SEED SHORTAGE

Experts at the Agricultural and
 Mechanical College of Texas,
 have observed that cotton seed
 grown under adverse weather
 conditions show a shriveled and
 shrunken kernel that is consid-
 ered unfit for planting purposes.
 Texas farmers are urged to exam-
 ine cotton seed grown under sim-
 ilar conditions with a view to
 determine whether or not it is
 fit for planting purposes. The
 cotton crop next year should be
 grown from good, strong, well
 developed seed and if on exam-
 ination it is found that intended
 seed contain shrunken kernels
 at this early date, provision
 should be made to get planting
 seed elsewhere.

The Committee on Seed Stock
 at College Station, Texas, is en-
 deavoring to assist the farmers
 of this state to get a supply of
 good seed, and to this end ar-
 rangements have been made to
 test seed of questionable value.
 Look into this matter at once,
 in order that you may know that
 you have planting seed of good
 quality. Address all communica-
 tions to A. B. Conner, Chairman

FINE RAINS

Feed Crops and Pastures Benefitted—Top Crop Talk

The rain which fell here Monday and Tuesday has put new life in vegetation of all kinds and has improved the "Spirits" of the people. While the downpour was not excessive in some parts of the country, all received a sufficiency and in some sections the total rainfall for the two days was 10 inches. The government gauge at the Trent State Bank showed 5 2-10 inches for the two days in this city, which was about the average. The fall at Lake Hull and in that section was not as copious as at this place and very little water was run into the lake, but in most every part of the county the lakes, tanks, creeks and branches were flooded.

The benefits of this rain can scarcely be computed in dollars and cents, for it insures a renewed growth of the grass in the pastures makes fall pasturage as well as a large acreage in small grain for harvesting in the spring. Fall feed crops can also be grown and where these crops had already been planted there is no doubt of a good harvest before the winter season.

There is some talk of the possibility of a top crop of cotton there is little doubt that many and if frost should come late bales of cotton will result from the splendid rains this week.

A court martial of the negro soldiers who created a disturbance at Waco some weeks ago has resulted in a sentence of five years in the federal prison for six of the coons and ten for one of them. They are to be dishonorably discharged from the military service and forfeit all pay due them by the government.

Governor Hobby has made quite a good record with his appointments. He has named men of ability for the places to be filled. He does not seem to be serving any faction or clique, but his selections have been from the standpoint of merit. It is to be hoped he will continue this system as long as he occupies the governor's office.

The newspapers of Oklahoma are almost unanimous in condemning Senator Gore for his stand in the senate against the president's views and policies in the war. The chairman of the state executive committee requested the "blind orator" to align himself with the administration or resign, but the request was positively and vociferously refused by Gore.

The unselfish and helpful work of the Red Cross society should commend that organization to everybody everywhere. No other organization does or attempts to do as much for suffering humanity as does this grand organization. Every man, woman and child in America should be affiliated with the Red Cross society at least till the end of the war.

A large percent of the ammunition supplied to the American forces in France was found faulty and the war department has inaugurated an investigation to ascertain the place for responsibility to rest. If it is found that the defect came thru graft and desire to substitute the inferior ammunition, those responsible should be severely punished. The matter is one of too much importance to be allowed to pass.

A bill has been introduced in congress forbidding any citizen of the United States taking any emolument, office or title from any foreign government under penalty of \$10,000 fine and forfeiture of citizenship. It is well and timely that such a law should be enacted. We don't want this country filled after the war with lords, counts and no accounts in recognition of some foreign aristocracy.

About three hundred Mexicans which includes children, have within the past two months moved from Sonora to Mexico. They have returned to their native land for fear of the war. It is said the border towns are deserted and that large numbers of Mexicans from San Antonio and as far east as New Orleans have gone to Mexico. The biggest part of the people are entering the country controlled by Carranza and this will assist Mexico in maintaining a stable government.

The most blessed of human endeavors is service—the service that educates and builds and makes the old world a better and happier place to live and work. Service is the spirit of the hour. It blesses him that gives and him that gets; it is the brotherhood of man in business; it is the helping hand extended unselfishly; it is bread cast upon the waters; it is a way of helping ourselves by helping each other. The best that can be said of any man is this: He served others that they might better serve themselves.—Barker.

