Opening Remarks

In the last issue of the "Mullin Enterprise" is made what might charitably be taken as an effort to say something harsh or funny (we hardly know which) concerning the Eagle, because the Eagle published the proceedings of the commissioners court.

Just why the Lick-Spittle Extraordinary of the "court" thought it improper or a subject for comment that a county paper should publish the proceedings of a body of men who, for the time being, have the power of dealing with the tax matters of the county, is inexplicable to a man who has been in the newspaper business for the "twenty-five years" with which the L. S. E. twits us. Perhaps it is because some member or members of the court objected to the proceedings being made known to the public. Of course, we have no way of knowing if that is the reason. At any rate, the "official organ" of the court made no mention of the proceedings of its own volition. There is every reason why a newspaper designated as the "organ" should report the proceedings of the "court" which appoints it and pays its bills out of the tax-money of the county, but for some reason the "organ" failed to give such report. If it has come to a pass that the taxpayers of Mills county are to get no report of the proceedings of the commissioners court of the county, we think that fact should be made known. If, in making such publication, we have offended the "organ" or its masters, the lid is off.

The feeling of the Eagle, which the Enterprise designates as "peevish" is probably the exact feeling we have—along with a vast majority of the tax-payers of the county. The action of that "court" in refusing the Eagle payment of an account justly and honestly due by the county may be said to be a personal matter between the members of the "court" and the Eagle, but that any citizen would suffer that injustice without a feeling of "soreness" is hardly reasonable to suppose. And the boycott of the business of this paper ordered by a public "court" which is supported by the editor along with other tax-payers is not an act calculated to put one in a pleasant humor. That this boycott was ordered because the editor of this paper favored a road law that would have put the county road building under the supervision of a specialist in that work, is not

The Eyes of Texas Are Upon You!

To the Women of Texas:

The eyes of Texas are upon the women of the state. Theirs is the privilege and the duty to elect a governor who stands for the best ideals of the people and the welfare of the state.

We have worked for the right to participate in the election of the men who control the policies, enact and enforce the laws of our state. We now have that privilege. It carries with it serious responsibilities. Especially is this true when we are faced with the knowledge that opposed to the governor who is responsible for our enfranchisement are the combined forces that have fought the political freedom, protection and advancement of women. We know from our own experience how strong is the organized liquor traffic and its allied interests. We know how bitterly they resent the laws that Governor Hobby was instrumental in securing for the protection of the state, the army and the homes of Texas. We know, too, how industriously they are working against him, seeking to overthrow him and all the good laws that he has been instrumental in having enacted. Let us prove worthy of our responsibility.

So that the record may be kept straight, let it be known that Governor Hobby, when he entered politics in 1914, declared himself in favor of suffrage for women. He has consistently preserved that attitude against the wishes of some of his best friends and close advisers. He stood for what he believed to be right and just and today it is in our power to justify his belief in our ideals and our standards.

Mr. Ferguson's opposition to suffrage and his action in fighting that measure at the Democratic National Convention at St. Louis in 1916 are matters well known to the women of Texas.

Governor Hobby is responsible for some of the most progressive legislation ever placed upon the statute books of any state. The zone law, the prohibition law, the primary suffrage law, the alien law, the literacy law, the delinquency law, the vice bills, the age of consent law and the educational laws for the benefit of the schools, all passed at the recent special session, are measures in which every woman in Texas is vitally interested. Shall we preserve these laws and re-elect the man who advocated and assisted in their passage?

It has come to me that those opposed to Governor Hobby are seeking to mislead women who are not well informed on these matters in an endeavor to prevent his receiving the unanimous support of the women. I believe that these efforts will be in vain. I have a feeling in the intel-

been my belief in their integrity and intelligence and their sense of justice and right that has caused me to work for the laws giving them the rights they now possess. I know that they will prove true to the ideals for which they stand, to the principles of political integrity, honesty and civic duty which they wish their children to follow. I know that they will vote for clean politics, clean government, the continuation of prohibition and good morals, for the elimination of the liquor traffic and the vice interests—that THEY WILL VOTE FOR HOBBY.

