The commissioners court met in regular monthly session Monday with all members present.

Petitions of P. C. Harris and others for public road in precinct No. 2, and E. E. Clements and others for road in precinct No. 2, were continued until the May term.

Petition of J. M. Sanderford for second class road thru his land was granted and a stock gap ordered built.

Report of jury of view of Hamilton and Goldthwaite road received and accepted. The jury assessed damages to land owners for \$180.40, besides a number of land owners agreeing to donate the amount of land required.

The terms of the county court were prolonged to eight weeks each, to be held beginning the first Monday in March, June, September and December.

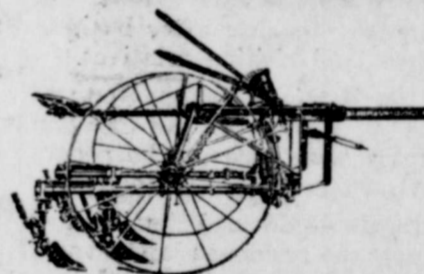

### SCHOLASTIC CENSUS

The scholastic census of the county and independent school districts has been completed and it is believed the total will show a healthy increase over last year when there were 2046 scholastics in the county, exclusive of Goldthwaite and Mullin. The total has not yet been ascertained, but the work will be completed in a short time.

In Goldthwaite the enumeration shows 402 pupils, which is a decrease of one from last year. Of this number 206 are girls and 196 boys.

Mullin report shows 262 scholastics, which is an increase of three over last year. Of this number 135 are girls and 127 boys.

Star shows to have 132 scholastics, an increase of ten over last year. There are 63 girls and 69 boys.

The United States senate this week adopted the bill by Senator Culberson prescribing a penalty of thirty years imprisonment for any person convicted of destroying war materials in time of war.

The district judge of Port Lavaca, in opening court Monday ordered all those in the court room to stand and sing "The Star Spangled Banner" He then charged the grand jury on the subject of treason.

After explaining his plan of raising money and receiving compensation for his services, Billy Sunday announced in a great tabernacle meeting in New York last Sunday that he would not receive financial benefits from the three months meeting he was beginning in the American metropolis. He stated he would divide the offering at the close of the meeting between the Y. M. C. A. and the Red Cross society, after deducting one-third to pay the expenses for himself and his party.

Since the entry of this country into war some of the trusts appear to have run riot and recognize no limit. The idea seems to be with some of the "magnates" of more or less importance that the government officials will have no time to look after the misdeeds of "home people" while the country is at war. Like the railroad brotherhoods, they perhaps imagine the time to "get their's" is when the country is involved and resistance is at least not practicable.

A copy of the Abernathy Breeze, published by R. E. Downey, has arrived at the Eagle office. The paper is well edited and well printed and is evidently appreciated by the business men of the town, judging from the amount of advertising it carries. The Abernathy people can count themselves fortunate in securing so good a newspaper man as Robert Downey. His many friends in Mills county feel confident he will make a success of the business and they know he is fully capable of properly representing his community and county.

A suit was filed in the district court at Kaufman Monday by Judge V. W. Grubbs, the originator of the idea of establishing a college of industrial arts by the state asking that a receiver be appointed for the college and an order be issued forbidding the enforcement of the rules promulgated by the college management whereby girls who are unable to pass a certain literary examination are denied the benefits of the college. He also asks damages in the sum of \$10,000 and the refund of money contributed by his friends for the college.

War talk is all we hear nowadays, whether on the streets, in public gatherings or elsewhere. The hostilities of the foreign foes will not be all of the troubles of this nation, for the long years of peace and freedom of speech and action have given opportunity for the promulgation of anarchist doctrines throughout the country and traitors have banded together to rob the people in every way possible. The coming of the war has revealed this condition and hope is indulged that one of the benefits of the war will be the destruction by law and public sentiment of all institutions and organizations that have sought to make a national crisis an occasion for getting gain to themselves.

