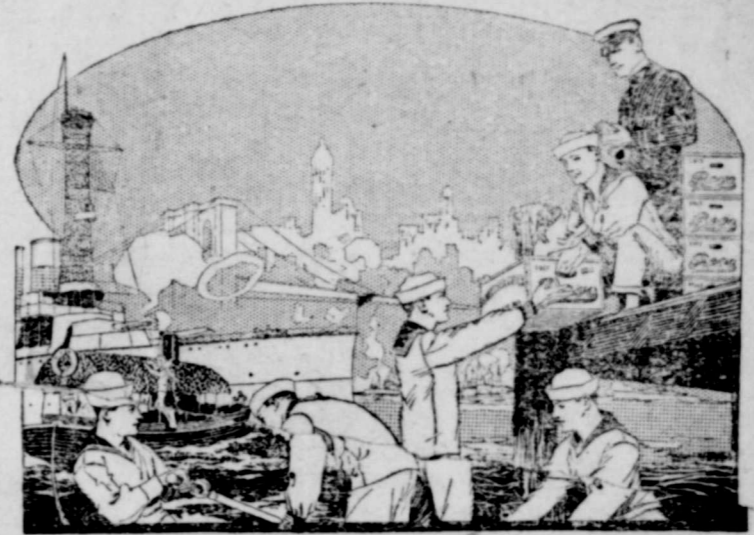

A young man engaged in oiling a thresher near Fort Worth Monday lost his balance and fell across the knives. He was chopped to death quickly.

The mayor of Houston, Mr. J. J. Pastoriza, died of apoplexy in that city Monday. He was noted for his advocacy of the Henry George single tax plan.

It is expected that the draft for military service will be made public today. Double the number of men needed will be drawn in order that all necessary allowances may be made for claims of exemption.

The cowardly murder of the negroes of East St. Louis last week is being strongly condemned all over the country. One of the strongest denunciations of the cruel and wanton murders was by ex-President Roosevelt.

The United States senate refused to include beer and wine in the bill which forbids the importation or manufacture of whiskey during the time of the war. It was suggested by President Wilson that this action be taken.

Mr. R. Green, the multimillionaire, has married. The event was recorded at a suburb of Chicago the early part of the week. It is claimed that Green has received an aggregate of 9000 proposals of marriage since he attained his majority.

China has been doing some political acrobatic stunts the past few weeks—first a republic, then a monarchy, then a republic and then we don't know what. China is a powerful nation numerically, but all the world feels a contempt for the mighty giant who has been too cowardly for self-protection thru all the generations.

The long continued drought throughout western Texas and in many other sections is causing serious concern as to the food situation. Not only will crops be short, but cattle are suffering and in some places are dying from poverty. The scarcity and high price of feed makes it impossible for stockmen to feed their herds and the shortage in the meat supply will be serious.

Every citizen should be interested in the Red Cross movement and should be anxious to contribute to the funds and to the work. While the \$1 membership fee is helpful and in the aggregate a large amount of money will be raised for the cause in that way, the membership fee alone should not satisfy any in contributing. There is no cause that can or will appeal more strongly to the human heart than that of the Red Cross when the work being done by that organization is understood. Those who have not yet joined a local organization and made a contribution for the support of the work should hasten to take part.

The campaign that is being made for economy in food stuffs is misunderstood by a great majority of the people. Instead of realizing that it is not a case of poverty, in the sense that people are not able to buy food, many people understand it to be "save what you have, for you may never get any more" and apply this mainly to money. The finances are all right, but the production of food stuff is scarcely sufficient for the needs of the world and every effort must be made to prevent waste, in order that a sufficiency may be had for those in the countries where no crops can be grown because of war and to supply the armies of the world with provisions.

