OIL PROSPECTS

Land Leased for Oil Rights—Will Sink Wells

J. V. Cockrum, representing an Oklahoma syndicate, has leased several thousand acres of land between Goldthwaite and Pecan Bayou for the purpose of sinking test oil wells and it is understood the syndicate expects to begin operations in the near future.

Mr. Cockrum has also leased a great amount of land on his own account for oil prospecting and informs the Eagle that he expects to begin at least one deep well as soon as the desired leases are closed.

Others whose names have not been authorized to be published are also engaged in securing oil leases, which cause the belief that sure signs of oil have been found and that there are good prospects for this section to become oil producing in paying quantities. No rigs have been put to work at this time, but operations are likely to begin any day and if a paying flow is located this section will enter upon a new era of prosperity.

A GOOD MAN GONE

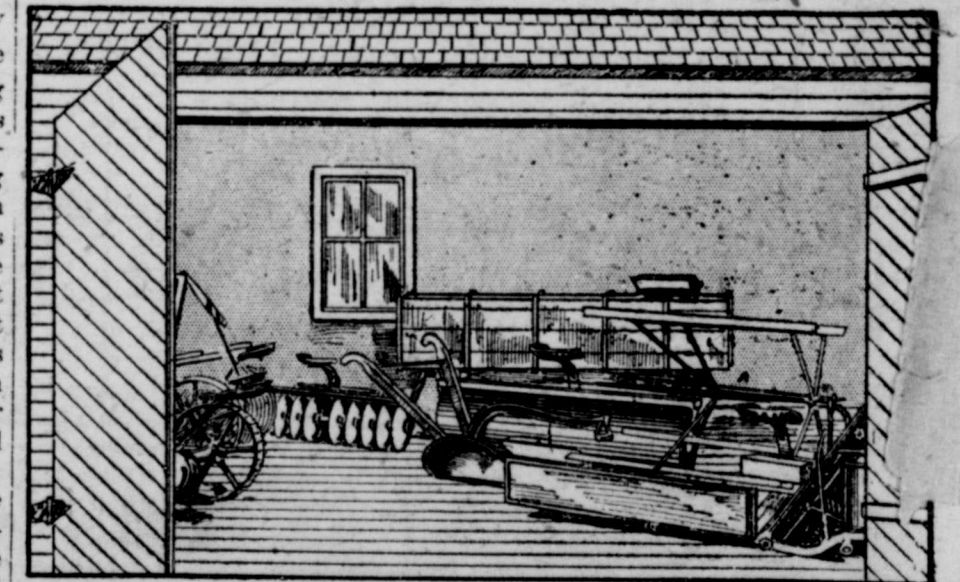
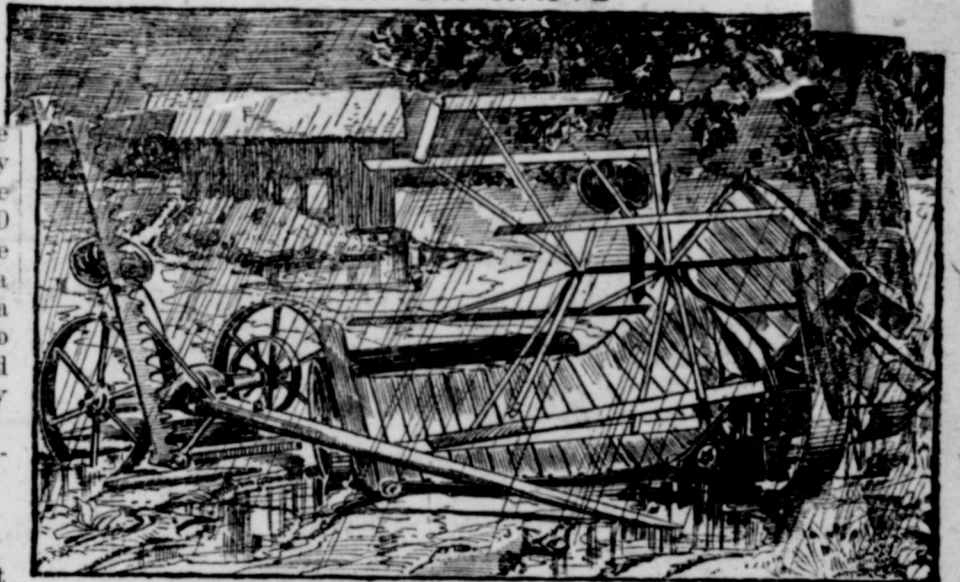
Mr. Samuel L. Cooke died at the home of his son, Mr. J. R. Cooke, in Winters Wednesday morning and his remains were brought here on the evening train for burial at Rock Springs Thursday. Mr. Cooke was a resident of this county for a long time, having located here in 1884, and still claimed Mills county as his home, altho he spent a good portion of the last few years with his children at Brady and Winters. He was 75 years of age and had been in ill health for several years prior to his death, which was caused by apoplexy.

