You are hereby commanded to summon F. H. Perkins by making publication of this Citation once in each week for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your County, to appear at the next regular term of the District Court of Mills County, to be held at the Court House thereof, in Goldthwaite, Texas, on the first Monday in October, A. D. 1916, the same being the 2nd day of October, A. D. 1916, then and there to answer a petition filed in said Court on the 8th day of August, A. D. 1916 in a suit, numbered on the docket of said Court No. 1534, wherein Randolph & Allen, a firm composed of J. H. Randolph and J. T. Allen, are Plaintiffs, and F. H. Perkins is Defendant, and said petition alleging substantially, that on or about the 3rd day of February, 1915, said F. H. Perkins executed and delivered to said plaintiffs his promissory note, with mortgage clause, for the sum of \$552.20, bearing interest at 10 per cent per annum from date, and due and payable Oct. 1st, after date, and providing for the payment of a reasonable attorney's fee if said note is not paid at maturity, and is placed in the hands of an attorney for collection, which plaintiffs allege has been done, and that a reasonable fee for said services is the sum of \$63.55; that plaintiffs are the owners of said note, and that there is due and unpaid thereon, after demands made on defendant, the aggregate sum of \$699.30, together with interest thereon at the rate of 10 per cent per annum from the date of the filing of said petition, that said note further recites that it is given as renewal of certain other notes in said petition more particularly described, and that same is given for the purchase price of Deering 6-ft. binder, and Double Disc Moline Plow, and John Deere Double Disc Plow, and that a lien is retained on said machinery aforesaid for the securing of said note. Said petition alleging that said F. H. Perkins' residence is unknown, that he secretes himself so that the ordinary process of the law cannot be served upon him, and asks for the issuance of attachment to be levied upon the property of said defendant. H. Perkins from Randolph and Allen at various times.

The undertakers are getting ready for the rush as the season approaches for starting the kitchen fire with the coal oil can. This is always a profitable season for dealers in burial outfits.

A Fort Worth man took offense at some of the sayings of Evangelist Ham and assaulted him at his hotel Monday night. The evangelist was struck several times, but his injuries were not serious.

The revenue bill adopted by congress just prior to adjournment does not require the placing of revenue stamps on commercial paper or on telegrams, bills of lading, express receipts and similar documents.

The announcement was made in New York this week by Mr. Ripley of the Santa Fe system that he would test the constitutionality of the recently enacted eight hour law for railroad employes by the federal congress.

Quiet prevails along the border and in Mexico, but there is no permanent peace assured. The policy of making it so dangerous to cross the border that no Mexican would risk it is the only way to effect permanent peace along the border.

The jury in the trial of Mrs. Foust at Sherman returned a verdict Sunday finding her not guilty. She shot and killed Rev. H. M. Cagle, a prominent Baptist preacher, some months ago, but claimed self defense as a cause for the shooting.

The result of the election in Maine appears to have been very satisfactory to the Republicans and Democrats alike. The former are pleased because of the victory for their state ticket and the latter are pleased because of the small majority given the successful ticket.

The Eagle's statement that a pay-in-advance system would be adopted by the management has met with the approval of all who have been heard to express an opinion. It is the business way to conduct affairs and is more satisfactory to everybody than the go-as-you-please plan to which we have been accustomed.

It is thought likely the Kansas City school board will prescribe a regulation uniform for the young ladies who are pupils in the public educational institutions of that city. This action will be taken to prevent embarrassment to those who are too poor to buy such finery as is displayed by other pupils of the schools.

Already the matter of supplying free text books to children who are unable to procure them and are forced to attend school has become a serious problem in some counties. The compulsory school attendance law requires the county to supply books and other school supplies for law requires the county to supply them and some counties levied a special tax to provide for the expense.

The idea of a national pay-up week is a good one and as the years go by the plan will be adopted more and more, until the date will be looked forward to by debtors and creditors alike when accounts will be settled. Many people can not pay their obligations because of a failure of those who are indebted to them to make proper settlement. By the universal observation of pay-up week many will be able to pay their debts who otherwise could not pay.

The great steel bridge which was to span the St. Lawrence river in Quebec, collapsed and eleven men lost their lives in the accident. The building of this bridge was one of the greatest engineering propositions ever undertaken in the world and has been under consideration for more than fifty years. While this accident will delay the work, which is to have been completed by next year, it will be a relief to the thousands of people who couldn't ride him. The

CAREY, TEXAS

Editor Eagle: Since it has been a long time since I have written the Old Bird, I thought I would drop a few lines. We certainly enjoy reading the Eagle every week. I have been a reader of the Eagle ever since I could read a paper and now you readers can guess whether or not I would miss it if it should fail to come to Carey.

