A news report tells of many attempts being made to defraud farmers in organizing rural credit associations and loan societies. The eport says: "Clear across the contment, in a strip of states from Virginia to California, the Federal Farm Loan Board reported organizations either deliberately, fraudulently or at best illegal, have sprung up for the purpose of defrauding farmers through the latter's ignorance of the new rural credits act. In one single inctance, it is said, the farmers have been victimized to an aggregate of \$350,000." The Federal Farm Loan Board has issued a warning to the unsuspecting. Since the twelve Federal Farm Loan Banks have not yet been established banks will be located and farm-loan associations will be required to secure loans. No one should be deceived as to these promoters. Much remains to be done before this system is ready for business, yet it is expected that by January or February of next year the system will be in. operation.-Ex.



It is certainly to be hoped that this amendment will carry. It will not of itself impose a tax upon the people, but would give them a right to vote a tax for school purposes if they so desired. That the schools in Texas are badly in need of more money with which to run the'r schools is unquestioned. That Texas ranks low in educational facilities is now admitted by all. That it should rank first is the ambition of all true Texans. To raide the stan. dard of education creates a necessity for more morey. That the people should be allowed to raise and spend own children does not admit of ergument.

The rural school districts and independent school districts are ask. ng the state for permission to tax themselves for the purpose of educating their own children. In order to do this, this amendment must be passed. Surely no reasonable person would deny them this right.

In voting for this amendment you vote no tax on yourselves. Your districe may not need the tax, but the people in your neighboring district may sorely need and want it. You only say by your vote for the amendment, that your neighbor may tax himself for the purpose of educating his children. Don't you think he should be permitted to do this, especially as it does not commit you to voting a tax on yourself.