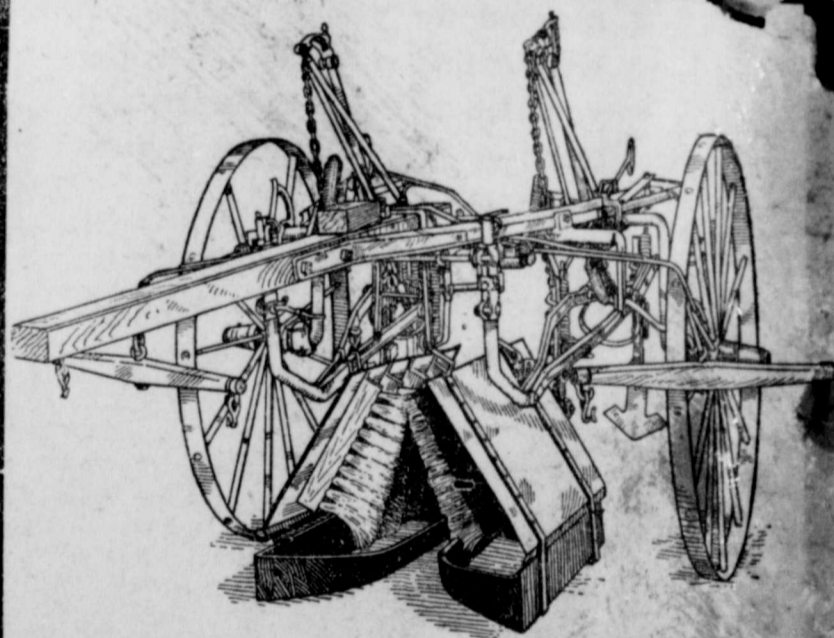

### REPLY TO SAM SAY

Mr. Sam Say,  
Care of the Eagle.  
Dear Sam:

Did you know that there were two special Mills county road laws? One of them was written at the request of the commissioners and increased their pay from \$240. a year to \$3. a day for 30 days a quarter.

This law passed and under its provisions we pay for one day out of every three the year around for road inspection in each precinct. Funny, Sam we never see a commissioner out our way when he works so steady at the job.

We have a law that provides (according to the commissioners' Eaglelet scream of a few weeks since) about \$9000 per year for road purposes. Or about \$20 per mile for all first and second class roads in the county. This money is divided among the several precincts in proportion to the taxable property in the precincts, but the commissioner spends this money where he wishes to in his own precinct. Therefore Star and Caradan, Priddy and Mullin, Regency and Rattler each seek to elect the commissioners in their own community believing that this money will be spent as near the commissioners home as possible.

Some commissioners have worked this so well that in precinct No. 3 not many years since the entire apportionment had been spent and advance warrants issued for the money before the apportionment was made. The present court claim that the out going court spent about \$3000 of this years funds on advance warrants. Now Sam the new law provided that no money could be spent on advance warrants except in case of emergency and then not to exceed \$1000. I think this is a good idea. How about you Sam?

Sam you say we are all in favor of good roads, but not in taking money from one man and giving to another. I beg to differ with you. I favor spending this money for road work and not so much for road inspection.

When Fletcher, Patterson, Head, Nelson, Dalton, Humphries and many others served this county they did it for \$3.00 per day for ten days in an entire year and never kicked on the job. A later court elected under the same law concluded that they were able men than the ones I have mentioned, so they proceeded to raise their own pay and secured an attorney to draw up a special road law for Mills county increasing their pay to \$3. a day for 30 days a quarter. This attorney drew the bill and requested the member from this county to not let it pass the house, as he did not see the sense of a commissioner spending 30 days every three months in riding over the roads at the county's expense. Do you see the sense Sam? The bill passed and the commissioners had succeeded in raising their own pay and the people were not the wiser. Sam, why did you not rush to the Eagle and call attention that this bill was being put thru without consulting the people? Did you say then that I object to the method by which the law is passed? Did your court hire a jitney and rush to Austin to hold up the law? Did Judge Weaver then wire the governor "Don't sign the bill till the people speak?" No, the people were paying the bills and your court was increasing its pay and the people were getting nothing, so it was none of the people's business.

How different the proceedings were in this new law. The Goldthwaite Commercial club took this matter up with the Farmer's Union and the Mullin Commercial club and asked them to join in getting this matter before the Commissioners Court and in case the court refused they would then take it up with the legislature. Some commissioners were in Indiana seeking to spend a part of the remaining \$6000 when

this second law passed the legislature.

The bill reached the governor's desk the day they returned and tho they were worn out from their long ride on a Pullman, they persuaded Judge Weaver to wire the governor, "Don't act until the people speak" and the tired court fell into a jitney and set out on the Sabbath for Austin. They returned and got me and several others to circulate petitions against the law, but they did not tell the people that the commissioners hired and fired the supervisor; that they fixed his salary at \$3 or \$4 a day, but that they could not pay more than \$125 per month and then only while he was actually working on the roads.

