Mayes, dean of the faculty of the school of journalism, who is one of the successful publishers of the state and one of the most popular members of the journalistic profession, was in charge of the program and his experience in conducting conventions of that character gave confidence to those interested and they were not disappointed.

The business sessions were, of course, beneficial, but the social features of the meeting were equally as important. One of the most enjoyable portions of the entertainment was a rice banquet at the University cafeteria by the Southern Rice Growers association and managed by Mr. L. A. Pettit of the Beaumont Enterprise. The menu was varied and almost every dish contained rice. Mr. Pettit stated that he knew of six hundred and twenty five ways of preparing rice and he hoped to increase the list by several hundred. However the many ways in which it was prepared for this banquet was indeed a revelation and a delight to the guests, who were indeed appreciative of the courtesy of the rice growers association, which is composed of members from Arkansas, Louisiana, and Texas. The convention and the entertainments were greatly enjoyed by the Eagle editor and his family.

NEW ROAD LAW

Measure Passed by Legislature and In Hands of Governor.

The new road law for Mills county, which was proposed by the Commercial club last year and discussed at the joint meetings of the club and Farmers Union at various places during the campaign for road improvement last summer, has been enacted by the legislature and passed up to the governor for whatever action he may deem wise and proper. As will be remembered by the readers, the plan proposed by the Goldthwaite club and adopted by the Mullin club and endorsed by a large number of people in petitions to the commissioners court, provided for a road superintendent or supervisor for the county. The plan was laid before the commissioners court last year and was rejected and was brought before the new court after its organization and again rejected, its advocates, or at least a goodly number of them, then carried the matter to the legislature, believing the appointment of a road supervisor would be in the interest of the roads and would lead to road improvement.

The plan provides for the selection of a road supervisor by the commissioners court and it is supposed the selection will be made from among Mills county citizens. The salary of the supervisor is to be fixed by the court, but can never be more than \$125 per month, the court having the authority to discharge the supervisor whenever his work is not done satisfactorily or economically. He is to be required to give a bond to the county for the faithful performance of all his duties. By the provision of the act the road overseers are dispensed with and the supervisory road hands for the roads to which they are assigned by the court and also employ such hands and teams as he needs for the road work. All money is paid out on warrant drawn on the treasury by the county clerk and time checks is sued for road work must be submitted to the commissioners court, in order that a complete record can be had of the expenditure of the road funds. The commissioners are allowed six days in each quarter to go over the roads and ascertain where work has been done and where work is needed to be done, a report of such inspection to be furnished the supervisor.

Some of the legislators say it is the best special road law in Texas and have declared the intention of copying it for other counties.

Some who oppose the new system, preferring the plan that has been in use for a long time here, have signed petitions to the governor asking him to refuse to sign the law, but up to the time this article is put in type he has not made public his intentions, as far as the Eagle is informed. If the new law is not signed it will not become operative, and the law under which road work has been done here for several years will continue in force. If the new law is signed by the governor it will become operative at once and the commissioners court will be required, under its provisions, to appoint the supervisor or and fix his salary.

If the new law is approved by the governor it will be published in full in this paper as soon as possible, but if it is not approved, such publication will be unnecessary.

It is thought by those in position to estimate the increase in cost of supplies of all kinds for the state institutions that the appropriations necessary for the next two years to pay the expenses of the state government will be five million dollars more than the required amount for the past two years. This will mean an appropriation of twenty-three million dollars by the present session of the legislature for that purpose.

Next Friday will end the sixty days session of the legislature and also ends the time for which the lawmakers can draw \$5 per day in a regular session. After that date the pay will be \$2 per day, if the session is prolonged. It is likely that the term will be prolonged for a short while at the lower rate but the solons may decide to adjourn and allow the governor to call a special session in which event they will again receive \$5 per day for their services.

A report made by Col. Lee J. Roundtree to the newspaper people in attendance at the meeting at the school of journalism in Austin last week was encouraging as to the future price of paper. He is confident the trust, manufacturers, dealers or whoever is responsible for the present high prices will be forced to reduce the unreasonable demands and that speedily Col. Roundtree spent a month in Washington and New York securing information that will be of assistance to the attorney general of the United States in prosecuting those responsible for the unlawful combination to put up prices.

The continued dry weather and positive demand for food crops brings the producer face to face with another one of those problems upon the solution of which so much depends. If the food crop can be raised and properly marketed, the producer will reap a profit. If the dryness limits the yield of food crops to nothing more than enough for home use, then will a golden opportunity be lost to the producer. At this time it is well to remember that the top soil should be kept in a finely pulverized condition, thus constituting a blanket to hold the moisture still in the ground. Every crack exposed to the air and sunlight is a leak in the producer's bank account.—Temple Telegram.

