### CROPS ON STUBBLE LAND

Practical farmers are conserving the fertility of their soil this year but they realize, as never before, the importance of getting as much feed and food from every acre as is consistent with safe methods. The war has created enormous demands for both food and food crops. Each farmer must produce enough for the farm's needs and something for soldiers and sailors. Government officials, miners, manufacturers and others in commercial pursuits must also have food and this requires a surplus for sale as well as a supply for the farmer's family and feed for his stock.

To use every acre of available land as efficiently as possible it is desirable to plant a suitable crop on the wheat and oat stubble if possible. Where the land is fertile enough to permit a grain crop may be planted, such for instance as June corn, maize, sorghum or feterita. Such crops ordinarily had best not be planted after oats and wheat as two grain crops in one year are quite trying on land. But the demand for grain to supply food and feed seems to make a system of rotation permissible this year.

The stubble land may be planted in a summer legume such as cowpeas, soy beans, velvet beans or peanuts. The legume crop under favorable conditions will help restore the thin land in nitrogen and humus and at the same time produce feed or grazing.

By planting the stubble land in event the summer season is at all favorable the value of a short grain crop may be supplemented. With record prices for wheat and oats, as now seems likely, the summer crop on stubble land has great possibilities.—Farm and Ranch.

The University controversy will be drawn out and no matter how it terminates the institution will be injured for years to come. The court has granted an injunction against the regents to prevent a disruption of the faculty of the University and this injunction will be in force until September when the case will be heard on its merits. Of course, there is the danger that the faculty will not await the decision of the court and will accept employment elsewhere, while many of the students will be induced to enter other educational institutions because of the uncertainty and confusion.

### CAREFUL HARVESTING

Conservation of grain through efficient methods of harvesting, including stacking wherever labor conditions permit, is recommended to farmers by Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Carl Vrooman.

"The nation needs every grain of wheat that can be raised this summer," declared Mr. Vrooman. "Efforts must be made to save every ounce of wheat, oats, and rye at the harvest. Each year hundreds of thousands of bushels of grain are ruined in regions where midsummer rains occur, because it is allowed to remain on the ground, a prey to the weather. Keep in mind that a bushel of wheat will furnish bread for one person for about 75 days.

Harvesting machinery should be adjusted so that there is as little loss as possible in cutting. Care should be taken also to harvest all grain cleanly in the corners, along the edges of the fields, and lodged spots.

More than usual attention should be given to shocking in order that there may be as little waste as possible from exposure to the weather. If at all practicable, the grain should then be stacked as soon as it is cured in the shock. Stacks of sound or headed grain should be built carefully so that they will shed water. Every blade saved equals a blade produced.

In threshing, special attention should be given to the adjustment of the concaves and of separating machinery to make sure that none of the grain is lost with the straw and chaff."

