LOYALTY ACT.

The Legislature Outlines What Are To Be Considered Disloyal Acts and Provides For Punishment.

The special session of the Texas legislature enacted a law known as the "Loyalty Act" and the military authorities request the publication of its provisions. Good and loyal citizens would not commit the acts forbidden, even if such acts were not forbidden by law, but it is well for them to know when the law is violated by others.

The act declares that if any person shall, while the United States is at war, use any language in the presence and hearing of another, of and concerning the United States of America, the entry or continuance of the United States in war, or concerning any flag, color or ensign of this government, or the uniform of any officer of the army, which language is disloyal, or shall use language which is abusive in character and calculated to bring into disrepute the United States of America, or its army, navy or marine corps, or of such nature as is calculated to provoke a breach of the peace if said in the presence and hearing of a citizen shall be guilty of a felony and shall be punished by confinement in the state penitentiary not less than two nor more than twenty-five years.

The same provisions are applicable where such disloyal statements are made in writing or in any other manner.

The provisions of the act also apply to any person who shall mutilate, defile or cause contempt upon any flag, color, standard or ensign of this nation or its officers or any likeness or other imitation of them. It also applies to any one displaying or having in their possession for any purpose whatsoever any flag, color or ensign of any nation, country or subdivision of any country with which the United States is at war.

All officers are authorized to make arrests of persons guilty of the acts herein and it is made the duty of all citizens to report to the proper authority any violation of this act that may come to their knowledge.

CONFEDERATE REUNION.

Date To Be Fixed For the Annual Gathering.

Jeff Davis Camp of Confederate veterans will hold a called meeting the second Saturday in April for the purpose of fixing the date for the annual reunion. To become an agent it is only necessary to obtain an application blank from the County Chairman or State Director of the National War Savings Committee, sign it and mail to the State Director at Dallas, Tex. Stamps may be obtained from the Federal Reserve Bank or through the local bank or postoffice. In becoming an agent there is no loss liability as the thrift stamps are always convertible into War Savings Stamps which are worth more every month and can be cashed at the postoffice at any time at what they cost plus interest.

"GINGER CARS" CARRY UNCLE SAM'S MESSAGE

"Ginger cars," decorated with war savings signs, carrying literature and a flying squadron speaker, are now being sent to every town, community and schoolhouse in their counties by the chairmen of several South Texas subdivisions. At each place visited literature is distributed, agencies are designated, posters are hung up in the stores and public places and the speaker addresses the school children.

H. Warren is plaintiff, and D. W. Russell, V. E. H. Russell, J. R. Speight, J. R. Speights, J. B. Cutburt, J. B. Cutburt, J. M. Weeks, D. W. McDonald and wife, Mrs. M. E. T. McDonald, and the unknown heirs, legal representatives, legatees and devisees of each of the above named deceased, all deceased, are defendants, said petition alleging substantially as follows: That the plaintiff resides at Mills county, Texas, but that the names of the unknown heirs, legal representatives, legatees and devisees of each of the above named defendants deceased as well as the place of residence of the above named defendants is unknown to plaintiff.

That heretofore, to wit, on or about the 20th day of January, 1918, the plaintiff was and now is legally and lawfully seized and possessed of the tract of land hereinafter described, holding the same in fee simple; that on the day and year last aforesaid, the defendants entered upon said premises and ejected the plaintiff therefrom, and unlawfully withhold from the plaintiff the possession thereof to his damage in the sum of \$1000; that the premises so entered upon and unlawfully withheld from the plaintiff are described as follows, to wit:

Plaintiff further alleges that he and those whose estate he has, claiming to have good and perfect title to the above described land and premises, now have and have had peaceable and adverse possession of the same, cultivating, using and enjoying the same, and by actual enclosure for a period of more than ten years next after the defendants' cause of action accrued and before the commencement of this suit.

And for further cause of action herein plaintiff says that he, claiming the said land under a deed duly registered, has had peaceable, continuous and adverse possession of the land and tenements claimed herein, cultivating, using and enjoying the same, and paying all taxes thereon of a period of more than five years after the defendants' cause of action accrued, if any, and before the commencement of this suit, and of this he is ready to verify.

