ROAD WORKING CAMPAIGN

Plans Inaugurated for Co-operation in Highway Improvement

A delegation from the Goldthwaite Commercial club, joined by a similar delegation from the Mullin Commercial club, called on the commissioners court in session here Tuesday and offered co-operation and suggestions for road improvements in the county.

No definite plans were announced by the court and while no decision was reached as to the propositions of the clubs, it is safe to predict that the members of the court will look carefully into the plans and give attention to every detail, which will result in an improved system of road working in Mills county. The court decided to visit some of the surrounding counties before adopting a system and a thorough investigation will be made as to cost, permanency and other facts of importance.

The plan outlined by the clubs is for the court to buy one or two traction engines, together with necessary heavy plows and other implements and machinery for road work, after which an experienced road builder is to be employed to have charge of the work under the supervision of the commissioners. This supervisor is to be selected from among the residents of Mills county, if possible, and is to be employed at the same salary allowed the commissioners for similar work. It is also proposed on the part of these clubs to inaugurate a campaign for "32 or two days" contribution to road improvement by every citizen of the county, regardless of age or financial ability. The Eagle believes the plan proposed by the clubs is a most advantageous in every way and outlined to the court will and hopes the court will adopt it.

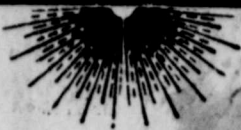

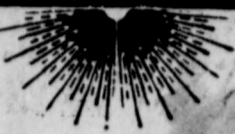

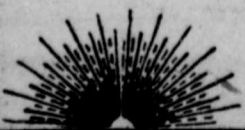

Two men robbed the depot safe at Egan at an early hour Monday morning, securing \$17.

The German merchant submarine Deutschland has completed its second voyage to the United States and is again safely in port. The last voyage the vessel carried a cargo valued at two million dollars.

Bandits entered the bank at Vin. Itc, Okla., Monday afternoon and locking the cashier in the vault escaped with \$15,000 in money. They made a clear get-away and there is little hope of their identification.

The frequent and persistent rumors that members of President Wilson's cabinet intended to resign have been set at rest by the members making positive declaration that no such action was contemplated by them.

Senator Sheppard has been made chairman of the senate census committee which will have charge of the census taking in 1920. Plans are in formation for making the next census the most complete ever attempted in this country.

Every Democrat should be interested in raising the money with which to liquidate the indebtedness of the national committee in the recent campaign. This committee has a right to expect the Democracy to pay the expenses of the campaign.

It is certainly hoped the murderous villain who killed the cashier of the bank at Point, Raines county, will be convicted and hung. He entered the bank when the cashier was alone and ordered the safe opened, but as the time lock was on the command could not be obeyed. He then ordered the cashier to hold up his hands and turn his back, which was done and the villain then shot the cashier dead.

A ray of hope was seen in the European war situation this week when the German allies made announcement that terms of peace would be discussed if desirable to those nations engaged in hostilities with them. While the outline of the plan set forth may not be accepted, it is mighty likely the promulgation of the proposal at this time will be helpful in finding a way to end the terrible and apparently useless struggle. It will at least open a way for offers of mediation by neutral governments.

The Federal Trade commission has reported its finding that there has been no increase in the cost of manufacturing news print paper, notwithstanding the price has been more than doubled in the last few months. The result of this finding may lead to the investigation of the alleged paper trust which has arbitrarily put the price of paper to the present high and unreasonable price. When paper costing \$30 per ton in the manufacture is sold for \$140 the profit to the manufacturer and middle man is too much.

The road that connects your farm with the nearest town has more to do with the cost of living, doubtless, than you realize. Have you ever thought that every product you sell and every article you buy must be hauled over the road; that your teams and vehicles or your automobile must bear the "wear and tear" caused by a rough road to sell farm products or to bring the necessities from the town? The fact that your neighbor must also pay the high cost of bad roads is all the better reason why you, he and the rest of the neighborhood should get together and improve the road to save some of this expense. What you and your neighbors lose in hauling farm products over bad roads would soon build a good road and give you quick and satisfactory service. How long can you afford such loss? And when shall the road be improved?—Farm and Ranch.