The women of Texas are more concerned with what a man is and how he has fulfilled a public trust than the technicalities of an impeachment proceeding. It is not whether the legislature had the authority under the constitution to declare Mr. Ferguson guilty, but that Mr. Ferguson is guilty of acts that render him unworthy of public trust and confidence. The misappropriation of public funds, the violation of state banking laws, the \$156,000 currency which he refused to account for, the unlawful handling of state funds, the use of public funds to pay his personal obligations, the appropriation of escrow money deposited in his bank to his personal use and his refusal to return it, his attempts to influence the supreme court and the court of civil appeals at Beaumont in his own behalf and his vetoing an act of the legislature increasing the salary of the supreme court judges, when they refused to be coerced by him—these are the matters that women are concerned with.

The women of Texas will not be misled or deceived. They know well how hard has been the fight to eliminate liquor and how difficult it has been to secure legislation regulating the saloon and its allied connections. Women will question closely any falsehoods that may be circulated to mislead them. Women will vote July 27th. They will vote for prohibition, for good morals, for honesty and integrity in high office, for loyal support of the government, for the protection of the nation, the army, the home and the children. They will vote unanimously for HOBBY. They will justify their enfranchisement and they will bury in oblivion those interests that have so long endangered not only their own lives and homes but the very foundation of a free state and a free people. LIFE OF CHILD IN LIFE OF MILK

Now Is the Time to Make Use of a Food Made Abundant by Green Fields and Ripening Grain—No "Little One" Should Be Stinted of Its Milk Ration—Germany Saves Her Children by Saving Her Milk for Their Use; SO MUST WE.

The Food Administration desires to secure economy in the consumption of all kinds of meats without the reinstating of the Meatless Day. There is now an abundance of milk products which can well be substituted in various forms for meat.

If less milk is used, less milk will be produced. Farmers will be obliged to sell their dairy cattle because of the high cost of feeding them, and the failure to find a market for the product, and this country will face the same conditions from which the people of Europe are now suffering. Milk is a cheap animal food. There is at the present time a surplus of both cheese and butter. If they are not used an important outlet for surplus milk has been moved and milk production will diminish.

Where possible, provision should be made to supply each child in the family with a quart of clean, wholesome milk a day. For each adult a pint is desirable when the meat consumption is low. Children should have whole milk, adults may use milk and cheese in place of meat. The present prices of butter have made many families refrain from using it. Those who are able to purchase it should do so. Unless all members of the family are using whole milk, they need some butter in the diet. If the family must economize, the amount of butter may be reduced, but the amount of milk should be correspondingly increased to secure the right total of the fat of soluble growth-promoting substances. The use of butter and cheese should be encouraged since the storage of milk in these forms is an important method of conserving an unmarketable surplus of this food. E. A. PEDEN,

TEN INSPECTORS AND THREE THRESHERMEN ADDED TO FOOD STAFF.

The inspectors of the State Food and Drug Department have been placed at the disposition of the Federal Food Administration for Texas, and in ten inspectors have been officially deputized by the Food Administration to check up on food sales over the State. These ten inspectors plus the agents of the Department of Justice who are continually at the disposal of the Food Administration gives to the State Administrator a splendid nucleus for this department of the State work.

SIDEWALK AND RAILROAD TRACK JOBBERS MUST BE LICENSED.

The attention of the Federal Food Administrator has been called to the fact that in some and probably all of the cities of Texas parties are engaged in the business of buying up rejected shipments of commodities, or buying directly from producers, and selling the same to retailers on sidewalks or the railroad tracks.

All persons so engaged are jobbers, the Administration announces, and if the commodity handled is one licensed under the president's proclamation such handling can not be legally done without a license issued by the United States Food Administration. Those who contemplate continuing or engaging in such business practice hereafter will do well to apply immediately to the License Division of the U. S. Food Administration at Washington for a license.

Anyone engaging hereafter in such a business without having previously obtained or applied for a license will be liable to criminal prosecution of a serious character.

Khaki colored cloth will not be available for the use of civilians in future, the cloth manufacturers having received an order to that end from the war department.

The Italians have been giving a good account of themselves of late. In fact, all of the allied nations have been strengthened and encouraged by the knowledge that America's mighty forces are with them and the unlimited resources of this nation are behind them.

Heavy rains in the panhandle country the first of the week resulted in much damage in some localities. At Clarendon there was a "cloudburst" and some of the houses in the low lands were demolished. A washout on the Denver railroad caused the death of three trainmen when their train ran into it.