Carey is just a little wide place in the road, one grocery and dry goods store, one lumber yard, one blacksmith shop, one gin and post office and about twenty dwelling houses, two churches and one large school building. It is just eight miles west of Childress, on the Fort Worth and Denver railroad.

Crops are cut short in this part of the Panhandle on account of the drouth, but there will be good cotton in parts of the county, if the frost don't come too early. We have had a good rain after a two and one-half months drouth. The crops have revived up and looking good now and the grass is getting good. I think this a good country up here, but of course it has its drawbacks. The old N stores and cowboys here say we are not in the Panhandle, we are just in the handle of the pan. I guess that is right, as lots of the men and boys in this part, went west to work through harvest time, so I suppose they went on up in to the pan, as the grain country has always for several years been considered in the Panhandle and this year the handle failed.

The Childress county fair has just closed, after four days of fun and amusement. I had the pleasure of attending this fair and it was certainly a good one, just for a county fair. They certainly had fine stock on exhibition and everything right up to now and something to entertain from the youngest to the oldest people that were there. They had all kinds of horse racing and auto racing and motor races and bronk riding to a finish. It seems like that racing and riding is the main enjoyment to those Panhandle people. They also had Kiawa Bill, the big Kiawa Chief and his band of Indians to come here from Oklahoma and attend the fair. They came in all kind of rigs from a two wheel cart to an auto. I believe there were seven autos in the bunch. Now believe me, those Indians enjoyed themselves. The county furnished them beef and some bread and pickles. I don't believe those old time Indians don't like a cucumber he just ought to see them turned loose on a barrel. Of course those younger Indians, some at least that have been educated, have nice manners and seem to be jolly good fellows, both boys and girls, and I noticed that they did not hang their feet up in the hot sun as those older ones did. Some of the girls were dressed like our people dress and looked real nice, but when they would leave their tent or wigwam they always wore their lawl. There are lots of difference in those Kiawa Indians now and what they were ten years ago, except the old ones—I can't see any change in them, only they will try to talk to anyone now, more so than they would when I used to see them ten years ago. The Indians run horse races in the fair ground and one old Indian that rode a race claimed to be seventy-nine years old. He looked awful feeble to whip a horse through a half mile circle track, but when he passed the grand stand he waived his hand to the crowd and rode like a sixteen year old boy. The Indians brought with them some awful pretty ponies, all colors, and they run some good races. I saw the two famous outlaw horses, Montana Red and Crazy Snake, from Hollis, Oklahoma. Montana Red won first money for being the highest pitcher and a cowboy they called Panhandle Slim won first money when he rode him. It was exciting to watch them saddle him. When they led him out in front of the grand stand to saddle him, the boy who led him had to dismount, as he would just stand on his hind feet and paw. I suppose there are forty or fifty acres in the fair ground and they would just turn them loose with nothing on but the saddle and rider and several times the rider would be left to walk back to the grand stand and meet the shouts and

noted Crazy Snake won first money as being the crookedest and fastest bronk, but he left his rider on the ground after he had rode him at least one hundred yards. Those people out here know how to prepare a program and they don't mind to spend their money. We like to live out here very well. I have improved in health a great deal, but the rheumatism has still got a hold on me, but I believe I will get entirely well, but suppose it will take time. I have been told that E. G. Crawford, our ex-county clerk from Goldthwaite, lives out here at Childress, though I haven't seen him. Would have liked to meet up with him. I think a great deal of him. I have a right to. You know he is the man that sold me my marriage license and I was a poor boy and he never charged me any more than he did other folks. Well, Mr. Editor, for fear I will write so much you can't get it all printed and get the Eagle out here on time, I will bring this to a close. DAVID L. GOODWIN.

COLVILLE AGENCY

Daisy, Washington

Editor Eagle:

After some delay, I come again with another letter.

We have spent a delightful vacation to be brought to a close next Tuesday, September 5, when the doors will be thrown open and the school bell will again call forth a multitude of Indian children from their homes to the halls of learning. This date marks the beginning of every school on Colville reservation.

While our vacation has indeed been a treat, we are glad to take up our school work again, thus modifying our duties more completely. Vacation eventually grows tiresome and monotonous.

There's time for work and time for play and we feel like we have had our share of the last mentioned. Many were the pleasant strolls we had down to the picturesque Columbia, where we watched from the shady banks, its turbid waters rushing, racing, as if for life. Often we captivated some of Columbia's choicest spotted trout and squaw fish.