ENDORSES MOVE

Advocates Enforcing All of the Laws

Mr. Editor and to All It May Concern:

The Sunday law article in last week's Eagle signed by two officers of the county seems to me like a step in the right direction, provided they step far enough or often enough to come within reach of all unnecessary and willful violations of the Sunday law. I have no auto, but if I did and was to run out of gasoline or oil on Sunday and could ease my conscience on pleasure driving on Sunday, I would certainly consider I was as justifiable in asking a dealer to sell me and he the same right to sell me as the man with a cold drink, cigar, cigarette, tobacco and wax stand has to sell these things on Sunday, or the stock man to come bawling down the road, into town with a car or two of stock to attract and enlist the loafers and often boys and young men on their way to church or Sunday school and often annoying the whole community to get to violate a law in the same statute book that the law is forbidding selling oil or gasoline.

As I expect this article to be criticized by men who are in the habit of disregarding the Sunday law I will go further and state without any fear of successful contradiction that no man has any right to run his binder or mower on Sunday, for God makes no provision for Sunday work except when the ox is in the ditch, which is allowable on account of relieving suffering. I would consider the man who was afraid of doing something wrong by pulling a dumb brute out of the ditch on Sunday and relieving suffering as wicked and a violator of the commands of God as the man who does any or all of the above named things. If the preachers believe this is the right kind of talk, let them say amen. If they don't believe it right, let them remain silent as most of them have done. If they have not cried aloud and spared not they are guilty of not doing what they as teachers and leaders of the people are commanded to do.

The majority of people think there is no harm in Sunday visiting, often causing those whom they visit to stay away from church and often the hardest day's work of the seven. I knew a preacher to call his neighbor up over the phone and tell him that he and his family were coming to make him a Sunday visit when there were Sunday school and church services at a half dozen places within reach of him. Of course the lady of the home missed her Sunday school to stay at home to cook and otherwise entertain these Sunday visitors. The writer had one good Christian woman tell him that often her heart yearned to go to church and was making preparations to go when the phone rang to notify her that not only one but two or three families were coming to make her a Christian (or church member) visit. 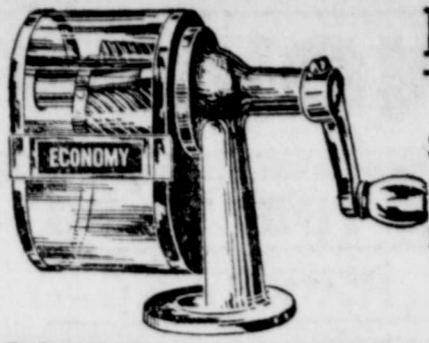

as well as confessed its teachings
and its dictates. We who knew
her and were acquainted with her
pure and unselfish life can better
understand the language of Him
who walked among the golden
candle sticks when He said,
"blessed are the dead who die
in the Lord," than we should
have understood them had she
not lived among us, for truly
we know that her works do fol-
low her and will continue to be
exemplified in the lives of her
children, grand children and all
others who came within reach of
her beautiful life and Christian
example. It can be said with
truth and assurance that the
world is better because she lived
in it and is brighter because she
passed this way.

While her friends will miss her
more and more as the years go
by and especially will the old
soldiers miss her kindly greeting
and devoted attention, her thought-
fulness and hospitality at the
time of their reunions, where she
was ever to be found ministering
to their needs and solicitous of
their pleasure; her neighbors will
miss her and her absence from
the church in her home commu-
nity at the hours of worship will
cause a sadness to fall over the
services that have been hereto-
fore brightened and helped by
her presence and her influence;
her children and grand children

will miss her in all their affairs
and her place will be indeed hard
to fill; but most of all does the
sympathy of the people go out
to her bereaved husband, that con-
secrated old man of God whose
life has been so great a blessing
and such a benediction to the
world, whose sympathy has
warmed the hearts of so many
thru the years and whose kind
words of consolation have helped
drive back the dark mists and
reveal to so many hearts a rain-
bow of hope; it is to him most
of all that the hearts of the peo-
ple go out in this dark hour. May
the God he has served so long
and faithfully be an all-sufficient
support to him now and may he
feel more and more of that grace
and strength as the years go by
until his work on earth is end-
ed and he is reunited with the
sweetheart of his youth in that
land where separations come no