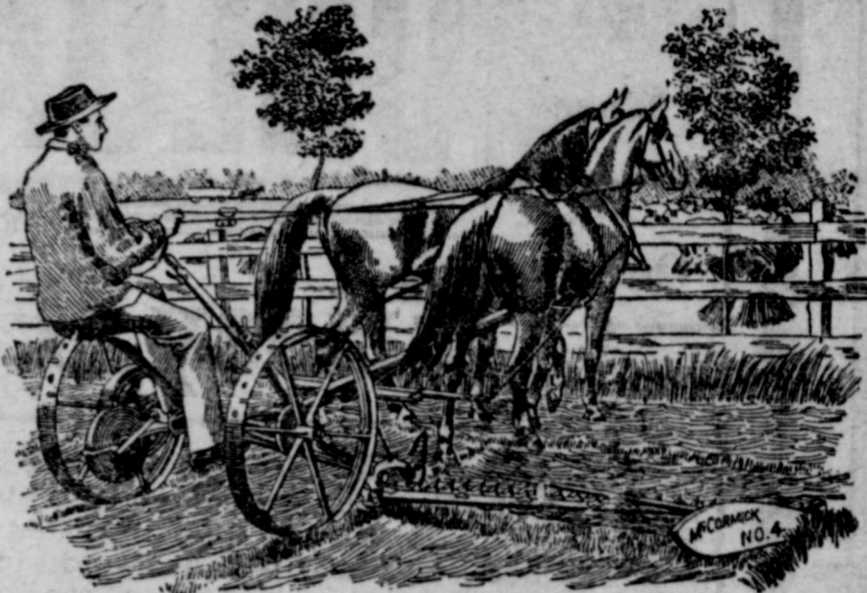

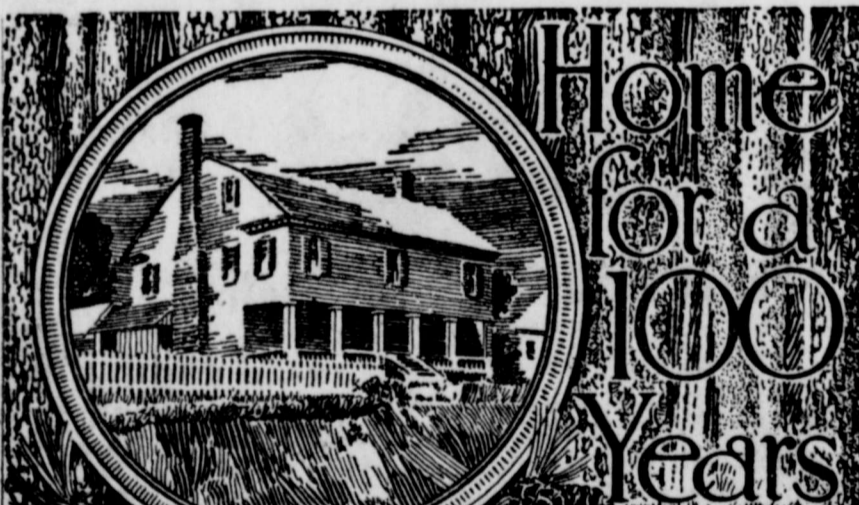

A federal grand jury in Dallas this week returned indictments against 55 people, mostly members of the Farmers and Laborers Protective Association charging conspiracy against the United States government in the matter of registration. Most of the indicted parties are already in jail.

The arrival of Gen. Pershing and his staff in England was hailed with delight by the English people and their allies. These officers have come there to look into the situation and to study the plans and systems of those with whom they are to be associated in war. The people on that side of the water were pleased greatly, naturally, but they will have much greater cause for pleasure when a hundred thousand American troops arrive on that side, for the American fighting men will make things happen rapidly for the cause they set foot upon European soil until they return to their native country waving palms of victory.

One of the most cruel and wanton murders yet recorded was the killing of the 14-month-old Keet baby at Springfield, Mo. The child was stolen from the home of its parents in that city and held for a ransom of \$6000. The father announced his willingness to pay the amount demanded and made several trips to points designated by the kidnapers, but to no avail. Each time the person who was to come with the child failed to appear. Saturday the lifeless body of the baby was found in an old well where the villainous plotters had thrown it. Just why they should have murdered the child can not be imagined, since they were given many opportunities to get the money for its restoration to its parents and the father urged the officers to desist from following him or attempting to interfere with the kidnapers. A number of suspects have been arrested and the good people of that part of Missouri will see that the guilty persons receive punishment as nearly commensurate with the crime as is possible for human beings to administer. See if they don't do it.

We need not go beyond the sea to find our only enemy—we have a greater one right here at our homes, says the Knoxville Journal. It is not an enemy armed with big guns, loaded to take our lives. That enemy is mobilized and getting in its destructive work in our hearts, minds and souls. It is an enemy that, if not overcome if not vanquished, will prove an obstruction to the flow of the life-blood of business which is the chief cornerstone the essential foundation of national prosperity. The name of the enemy that at the present time is giving us so much trouble in the land of our homes is "hysteria." Let every man, woman and child in our country take up arms of self-control, self-reliance, self-confidence, and it will be easy to ward off all fear of imaginary evils. If in the future we may have mountains to climb let us reserve strength for the climbing when it comes. Never the future may be, let us not weaken and demoralize ourselves by drawing premature conclusions from diseased imagination, sent, most immorally, to the eternal, and at Ft. Worth

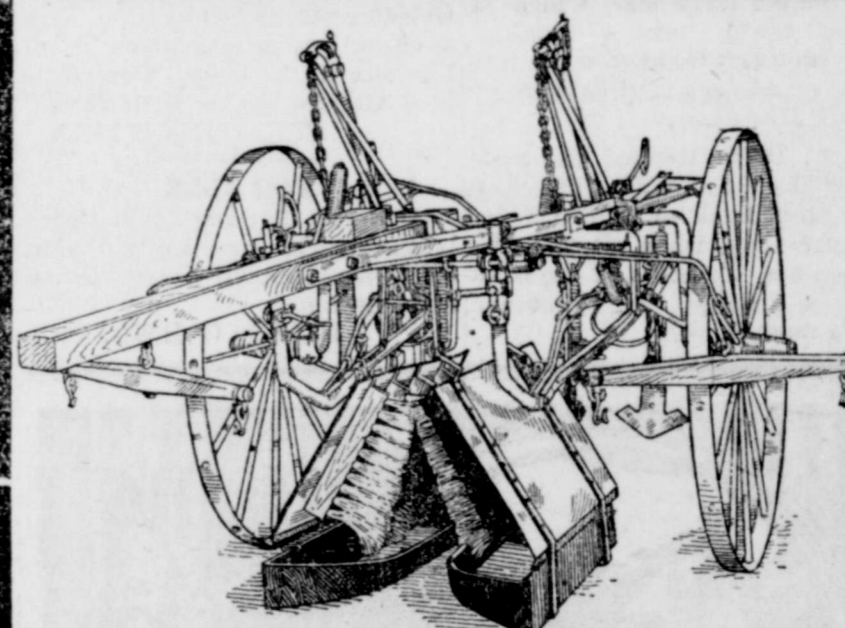

### A NEW LAW

The new law governing the operation of automobiles becomes effective July 1 and every auto. owner in this state should be careful to acquaint himself with its provisions, for it may be expensive to violate this law. Some of the customary rules of auto. drivers have been materially changed. Especially is this true in regard to "speeding" while passing other cars and in making all the noise possible while operating an auto about the business part of a town. A few of the provisions of the new law are here given:

