A PROCLAMATION

By request of the ladies of the Civic League of Goldthwaite and because of a clean-up week being advisable and necessary before the beginning of the heated term I hereby designate the last week in March, which will be March 25 to 31 as a "Clean-up week" in Goldthwaite. All citizens are urged and requested to cooperate during that week in cleaning up the streets, alleys, vacant lots and private premises and putting the entire city in a high state of sanitation. If each citizen will take part and interest in this good work there will be but little work and inconvenience for any one and our already clean and sanitary town will be made more attractive and pleasant.

On Thursday and Friday, March 29 and 30, the city will provide wagons free of charge to haul away trash that is piled in convenient places and cannot be burned. Those who can burn the trash, weeds, etc., are requested to do so, as the wagons will of necessity be kept very busy hauling such trash as cannot be burned. Scrapings from the stables and barnyards will not be hauled off free by the city wagons, but such articles and scrapings as are ordinarily termed trash and this will include rocks that are scraped together in piles at convenient places for loading.

Saturday afternoon—United States History, General History, Agriculture Algebra, Physics, Plane Trigonometry.

NOTICE TO CENSUS TRUSTEES

As the census blanks have been in the hands of the census trustees for some time and a few reports have been made, possibly some have not noticed the instructions and I take this method of calling your attention to the same. 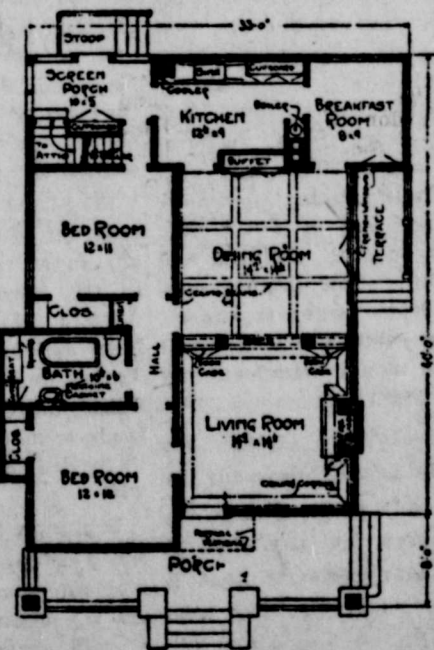

The supreme court of the United States handed down a decision Monday favorable to the Adamson law, which was passed by congress last summer to avert the threatened railroad strike. While some of the judges dissented, the opinion of the court upheld the validity of the law in every particular.

The czar of Russia was forced to abdicate the throne Saturday by revolutionists who were given active support by the government troops and people of all classes, only a slight show of resistance having been made. The demands of the revolutionists have been met by the legislative body and the country is to have a government far more liberal in its policies than it was thought possible to bring about in Russia for a century to come. Universal suffrage and the abolition of religious restrictions are among the concessions gained.

Col. Wm. J. Bryan, in speaking to a joint session of the two houses of the Texas legislature, said some very wise things and one of them was that the men who prevented the submission of the prohibition amendment to the people had done the cause of prohibition good service. No matter how one thinks on the question of prohibition and the best method of controlling liquor traffic the spirit of justice and of Democracy must indicate that the question should have been submitted after having been passed on by the voters in the July primary and demanded by a strong majority. The failure of the measure by one vote in the senate and two in the house will prove a boomerang to those who in this way thwarted the will of the people and defied the demand of the party to which they claim allegiance.

A daring daylight holdup took place in Dallas last Saturday shortly after noon when two boys who carried a satchel of money to Sanger's overall factory were attacked on the steps of the factory and the satchel taken from them. Two men took part in the robbery while a third remained in a car and kept the engine running. As soon as the robbers returned to the car a rapid run was made to get away. One of the boys who had been charged with carrying the money gave chase on foot and cried out for help. Soon officers were in the chase. The men with the satchel jumped from the rapidly moving car and hid in a ravine, where they were soon captured and carried to jail. The satchel contained about \$1500 when it was secured by the robbers, but a small amount of the money was lost by them in their flight.

While no declaration of war has yet been made against Germany by this country, such a declaration is expected in a very few days and it can be said with certainty that it will be made. Just why those who are charged with the conduct of the affairs of the German government should have persisted in a policy that they knew would array the United States against them it is hard to understand, unless it is that they hope in the final settlement at the end of the European war, which is even now in sight, they will profit by the magnanimity of this country in outlining and advocating a policy that will be less burdensome and more acceptable to them than could be expected from their enemies in Europe should the allies be victorious. That they should want this country in the active conflict is unreasonable from every standpoint they could approach the subject and the wish to give the right to America to a place in the council of final settlement is the only logical reason so far advanced.