Mr. Cooke was a man of the highest ideals and noblest principles. He had the confidence and esteem of everybody and the announcement of his death caused universal sorrow among his acquaintances. He served the county in the capacity of commissioner some years ago and his record in that office was one of the best, showing fidelity to duty as well as ability in the transaction of business affairs.

He leaves two daughters and two sons, a number of grandchildren and other relatives as well as a host of friends throughout this section of Texas. The burial services were held at Rock Springs cemetery Thursday at noon and were conducted by the Masonic lodge of which fraternity he had long been a true and honored member.

HIGHWAYS DESIGNATED

Plans Inaugurated For Making
Better Roads

Dr J. M. Campbell, L. R.
Conroy and Judge Weaver re-
turned Tuesday from Austin,
where they appeared before the
state highway commission and
secured the designation of two
public highways thru the county,
one from Waco via Gatesville,
Evant and Star to Goldthwaite
and from this place to Brown-
wood and San Angelo; the other
from Temple via Lampasas and
Lometa to this place to intersect
the Waco-San Angelo road.

The benefit of designating
these highways is to force the
expenditure of the county's por-
tion of the automobile tax
money on the roads under gov-
ernment instructions and ulti-
mately government aid may be
secured for these roads.

The gentlemen who made the
trip to Austin are entitled to
great credit, as is the Goldthwaite
Commercial club, which shared
in the payment of their expenses.

OBITUARY OF MRS. J. D. CALAWAY

Mrs. J. D. Calaway, whose
maiden name was Viola Clem-
tina Henderson, was born in
Butler county, Ala., March 14th,
1851, was converted at the age of
ten years and joined the Mis-
sionary Baptist church, was married
to Dr. J. D. Calaway at Orion,
Pike county, Ala., Jan. 19,
1870, died at the family home in
Goldthwaite, Texas, Nov. 15, 1917.

It is indeed a pleasure to think
about a devoted Christian life,
one which has been felt in the
world on account of the good
it has done. Sister Calaway's
life was indeed one of this kind.
She was indeed and in truth a
devoted wife. The affections of
early life for her husband con-
tinued to the end and after al-
most 48 years of wedded life
they were lovers still.

To Brother and Sister Cala-
way were born 7 children—5
boys and two girls—five of whom
are still living, all of whom are
Christians unless it be one.

Sister Calaway was always in-
terested in the welfare of her
children and wished to see them
all in the kingdom of God before
her death. I do not think I
ever knew any one more devo-
ted to her church and Lord than
she was. And it was seldom if
ever she was in company with
any one even for a short time,

she has brought to Christ. For
several years before her death
she suffered great bodily af-
fliction, but she bore this with
true Christian fortitude and
often attended the services of
the church when suffering se-
verely.

She will be missed—missed by
her devoted husband, by her
children and grandchildren;
missed from her accustomed
place in church and the prayer-
meeting and Ladies Aid; missed
by her helping hands and whole-
some advice are needed. But
while she is thus missed, we
sorrow not as those who have
no hope, for we believe when
Christ comes again she will be
among the throng that will be
with Him. Not sick and emaci-
ated, but well, joyous and con-
tented in the presence of that
Savior she loved to serve while
here.