Director General McAdoo has authorized a 25 per cent increase in freight rates, effective June 25 and passenger fare increased to 3 cents per mile in sections where it is below that rate. The increase in rates was made necessary largely by the increase in wages of railroad employes recently granted.

The sinking of an American vessel by a German submarine is always a matter for regret, but each occurrence of the kind makes the American soldier more determined to take Berlin and mete out just punishment to those responsible for the terrible outrages and make a repetition of this war impossible.

One express company will be operated in the United States after July 1, in lieu of the many companies now operating. The new company will be operated under government supervision, but will be a corporation with a capital of thirty million dollars. A great saving in the matter of operating expenses will be made by the combination.

So liberal was the response of the people of America to the call of the Red Cross for one hundred million dollars that the grand total will reach almost double the amount asked. Nothing could more clearly demonstrate the patriotism and determination of the people than their ready and liberal response to this call. A people with that spirit can never be defeated.

When the law was enacted allowing women to vote many people believed and stated that but few women would go into the primary. This idea has now been proved erroneous by the number of political organizations formed by the ladies and their increased interest in governmental affairs. Indications are that they will be united in their efforts for improvement and reformation.

The federal congress will not likely take a summer vacation until the latter part of August, if in fact a vacation is taken at all this year. The continuous session is made necessary by the war conditions and the need for much legislation on revenue plans and other matters. Members of congress will not, therefore, be as accustomed to the inactivity in the main they have experienced in the past. The people are not very much political.

NEW U. S. RULES ON COMMERCIAL FISHING GIVEN

Local Restrictions Generally Removed; Seining Authorized Without Regard to State's Closed Season.



With the new rules and regulations governing the Fish Industry of America, guaranteeing freedom of movement and production to the fisherman and the distributor, and lifting many restrictions and hardships which served to paralyze the industry, Texas should from now on have an abundance of good sea-food at a reasonable price.

All distributors have been notified by Administrator Peden to submit at once a schedule of costs and quantities of fish handled. Every effort is to be put forth to secure a stabilization of prices and to free the market of the speculative influences which too frequently made Texas fish cheaper in St. Louis and Kansas City than in San Antonio or Dallas.

All dealers and all fishermen are required under the rules and regulations to have license, which may be secured from the License Division at Washington free of cost. Failure to comply with the rules and regulations, or proof of speculation, eliminates automatically the fish dealer or fisherman from the field of fish production.

Dealers are required to submit address and change of address; to make reports under oath when requested; to be prepared at all time for inspection; to eliminate all waste, or suffer penalization if they fail to do so; they are forbidden to enter into fishing arrangements with persons or firms not holding license; only wholesome seafood will be shipped; containers not full must be so labeled; willful violation of contracts are forbidden; every effort must be put forth to market all seafood taken; damage to gear and equipment is forbidden.

The Federal law replaces the State law with the one exception: fishing is not to be followed by the use of seines at channels connecting one body of water with another. All persons fishing and selling fish must be licensed.



NEW MEAT PROGRAM CALLS FOR ECONOMY

The new meat program of the United States Food Administration does not contemplate a definite quantity of meat per person, and through an inaccuracy in transcribing the telegram from Washington the phrase was used that the "ration would be one and a quarter pounds per person per week," whereas the statement should have read that the present meat ration in France and England is one and one-quarter pounds of meat a week.

In deciding upon a program of retrenchment in the consumption of meat the United States Food Administration does not include "Meatless Days," but it puts it up to every American to cut down his meat consumption and that of his family:

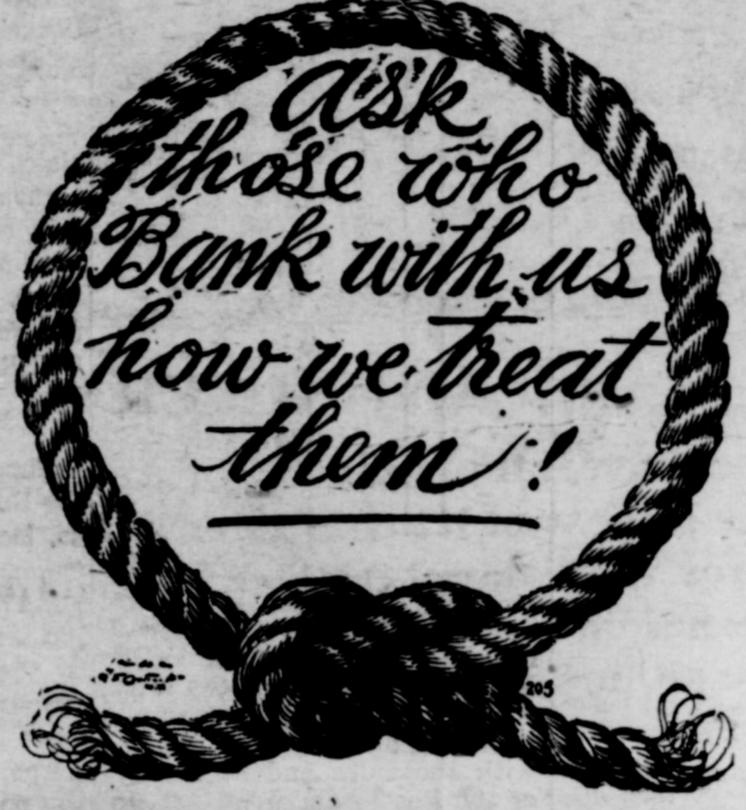
- First: By eliminating every ounce of waste.
- Second: By curtailing purchases and buying more closely.
- Third: By serving smaller portions.

Facts in a Nut-Shell

These are days of co-operation, organization and team work.

GOOD NEWS

Because S. Friedlander of Tyler, Texas, a merchant, refused to handle promptly a carload of meal purchased by him, the United States Food Administration has issued an "UNFAIR ORDER" directed to all wholesalers and other licensees, forbidding them to sell licensed commodities to Friedlander for a period beginning May 15, 1918, and extending to June 15, 1918.

For selling flour in excessive quantities, the Worth Milling Company at Ft. Worth, Texas, has lost its Food Administration license.

The decision of the Division of Enforcement is that the mill will be allowed to apply for a new license after June 15, if in the meantime it follows the Food Administration's program, and that its officers are familiar with the rules and regulations of the Food Administration and of the Grain Corporation.

Because of his selling, holding and dealing wrongfully in and with food necessities, L. A. Bletch, a merchant at Otto, Texas, has had all supplies to him from wholesalers and jobbers suspended for a period beginning with May 15th and extending to the 13th day of July, 1918.

The grocery store conducted by Max Gott at 1102 Colorado Street has been ordered closed by the representatives of the Food Administration for alleged violation of the prohibition against the sale of flour on wheatless day. Two other charges were also made against the grocer. One is the failure to observe the rule for closing at 7 o'clock and the other is the disregard of prices promulgated by the price interpreting committee. The action will be taken and the papers are to be forwarded to E. A. Peden, Federal Food Administrator of Texas.

Three Houston, two San Antonio and one Victoria restaurants have been penalized by the Federal Food Administration for Texas because of failure to comply with the rules and regulations, each instance being a case of a use of too much sugar and wheat flour in service. The Houston restaurants are:

In each case of a sustained proof of violation, notice that offense has been made against the Food Administration is posted both on the outside and the inside of the public eating place, until its removal is authorized by the local administrator.

The wheatless period for Texas has been extended from June 1 to the next harvest, due to the fact that the shortage of wheat has become so acute that the National Government must use every conservation measure in order to secure sufficient wheat to meet the European demands. In replying to U. S. Food Administrator Hoover's query if Texas would remain wheatless until the harvest, Administrator Peden for Texas replied:

"Complying with your message I am requesting all district and county administrators to explain situation and feel safe in assuring you TEXAS will cheerfully continue on wheatless basis until next crop. Our people genuinely enjoy making this sacrifice for our allies and our boys OVER THERE.

"PEDEN."

Superintendent Mark Riley of the Bureau of Fisheries for Texas, located at San Marcos, says emphatically that PORPOISE MEAT is highly palatable and has begun a campaign, backed by the Food Administration, to encourage the use of porpoise meat as a beef substitute. The purpose of the campaign is not to popularize porpoise meat, which centuries ago was considered a rare viand, but to give the people, the every day folks, a chance to live. With beef at 35 cents a pound and over, beef eating is beyond the hope of the average, and with many has become a lost art. Porpoise meat has the appearance of venison, the flavor of veal and is the flesh of a fish abundant on the Texas coast.

