### STORM AT THE FORT

Fort Morgan, Ala., Sept. 29, Dear Mills County Folks:

We have had a terrible storm at Fort Morgan and I thought I would tell you about it, although many of you have doubtless read of it in the papers by this time.

All of the barracks and mess halls were destroyed and the slate from the roof was blown thru walls, but none of the soldiers were hurt. We all marched to the battery, where we were protected from the wind, but the water from the gulf ran waist deep or more. The breakers in the gulf were 50 feet high and the wind registered from 110 to 120 miles an hour. There are now ships, logs and scattered timber and other debris all over the prairie, consequently there is lots of work to do, but I did not have to work this afternoon, as the captain told me if I would swim down in the basement and get some tubs he would excuse me from work, so I thought I would take advantage of the opportunity to tell you all of the storm and also to say that I would rather be in Texas and have to hop like a grasshopper than be in Alabama and have to swim like a duck.

### INDEPENDENCE IN FARMING

In no other occupation so far as we know is there greater pleasure and satisfaction over a day's work well done than farming. The laborer at public work has a shorter day, it is true, but he cannot select his task or always take advantage of the work; he is more dependent upon some one for his orders, and his pay. The farmer must depend upon the seasons and sometimes he is disappointed because of drouth or excessive rains, but he can continue and take advantage of his experience and knowledge to reduce risk and failures. There are very few seasons not favorable to some crop or some of the farmer's activities. There is satisfaction in being one's own "boss" and laying one's plans for the future. Where is there another occupation with so small an investment that is as nearly independent and as certain as farming? —Farm and Ranch

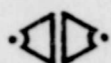

### SOLDIERS ENTERTAINED

Picture Show—Prominent Speakers—Oyster Supper On Program

The soldier boys who left for Camp Travis Monday night to go into training were royally entertained by Mr. W. C. Dew of the Trent State bank, together with other prominent citizens.

A special program was provided by the Dixie Theatre to which the soldier boys were admitted free. Seats were reserved for them where they could have a clear view of the picture, which was one of the best produced by the high grade Blue Bird company. Mother O'Mine was the title of the play and was an exceptionally good and timely selection for the occasion.

Mr Dew acted as master of ceremonies for the entire entertainment and saw to it that the soldier boys were given good seats.

After the picture show Mr Dew made a short and appropriate address to the young men and then introduced Judge Spann and later Rev. W. R. White, both of whom made excellent addresses and gave the young men some very timely and valuable advice as well as spoke words of cheer and encouragement to them and their loved ones, coupling their remarks with expressions of patriotism and confidence in the American troops and the American people.

When the speakers concluded their addresses, Mr Dew invited the soldier boys, the speakers and the exemption board to the cafe, where oysters in abundance were served.

The treasury department announces very satisfactory progress of the second issue of Liberty bonds. The Mormon church of Salt Lake City is among the purchasers of the second issue of these bonds.

A large number of turkeys have been shipped to France to be prepared for the Thanksgiving dinner of American soldiers there. The government has also called for bids for supplying a million pounds of turkey meat for the soldiers in this country and in the Philippines.

Frost was reported in many sections of Texas Tuesday morning. In some places it was light and did but little damage, but in the entirety it caused heavy loss in fields and orchards. This is said to be the earliest frost that has been recorded in many years.

A ranchman in west Texas announced to the soldier boys leaving Baird for training camp Monday that he would give 100 heifer yearlings to any Texas soldier who would take Kaiser William dead or alive and he would give \$250 in money for the scalp of von Hindenberg.

Trial of some of those charged with the kidnapping and murder of the Keet baby at Springfield, Mo., has been in progress at Marshfield this week. There are strong hopes and some indications that the guilty parties will be given as near just punishment as it is possible to mete out to them for their diabolical deed.

While the news from the battle front is carefully censored, as it should be, enough information is given out to show that the allies are making steady progress along all fronts. The advance will be much more rapid however, when the American troops now in training are given an opportunity to take part in the battles.

Governor Hobby made his first speech as governor at the opening of the Tyler fair last Saturday. His ideas were well expressed and well drawn and the impression made upon the people of Texas must necessarily be favorable. He has so far given every assurance of "making good" in the very important position in which he has been placed.

The suggestions of peace offers from Central powers of Europe continue to circulate, but none of them have had as a basis a proposition to materially change the form of government in Germany, which change will be the paramount demand of the allied nations whenever peace terms are arranged. The loss of life and property and the heavy financial expense already incurred make it necessary that any plan of settlement have for its foundation the impossibility of another war like the one in which the nations are now engaged.

From all over the country come assurances of good business conditions and while in some sections the drought has been severe, the people generally are hopeful and very little destitution exists. The splendid prices at which products of every kind are sold, together with the demand for labor, both skilled and unskilled, at high wages, make a prosperous condition, regardless of the drought. In some sections people are moving out on account of the crop failure, but many of them would have moved anyway and are not actuated as much by necessity as by desire. Taken as a whole, there is no cause for looking to the future with dark forebodings.