A CALL COMING

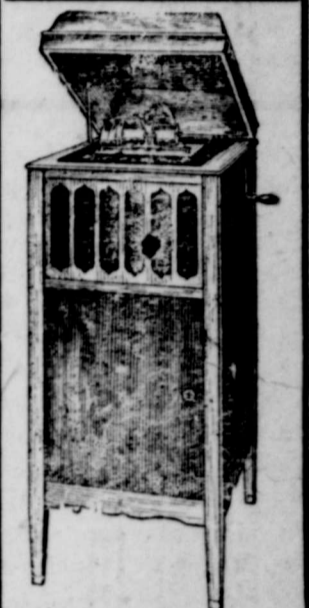
The government is preparing
to submit questionnaires to all
registrants for military duty
who have not already been ac-
cepted and beginning Dec. 15, 5
per cent per day will receive
such questionnaires and will be
allowed seven days in which to
fill the blanks and return. All
who have been heretofore dis-
charged or exempted will have
such discharges and exemption
annulled on Dec. 15 and will be
on the same basis as a man who
has never been examined. The
rules are also very strict on ex-
emption boards, subjecting
them to heavy fine and imprison-
ment where favoritism or other
violations are shown. If a regis-
trant does not return his blank
in the required time, he is
placed in the list of the first
called and must respond without
further question.

A number of changes are
made in the former method and
will, doubtless prove beneficial.

MORE HOGS FOR MEAT

The value of meat for human
food has often been emphasis-
ed; yet many do not realize its
importance upon nutrition and
every-day efficiency. There are
many other foods that may be
eaten instead of meat but none
quite so good for economy in
producing energy, efficiency for
physical and mental labor.

Animal foods we are being con-
stantly reminded will be neces-
sary for our armies and those of
our allies to win the war. Farm-
ers are being urged from every
side to produce more meat—es-
pecially pork, as hogs increase
fast and are economical feeders.
There can be no doubt as to the
country's need of more animals
since those who stay on farms to
produce must have meat, milk,
butter, eggs, poultry as well as
those who go to the front.

The problem will be first to
make plans for enough hogs to
supply meat for the family, then
a surplus to sell to those who
are not producers. This will
be very largely a problem of
feed and especially pasture
since the cheapest pork is al-
ways that produced where swine
harvest their own crops. This
will be all the more important be-
cause of higher cost of labor.

TEN THOUSAND STENOGRAPHERS

Wanted By The Government
Abilene, Texas, Nov. 15, 1917.
—Hon John A. Mellhenny, presi-
dent of the Civil-Service Com-
mission, Washington, D. C. re-
cently wrote to Draughon's Col-
lege, Abilene, urging that Col-
lege to help the United States
Government in securing more ste-
nographers, both men and wo-
men, the government now being
in need of ten thousand stenog-
raphers and many, many book-
keepers, at salaries ranging from
one thousand dollars to twelve
hundred dollars to begin on.

In his letter Mr. Mellhenny
urges young men and women who
are not trained for government
office positions to begin now to
take the necessary training, as
the prospect is that the demand
will continue indefinitely.

A garage in Granbury burned Tuesday morning causing the loss of 22 automobiles.

A large number of sheep died near San Angelo from eating parched milk weed. The animals were being herded for shipment and feed was unobtainable.

President Wilson and Governor Hobbs have each issued a Thanksgiving proclamation designating Thursday of next week as a day for universal thanksgiving.

The long continued drought in Texas was broken over a large area Sunday morning, but the amount of rain in most localities was not sufficient to do any considerable good.

A soldier in Camp Bowie insured his life in favor of his mother and died the next day. His mother will receive \$58 per month from the government for 20 years in payment of the insurance.

A proclamation was issued by the mayor of Tulsa, Okla., the first of the week calling on all citizens to be prepared to protect themselves against the I. W. W. members, who were on the way to preparing to go on the march.

The time is drawing near when the negroes responsible for the riot in Houston are going to get what is coming to them. The courtmartial has developed that the devilment was planned by the black brutes hours before its consummation.

A wealthy banker of New Orleans announced that he will give his income, except his household expenses, to war measures and the Red Cross society while the war continues. That is a mighty good way to show patriotism.

One of the most effective ways to stop a strike is the method used by the sheriff in Harrison county, who jailed two strikers for attempting to intimidate others who were willing to work for wages and on the terms rejected by the strikers.

A peace-maker in Fort Worth was killed by a single blow Monday, while attempting to induce one man to discontinue stamping another. The enraged man struck the peace-maker and felled him to the pavement, his head striking with such force as to cause his death.

H. G. Forehand and wife and Nath Goode and wife have returned from an automobile trip to Knickerbocker, San Angelo and other points in the west. They found the drought severe in most sections they visited, but cattle in many places were looking fairly well, notwithstanding the shortage of provender.

W. H. Leverett of Caradan is one of the most enthusiastic Red Cross workers and his efforts always meet with success. He organized an auxiliary at Center City last Friday night with a membership of 41 and good prospects to reach the hundred mark. One reason for his success is that he is a mighty good man and people have confidence in him.