Perhaps, Sam you were like the Mullin Enterprise guessing, and one week guessed \$2000 and the next \$1500, but never guessed right.

Did they tell you, Sam, that this supervisor worked under the direction of the commissioner, while in his precinct? That he must go into each road district and call out the hands and work them on the road nearest their home? That he would work me on the road in front of my place and spend part of the \$6000 taxes in doing this work? You see, Sam, that my taxes ought to work my roads and not take the commissioners to Austin and Lam pasas.

Sam, did you ever drive your mule from Goldthwaite to Mullin and see the nice cement crossing that the Goldthwaite Commercial club had built on Brown's Creek? And then did you go a little further and find that nice mud hole that the commissioner missed every time he inspected that road? Did you notice how nice the commissioner had piled rocks in the road on the first hill this side of Brown's Creek?

Look at the improvement made by some of these Goldthwaite people in their streets and then notice that their taxes were not increased while this work was being done. You will at once see that Mayor Trent and his council in Goldthwaite can use the city's money judiciously. They did not make a trip to Indiana to see rock crushers. They did not increase their pay, but spent the city's taxes for working men.

Now the commissioners cannot buy furniture for the court room and keep track of it. Let me prove that. When your court, Sam, bought the court house furniture did you not contract that the court house be furnished complete for \$12,000. If you did why did you not get a desk for the judge's room? Didn't the old judge need a desk or wasn't the desk already good enough for the new judge? If it was why did this court buy a new one?

I merely cite this to show you that your court does not look after little things as the City Council does and so once more we, the goats, are called on to pay.

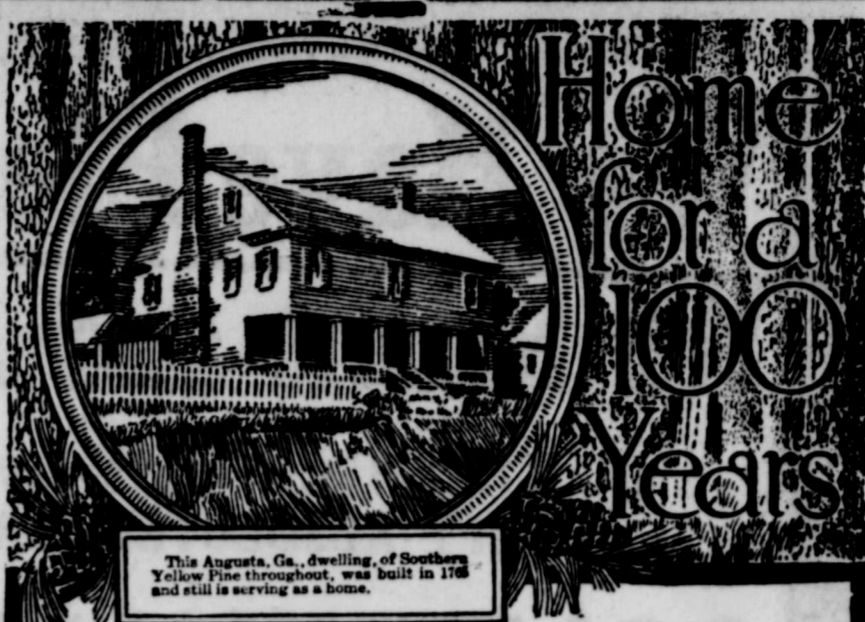

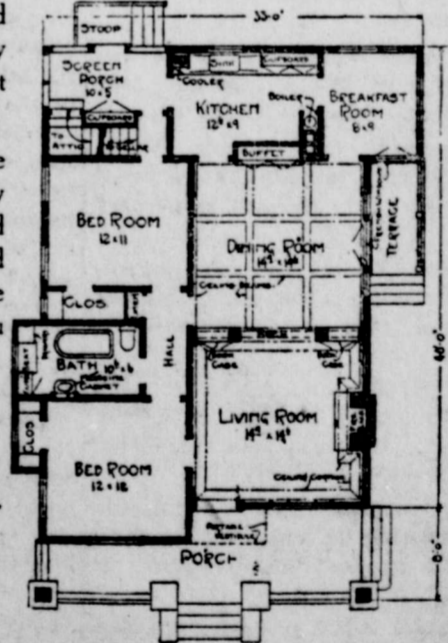
