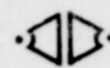

The house of representatives, in special called session to investigate charges against Governor Ferguson, voted Thursday night to present articles of impeachment against him to the senate and the matter was to have been presented to the senate yesterday morning. The vote on the question was 81 to 52. The presentation of the impeachment proceedings to the senate displaces Mr. Ferguson as governor temporarily and if the senate votes to impeach the removal becomes permanent, the lieutenant governor automatically becoming governor. It is thought the matter will be promptly acted upon by the senate, but the result of the finding of that body will not likely be known before tonight or tomorrow. This is the first time in the history of Texas that impeachment proceedings have been brought against the chief executive.

A plan is now being considered by the contracting ship builders to construct steel ships at Beaumont of Texas materials. It is said steel can be produced from Texas ore at a great saving to the government.

An appeal has been made by Commissioner Hoover for the people of this country to conserve the bread supply as much as possible. He says if each family will curtail their wheat bread rations one pound a week the result will be beneficial to a marked degree.

The Santa Fe railroad company is preparing to establish schools of telegraphy in each superintendent's division. The school for this division is to be located in Brownwood and will be open to pupils Sept. 1. The local agents of the company can give all the information desired.

The coal supply of the nation is to be conserved in every legitimate way to provide a supply for manufacturing and industrial enterprises as well as for shipping. R. S. Lovett, formerly of Texas and one of the most prominent railroad men in America, has been given charge of this department of national economy.

It is claimed that there is an abundance of wheat in Russia, but the lack of transportation facilities makes it impossible for it to reach these in need of it. This may be a story put in circulation as a war measure, to give courage to those who believe the people of this and all other countries are on the verge of starvation, but if the wheat is in existence some way will be found to distribute it before the need becomes very urgent.

There will be a cessation in the manufacturing of whiskey on Sept. 8 and the supply in existence will likely be exhausted before more will be allowed made.

The Russian government is giving Nicholas Romanoff, better remembered perhaps as Czar Nick, a taste of the medicine he administered to his unfortunate subjects for so many years. He and his family have been sent to Siberia, where they are in reality prisoners.

The problem of supplying the allies with meat has devolved mainly on the United States and daily the burden is growing more enormous, according to a statement issued by the food administrator. Wartime demands have been so great that Europe has been making alarming inroads on its herds, with a consequent reduction in its domestic supply. Since the war started there has been a total decrease of 115,000,000 in the world's supply of meat producing animals.

"The great fact that stands out above all the rest is that this is a Peoples' War, a war of freedom and justice and self-government amongst all the nations of the world, a war to make the world safe for the peoples who live upon it and have made it their own, the German people themselves included; and that with us rests the choice to break through all these hypocrisies and patent cheats and masks of brute force and help set the world free, or else stand aside and let it be dominated a long age through by sheer weight of arms and the arbitrary choices of self-constituted masters, by the nation which can maintain the biggest armies and most irresistible armaments—a power to which the world has afforded no parallel and in the face of which political freedom must wither and perish."—Woodrow Wilson.

SCHOOL OPENING

Good Results From Community Co-operation

I respectfully call attention of the public to the opening of the Goldthwaite public schools Sept. 10., and trust that as many as possible will make an effort to start their children on the first day and continue through the term. It is a very serious mistake to think that satisfactory results can be expected from a child who enters late and perhaps then is absent from school one and two days out of every week. This not only proves injurious to the child, but to the school at large.

I believe that all will agree with me that the greatest business of this town is proper education of its over 500 girls and boys. There is one way and only one that this stupendous task can be accomplished, and that is by the united efforts of teachers, school board, patrons and children alike. With these four great factors pulling together and working in harmony for a good school, such things as a "failure" is an impossibility.

I am with you for no purpose except to do everything I can for the betterment of your boys and girls, and strive in every way possible to aid in accomplishing things for this community that will tell for your town after I shall have been forgotten. I hope that every patron will strive earnestly to do their "bit" in helping make the school worth something to the children, to the town and to the state, and while troubles and dissensions may come, please remember there is but one way to settle anything right, and that is to come to me in a business way, determined on your part to be governed by reason and to do whatever is best for the school and the child and adjust matters in a strictly business-like way.

I make this assertion now, that there will never come a problem, while I am superintendent, that cannot be rightly settled and as a rule to the satisfaction of both parent and teacher, if you will only come to us as you do to your average business man, that is with the right spirit and with a determination to respect our views and feelings, and to be governed by reason when the conclusion is reached.

In all matters that require my ruling, I shall always be governed by what I believe to be the best interest of the child, regardless of whether or not it will exactly suit the parent or conform to the exact standard of the school.

With reference to the curriculum of the school for this year I want to say that we have been forced, in order to meet the requirements of the University, to make some very vital changes in our course of study—changes I feel sure will be to the interest of this community after we have time to work them out—but we should bear in mind that it takes time to successfully bring about these changes, hence we ask your patience and co-operation in our efforts.

The department of agriculture at Washington has sent out a report positively denying that the pink boll worm has appeared in Texas. The department says the boll worm at work on the cotton in the Rio Grande country is the same character of insect as that found in the cotton fields of Texas for a good many years.

