This copy is well prepared and arranged in a manner that reflects credit upon the clerk and will expedite the work of printing the books. He is well qualified for the position, by experience, education and natural ability and his friends here know full well that he will make good.

#### PAYMENT IN ADVANCE

All newspapers are making some manner of change in their subscription arrangements. Some have increased the price, while others will require advance payment and eliminate all free copies. The last plan appears to the Eagle to be the most desirable and it is contemplated for the Eagle in the near future. The idea of sending papers indefinitely, or even for a year, on credit is not based on sound business principles and was inaugurated in the long ago when printing supplies were cheap and the cost of labor was inconsiderable. All of these things have changed and the publisher who continues to send his paper to those who will pay if they think of it and "feel like it" is as sure to reach bankruptcy as is the merchant who sells his goods on credit without security for the debt. The date for this change in the subscription system by the Eagle has not yet been fixed, because of the necessity for mailing of statements to those who are in arrears for subscription and should be notified, because most of them, if not all, will pay upon being advised of their indebtedness and for that reason the change will not be inaugurated until all have been notified and given an opportunity to adjust their arrangements to the new plan.

#### CITY COUNCIL

The Goldthwaite city council held its regular monthly meeting Monday night with all members present.

A considerable amount of business of a routine nature was transacted, such as receiving official reports, auditing bills, etc.

A traffic ordinance was adopted and ordered published, after which it will be enforced, therefore, all citizens and especially drivers of automobiles should read it carefully.

#### AUTOMOBILE CLUB

Plans Suggested For Betterment of the Roads in the County.

There are about 350 automobiles registered in this county and it is safe to say that at least that number of cars are in operation in the county, to say nothing of the transient cars. If the owners of these cars would form an association they could have a strong influence on road improvement in the county. If the membership dues for such an association could be placed at \$5 or even \$10 per annum, the full amount of such dues to be expended in road improvement under direction of the club that amount alone would make a wonderful improvement.

It is useless to attempt to make a secret of the fact that Mills county will compare in the matter of bad roads with any county in Texas. While various causes could be assigned for this condition, the fact remains that the roads of the county are all bad and some of them are little better than impassable. If no more is done for road improvement in the next two or three years than has been done in the last ten years the matter of overland transportation will be extremely serious. This condition effects the value of property and the prosperity and progress of the people in every vocation.

If it is fact that our roads are bad—extremely bad—with little hope for betterment under the present system, it behooves those interested in the material prosperity of the county to take some action and that soon. The forming of this automobile club would probably stimulate similar organizations and independent efforts in road improvement. The plan suggested would be no real expense to any except the manufacturers of automobile tires and every car owner knows that the saving of tires and wear and

tear on their cars would amount to that sum on almost any across-the-country trip.

The Eagle would be pleased to have some suggestions from auto owners and others regarding the move suggested.

You are hereby commanded to summon F. H. Perkins by making publication of this Citation once in each week for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your County, to appear at the next regular term of the District Court of Mills County, to be holden at the Court House thereof, in Goldthwaite, Texas, on the first Monday in October, A. D. 1916, the same being the 2nd day of October, A. D. 1916, then and there to answer a petition filed in said Court on the 8th day of August, A. D. 1916 in a suit, numbered on the docket of said Court No. 1534, wherein Randolph & Allen, a firm composed of J. H. Randolph and J. T. Allen, are Plaintiffs, and F. H. Perkins is Defendant, and said petition alleging substantially, that on or about the 3rd day of February, 1915, said F. H. Perkins executed and delivered to said plaintiffs his promissory note, with mortgage clause, for the sum of \$552.20, bearing interest at 10 per cent per annum from date, and due and payable Oct. 1st, after date, and providing for the payment of a reasonable attorney's fee if said note is not paid at maturity, and is placed in the hands of an attorney for collection, which plaintiffs allege has been done, and that a reasonable fee for said services is the sum of \$63.55; that plaintiffs are the owners of said note, and that there is due and unpaid thereon, after demands made on defendant, the aggregate sum of \$699.30, together with interest thereon at the rate of 10 per cent per annum from the date of the filing of said petition, that said note further recites that it is given as renewal of certain other notes in said petition more particularly described, and that same is given for the purchase price of Deering 6-ft. binder, and Double Disc Moline Plow, and John Deere Double Disc Plow, and that a lien is retained on said machinery aforesaid for the securing of said note. Said petition alleging that said F. H. Perkins' residence is unknown, that he secretes himself so that the ordinary process of the law cannot be served upon him, and asks for the issuance of attachment to be levied upon the property of said defendant. H. Perkins from Randolph and Allen at various times.

