The War Industries Board has issued an order that all papers to subscribers must be discontinued at the expiration of the time paid for, and in no case can the paper be continued to an address where the subscription is more than 3 months over-due. There is no option given the publishers in the matter and those refusing to obey the rule will not be permitted to purchase news print on which to print their papers. The rule is in effect now and the Eagle, like other publications, must put it into operation. Our subscription list is being checked as rapidly as possible and after this week no paper will be sent in violation of the rule. Subscribers who know themselves to be in arrears are urged to renew promptly. We want their patronage for many reasons and we hope no name will have to be dropped from our list because of non-payment.

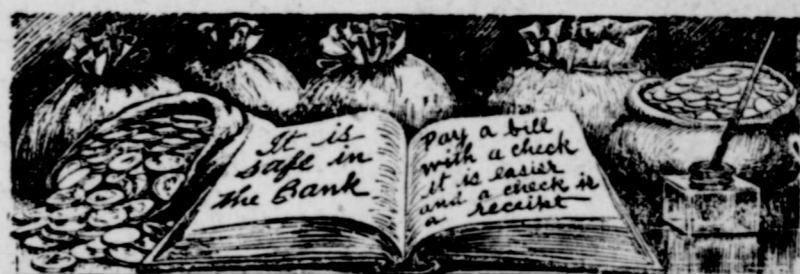

The minimum price of \$2.20 per bushel for the 1919 wheat crop has been fixed by the government.

The next campaign for Red Cross membership will begin on Dec. 16 and it is expected to enroll every person in America.

An increase in wages has been approved for a million railroad employes by Director General Adoo. The increase is from 15 to 30 per cent of the amount they now receive.

An Angelo improvement has petitioned Governor to call a special session of legislature to provide relief for drouth sufferers of the part of this state.

Reports from the western front indicate the average daily German casualty list is twenty-five thousand, against five thousand for the allies. American troops are reaching France at the rate of ten thousand a day.

The bill requiring the registration of all male citizens between 18 and 45 years of age has been signed and approved. Thursday of next week has been designated as the time for the registration. It is expected that the greater portion of the army to be raised will be in France by next June.

A very unusual railroad accident occurred on the Texarkana section of the I. & G. N. railroad today. A passenger train was derailed, a piece of the rail even tore thru the bottom of the coach and extended to the roof of the car. Only one passenger was seriously injured as a result of the accident.

A new draft system is being worked out. This is the third system to be used in getting men, each better than the former one. The new draft plan will not allow for claims for deferred classification, but under it the registrant will state all the facts about himself and then he will be classified without regard to any claim he may make. The authorities will get the "dope" on all registrants and classify them and call them by class. This plan is well framed. —Comanche Chief.

The war industries board has promulgated an order that all publications must discontinue papers to subscribers who are more than 3 months in arrears with their subscription. Papers of more than 8 pages must reduce 10 per cent. This order is a war measure, but it will not be surprising should the postoffice department make the order permanent and the publishers will be benefitted if it is done, for the paying subscriber will have no objection to paying promptly and the fellow who takes the paper from the postoffice for years and when called on for the amount due declares he paid 25 cents at the beginning and thought the paper was paid for up to the date the bill was received, will cease to be a subject for complaint.

The campaign for the Fourth Liberty Loan begins September 28 and closes October 19. While the amount has not yet been announced, it is generally conceded it will be for a larger amount than any of the preceding loans. The American people, therefore, are called upon to raise a larger sum of money in a shorter length of time than ever before. There is need, therefore, for prompt action—prompt and efficient work and prompt and liberal subscriptions. We have a great inspiration for a great effort. The news of the battle front inspires American heart, not only of the individual but of the nation as a whole. There is no shirk-ness by the people in France; they are here.

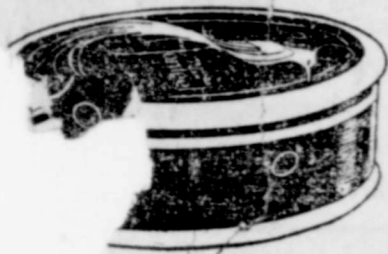

### Laborers Notice

In Mills county is an organized labor board, known as the Community Labor Board. This board is operating under the instructions of the Department of Labor, U. S. Public Service Reserve.

It is the duty of this body to enroll every laborer in this county and secure work for him. He will know where he will find work and what the pay will be before he leaves home, and is requested to leave his women folk at home to look after home duties until his return to begin another crop. Every man engaged in such work as is non-essential to the advancement of the war is requested to apply for government work. Do not leave the county without enrolling with this board.

The labor board hereby adopts the following resolution:

The undermentioned industries are non-essential to war work, to-wit: Auto industries and accessories; sight-seeing cars; drivers of pleasure cars; cleaning, repairing and delivery of same; auto trucks engaged in work other than fuel or government work; teaming, other than delivery of products for war work; candy manufacturing; tobacco and cigars; confectionery and delicatessen establishments; dyers and cleaners; bottle supplies and bottlers; builders and contractors not engaged in war work; bath and barber shop attendants; dancing academies; mercantile stores; clubs; livery and sales stables; fruit stands and florists; peanut vendors; bowling alleys, billiard and pool rooms; shoe shining; window cleaning; junk dealers; soft drink establishments; soda fountain supplies.

The Community Labor Board for Mills county is composed of the following: E. O. Priddy, chairman, Goldthwaite; D. L. Lanford, employers; G. W. Jackson, labor; R. B. Weaver, chairmen of enrollment officers. Enrollment officers: R. Robertson, Goldthwaite; G. W. Tippen, Ebony; J. W. McNeal, Caradan; D. A. Hamilton and Rev. J. T. Weems, Mullin.
