
The Railroad Commission at its regular monthly hearing this week ordered the suspension of the rule requiring passenger trains not to stop longer than thirty minutes at junction points for connection. The proposition was proposed by the commission and did not meet any opposition. The suspension of the rule was deemed advisable by heavy troop movements and movements of supplies for the government.

A case involving the validity of the landlord and tenant law was tried at the recent term of the District court at Falfurrias. Suit was brought against the landlord to recover double the rent collected. Judge Taylor in deciding the case held that the law had not been violated, and that the law was unconstitutional, in that it interfered with the right of contract, and also discriminating against a certain class, to-wit: owners of agricultural lands.

Save the food and you will thereby help to win the war.

The people of Tulsa, Okla., have a mighty good remedy for the evil influence of the L. W. W. outlaws. A good coat of tar and feathers following the vigorous application of a wet rope ties the work.

Powdered glass was discovered in a can of chili being served to a family home in Temple Monday. Children discovered the glass and an investigation showed that a spoonful of it had been added to the can.

It is as much a duty to conserve the food supply of the nation as it is to respond to the call to arms in the country's defense. People who refuse to assist the country in its time of need certainly can not lay claim to patriotism.

The war department has authorized the raising of a new National Guard for Texas. It is planned to recruit the guard to a strength of 10,000, and will be subject to the president, of course. It is more likely the forces raised will be used for purposes.

A cowboy from El Paso secured a bunk aboard a passenger train on the Texas and Pacific road Sunday, killed one man, wounded two others before he could be overpowered. One of the men was saved from death by a bullet from the enraged cowboy striking his watch.

The death of the former queen of Hawaii, Liliuokalani, occurred Honolulu Sunday morning at an early hour. She was the reigning sovereign of Hawaii when annexation was effected with the United States during the administration of President Cleveland.

Developments since the beginning of the war prove that the time has arrived for the government to take a hand in the capital and labor situation in this country. When men will combine to bring about strikes with injurious results that are far-reaching at a time when every citizen should be exerting every energy for the government they should be forced by law to desist. If conditions and wage scales effective before the war are in force it is not right to paralyze the industries of the country by striking for higher wages, shorter hours and other benefits at this time.

It is almost as risky to attempt to report conditions in Russia as to give an account of the military matters in Mexico, for we can never tell what a day will bring forth in the way of an uprising or revolution. However, at this writing, which only stands good for the hour, the Russian situation appears more encouraging. For it is believed that Premier Kerensky will be able to dominate the Russian situation and at least prevent independent terms of peace being agreed, even in the strength of that nation is not again put in the war on the side of the allies. The Italian situation is also more encouraging than for several days last week and with the increased reinforcements there will be victory for the allies on that side.

ARMY LIFE

Camps Are Made Comfortable and Surroundings Pleasant

To the end that parents, relatives, and friends of the soldiers now composing the 90th division, National Army, station at Camp Travis, San Antonio, Texas, may be kept informed as to the health, progress and general welfare of the men composing this army division, General Henry T. Allen, commanding, has established a Publicity Bureau. This Publicity Bureau will each week send to the country newspapers of Texas and Oklahoma, items of interest concerning the soldiers at Camp Travis. Every effort will be made to so localize these items that each newspaper will be supplied with news that relates to men from the county in which the particular newspaper is published.

General Allen is well pleased with the progress the soldiers now at Camp Travis are making. If the intensive training schedule that has been followed up to this period continues to produce such splendid results, it is the belief of those high in command here that the 90th division will be trained to energetically uphold the liberties of the world at a date much earlier than has been planned. The first French officer who reached Camp Travis to assist in training the division in the finer points of the war game expressed himself as being agreeably surprised at the results of the training so far given.

To the end that there be no irksome periods of training, General Allen has given special attention to providing ample and healthful recreation for the soldiers of this division. All clean athletics are given official and energetic encouragement and allotted hours each week are devoted to sports that make supple the muscles, make keen the eye and have in them the zest of contest.

The general health of the camp receives the constant attention of the officers, under direction of the Medical Corps. Skilled attention is given every case even of slight indisposition. The sanitary conditions are formulated with the sole idea that the soldiers at Camp Travis remain healthy in body.

Nor is the moral and spiritual side of the soldiers overlooked. The camp is fairly dotted with Y. M. C. A., Knights of Columbus, and Young Men's Hebrew association buildings. In these buildings every effort is made to provide entertainment, instruction and recreation for the soldiers. The moral atmosphere surrounding the camp is more pure than is to be found in any city of 30,000 population in the United States. Each soldier has had impressed upon his mind the extreme importance of being clean in his thoughts and leading a cleanly life. The social features are gradually being developed and soon will be of sufficient variety to provide entertainment for all spare hours. Many homes in San Antonio make it a practice to invite soldiers to Sunday dinners and at some churches in San Antonio invitations are extended all soldiers who attend services to accompany members of the congregation to their respective homes and break bread under family influences.

General Allen wishes a message of encouragement be sent to relatives and friends of the soldiers that the men at Camp Travis are proving worthy of the best traditions of this nation and that they are responding to the call with a zeal that marks a high point in the training of the armies that have made history.

Otto C. Sykes, who left Goldthwaite with the first contingent of the National Army recruits has been appointed to the grade of corporal. His many friends expect big things from Otto and from all accounts should his progress be as rapid as it has been in the past, we wouldn't be surprised to see him with a gold cord around his "dome", with boots, donned up "A la Pershing," so go to it Otto, we're with you. XX

Texas War Work Council Organized. Will Send Executive Secretary Here for Campaign.

To keep the home fires burning in the hearts of the 100,000 American troops in France during the long, cold winter that faces them in the trenches and to preserve the high moral and social life of the 1,700,000 men under the colors at home, the Young Men's Christian Associations of America are raising a national war work fund of \$35,000,000.

This County to Aid. Texas has agreed to give \$400,000 to this amount, and this county has been asked to do its part in the campaign.

At an organization meeting of the Texas War Work Council in Dallas recently, at which practically every county in the state was represented, the following men were named as members, with Rhodes S. Baker as chairman, and L. A. Coulter of Dallas, as state campaign director: H. H. Simmons, Hillsboro; R. E. Burt, Houston; E. R. Brown, Dallas; W. C. Waige, Houston; W. S. Mosher, Dallas; C. A. Nichols, Georgetown; James Kapp, San Antonio, and J. P. Millican, Fort Worth.

A district executive secretary will be sent to this county in the interest of the campaign which will start Nov. 11 and continue through Nov. 19.