A prohibition election is to be held in Tarrant county on Sept. 25, the petition of the prohibitionists for the election having been granted by the commissioners court this week.

As a result of an election by mail by the former students of the Texas university, Mr. Leonard Doughty, formerly of this city, has been selected as one of the editors of the Alcalde, the magazine of the University alumni. Mr. Doughty is one of the strongest writers and best educated men in Texas.

President Wilson was notified last Saturday that he had been nominated by the Democratic party to succeed himself as president of the United States, the highest position any man in the world can fill. He accepted the nomination and will accept the office with all the necessary pomp and ceremony next March.

J. H. Allen, Jr., who was employed in the Trent State bank for quite a while, resigned the position Monday and left for Lampasas, where he accepted a position as book keeper for Landrum & Sparks. He is an experienced business man and his high standing is attested by the fact that this is the third time he has been employed in the house in Lampasas. The many friends of Mr. Allen and family regret very much their removal and wish for them the best of fortune.

For every life there is a summit. Happy are they who gain and sad the lot of those who faint and fail in the struggle. Short or long to the top, it can only be scaled by persistent climbing. There must be ambition to do and dare, or the prize will not be secured. Have you in the vigor of youth begun the journey? Already are you tired and weary? Are you resting by the way in slothful indulgence, hoping for wings or sails to bear you aloft without effort? Long before manhood's prime you will miss the top and go down hill. Arouse for another effort. At the base is the thorn, at the summit the crown. There is no escape from one to the other in the life journey. Which will you have, wealth or poverty, comfort or squalor? Decide in the dew of the morning. At high noon stand out a man on the peak of endeavor wearing your own crown.—Ex.

The contemplated strike of the railroad trainmen, which was to have started Monday morning was called off by the leaders after the congress of the United States had enacted a law making the demands of the trainmen a federal law, except that the men are not allowed price and a half for overtime, but the same rate of compensation as for the first eight hours. The settlement of the differences amounts simply to a political contest rather than a settlement on a business basis. While there is no doubting the fact that President Wilson "put one over" when he interested himself in the controversy and carried the matter to congress, the wisdom and justice of the course must be seriously questioned. True, the president has gained for himself and his party the labor vote of the nation and in this he simply outgeneralized the Republicans, who would have been glad to have secured the support of the labor organizations in the same way, had not President Wilson "beat them to it" and their leaders dared not oppose the plan, lest they be considered opponents of labor. Nevertheless, the fact remains that an increased burden of \$60,000,000 has been placed on the public annually to increase the wages of a class of workers who were already better paid than any other class or occupation in America. And yet, the most disturbing feature of the settlement is the confession that the country is completely at the mercy of a few labor leaders.

### AN ORDINANCE

Regulating traffic and travel on the streets, alleys, roads and highways in the city of Goldthwaite, establishing rules of the road, prescribing conditions upon which said streets, alleys, roads and highways may be used by vehicles, providing a penalty for the violation of the provisions of this ordinance, repealing all ordinances in conflict herewith, and declaring an emergency:

Be it ordained by the city council of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas:

Sec. 1. All automobiles and other vehicles, except when passing another going in the same direction, shall keep to the right and as near the right hand curb as possible.

A vehicle meeting another shall pass to the right. A vehicle overtaking another shall pass to the left, and not pull over or turn back to the right until so far ahead as not to interfere with the progress of the vehicle passed.