The kodak has been a source of much past time. Books from some of our most famous authors have been perused from beginning to end. Mid all these, the mildness of the climate is unrivaled. Only a few times the thermometer has registered 90 degrees, some mornings we notice the mercury at 47 degrees, then it is cool enough that a fire feels somewhat comfortable.

This country is laden with delicious fruits. Most especially the apple and pear crops is unusually good, as was the cherry and apricot, which is already gathered. Peaches were damaged by late frosts along the river.

Now a few thoughts concerning the Colville tribe. Their homes are extremely rude. Many of them are constructed of logs and very small with very poor ventilation, having only one door and sometimes just one window. Few of them have more than one or two rooms in their homes. The families being composed of all the way from two to twelve members, consequently the sanitary conditions are far below the standard. The death rate among the Indians is comparatively large, tuberculosis being one of the most prevalent and fatal diseases, which is due to exposure and unsanitary home conditions. Occasionally we see an Indian home somewhat modernized with good orchards, barns and a fairly decent home, but this is very rare.

We can look just across the river from here and see the nice modern homes of the white people and the apple orchards almost covering the entire valley, but we know very little of what is going on over there, save when we are permitted to visit the attractive little city of Daisy and mingle with her good people. We find also, that the people across the river are not very well informed as to what takes place on this side, as the river is the dividing line of the reservation and no other way of coming over except by paying the ferry charges, which range from twenty-five cents to one dollar per crossing.

Next Tuesday morning when the school bell rings, the children will form a line and march into the school building. This they will do each time when they are called from the playgrounds. At 10:30 o'clock some of the girls will be dismissed from the schoolroom and will go to the kitchen, which joins the main building. First they will wash their faces and hands thoroughly, then with the proper instructions, they go about the preparations for the noon lunch. The tables—one for the boys and one for the girls—are set and the dishes placed. When the noon hour arrives each child takes his separate wash basin and washes and uses his individual towel and comb. They march to the dining tables in order offering "Grace" in their native tongue and in unison. The tables are cleared and dishes washed by the girls who helped prepare lunch. When the bell rings all of the children line up and brush their teeth. The next day some other girls have their turn and so on until all have ample training in the line of cooking, baking and house cleaning. All the sweeping is done by the use of dustless sweepers, the trash being

removed by the use of dust pans and floor brushes, and then burned.

The Industrial period begins at about 3:00 p. m. The boys receive manual training, etc. and the girls receive instructions in sewing, hem-stitching, etc. The government often furnishes material for aprons and the girls make them here in the sewing room.

The pursuing industries of the Indian women are moccasin and glove-making. Some of them are quite skilled in the art of bead work. Their men kill the deer, they tan the hides and make the gloves and often sell them at from \$5 to \$7 per pair.

I could say much more, but my letter has already grown too lengthy. In our quiet meditations of summer vacation our minds have often times reverted to our many dear friends and loved ones in the dear Lone Star State. Our hearts have ached for the benefit in our home communities. We rejoiced with the good results of the great soul winning revival in our home town, Indian Gap, and everywhere in all the land where the word has been preached and accepted by the lonely wayfarer. We take up our winters work with zeal and enthusiasm.

Oh happy home of childhood, strange that we can never feel,
How deeply in our hearts thy spirit dwells

Until we wander from thy care and recollections steal,
Into our dreams, like distant chiming bells.

For though we travel thru the world to profit and to learn

From Texas to Washington, thru cities great and small,

There comes a time when tired souls would willingly return
To old Texas—the dearest place of all.

CHICAGO, ILL., September 8, 1916.

TO SANTA FE EMPLOYEES AND THE PUBLIC:

This is the position of the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe Railway Company regarding the controversy with its train-service employees over their demand for increased compensation:

Congress, hastily acting under a threat of four leaders of labor organizations, enacted a so-called eight-hour law, which is nothing more nor less than an advance of twenty to twenty-five per cent in the wages of the best paid men in railway service.

It is only fair to our employees and the public to say that the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe Railway Company **does not intend to comply with the law except as and when ordered to do so by the court of last resort.**

The merits of the case have been fully explained in the last few months and need no further mention.

Should the courts finally decide that the increase must be paid, there will be an immediate demand from the remaining classes of labor, resulting in entire inability to pay without heavy increases in rates to be paid by the public—especially the farming class.

TEACHERS' INSTITUTE

Those who have not attended the sessions of the Mills County Teachers' Institute during the past week have missed some rare treats. An evidence of the co-operative spirit that pervaded the meetings was the readiness with which the teachers responded, despite the fact that but few received programs before they reached the city, and we wish to thank them all for their efforts. We also desire to express our appreciation to those of our local citizens who have shown their interest in the school work of the county by leaving their places of business to assist in the institute work.

