#### MR. HINES DEAD

Mr. M. H. Hines died at his home in this city Wednesday morning at an early hour, after an illness extending over a year. He leaves a wife, one son and four daughters, besides other relatives and many friends to mourn his loss.

Mr. Hines was a man of the highest principles and had the unlimited confidence of all who knew him. He was truly a good man and was ever anxious and ready to help his fellows and no man was ever injured by him intentionally. No man stood higher in the estimation of the people than did he and no man had or deserved more friends among those who knew him.

He was born in Washington county, Texas, and was a member of Gen. Tom Green's brigade during the war. He was as faithful and loyal as a soldier as he was a citizen and was one of the most beloved and honored members of the Jeff Davis camp of veterans. He was one of those good and true men who could be depended upon in all conditions and under all circumstances—a genuine Confederate veteran. He located on the Lampasas river, east of Lometa, many years ago and engaged in farming for a long time. Some years ago he moved to this city and was employed in the mercantile business for a time and was then elected commissioner and justice of peace, which positions he filled with fidelity and ability.

The funeral service was held in the home Wednesday afternoon and was conducted by Rev. W. R. White, pastor of the Baptist church; Rev. I. T. Morris, pastor of the Methodist church, and Rev. D. I. Haralson, a friend of long standing. The large gathering at this sad service and at the cemetery fully attested the fact that Mr. Hines was truly mourned by the people among whom he had spent the last years of his life.

A riot in the state penitentiary at Joliet, Ill., Monday resulted in one prisoner being killed and several guards being injured. The riot was the ultimate result of too much freedom having been given the prisoners.

The trial of 55 men charged with conspiracy in connection with the plot to refuse to register for army duty has been in progress at Abilene this week. One of the men is also indicted on a charge of having threatened the life of Woodrow Wilson.

From press reports we note that two German prisoners have been surprised to find American soldiers in France. The impression has been sent abroad in the German army that Americans would not get into actual business of making war. When the German soldier realizes that he must actually fight the United States forces he will have a more terrible longing for peace, even though without profit.—Temple Telegram.

Approximately \$12,000,000 for war relief work in Europe will have been expended by the American Red Cross in the first six months since the United States has been at war with Germany, according to a report addressed to "The American People" by Henry P. Davison, chairman of the Red Cross war council, in which full details are given of the activities of the organization in various nations abroad, chief of which is France. More than \$10,000,000 of this sum, appropriated up to and including August 31, by the war council since its appointment, May 10, last for use in France. Other countries to receive relief are Russia, Roumania, Italy, Serbia, England and Armenia, the grand total amounting to \$12,339,681, the greater part of which will be used by November 1, although some of the appropriation covers a year. Most of the persons in charge of the Red Cross work in France are giving their time and paying their own expenses. A special fund of \$100,000 has been privately contributed to meet the expenses of members of the commission to France unable to pay their own way.

It is rather a trite but none the less a timely observation that Mr. Bryan makes to reassure the country that a vast majority of the people are giving a loyal support to the government and that the disloyalists are more noisy than numerous. Basically the exceptional words or act has a greater news value than the commonplace one, and it is the working of this rule that gives publicity to disloyal and withholds it from loyalty, unless loyalty is manifested in a signal way. Hence it is very easy for the casual reader of newspapers to fasten on himself a distorted view of the whole phenomenon in which the activities of a hundred million people merge. Mr. Bryan's statement is more noteworthy for the suggestion it gives that he himself has become reconciled to this country's participations in the war. He does not say so, to be sure; but the finely attuned ear may catch something like a note of satisfaction in the expression of his belief that, in the momentous task it has undertaken, the government enjoys both the support and the moral sanction of a vast majority of its citizens. Doubtless, if the decision were yet to be made, Mr. Bryan would again be found protesting against our entrance into war; nevertheless, the tone of his statement suggests that out of his philosophy he has drawn some considerations which reconcile him to the fact.—Dallas News.