A vehicle turning into another street, road or alley to the right shall turn the corner with its right hand side as near the curb as practicable. A vehicle turning into another street or road to the left shall turn around the intersections of the center lines of the two streets or roads.

No vehicle shall turn in the middle of the block, but shall always go to a street intersection before turning or attempting to turn, and shall observe the rules, in turning, as hereinabove set out.

No vehicle shall stop with its left hand side to the curb, but shall always stop with its right hand side to the curb, and shall always head in towards the curb, with the right front wheel as near as practicable to such curb, at an angle of forty-five degrees.

No vehicle shall emerge from any alley, stable, garage or other area or building, abutting on a sidewalk, at a pace faster than a walk.

Sec. 2. A signal shall be given by all drivers or operators of vehicles to those behind, when slowing down or stopping, by raising the hand or whip, when physically possible to do so.

A visible or audible signal shall be given by all drivers or operators of any vehicle when turning while in motion, or in starting to turn from a standstill, indicating the direction in which the turn is to be made. Before backing any vehicle, ample warning shall be given by visible or audible signal, and while backing careful watch shall be kept to avoid injuring those behind.

Vehicles must stop in such a way as not to interfere with the passage of pedestrians at crossings, always avoiding projection of horse or vehicle within five feet of crossing.

Sec. 3. Every operator of every or any automobile or motor vehicle or machine shall sound his horn, or other appliance for giving audible signal, when overtaking a person, vehicle, horse or other animal upon the roads, streets or highways of the city, and shall sound his horn, or other like appliance, when approaching any street crossing, or when rounding a curve or corner.

Every operator of any automobile or motor vehicle, which is equipped with bright lights, and also with dim lights, commonly known as 'dimmers,' shall, when meeting any person or vehicle upon the streets and highways of the city, and before coming within 100 feet of such person or vehicle, switch off such bright lights and switch onto the dimmers, until such person or vehicle is passed.

Sec. 4. When signalled to do so, by the driver of a horse or other animal, the driver or operator of any motor propelled vehicle shall stop the same; and if, requested, shall stop engine to same until all danger has been avoided.

In case of injury or damage to person or property, due to the operation of a vehicle, the operator or driver thereof shall stop, and, upon the request of the person injured, or of anyone present, shall give his or her name and address, and that of the owner of the vehicle.

All drivers and operators of any vehicle shall stop the same upon the request of any peace officer of the City of Goldthwaite, which signal shall be given by the raising of the hand or whip.

No vehicle shall be driven on the streets, alleys, roads or highways of the city, with a fire engine, or other

fire apparatus, shall immediately draw their vehicle as near as practical to the right hand curb, parallel thereto, and come to a stand still.

Sec. 5. No person, while riding a bicycle, tricycle, motorcycle, or while on skates, shall take hold of any automobile, or motor propelled vehicle for the purpose of being carried along by the same.

Sec. 6. The word 'vehicle' or 'machine,' as contained herein, shall be construed to mean wagons, buggies, carriages, trucks, push carts, bicycles, tricycles, motorcycles, horse, equestrians, and everything including gasoline and electric cars, on wheels or runners, invalid chairs and baby carriages excepted.

The word 'driver' shall include the rider or driver of horses, the rider of bicycles and operator of pedaled vehicles, motor propelled vehicles.

The word 'curb' shall mean the lateral boundary of that portion of the street designated for the use of vehicles, whether marked by curbstone or not.

Sec. 7. Any person who shall violate any of the foregoing sections or parts of sections of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction therefor shall be fined in any sum not less than one nor more than twenty-five dollars.

Sec. 8. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed.

Sec. 9. The fact that there is no adequate Traffic Ordinance and rules of road creates an emergency, and an imperative public necessity exists that the rules requiring ordinances to be read at three several meetings be suspended, and the same are hereby suspended, and this ordinance shall be in effect immediately after its passage and publication.