George Hasty returned to his home in Oklahoma Sunday, after a visit to friends here and looking after business matters in Tulsa. He reported his family well.

CAMP TRAVIS

Company "D" 343 Machine Gun Battalion

Editor Eagle:

Not only should the relatives of boys in the army be interested in news from the different camps, that are provided by the government for the training of our soldiers, but every loyal American citizen should derive satisfaction in reading anything pertaining to the environment and activities of men who are chosen to defend the cause of Democracy. It is well to remember that these men are making many sacrifices, and that the greatest sacrifice of all is separation from home and friends; that each and every one of them loves his home and deeply interested in all that transpires in the old home county; that the fact that a visitor hails from that familiar environment makes him welcome as a friend, although he may be a stranger. Let his people display the same interest in him, let them feel that he exemplifies their spirit and that he is striving to live up to the best traditions of his country.

The daily training has gone forward for the past week. Improvements are noticeable. Systematic work and regular habits are keeping the men in good physical condition. Many a man in future years will be able to attribute his strong physique to the training received in the army. Drill, physical training and practice marches are conducive to physical development as well as mental alertness. Quick thought and prompt and decisive results from the intensive training to which the man is subjected. It is a great school and one calculated to increase efficiency.

On Nov. 7th., our divisional football team engaged in a contest with the soldiers at Waco. While we were losers we were proud of the fight our boys put up. The score was close and it cannot be said we were out-play-

ed. Our battalion is doing a machine gun range. Three or four companies are doing the work. We are anxious to get on the range and learn to shoot, and hope to christen our range in the next ten days.

We are being instructed daily in the Semaphore Code which is a system of flag signaling employed in transmitting messages. The work is interesting, but takes constant practice to attain proficiency.

Several of our non-commissioned officers are attending divisional schools in order to qualify for special work.

As stated in the news letter, Saturday morning is devoted to a practice march. Next Saturday we expect to take an unusually long hike, but due to our previous exercise we are ready to cover many miles which to uninitiated would appear a great hardship.

The government is putting into effect the war risk insurance bill whereby for a small monthly premium the soldier may receive financial protection for himself or designated relatives.

Corp. Willis Hill, of Ratler, Texas, thinks that war is rather dangerous and has taken out a Soldier's Insurance. Policy for \$10,000.00—we will all agree that he knows a good thing when he sees it. At present writing Corp Hill is in the hospital broken out with measles. While he is not at all serious, the rest of us (12th bn) are enjoying a quarantine because of his "out-break".

