MORE CONSUMERS FOR PRODUCTS

The rapid growth of urban population in the Southwest is very largely responsible for the fact that markets for all kinds of country produce are better than they were several years ago. It is true that short crops this year and the war in Europe have increased prices considerably. It is also true that a limited supply makes favorable conditions for speculation. But it is a fact, nevertheless, that markets have been better since the cities and towns have grown and business in general has improved.

The growth of cities and towns means greater opportunities for farmers. While these urban centers may cause a change in the system of farm management, especially in the territory near certain cities and towns, such changes offer greater inducement for intensive farming and also for specialization.

As an example, near the larger cities many are now engaged in dairying to supply city people with milk and butter; truck growers produce vegetables and other food crops; fruit growers, poultrymen and others specialize in products needed for the local market. In addition to this farmers living some distance from such markets bring in their products. We thus see that these markets have been built and both the rural and the urban centers are benefited.

There are now greater opportunities for diversified crops than ever before. Cotton is one of several crops for which there is now a market.

City growth in the center of agricultural population is greatly desired. Cities in such centers are clearing houses of agricultural wealth and thus aid rural civilization.—Farm and Ranch.

DEMAND NEW LAW

A bill will be put before the next legislature asking that all legal notices now required to be posted in three prominent places be required to be published in the local newspapers instead. At first this does not seem as important as it is, but after sober reflection it will be seen to be more economical for those having the posting done and will really keep the public informed. For instance, it occurred in Comanche county that a certain piece of land was to be sold by a decree and the trustee did not want much publicity so his partner in the deal could buy in the land without paying what it was worth. Accordingly he had 3 notices posted where only a few disinterested ones would see them and pulled off the sale according to his wishes, really doing a skin game. This could not have been done if that notice of sale had been published. This case is but one of a thousand in Texas, that might be cited to. This shows an evil the present law permits that would be done away with should the attempted law pass. Now let us see the cost. The usual charge for such publications is \$5.00 and it often costs more to make the proper posting by the time fees, etc., are paid. The old law was sufficient in the early days when newspapers were not available and when twenty families and one town constituted a county, and when everybody visited the courthouse once a month at least. But we live under different conditions today.—Comanche Chief.

The Ham-Ramsey prohibition election in Travis county resulted in a victory for the "wets" by a small majority.

A number of papers have announced an increase in their subscription price after Jan. 1. This is but the dictates of sound business judgment, for the price of print paper has reached a point that either the publisher must collect every dollar due him, raise the price or go out of business.

The last issue of the Mullin Enterprise announced that R. E. Bradbury would again assume the management and editorial charge of that paper. This was indeed pleasing information for his many friends as well as the well-wishers of the Enterprise and Mullin. There are few better or more talented newspaper men than Bradbury.

The murder of ex-Sheriff Mitchell and ex-Deputy Sheriff Reed in Knox City Sunday night by an assassin was somewhat mysterious, both as to the identity of the murderer and the cause that actuated him. The men were standing in front of a drug store when some one in a closed auto shot and killed them and then made a quick get-away in the car.

One of the saddest accidents of the Christmas time was that by which Miss Eula Stone of Robert Lee lost her life. She was a student in the Industrial college at Denton and had returned home for the holidays. The morning after her arrival she went for a walk around the ranch home and in some manner fell from a rock ledge on the mountain side and was instantly killed, her neck being broken.

While some of the newspapers and alleged statesmen of Europe were inclined to make light of President Wilson's note regarding the ending of the war, the great attention they gave the matter and the continued discussion of the subject matter shows that it struck deeply and will have the final effect of bringing about peace negotiations, unless some of those in charge of affairs are too hard headed to listen to reason or to realize conditions.