Plaintiff further alleges that the exact nature extent and character of the defendants' claim to the above described land and premises is unknown to plaintiff.

Plaintiff prays that the defendants, and each of them, be cited to answer the petition filed herein, and that upon trial hereof he have judgment against each and all of the defendants herein, jointly and severally, for the title and possession of the above described land and premises, and for his writ of possession to the same, and for decree establishing and quieting his title thereto, and that all clouds cast upon his title to said land by reason of defendants' claim or claims thereto be removed, and for such other and further relief to which he may be entitled in law and equity.

Herein fail not, but have before said court on the first day of the next term thereof, this writ with your return thereon, showing how you have executed the same.

AN IDLE DOLLAR IS KAISER'S ALLY

WAR SAVINGS STAMPS ARE TWO-FOLD—TEACH THRIFT AND HELP NATION TO SUPPLY HER NEEDS.

Mr. Frank Vanderlip, Chairman of the War Savings Committee, said in his Dallas address: "There are just three things you can do with a dollar: you can hoard it; you can spend it, or you can invest it. We are beginning to understand that we have a personal responsibility, every man, every woman, and every child, to help win the war. Now what are these War Savings Stamps? They are little things; they cost a quarter, or \$4.12, and we expect to raise \$2,000,000,000 from them—the greatest financial transaction ever carried through in this country. Few subjects outside the war interest the general public at this time and newspaper publishers are giving place to war reports and war articles in preference to all other matter. They know what the people want.

The next Red Cross drive is scheduled for May and the people will be enlisted much more easily at that time than they were in the former drive, for they understand the matter better and are in reality more interested.

It is claimed that the Germans have bombarded the city of Paris with guns from a distance of 76 miles. This seems unreasonable but no nearer location could be determined and military authorities the world over are unable to believe the report.

Americans have taken a conspicuous part in the war operations in Europe the past week and several of the official statements from the enemy announced that the Americans were "recognized" in the battlefield. They will be recognized more and more as the war progresses and their number increases on the other side.

It is right and proper to talk patriotic, but it is far more important to act that way. The Thrift stamp campaign is on and Mills county should do her full part. In order for this to be possible every citizen must do his part in buying the stamps. Aside from performing a patriotic duty it is a good investment. The boy scouts, any bank or postoffice can supply you with the stamps you want to buy.

The growing of castor beans is a simple operation and a good yield is certain under normal conditions. Any soil that will grow a good crop of corn is suitable for growing a crop of castor beans and the planting and cultivation is quite similar. Harvesting and preparing the beans for market are tedious and expensive operations. Enough beans should be grown, and will be under government requirements to supply oil for aeroplanes and other demands. The demand outside of the government's needs is restricted, and during past years buyers have been confined almost exclusively to St. Louis, Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas have grown castor beans in past years extensively, and the amount grown has always met any profitable demand—Ferna and Ranch.

Governor Hobby signed the woman's suffrage act at 3:10 Tuesday afternoon and the women of Texas will be qualified electors in all primary elections in this state after ninety days, which will enable them to vote in the primary in July. The fact of women voting is new experience to this state, but in many of the states they have been voting for years, and why not? They must pay taxes and obey the laws the same as the men and they certainly should be given an equal opportunity to elect the officers who enforce the laws and collect the taxes. There are many other reasons for women being allowed to vote, but these are two good ones. True, the statute does not allow them to vote in the general election, for the good and sufficient reason that a constitutional amendment will be necessary to allow them the privilege of the general election, but in Texas nominations are equivalent to elections, so they will have a part in selecting the officers for the same.

MAGIC MESSAGE SENT BY RED CROSS WORKER BRINGS SOLDIER CHEER

A striking example of the mingled pathos and service of the American Red Cross for soldiers in the camps is related in a letter from T. T. Flagler, field director of the Southern Division, Atlanta, Ga., to Henry S. Thompson, director of the Bureau of Camp Service, Washington.