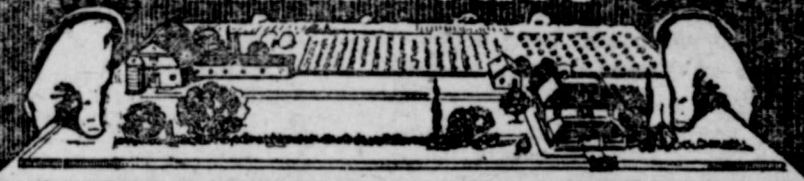

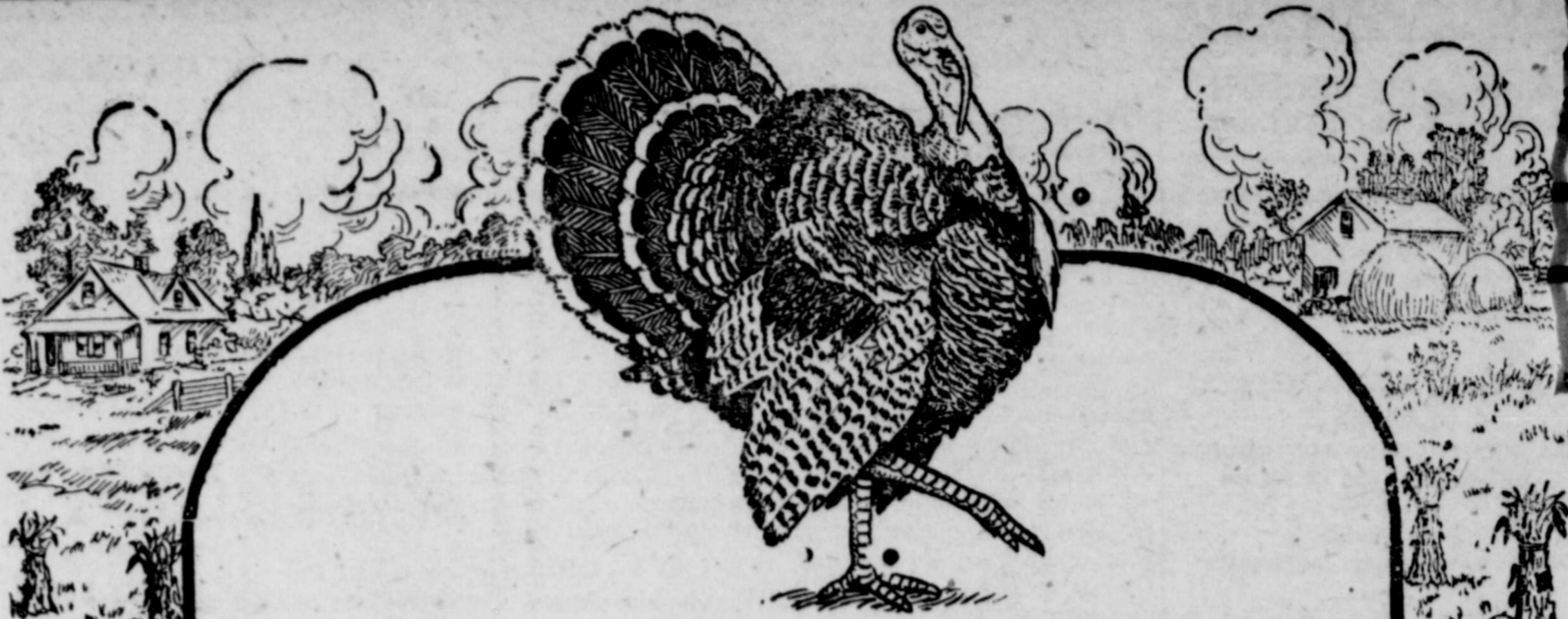

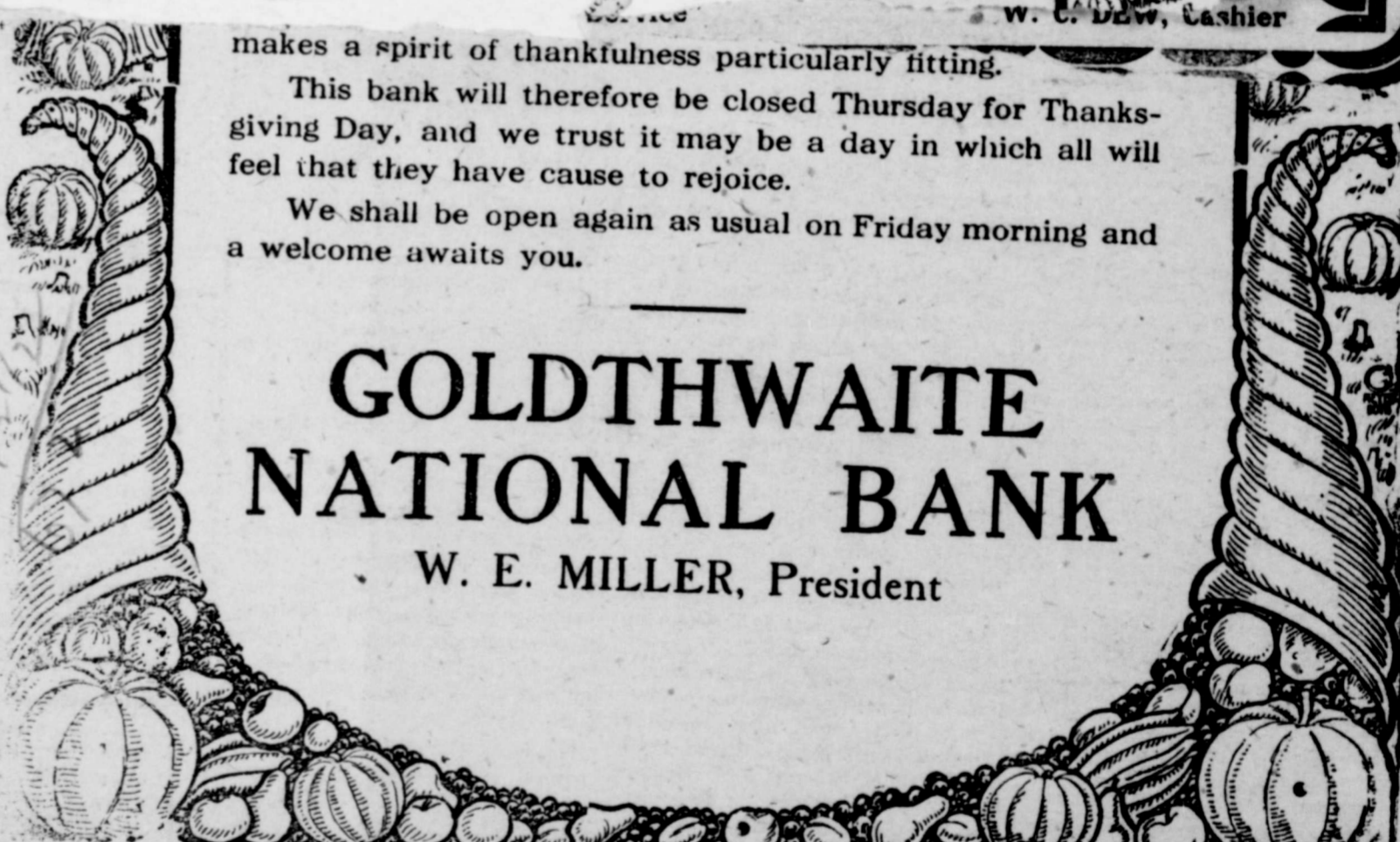

SUBSTANTIAL TESTS

A few indications of a successful farmer are the buildings, the livestock and the appearance of the farmstead. If the buildings are in good repair, the fences substantial and adequate for the farm's needs; purebred or high-grade livestock bred and raised; then you may assume that the soil is productive and the manager is energetic and progressive.

But it must be remembered that this kind of test is fair only to the man who has owned the farm several years. It would be manifestly unfair to require such a test of a farm that has been in possession of its present manager a year or two; when perhaps most of the purchased price is yet unpaid. It requires time for adequate improvements to be made and for the farm to be stocked with purebred or highly bred grade animals. Perhaps the best test of progress is where the owner of the farm makes improvements such as are needed from year to year, when the need shall arise and as often as he is able.

It may be argued that a rich farm may be producing large crops to be sold and the cash used for other permanent improvements or equipment for conserving soil fertility. If so a time will soon come when the farm will fail to produce because its fertility has not been conserved, and in such an instance large crops are not a test of prosperous farming.

The number of buildings, the number of animals and the valuation are not safe guides for prosperous farming. The requirement is that there is a need for every improvement, every implement and every dollar invested in farm equipment and that every dollar thus invested will under ordinary conditions serve as productive capital to bring dividends in larger crops or better grade of livestock.—Farm and Ranch.