Prosperity for the country means a condition in which all men who want to work can find work at remunerative wages. Prosperity for the individual means wages which provide for his necessities and comforts, with a surplus salvable against the day when he shall become incapacitated for earning his keep. To one individual the difference between prosperity and hard times may amount to as little as 16c a day, while to another it may mean a matter of \$10,000 a year.—Dallas News

A charter has been issued by the secretary of state to a "student's loan association" of Texas, capitalized at \$100,000, the purpose of which is to make loans to deserving University students to enable them to complete the course in that institution.

It is announced that Judge Duval West of San Antonio, who was recently appointed United States circuit judge to succeed Judge T. S. Maxey in the Western district of Texas, expects to enter upon his duties Jan. 3.

Albert T. Patrick, now a wealthy oil man of Tulsa, Oklahoma, who was three times sentenced to die in Sing Sing prison on a murder charge, but who was pardoned after a remarkable fight by his millionaire brother-in-law, John B. Miller of St. Louis, has announced his engagement to Miss Maud West, daughter of a Tulsa oil operator. They will be wedded in June. Patrick was tried for the alleged murder of William Mars' Rice, millionaire founder of Rice Institute of Houston, Texas, who died in New York, September 10, 1900. While in prison under sentence of death Patrick was married. His wife died soon after his release.

STANDING WITH NEIGHBORS

BURGLARS AT BROWNWOOD

Burglars gained entrance to Campbell Drug Company either Saturday night or Sunday night by breaking through a screen and glass window in the ice cream room at the back of the building going through the warehouse and from there into the main building. After searching the house over it was found that an enormous quantity of morphine tablets were stolen, and this appears to have been the sole purpose of the thief or thieves, as it was the only article in the house that was molested.

It was evident that the parties who broke into the store knew where the drugs were kept as the condition of the store showed no signs of a search. The proprietors together with both city and county officers are confident that they will bring the guilty party or parties to account.

It is impossible at this time to state just what quantity of the drug was taken but an invoice will be made at once to determine this fact. Aside from the charges of burglary that may be brought for such an offense it is thought that there will be charges made coming under federal laws for having the drugs in possession.—Brownwood Herald.

Some time alcohol (denatured) will be the chief motor fuel. Gasoline will play out for the simple reason that, so far as anybody knows, the earth is not now making oil. All the mineral oil we get, therefore all the gasoline, was stored in the ground through the long processes of nature. And we are using in a year perhaps more than nature stored in a century. The result must be that all the oil will be taken from earth's reservoirs before a great while, just as one's bank account, however rich, can not stand perpetual drafts against it. Alcohol will become cheaper as gasoline grows dearer. The things which are utilized in alcohol manufacture grow on every farm. For instance, Johnson grass. Some people may not know it, but Johnson grass is not only an excellent raw material for whisky-making, but is just about mean enough to suit the part. The time may come when the farmer who is now pestered by the pest in question will be able to sell it to a distillery for the manufacture of motor fuel. Then there are the various other members of the sorghum family, all good for distilling purposes, along with potatoes, beets, corn, rye and a dozen other farm crops. This will mean new markets for the farmer. But no town man has a right to congratulate himself on that prospect. The farmer has got so many markets now he doesn't have to advertise.—Dallas News.

INEXPENSIVE FARM HOME.

Department of Agriculture Furnishes Free Plans.

The farm house is the most important building on the farm, and money judiciously expended in its planning and construction is well invested. The United States Department of Agriculture, through its Bureau of Farm Management, has been investigating conditions in the rural districts and in many instances found that the living apartments were inconsistent in cost with the value of the farm, and very often in striking contrast with out-buildings and farm machinery.

The Department of Agriculture is not only striving to make the business of farming more remunerative, but is also endeavoring to make farm life more attractive. A series of plans for the construction of farm homes has been prepared. In designing these homes, service, economy and attractiveness have been combined in a frame structure which can be built for \$800 in a community where average prices for material and labor prevail.

The specifications call for a simple four-cornered structure. There is but one chimney and one outside entrance. Another door may be provided by sacrifice of wall and floor space or by increasing the size and cost of the house.