The cotton pickers of Texas will be able to buy Government bonds this fall. The new securities are expected to bear four per cent and to be non-taxable except as regards the income tax. This means that the bonds will be an excellent investment on the dollars and cents basis. A thousand-dollar bond will mean forty dollars a year, rain or shine, and if every old man and woman in Texas has an assured income of forty dollars a year, small as that sum is, it would mean for them many little luxuries which they would not otherwise enjoy. Many a farmer, in North and East Texas, will this year clear enough cash to guarantee him against penury in his old age if he will invest the surplus from the crop of 1917 in Government bonds. Some of these farmers will make such investments, but the majority will not. And by and by those who do make safe will be called "lucky" by those who had an equal chance at luck and passed it up. Three years from now the man who owns a \$1000 Government bond will stand a good deal higher in the community than the one who owns a run-down automobile. Dallas News.

### CHILDRESS

Editor Eagle:

It has been some time since I wrote to the Old Bird, so I thought I would drop in again.

This country is dried up, but not quite blown away. Crops are mostly a failure. Haven't had a rain to speak of since April. Water is a scarce thing here. Two of the city lakes are bone dry and the third one almost gone. Hundreds of people are having to buy water and it is hard to get sometimes, but twenty miles northwest from here there has been plenty of rain clear on to Colorado. So you see since it has rained so close by we are living in hopes.

Tuesday night August fourth at 9:25 members of Company C composed of volunteers from this county, who have been in training here for sometime, with headquarters in the fair grounds, obeyed an order to entrain for Camp Bowie, near Fort Worth, where they will meet with thousands of other boys in that soldier city. Monday and Tuesday word was passed around town that the boys would leave that evening and long before time came a large crowd of citizens assembled at the depot to bid them farewell. Many mothers, sisters, sweethearts wept bitter tears as they said the parting words to those who are to represent them in this great world-war and many a soldier's heart beat fast and voice grew husky as he pressed to his bosom his loved ones he was leaving behind. Amid the fond farewells and goodwishes of hundreds who had gathered at the depot the train pulled in bearing five carloads from Amarillo and four from Clarendon. They seemed to be a jolly bunch of soldier boys and by the time the train had come to a stand still, every one that could had his head out of the car window and one was waving a very large flag and they all began to greet us with a song the chorus was, "It Will Take a Long Long Time to Whip the Kaiser."

This of course seemed to cheer the Childress boys, and at the sound of the bugle call they marched into the cars set apart for them. There were four cars of Childress boys making 13 cars in all including a baggage car for each division, there being three companies made a total of ten cars of soldier boys, which looked like quite a bunch to me. The local Red Cross chapter prepared a nice lunch for each one of the Childress boys to be given them next morning for breakfast and the girls of the city and

the surrounding country had made a box of delicious candy for each boy. So they went away feeling that our hearts and best wishes were with them. Many of the boys seemed to be delighted at the prospect of getting down to Camp Bowie, while others were visibly saddened at the prospect of leaving loved ones behind.

Well, for fear my letter is getting too lengthy I had better step aside and try and come again after the fair, which will be Sept. 24th to 27th.

### TIMELY HARVESTING

Not in recent years has it been so important to harvest and market crops and feed livestock in such a manner as to have loss as it is this year. Farm products are bringing excellent prices with everything we must buy very expensive. The least waste in harvesting crops may be very expensive. Such loss farmers at this time can ill afford.

Every individual farmer has his own responsibility and difficulties in harvesting. Each has conditions somewhat peculiar and must use his own judgment in meeting these difficulties so that the crops and animals will be taken care of.

Shelter will be more expensive this year than usual, nevertheless it will be more important than ever because crops and livestock now represent more capital than formerly. It will not be good business judgment to take any risk in saving perishable products without facilities for doing this, even at considerable expense. Let us not forget that expenditures incurred for barns, sheds, silos needed as shelter for crops and livestock if economically built will be an investment supplying the needs of the manager for many years, whereas any products injured for lack of storage will be loss.

It is true labor is very scarce and will be very expensive where hands must be hired to assist in gathering and marketing crops. But when we remember the value of the crops we can understand why it is necessary to save that which our farms have produced.

It does not seem necessary and may not be advisable to market the products as soon as gathered, but it will be highly desirable to harvest at the earliest possible time and take no chances on bad weather and other causes of loss in perishable products—Farm and Ranch.