Wherever the system of dry farming has been given a fair trial it has proven itself the best for semi-arid countries, and for all countries where rainfall is not abundant and regular. But to break land, and leave it rough, is to disregard the first principles of the system, which are to make the land mellow and keep it so well closed that the moisture cannot dry out. The great essential is the soil mule, which keeps in the moisture and enables the soil to gather all the rainfall possible. As millions of people are living in the semi-arid country, and each year proving the value of this system, by making good crops where none can be made otherwise, it is time to discuss the system, and follow it faithfully. The harrow used vigorously and diligently and continuously is the great principle of the system. The soil should be kept fine, and no crust should be allowed on the land. All soils are not alike and some discretion must be used and in some cases the roller must be used to prevent the broken soil from blowing away. There are greater opportunities for farming in the west than many realize. But a system that conserves moisture is necessary—Farm and Ranch.

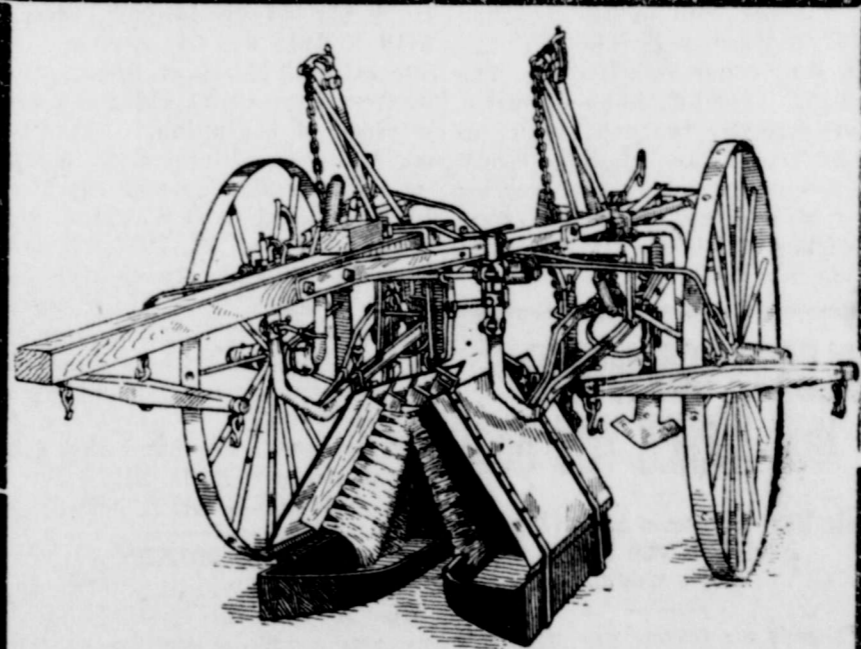

LIBERTY LOAN

It is a mistaken notion that all of the money raised by the sale of Liberty Bonds which is to be used for war purposes will be an eventual loss to the United States and its people; that it is all to be spent for things used up in war or useless except for purposes of war. It is well to remember that a great deal of the money raised by the sale of Liberty Bonds is to be invested in things that will be of great use and value to the nation when peace shall be declared.

One thing that most people realize will be of value is that it is going to put this nation in a state of preparedness. While it is hoped and believed that the end of this war will be the ending of all great wars it will be a valuable thing to America to find herself at the close prepared to enforce the just decrees of peace. There may be a twilight zone between the close of this war and the establishment of peace all over the world and preparedness will place America in a position to have that voice in the world affairs that this nation is worthy of. We know that voice will be for peace and justice and freedom.

Millions are to be spent in the construction of merchant ships and these, at least those that escape destruction in the war, will be a valuable investment. There will be a tremendous demand for merchant ships when peace comes and, whether the United States continues to own and operate this merchant marine or whether the ships are sold to private individuals, the money invested in them by the United States will be no loss to the nation. It may be a great gain to it. In the revival of foreign commerce, in the contest for foreign markets, the United States will no longer be at the mercy of foreign ship owners. We can do our own carrying trade and our commerce will have a fair chance in the foreign markets.

Billions of this money raised by the sale of Liberty Bonds have been loaned to those European nations engaged in war with Germany. This is no expenditure without return. It is an investment and it is an investment that no one will say is insecure. It will not only bring in a return of interest and a return of the principal when due but it has brought to us a regard and friendship with those nations the value of which in dollars cannot be estimated.

The war is going to be expensive; it is going to call for sacrifices on the part of the nation and on the part of the individuals composing the nation. Much wealth is going to be shot out of the mouths of guns and cannons and much is going to be sunk at sea, but all of the money used for war purposes is not going to be a financial loss to the nation. America will emerge from the war not only with her honor and greatness and power increased, but she will emerge better fitted for the struggles of commerce when peace comes and much of the money spent for war purposes will be equally valuable if not more valuable in time of peace.—Bureau Bulletin

A bill has been introduced in the special session of the legislature appropriating half a million dollars for the relief of people in the drought stricken counties in the western part of the state. The bill also provides for the issuance of bonds by such counties for the purpose of purchasing seed and stock feed.

An order has been issued by Postmaster General Burleson to postmasters instructing them to return to sender any package addressed to a member of the military force in France where the address does not include the company and regiment.
