## MASS MEETING HELD

### School Matters Discussed By Citizens—Amendment Favored.

A mass meeting was held in the district court room Monday night in response to a call by the Goldthwaite school board, to discuss school matters. Mr. A. J. Harrison, president of the school board, was elected chairman of the meeting and in his opening address explained the necessity for more finances to keep the school up to its present high standard and maintain a nine-months term.  
Mr. W. A. Bayley, secretary of the school board, presented figures showing the expenditures and receipts of the school and demonstrated that additional finances would have to be provided to carry the school on for 9 months.  
Prof. T. E. Gay, superintendent of the Goldthwaite schools, gave a report of the conditions of the school and showed that there had been a large increase in enrollment and conditions were decidedly favorable, with the exception of the crowded condition of the lower grades.  
A number of other citizens made short talks, which proved that people of the town are interested in school work and are anxious to give the children every advantage possible. Several spoke favoring the proposed constitutional amendment allowing an increase in local taxes in school districts and the meeting was harmonious throughout.

The Watson family was among the first to locate at Goldthwaite when the town was new and their friends are many. ### DAVE McCORMICK DEAD

D. R. McCormick, one of the best known business men of Mullin, was found dead in a hotel in Belton Thursday night and his remains were shipped to Mullin on the early morning train yesterday.

Mr. McCormick had gone to Belton on Wednesday night's train to look after some business matters. He registered at the Central hotel and gave orders that he was not to be disturbed the next morning, as he was not feeling well. When he entered his room he removed his coat and top shirt and laid across the bed without removing his other clothing and it was in that condition he was found Thursday evening about 6:30 o'clock, when the hotel people made an investigation after not having any communication from him all day. Physicians called after his body was discovered decided he had been dead for several hours and it is thought likely he died soon after entering the room.

Mr. McCormick lived in Mullin a number of years, having been one of the foremost business men of the town since its earliest days. He was popular with a large circle of friends and all who knew him liked him. He leaves a wife and several children, besides a number of other relatives to mourn his death, and in their bereavement they have the sympathy of everybody.

Funeral services are to be held in Mullin at 10 o'clock this morning and will be conducted under the auspices of the Masonic lodge of which order he was a member.

The trustees of Live Oak school have fixed Monday, Nov. 20, as the date the compulsory school attendance shall become effective in that district.

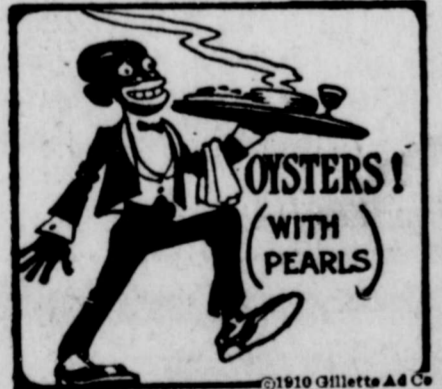

The disappointment over election results in the state and nation this week proves that people can make themselves believe anything they want to believe about politics.

A negro boy shot and killed a young white man near Bay City Sunday. He was arrested and was being carried to a jail in a neighboring county when a number of citizens took him from the sheriff and hung him.

The estimate filed with the comptroller calls for appropriations of fifteen million dollars for the support of the state government the next two years. The estimate is a few hundred dollars less than the appropriations for the past two years.

More than thirty people perished in a street car accident in Boston Tuesday, when a closed car on the elevated railroad went thru an open draw bridge into the channel. Some were killed outright or drowned, while others died after being rescued from the water.

The pink boll worm which has appeared in Mexico and across the border in Texas at some places will likely be a greater menace to cotton culture than the boll weevil, according to those who have made a study of the habits of the insects and know of the havoc wrought in cotton fields by them.

The present high price of cotton may not prove such a blessing to the farmers and the business world if it is the cause of an over-production of cotton next year or the over-planting of that crop. True, the planting of a large crop does not necessarily mean the gathering of a big crop, but in any event it is likely to prove disastrous.

The circulation of a rumor that Germany would establish a submarine base off the coast of Mexico, to prevent the shipment of oil to the English allies, caused this government to issue a warning to the Mexican authorities to be careful to prevent any infractions of the Mexican neutrality by giving aid to the undersea crafts and operators.

It is announced that Barry Miller, a prominent lawyer of Dallas and nominee for representative, has prepared a bill to be introduced at the next session of the legislature, providing that a county attorney may summon a jury to investigate crime in the same way that grand juries now make such investigation. It would be necessary to know the full text of the bill before being able to pass upon its benefits, but from the meagre report given it certainly appears to be unnecessary legislation.

The man who spends his money at home comes nearer being satisfied than the party who buys a money order at the postoffice and sends it a thousand miles away. In the first place the home man sees what he is buying, the quality of the goods and the price he pays for it. If he dislikes his purchase, after returning home, he can return it, and he can buy on credit if not in position to pay the cash. The merchant at home is willing to extend every accommodation. Is it not better to deal with people you know to be reliable, rather than patronize a firm not interested in the growth and development of home towns and home enterprises?—Granger News.

#### DEMOCRATIC VICTORY

##### Woodrow Wilson Again Elected President of the United States.

The Democratic party has again triumphed over its opponents and elected Woodrow Wilson president, thereby assuring the country peace, plenty and prosperity for another four years.

For a time the result of the election held Tuesday seemed to be in doubt and the early reports gave considerable consolation to the opponents of the dominant party, but slowly the returns continued to dispel the doubts and fears of the Democrats and by noon Wednesday there were strong indications that the country had endorsed the administration of Woodrow Wilson and had returned him to power.

While all returns are not yet in and the Democratic majority may be largely increased, enough states have given returns to insure a good majority for the Democrats in the electoral college. Reports up to yesterday morning gave Wilson 269 votes and Hughes 235 with 27 votes yet in doubt, the states of Minnesota, New Hampshire, New Mexico and West Virginia not having been officially reported, but unofficial reports giving three of these states to Wilson. However, the required 266 votes having already been assured, there is no uneasiness, no matter how the reports may come from the states named.

In Texas there was no contest, of course, except for railroad commissioner for the unexpired term and the face of the returns show a victory for Hurdleston, but whether or not this will be taken as final is to be seen. It is also reported that the constitutional amendment providing for an increase in the school tax was adopted by a large majority, but no figures are yet available.

In Mill County there was no contest. Therefore, the nominees were all elected and the commissioners court will meet next week to declare the result of the election and approve the bonds of the officials.

It is hoped that detailed reports can be made next week, but it is impossible to secure the figures at this time.