He wanted an outing, not being in the best of health. He left the camp to fish, rifle in hand and shortly after his companions heard the shot but thought nothing of it as all were out after game. Soon after they found his body. Death had been instantaneous. The remains were brought in at 6 a. m. Wednesday morning over a "terribly rocky road. The verdict of the coroner was left open and the general impression is that deceased stumbled over a rock and used his rifle for a support and it went off. He and his brother Finis were about to make a deal for a ranch.

His aged mother and brothers were wired and came in Thursday morning, the funeral taking place at the residence at 3:30 p. m.

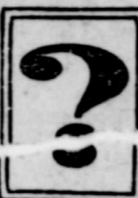
It is a co-incidence that his brother, Louis Lane, accidentally shot himself while hunting, fourteen years ago. Also another brother was found dead twenty years ago, while traveling by himself in the early days.

Buck Lane was widely known in this section and was a big-hearted, genial man who had lots of friends.

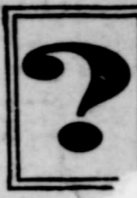
He leaves a wife and three children a mother and five brothers and two sisters to mourn his sad and tragic end.

Did you ever see a really good town that did not have good stores? The two go hand in hand.

I personally know of an instance where a wealthy man refused to locate and establish a modern store in a town of some three thousand population for the reason that an investigation developed the fact that the better class of residents adhered to a long-standing policy, or habit, of doing practically all of their buying in the stores of a nearby city, or by mail.

On the face of it this town had merely failed to secure a few stores. sonal and business taxes would have meant much within themselves.
