Editor Eagle:

I have been here most a month and have not yet received a copy of the Great Religious Weekly. I think you must be sending it to the wrong address, Claude is in Curry county, New Mexico. I want to know who has moved, died, married or gone crazy. Send me especially that copy which enumerates the successful candidates in the primary.

It is rather dry here now, though this is not very unusual here. We have exhilarating breezes every day on these wind-swept plains. They change to mountain time at Clovis. Our meals are two hours late here. I have not been used to this procrastination and I am always hungry when the dinner bell rings. I have been steering a barge for the last three days—not a barge trimmed with purple and gold, with silver tipped oars, like the one Cl. opatra commanded when she captured Mark Anthony, but a prairie barge used to catch the wheat after a header. The blader is taken off of the ordinary self-binder, an elevator chut with slatted canvas on rollers raises the heads high enough to fall into the barge. An ordinary wagon is coupled out long. Two great beams are chained under the axels and the barge is constructed on these beams. The ends are made solid and inclined, the sides are slatted or poultry netting is tacked on, the floor is solid. Wheat is too short to cut with a blader. 'Necessity is the mother of invention.' They raise a 'hard wheat here. Last year many farmers made 40 bushels to the acre. It is estimated at 10 bushels this year.

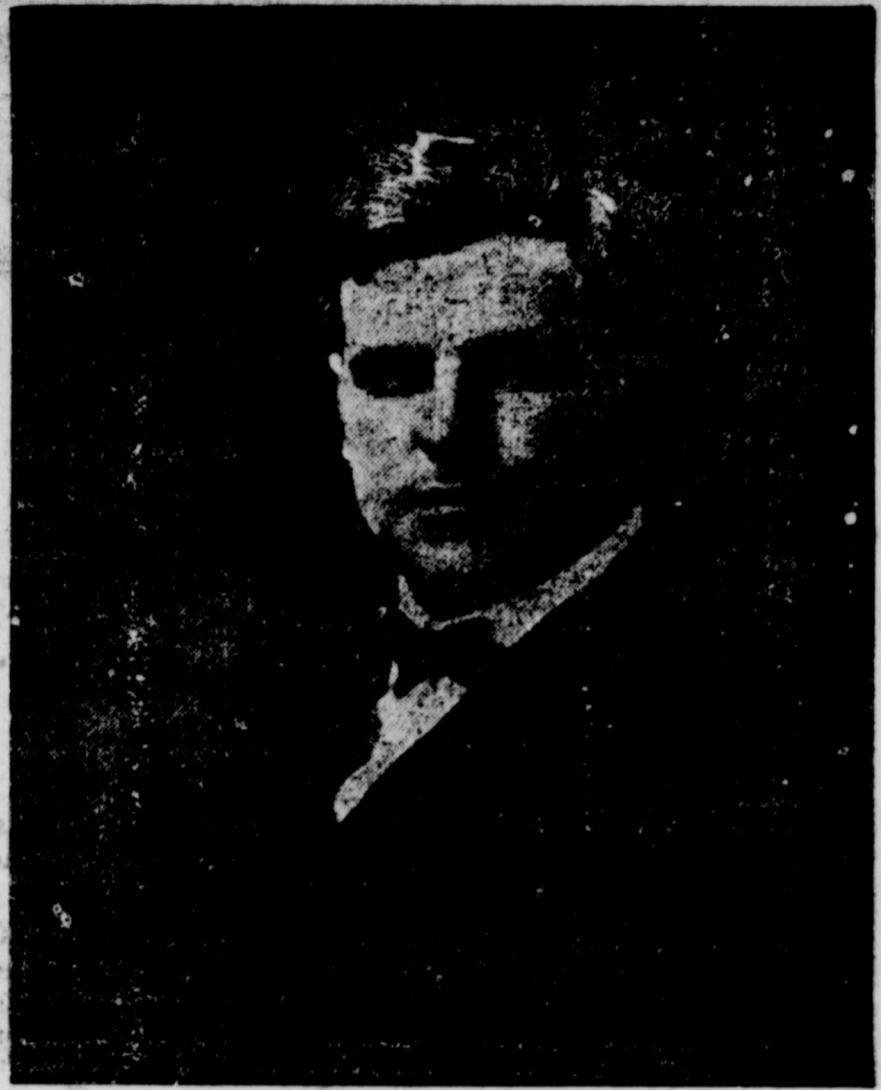

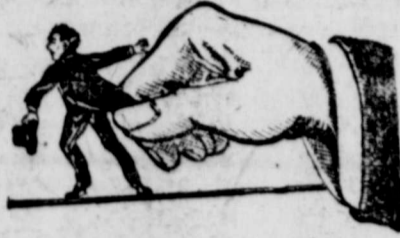

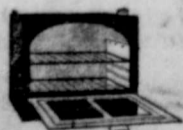

Villa has again been killed, this time by a rebellious member of his murderous band. He must have more lives than are credited to a cat, if he has suffered death as often as he has been reported dead.

Some of the Progressives or "Bull Noses" rebel and refuse to follow the dictation of Teddy in endorsing Hughes, but it is very likely a great majority of them will obey the mandate of their chieftain.

The supreme court of Texas upheld the decision of the Democratic executive committee of the state in ordering the levy of an assessment against candidates in the various counties to pay the expense of a second senatorial primary. In some counties the executive committees have refused to levy the assessment and will depend upon volunteer service in holding the second primary.