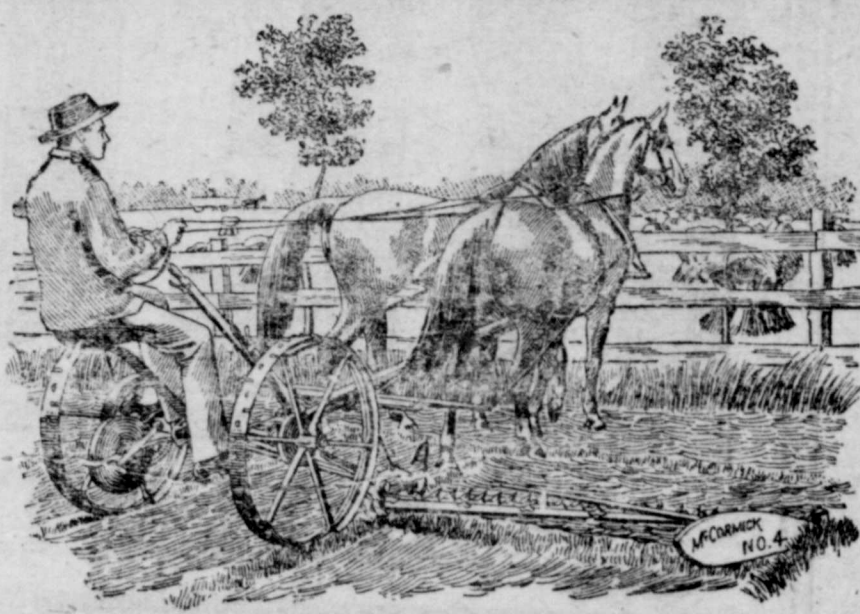

The farmer who lives ten miles out on a good road and owns an automobile, can now get to town about as easily as the city lady who lives in a residential suburb and utilizes the street cars. Country life has been robbed of much of its so-called disadvantages. And since the price of farm products "rize" farming has become about the best business a man of brains and energy can engage in. Not only are there potential riches in every acre of good ground, but the government, our dear old benevolent U. S. A., has agreed in good faith to lend to any man who wants a farm half the purchase price, on a reasonable valuation, and give him forty years to pay back the loan, at five percent interest. This condition ought to make it easy for many thousands of farm tenants to become farm owners. It ought to keep many thousands of farm boys on the farms. Heretofore, boys born on farms have considered farm life too unprofitable, too restricted, too laborious for their cultivated tastes. Many of them have preferred to earn scant wages in town, live in hot little houses along dusty streets and work under a boss. Under the changed conditions, farm life is more independent, more profitable, less exacting of labor, and altogether more inviting than wage-earning employments in the city. Farm boys who have come to town under present conditions know not what to do. But it is a free country—at least, tolerably free—and any young man who prefers a precarious urban career combined with a collar and cravat every day, to the less precarious and less drowsy life of the country is entitled to his preference.—Dallas News.