James N. Darrow, representative of the Federal Food Administration for Texas to the onion growers of the Rio Grande, in a recent report to Administrator Peden, states that because of the Government's assistance in marketing and distributing the onion crop for 1918, the grower who had no expectation of more than 65 cents a crate for his onions has received from \$1.00 to \$1.10; and as a consequence the administration has every assurance that the 18,000 acres planted in onions will be immediately planted in other feed and food crops.

There will be no waste in sugar during 1918, nor extravagant use in non-essentials. The United State Food Administration has placed the manufacturer using sugar on a ration basis in order to make certain sufficient sugar to take care of the housewife in her summer program of preserving fruits. The housewife may buy all the sugar she requires for this purpose by submitting statement to her grocer. Nor does the ration plan to the manufacturer affect the home. Sugar may be bought by the consumer in towns and cities in 5-pound packages, and in rural districts in 10-pound packages. The ration, or basis of a ration, still remains 3 pounds per person per month, and all serving should be on this basis.

Waste of Food

Threatens Disaster to Individual and Ruin to Nation.

(By E. A. Peden, Texas Food Administrator)



There can be no higher consecration of the American citizen who is not actually engaged in serving the colors than a genuine response to the cause of food saving.

Enough movements have been started. The thing now needed is team work to finish what has been begun. Food saving takes second to no issue, unless it is the issue of the men in arms. All the wealth in the world is no wealth if there is no food; and no front can be held and no battles be fought, unless there is food to sustain the men who shoot the guns, throw the grenades, make the dash over the top and across no man's land.

The rise and fall of ministries, the sinking of transports, the devastation of communities through epidemics and fires—all are recollected with tragedy that staggers the imagination.

But let there be an absence of bread, a restriction of sugar beyond what the body needs and craves; let the meat ration shift to a grain diet; let hunger become rampant and famine pregnant, and there is no calamity so great, so awesome, so appalling.

If there is to be a sporadic saving of food and not a constant one, just so much has the enemy been aided. To deny oneself of staples needed by the allies and our own men in arms, is not a sacrifice, but an opportunity to be of real service.

If there are the thoughtless and the heedless, let them now be appraised of an attitude, not dissimilar to an alien who openly espouses the cause of the Vaterland, the business of adapting oneself to substitute foods is not recommended, it is imperative.

Let there be no minimizing of the part that the housewife plays in her kitchen. Her work is now as sacred as that of the priest at the altar.

Let there be no minimizing of the war menus in hotel, restaurant, Pullman dining car and boarding house; it is the performance of a fine duty in a fine and splendid way.

Let there be no hesitancy in learning to say: I will do with less sweet; I will do with less meat; I will do with less wheat bread; I will gladly eat of the bread of the corn; I will be less of the fats which is the body fat of the armies; I will henceforth think in terms of business, nation, and no longer in terms of myself. I will tell you, I will petition the people of Texas to come dealer hood of what is needed of them; to open eyes to the world situation as it now stands, and through no act of selfishness cater to the luxuries which can do no other than to impoverish the individual and ruin the nation's monwealth.

REGULATIONS ON HANDLING PERISHABLE PRODUCTS



In carrying out a plan for marketing, handling, sale, and distribution of all perishable farm crops in this State, the Food

Administration, in co-operation with the Bureau of Markets of the United States Department of Agriculture, the Bureau of Markets of the Texas Department of Agriculture, and the Western Weighing and Inspection Bureau, desires to call the attention of dealers, handlers and shippers of perishable farm products to the necessity of conforming to certain rules and regulations which are necessary to be enforced in minimizing the losses which have heretofore been sustained in handling perishable products.

Dealers and handlers of perishable products are expected to observe the laws, rules and regulations of the Bureau of Markets of the United States Department of Agriculture and of the Texas State Department of Agriculture, regarding grading and packing, and the instructions in braeing and loading in cars of all perishable products, unless exceptions are authorized by the Federal Food Administrator.

Dealers and handlers of perishable farm products at point of origin are required to refuse to handle culls and inferior products when loaded in cars containing superior and standardized products, as these commodities should not cumber our transportation facilities, and thus deprive superior and standardized products of the opportunity of arriving in the market in first-class condition.