Standing prominent among the treats of the week's program were the addresses by Mr. Stockard of the State Department of Education and Mr. Bresler of the University of Texas. Especially important is the information brought by Mr. Stockard on the compulsory school attendance law, which goes into effect with the beginning of the 1916-1917 school term. Briefly, it requires the attendance of all children of Texas between the ages of eight and fourteen. The law provides: First, an age limit; second, exemptions; third, penalties for failure to comply.

All children whose eighth birthday comes before Sept. 1, or whose fourteenth birthday comes on or after Sept. 1, will be compelled by law to attend the public schools of the district in which they reside for a term of sixty days during that year, eighty days during the next year, and one hundred days each successive year, unless its parents or guardian present a certificate showing that the child is attending some other private, parochial or other school; or, second, present a physician's certificate that the child is mentally or physically deficient; or third, unless the child lives more than two and one-half miles from the school; or fourth, unless the child is over 12 years of age and has completed four years of work in an elementary school; or fifth, its services are needed at home.

The state superintendent has ruled that this compulsory attendance shall begin at the opening of school unless the school board sets a definite date. He has also ruled that parents or guardians, who are not able to provide school supplies may apply to the County Judge, who will purchase the necessary supplies.

Mr. Stockard's talk upon the \$1,000,000 appropriation for rural schools was of special interest to the county teachers.

Because of the great increase in the number of scholastics in the state and the growing demand for additional teachers and school equipment to accommodate the school children, an effort to meet this demand resulted in House Bill No. 20, passed by the 34th legislature. This bill provides for an increase from 50 cents to \$1.00 of our present tax limit for school purposes. It also provides that each county may levy a special tax of not more than 50 cents for the purpose of raising additional funds for school purposes. This does not mean that the tax will be \$1.00, but that the limit may be raised to not more than \$1.00 in case conditions demand. Those acquainted with our local school conditions are aware that the present 50 cents limit is a great handicap to the maintenance of our present standing or to the prospects of raising this standing.

Mr. Bresler's address on the Interscholastic League of Texas aroused renewed interest in this work. The desire to push this co-operative work of the public schools of the State was expressed by an unanimous vote of the teachers to reorganize our local league. The following officials were elected: R. E. Weaver, director general; Thos. E. Gay, assistant director general; A. H. Daniel, director of debate and declamation; Miss Patly McPherson, director of spelling; Miss Florence Douglas, director of essays; D. A. Benton, director of athletics.

In the belief that the social side of life should be developed along with the intellectual and physical, the citizens of Goldthwaite, on Thursday afternoon, treated the teachers attending the institute to an automobile ride over the city. Returning to the court house, all were served with punch and cake.

In appreciation for all favors shown them during the week the teachers

unanimously adopted the following resolution:

BE IT RESOLVED

1. That we, the teachers of Mills county, do hereby extend our gratitude to the citizens of Goldthwaite for the kind hospitality shown us during institute week.

2. That we extend our thanks to the visiting and local speakers, who have so kindly assisted us with our program.

3. That we thank our chairman, Mr. T. E. Gay, and our county judge, Mr. Dalton, for their hearty co-operation and advice.

4. That we extend our appreciation to the citizens of Goldthwaite for the special entertainment given us Thursday afternoon.

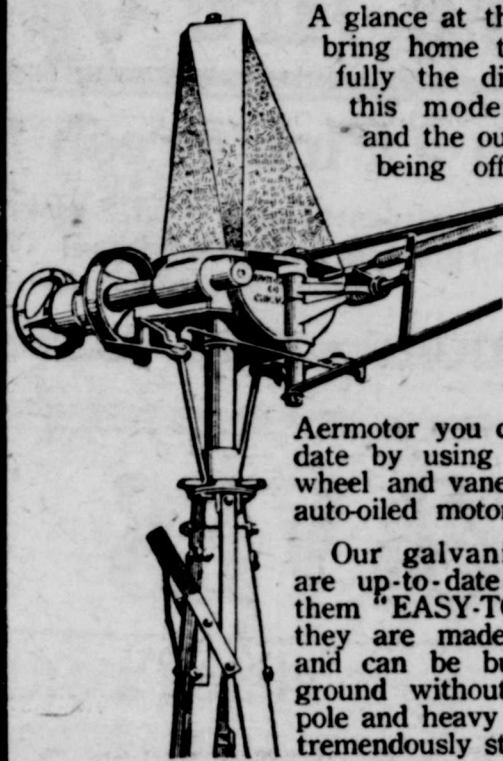