FINE LECTURES

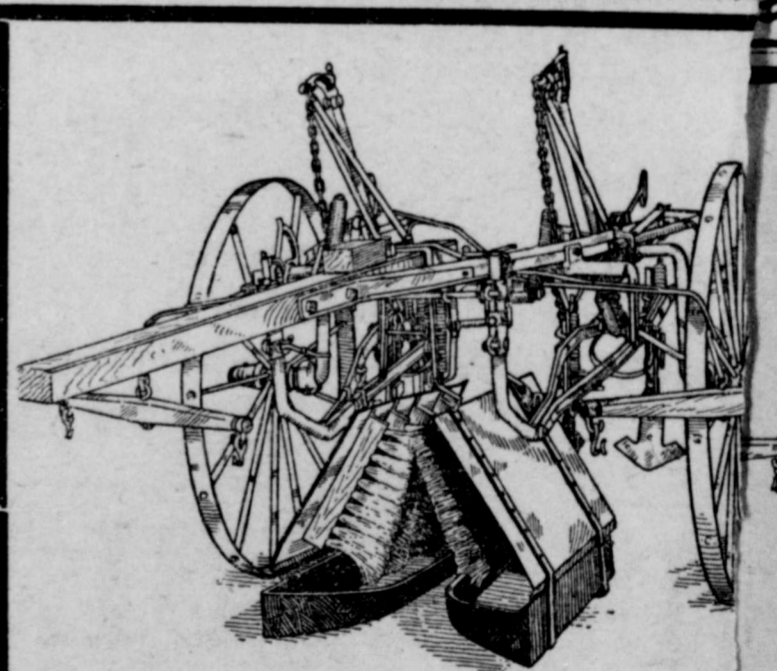

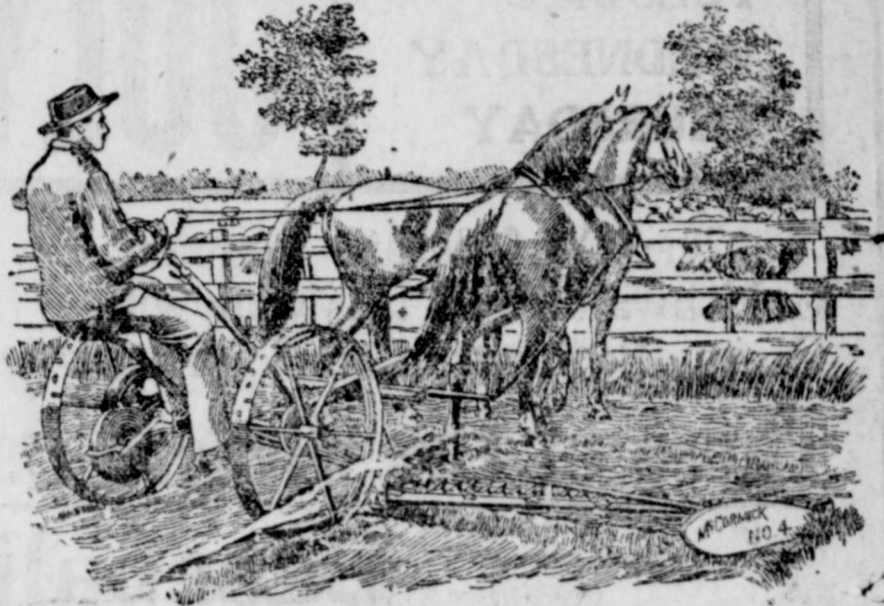

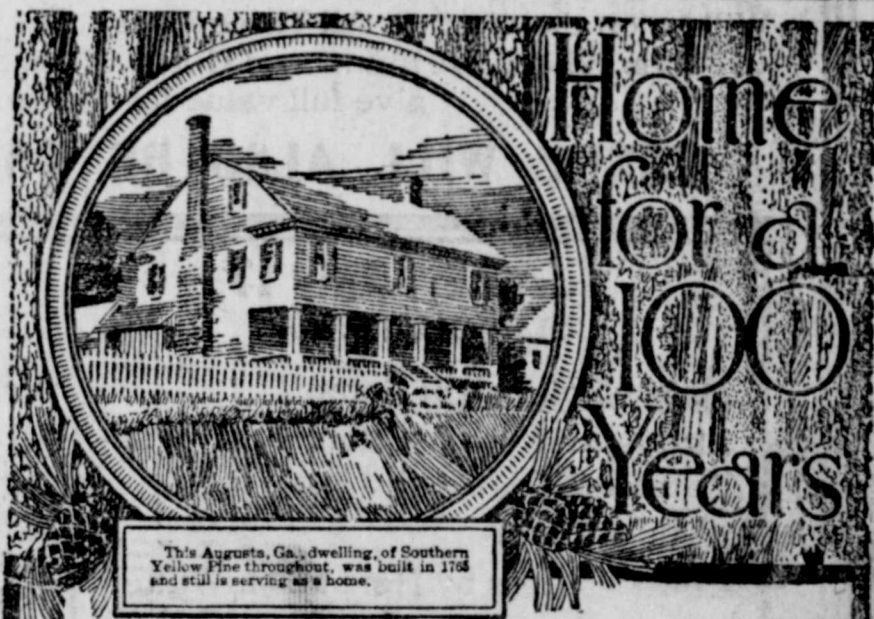