All motor vehicles must be provided with adequate brakes in good working order.

No muffler cut-outs shall be used in any town or any highway near a closely built up section; and all vehicles shall be so arranged as to prevent unnecessary noises.

No drunk or intoxicated person shall drive a motor vehicle in this state.

All vehicles shall be driven in a careful manner with due regard for the safety and convenience of pedestrians.

No vehicle shall be left in any public highway unless the brakes are set and the motor stopped.

Two vehicles passing each other shall have the right of way and no other vehicle shall pass or attempt to pass such vehicles.

All travel shall be on the right hand side of the road unless the road on the left be clear and unobstructed for at least 50 yards ahead.

All vehicles shall be driven in a speed reasonable and proper. No vehicle may exceed 25 miles an hour anywhere; nor in closely built up territory more than 18 miles an hour; nor in a town or city 15 miles an hour; nor in business districts of more than 10 miles an hour; nor in passing other vehicles on the road of more than 15 miles an hour.

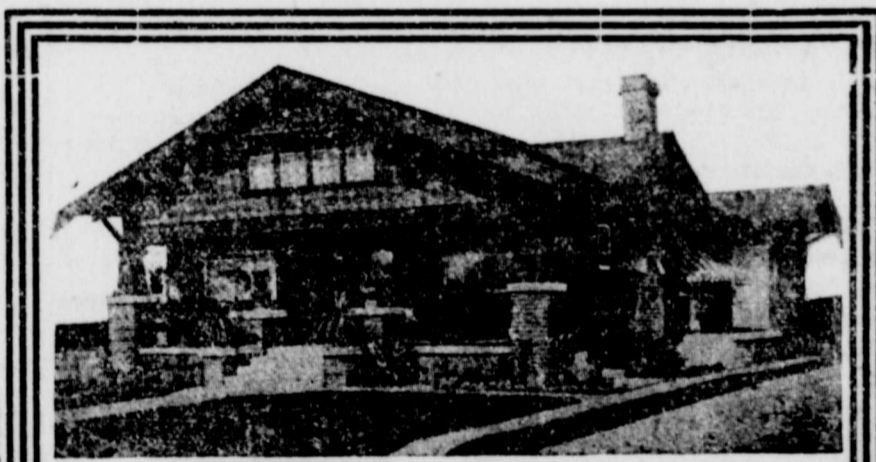

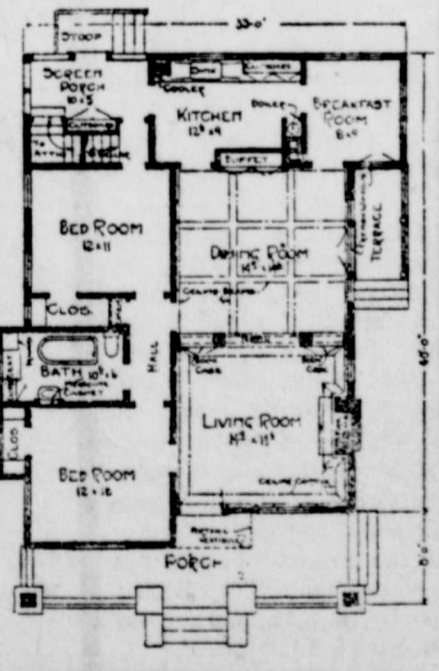

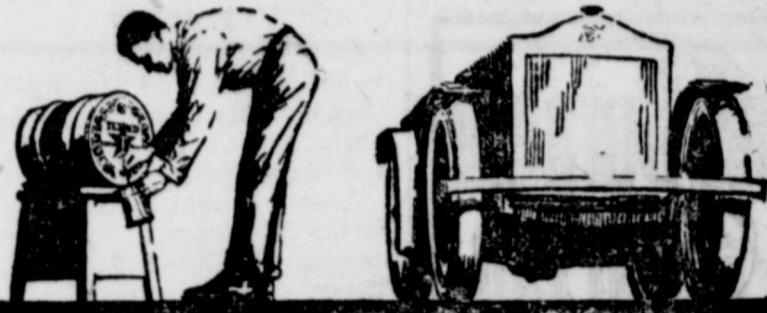
