that such assessment is without authority of law. To refuse to make any provision whatever for holding the primary would have the effect of preventing citizens in the county from sharing in the selection of one of the two candidates for senator who will be in the second primary. A request has been made by the county executive committee that the second primary be held free of charge and if this is done the amount assessed can be returned to the candidates for county and precinct offices, even though the supreme court holds such assessment can legally be required by the state committee.