Are you an asset to your community, or are you a liability? Would this city be any worse for you leaving it? If you are not an asset to your home town, you are a liability. If you are indebted to the community it is time you were stopping the leaks in your conduct and turn the balance the other way during the year. You are just as much a liability to the community if you are doing nothing for the community's good as if you were working it an injury by living here. You are a dead weight and in that you are a liability. Of course if you are a knacker, you are a liability. If you send away for everything you use, you are a liability. If you are neither of these but do nothing to help the community grow and improve, you are a liability. Get to be an asset. Make the community recognize you as an asset. Be of some benefit to the town you call home.—Eagle Press News-Guide.

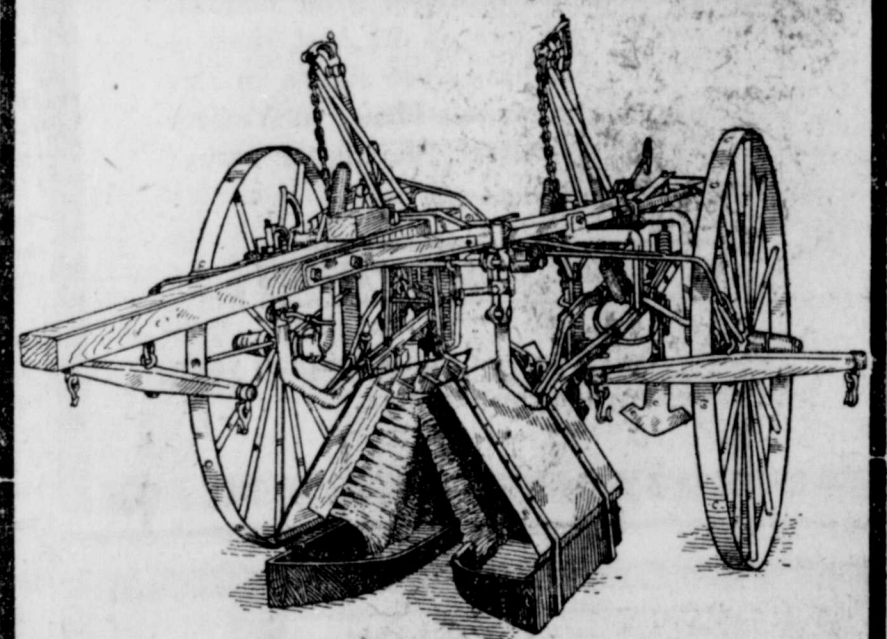

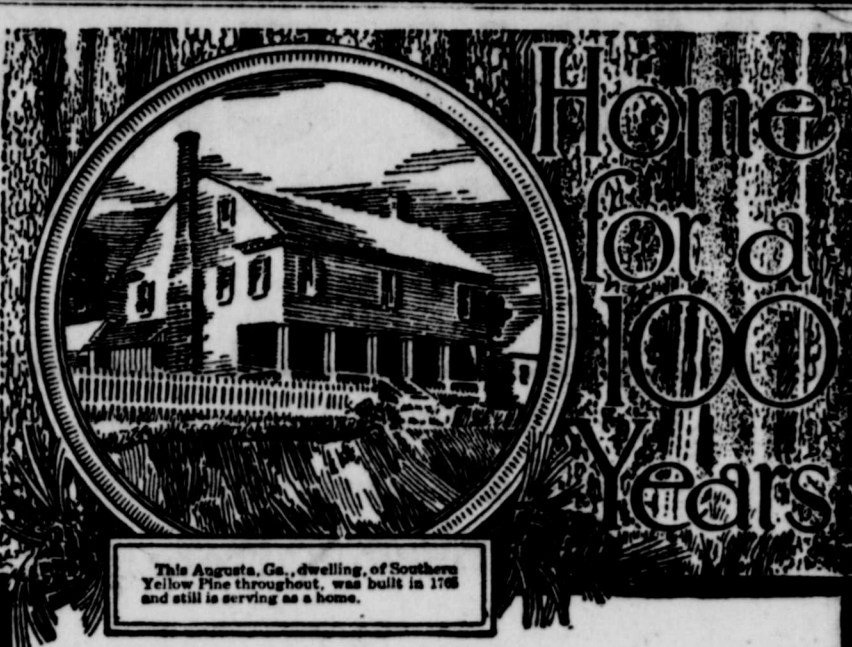