The jury in the case of Paul Hadley and wife of Muskogee, Okla., on a charge of murdering Sheriff Giles of Beaumont returned a verdict of acquittal as to the woman and assessed the punishment of the man at life in the penitentiary. It will be remembered the Beaumont sheriff had the man under arrest and was conveying him back to Beaumont from Kansas City, where he had been arrested. On the train the sheriff was shot to death.

Let us hope that when the American army finally gets ready for action a great amount of "red tape" will be done away with and when they are lined up in battle array they will not have to wait to hear from Washington and to let a contract for ammunition before returning the enemy's fire. The delay so far has proved the "red tape" to be very undesirable. Of course it is necessary to make preparations for active warfare, but the system appears very complicated.

The firm of Abney & Vincent is no more, and Brady is to have two new stores under the respective brands of C. H. Vincent and I. G. Abney, these two gentlemen, by mutual agreement, dissolving the partnership heretofore existing between them. Mr. Abney has this week fitted up the grocery department with nice shelving, show cases, etc., preparatory to what he terms a "Country Store" in which he will carry a general line of dry goods and a nice stock of groceries.—Brady Sentinel.

After considering the matter for several weeks Col. Roosevelt finally definitely declined to accept the nomination for president on the Progressive Republican ticket and advises the members of that party to support the old party ticket. The executive committee, which had authority to substitute a name for that of Roosevelt declined to do so, but favored the suggestion to unite with the Republican party. Were conditions the same at this time as in last presidential campaign the reuniting of the opponents of the Democratic party would be disturbing, but the campaign will be on very different lines, while the issues will be entirely changed from those of the former campaign.

It is well to advise caution by Americans in dealing with Mexicans anywhere and under all circumstances. The Mexican is treacherous by nature, and is as full of venom as a snake. The American Indian in his most savage form was never more to be dreaded than the Mexican when he has his victim at his mercy and it is well to be prepared for all emergencies. While the Mexican is indolent and for that reason appears harmless, in truth he is far from being the docile animal he appears. While we would not be understood as an alarmist, it is but the act of caution and good judgment for those who have dealings with the gringos to have one eye on them all the time and it would not be ill-advised to have some kind of "shooting iron" within easy reach at all times.

There was a big Mexican scare at Zephyr Monday night. Two greasers applied for food at a residence in that section and a report was circulated of serious threats and robbery by the 'outlaws.' An investigation by officers forced the belief that the Mexicans really did not commit any unlawful acts.

With the prospects or actual movement of men in great numbers toward the Mexican border, the matter of typhoid fever prevention among them is of the first importance. In a recent communication to Science, Surgeon General Sir Alfred Keogh points out that in the British army now serving in France there were at the time of writing but twenty-two cases of typhoid, whereas under former conditions there would have been from 80,000 to 100,000 cases. The embattled armies, as is well known, are fighting over what has now become the most highly infected area in the world. In the first few months of the war, because antitoxin in sufficient quantity was not to be had, there were fairly numerous cases. Then anti-typhoid inoculation began and was continued until at the present time 95 per cent of the soldiers have received the treatment. The result is the amazing proportion brought out by Sir Alfred Keogh. Of course the campaign against the fly and stringent measures of camp sanitation have been contributory. But the direct relation of the figures to inoculation is too clear to be discussed except by those who in the name of a misguided sentimentalism or a medieval superstition, blind to light and deaf to argument, oppose a practice that is daily saving countless lives.—Philadelphia Public Ledger.

**PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION RELATING TO LEVYING TAX FOR SCHOOL PURPOSES**

H. J. R. No. 30) House Joint Resolution,

Proposing an amendment to Section 3 Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the levy and collection of an ad valorem county tax not to exceed fifty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of property for the maintenance of the public schools of the county, and authorizing the levy and collection of an ad valorem district tax not to exceed one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation of property for the maintenance of the public schools of the district.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

Section 3. School Taxes—One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes, and a poll tax of \$1.00 on every male inhabitant of this State between the ages of 21 and 60 years shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools, and in addition thereto there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount, not to exceed 20 cents on the \$100.00 valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources will be sufficient to maintain and support the public free schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year. The Legislature may authorize the levy and collection of an annual ad valorem county tax within the counties of this State not to exceed 50 cents on the \$100.00 valuation of property situated within the county; provided, a majority of the qualified property-paying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, for the purpose of maintaining the public free schools of the county, and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by general or special law, without the local notice required in other cases of special legislation, and all such school districts, whether created by general or special law, may embrace parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such district, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties. And the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed, or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided that a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of the district, voting at an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year one dollar on the \$100.00 valuation of the property subject to taxation in such districts, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns, constituting separate and independent school districts.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this State be hereby instructed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the next general election to be held in November, 1916, at which election all voters favoring this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment to Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to the levy of ad valorem school taxes not to exceed fifty cents on the \$100.00 valuation in the county and not to exceed one dollar on the \$100.00 valuation in the district, for the purpose of maintaining the public schools of the county or of the district." And those opposed to this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "Against the amendment to Section 3, Article 7,

Sec. 3. The sum of \$5,000.00, or as much thereof as may be necessary therefor, is hereby appropriated to pay the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this resolution.