## THE COMPULSORY ATTENDANCE LAW

In view of the fact that schools are beginning to open and many patrons, who have not had a chance to become acquainted with the compulsory law, are asking about it, I take this method of bringing before the people some of the main provisions of the law so that it may be understood better.

The law provides that children eight to fourteen years of age shall attend school and for the term of 1917-18 a period of eighty days or four months. The compulsory period shall begin at the opening of school unless otherwise authorized by the trustees and if changed the trustees are to give notice when said period starts, provided they do not put it off until the eighty days cannot be gotten in. The exemptions are: children attending a private school where the adopted text books are used, children whose bodily and mental condition is such as to render attendance inadvisable and who hold a physician's certificate relative to the fact, children who are blind, deaf, dumb, or feeble minded, children who live more than 2 1/2 miles from the school and children who are more than twelve years old and have completed the fourth grade and whose services are necessary in support of their parents may secure an exemption upon application establishing the facts. Any parent who is absolutely unable, financially, to buy the text books may apply for free books upon blanks furnished by the County Superintendent.

Any child may be excused for temporary absence due to personal sickness, sickness or death in the family, quarantine, or severe storm which renders travel dangerous. In case a child is excused temporarily the parents are respectfully asked to send written excuses to the teacher setting forth the reason and properly signed. And no child, under fourteen years old who is not excused from school, shall be employed by any one during school hours.

The duties of the principal of the schools and penalties imposed for non-compliance with the provisions of the law are not set forth here as all teachers are supplied with a copy of the law and any other person who wishes one may secure it at my office.

The law is not designed to work hardship on anybody, for compliance with same is very easy for all patrons who desire the full benefit of the school. I write for the reason that public sentiment will count for so much in the administration of the compulsory school attendance law and it is my unpleasant duty to be required to act as attendance officer for the county. I am impressed with the necessity of giving correct and helpful information to the people who are to receive the benefits of this measure and I ask your full cooperation in the matter for I believe this is a most creditable law and will serve the best interests of the people to begin with, if properly administered.

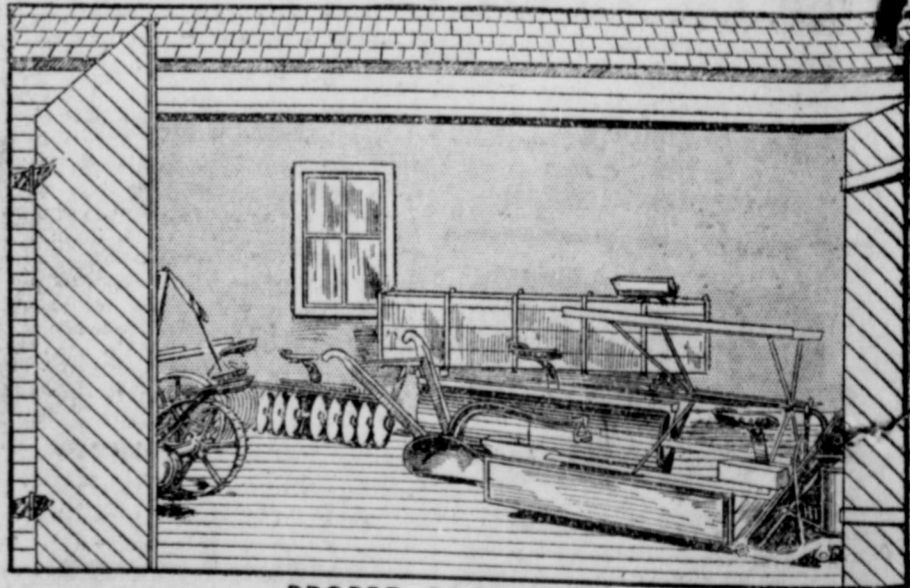
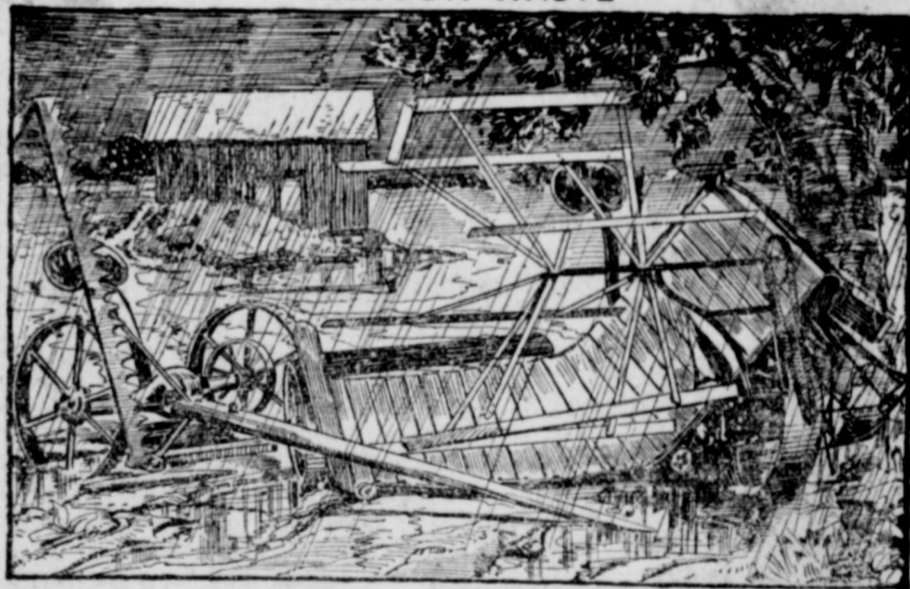