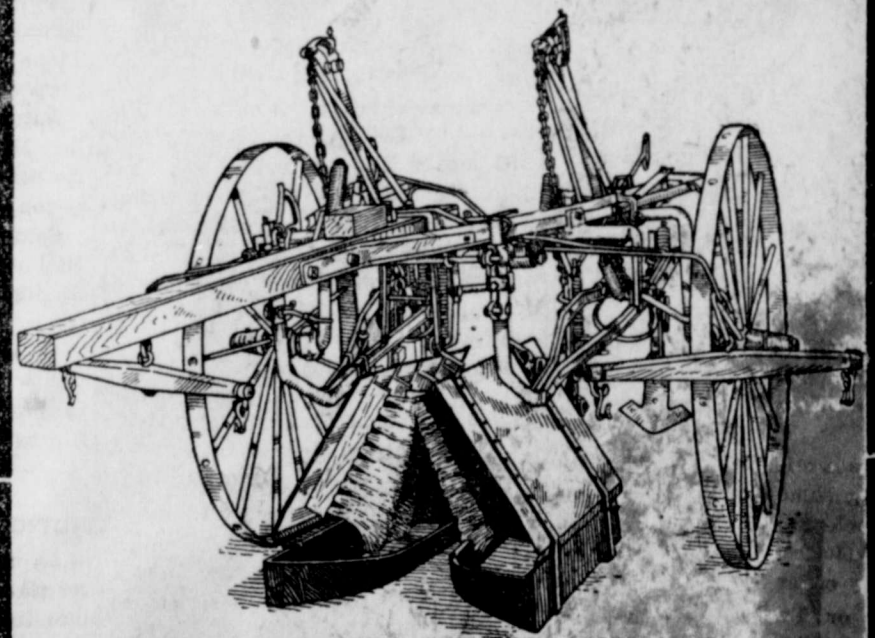

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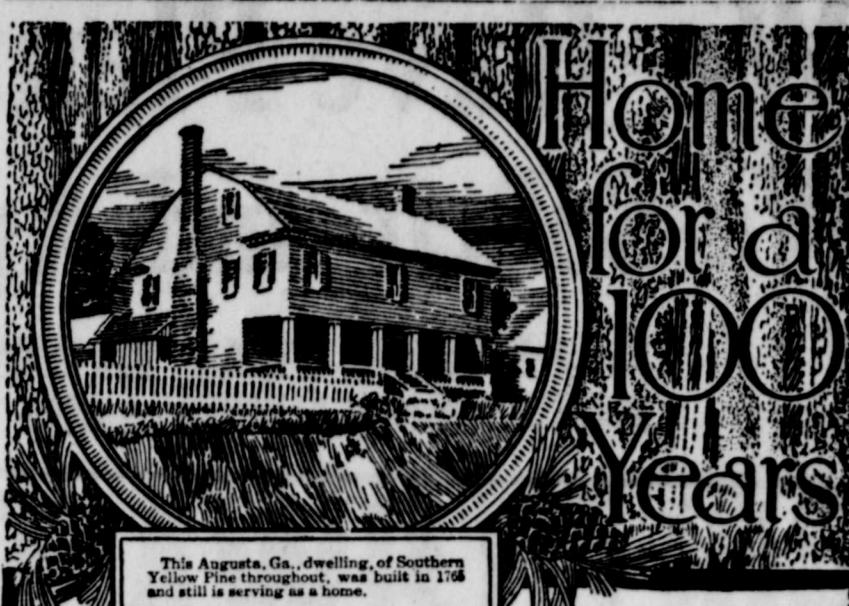

COUNTY SCHOOL MEET

The County School Contest will be held at Mullin, March 31. The announcement that it would be held at Goldthwaite was made before the executive committee had finally decided on the place of meeting and since Mullin has been selected, the school people of that town are enthusiastic and promise to do all in their power to make a good success. They have promised the prizes for the different contests and hope that as many schools as possible will take advantage of the contest.

On the part of the director, it is hoped that teachers and parents will encourage the students to prepare for the best meet as time will permit and arrange for them to go for the purpose of taking part in some event as this work is better training than actual text work for the time spent.

As to the different contests: The debate subject is "Resolved, that all revenues for the support of government—local, state and national should be derived from a single tax on land value, constitutionality granted." Debaters should be prepared to speak on either side of the subject. The speeches limited to 10 minutes. In the declamation contest there are four divisions: the junior division for boys and girls under 14 years of age, and the senior divisions over that age. In the girls junior division the selections will be some standard poem, while in the other three divisions selections are to be made from some prose writer. No declamation to be more than 5 minutes long, 3 minutes is suggested. The spelling contest will be carried on in the old fashion way of oral spelling, the words to be taken from the adopted spelling book, for both senior and junior divisions. In the essay contest, the essays are to be in the form of short humorous stories. The subject selected by the writer and the essay not over 1000 words must be sent or brought to my office not later than Friday morning, March 30, to be graded by the judges and the winner announced next day at the meet.

The athletic contest will probably be limited to running, jumping and throwing events and possibly tennis and basket ball.

I do not know a better move a school could make than to support these contests in sending in as many representatives as possible simply for the advantage of the ones who represent their schools.

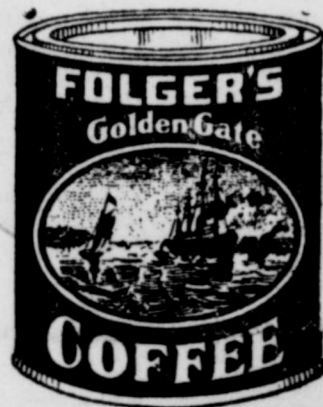