The government experts in planning these homes realized that the comfort and convenience of the farm woman was paramount. They drew their plans accordingly. The kitchen is the most pleasantly located room in the structure. It opens on a screened porch where a large part of the work may be done in the summer.

The water problem has also been carefully considered. Cistern water may be drawn from a bucket pump on the back porch or from a pitcher pump in the sink. Hot water is provided by a reservoir connected with the kitchen stove. The sink with only a drain pipe to be provided, has been found too expensive to be omitted.

The living and dining room is combined and affords sufficient space for the longest table the harvest days will ever require. It has two routes to the kitchen which are convenient for serving a large number of workmen. The Bureau of Farm Management is trying to help the farmer and will gladly furnish free plans to farmers contemplating building homes.

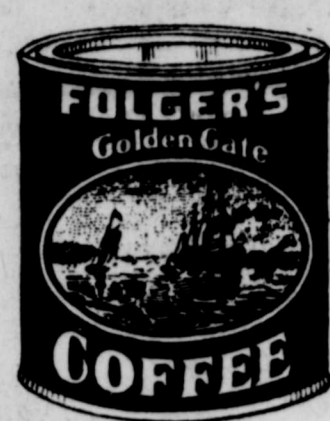

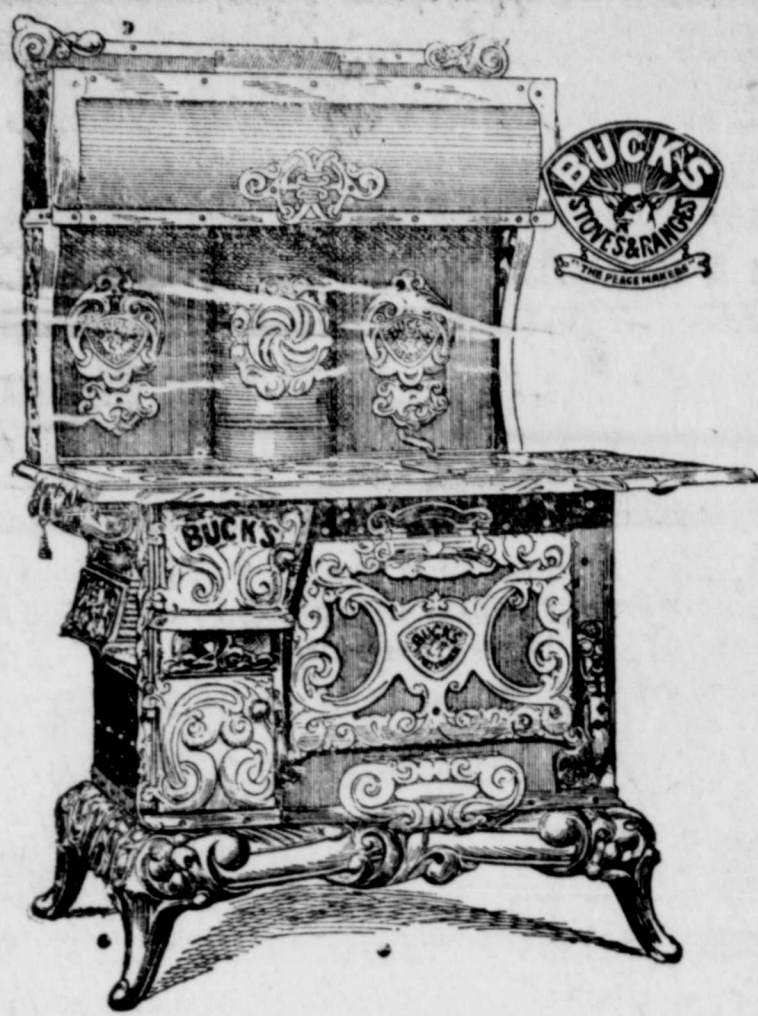