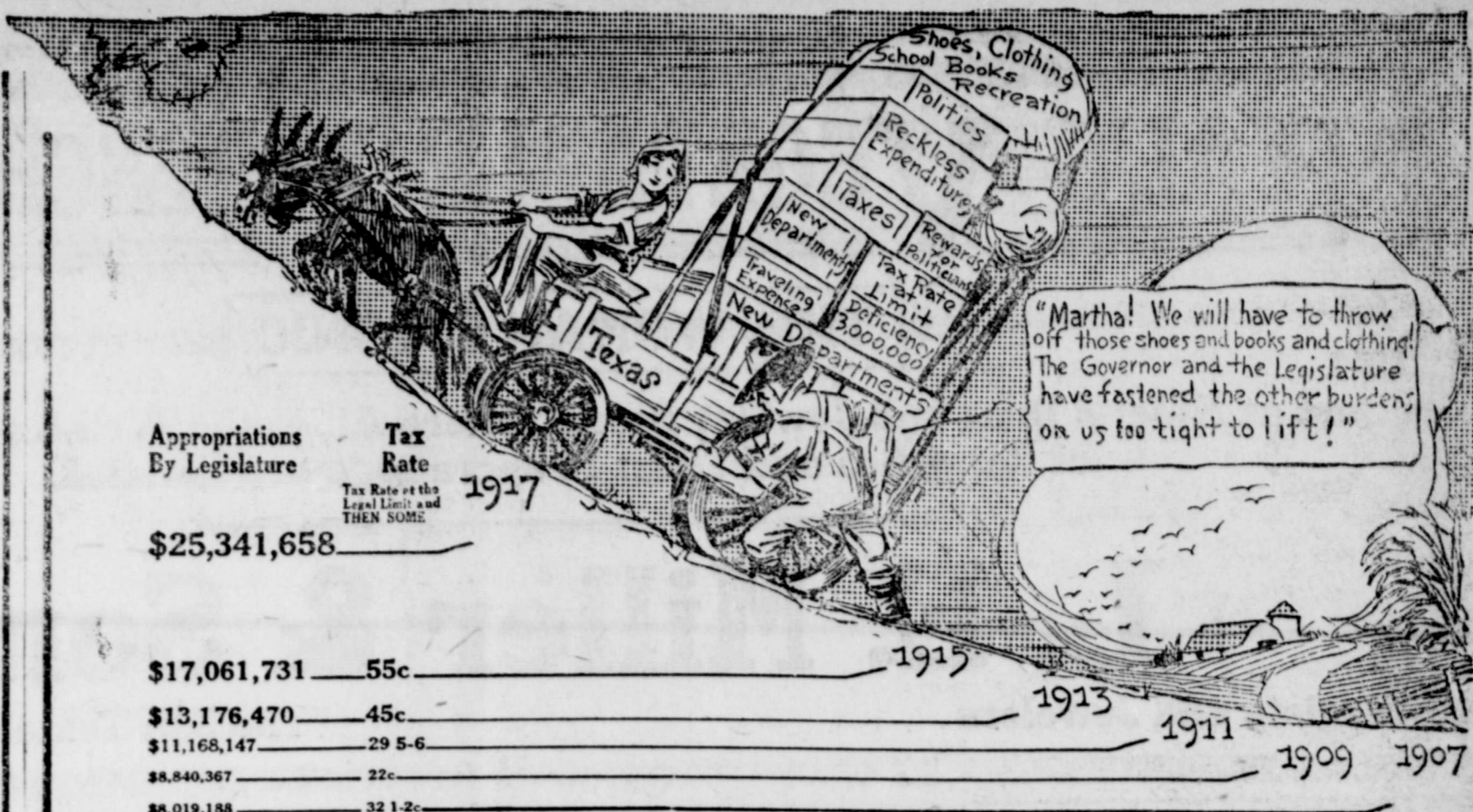