All cars of perishable farm products are to be loaded under the directions and instructions of the Western Weighing and Inspection Bureau, and the inspectors of the Bureau of Markets of the State Department of Agriculture are instructed to withhold the issuing of certificates, setting forth grades of the products loaded, until he has satisfied himself that the car of produce certified to has been loaded according to the directions and instructions of the Western Weighing and Inspection Bureau; and when the inspector of the Bureau of Markets of the State Department of Agriculture issues a certificate, setting forth grade and standard of the commodities to be shipped, this certificate shall be accepted by the consignor and consignee as prima facie evidence of proper grade and quality at the time of loading.

All licensed dealers and handlers of perishable farm products of this State are expected to co-operate with the Federal Food Administrator in the compliance and enforcement of the above rules and regulations.

It is not the purpose of the above regulations to prevent the shipment of cull fruits or vegetables, but when shipped they must be shipped in separate consignments. E. A. PEDEN, Federal Food Administrator for Texas.

As Texas well knows, the East Texas peach crop is usually a "bumdinger." 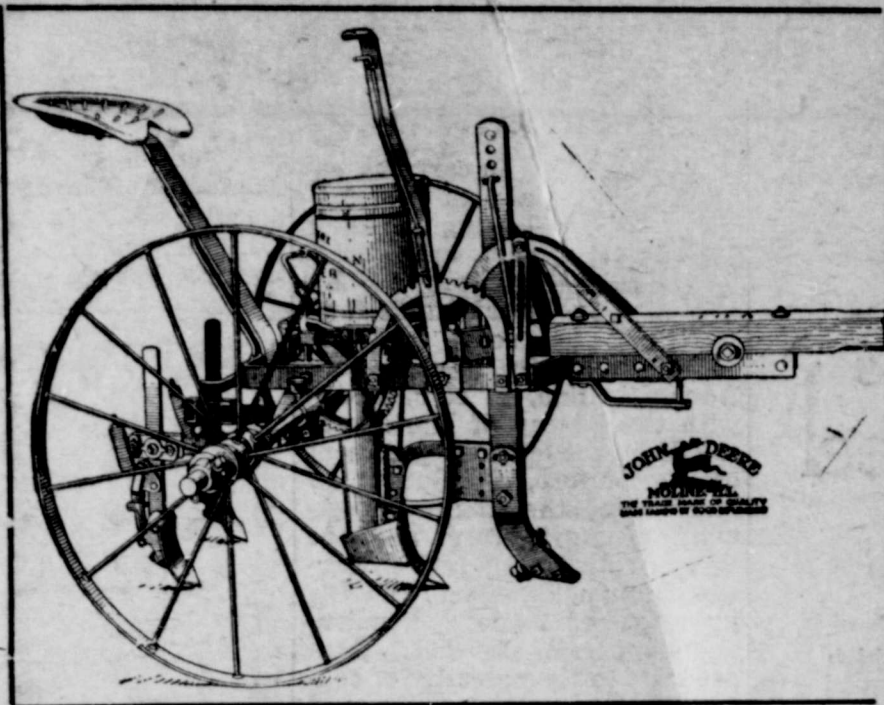

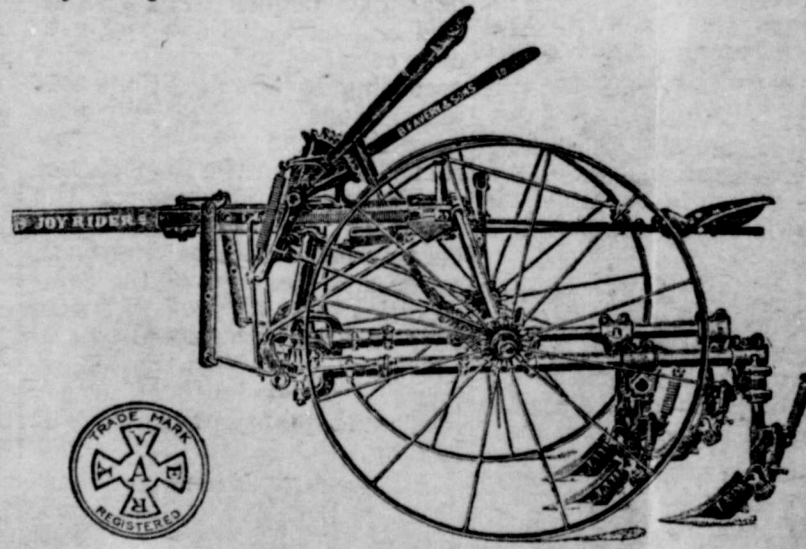