WHAT IS MAN

According to tradition, history or something of the sort as the great wheel of time began to roll forward toward the end of these almost 6000 years and after everything else made, that was made, man because the very last of creation, took his place at the head of the procession, made monarch of all he surveyed and permitted to give names to the rest of the animal creation. His master made him upright, pure and good and filled him full of names suitable for all the rest of creation. Started him out under the most charming and favorable circumstances with the birds singing, cattle lowing, sheep bleating, serpents hissing, all gentle and fearless of him whom the creator had placed over them.

When we contemplate man in this very enviable position before God and the world we are horrified at the thought that he would step down from his lofty place to listen and be led off by the seductive influences of the devil—the enemy of God and man—and take up his dirty work of disobedience that led to banishment from his lofty estate to a life of disappointments, heartaches and finally murder in his own household. Yet it is true and we are brought face to face with the fact that through this disobedience, death was brought on all the children of men and we must all die. If the golden text of our last Sunday school lesson means what it says (Be thou faithful unto death and I will give thee a crown of life) nothing short of faithfulness in God's service will meet the requirements and these requirements are all wrapped up in one of the little words previously mentioned 'right.' We know the tendency is away from God and the right, and we are fluent in making excuses when not in the right, yet these excuses will avail no more before the tribunal of the skies than excuses will count before man made courts. God says, "The soul that sinneth it shall die." Just to the reverse, he says "He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life," both sentences being in the present tense. Sin until death and we die; believe on the Son until death and we live. The point I wish to make clear (if possible) is that in all of Christ's teachings, in fact, all the Bible from beginning to end offers nothing but a now salvation.

Blessed is the man that walketh not in the counsel of the ungodly, not did walk but is walking now. God gave His son that whosoever believeth hath everlasting life, not did have it, but got it now, because he believeth now and that present tense belief keeps him warm in a present tense salvation from sin, soul and body and in communion with the Divine. "Blessed are they which do hunger and thirst after righteousness for they shall be filled," not did hunger and thirst, but are on to their job and hungering and thirsting now and as they hunger and thirst the filling comes. "Blessed are the pure in heart for they shall see God," not were pure in heart, but pure now and in this pure sweet relation we can look up and with our spiritual vision see God and by keeping up this present tense purity of heart we will by and by see Him face to face. The Master says "ye are the salt of the earth, the light of the world, a city set on a hill, a candle up on the candlestick, etc., but not a single time does He say "Turn down the light, put out the salt to fit and frolic with the Devil and his gang for a while." 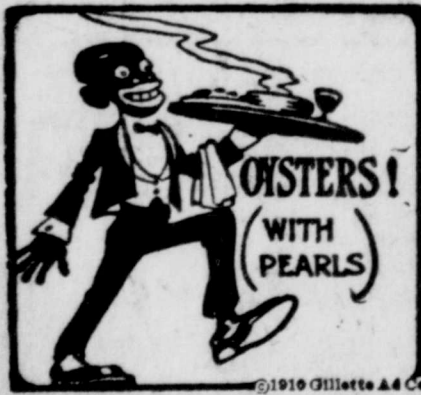

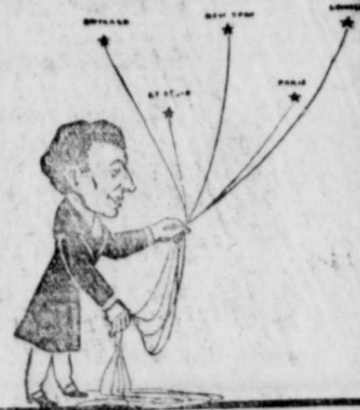

Either of these committeemen will be glad to receive and forward contributions to the national headquarters.

Following is an extract from an appeal sent out by Chairman Ridge-way of the Texas central committee: "To the Democrats of Texas: I have just returned from Washington, where I had a conference with the national campaign committee, and it was decided that about \$500 for each senatorial district in Texas would constitute Texas' share in making up the deficit which the national campaign committee is facing. These gentlemen have given their time for several months without pay in winning the battle for national democracy and they are very much in need of money. During October they personally obligated themselves for nearly \$300,000 more than was collected, and it would not be right for these men to have to pay this personally."