An extract from Flagler's letter follows:

"I was alone in the office one afternoon, trying to burn anthracite coal in a wood stove, when there was a knock on the door and out of the rain, sleet and snow came one of the best-looking types of American manhood I have seen in some time. He was of striking appearance and a bad cough which he had and the paleness of his face showed that he was convalescent. He brought a note from his commanding officer stating that the bearer was a motorcycle rider and was just getting over the grip and was very much in need of knitted articles.

"I took the man down to the warehouse, and on the way down he mentioned that several sweaters he had seen had cards on them giving the name of the woman who had knitted them, and asked me if I couldn't get him a sweater with such a card on it, as he wanted to write a letter of thanks.

"On entering the warehouse it chanced that the first sweater I picked up had stitched to it a little blank-bordered card bearing the name and address of the woman and in a little, thin, shaky hand the following words:

"I am 71 years old, and God bless you, boy."

"When the soldier saw the little card he gathered up his helmet, wristlets, muffler and sweater, and his eyes were actually filled with tears as he turned to me and said, 'Isn't that splendid? That is just what I wanted!'"

Red Cross is Backing Italy.

That the American Red Cross War Council will assist in re-equipping field hospitals in Italy, many of which were lost or damaged in the retreat of the Italian army, is the information contained in a telegram to the headquarters of the Southwestern Division, American Red Cross, at St. Louis, from Henry P. Davison, chairman of the Red Cross Council.

Dr. Tallaferra Clark Appointed. Through the assignment of the surgeon-general, Dr. Tallaferra Clark has been appointed director of the Bureau of Sanitary Services of the American Red Cross. Dr. Clark succeeds Past Assistant Surgeon Paul Preble.

Service Which Saves Lives.

Nothing illustrates better what the Red Cross means to the soldiers in the Southwestern camps and cantonments than an occurrence at Camp Bowie, Fort Worth, Tex. When the December blizzard struck the camp it found the men unprepared for it. One thousand soldiers fell ill in 24 hours. More than 2,000 were ill 72 hours after the blizzard hit. Many of them were threatened with pneumonia. Many had pneumonia. There was insufficient bedding. The government was unable to take care of the situation. Charles W. Connery, field director for the Red Cross at Camp Bowie, bought every blanket he could get in Fort Worth and other Texas cities and wired Red Cross headquarters at St. Louis for more. Within 48 hours after the blizzard struck, Connery turned over 20,000 blankets to the commandant of the camp, without any cost to the government whatever. Undoubtedly this quick work saved the lives of many soldiers.

That is the sort of work the Red Cross is doing for 350,000 American soldiers in the Southwestern camps and cantonments, likewise in every camp and cantonment in the United States. That is how money given to the Red Cross is spent in military relief.

Shopping Personally Conducted.

The American soldier in France is a good fighting man. But when he faces the French shopkeeper—that quick-tongued, sharp-eyed little woman who keeps the till as full as she can while her husband fights, he is glad enough to have an American woman beside him. So the Red Cross women at the line-of-communication canteens have a new job. They take the boys out shopping.

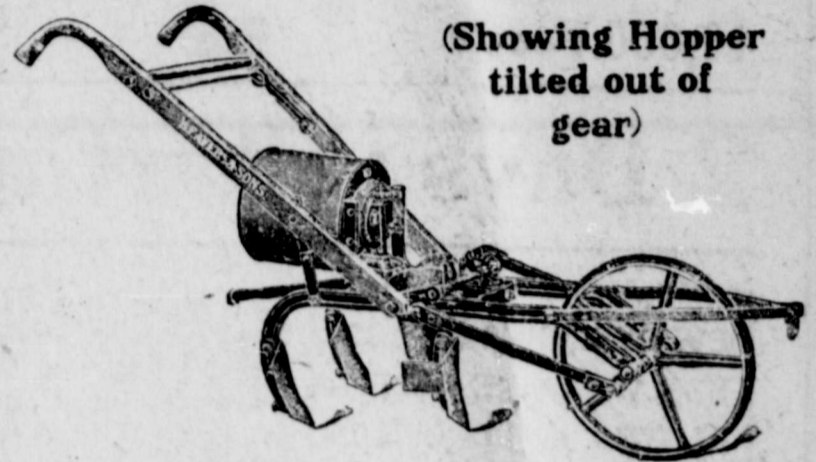
