DRILLING PROGRESSING WITH MIGHTY GOOD PROSPECTS

Developments Have Given Great Confidence In the Future of the Field.

The developments in the Mills county oil field have been more encouraging this week than at any time since development was begun a year ago.

At a number of the wells fine indications are reported and new contracts are in prospect for additional wells. At least one new rig is on the way and many new wells will be "spudded in" before the lapse of any considerable time.

The knowing ones—visitors and local people—are confident in their opinion that the Mills county field will prove to be one of the most valuable in America.

The hour for meeting was fixed at 8:30 p. m. the first Monday night in each month.

BAD STORM AT MULLIN

Heavy Property Loss But No Serious Personal Injuries.

Some Narrow Escapes By Citizens—Many Were Not Injured—Crash—Local Matters of Interest.

A severe storm passed through Northern Texas, Southern Oklahoma and a portion of Arkansas Tuesday night, doing great damage. The total number of people killed will probably reach 100 and the property loss is enormous.

The storm took somewhat the form of a cyclone when it struck the town of Mullin at about 12:10 Wednesday morning. It struck in the western part of town, passing directly across and doing great property damage. There was no loss of life at Mullin, however, but there were some narrow escapes. Jack McNeil, night operator for the West Texas Telephone exchange, was somewhat bruised when the front end of the building fell. Prof. Robbins, superintendent of the school, was slightly hurt when his residence was wrecked, but there were no serious injuries.

The storm broke over the town so suddenly that many residents were not aware of the danger until the crashing of timbers and falling walls brought to them the fact of the severity of the storm.

A number of buildings, some of them the best in the town, were damaged seriously. Following is a list of the estimated losses and it can be depended that this is an extremely conservative estimate:

A BIG BLAZE

Oil Warehouse and Tanks Burned Other Damage

Fire at the Magnolia Petroleum Co.'s warehouse in the southern suburbs of this city Monday afternoon about 5 o'clock caused a loss to that company of about \$8000. The fire is supposed to have been started by a railroad locomotive which had been standing near the warehouse for a few moments waiting for another train to pass. A. E. Evans, Will Evans and L. E. Booker were in the warehouse and had the pump in operation unloading a tank car of gasoline, which was standing on the railroad side track, between the warehouse and the locomotive. Just as steam was turned to the engine to start the train the fire flared up inside and outside the warehouse. The clothing of the Messrs. Evans took fire and A. E. Evans was quite painfully burned on the leg and hand, but Will Evans succeeded in divesting himself of his overalls without getting burned.

It was clear from the first that the warehouse, railroad tank car and large oil tank outside could not be saved, for they were beyond the reach of the fire company's hose and the danger of an explosion made the fighting of the fire extremely hazardous. The proximity of other oil tanks and warehouses caused fear that the flames would spread, but they did not do so and the loss was confined to the Magnolia company's property.

A. E. Evans, agent for the company, says the loss includes 9000 gallons of gasoline, 6000 gallons of coal oil, besides other stock.

A wind storm swept the Burk Burnett oil field Monday, doing damage to buildings and derricks estimated at half a million dollars.

The campaign for contributions to the Jewish Welfare commission opened Sunday and is being pressed hard, especially in the larger cities.

Secretary Baker has gone to Paris to attend a meeting of the liquidating board to settle with England and France in matters of war materials.

The railroad brotherhoods and Director General Hines of the federal administration of railroads have agreed upon a new wage scale with an upward tendency, but a full report has not been given out.

The Methodist Centenary campaign was postponed to begin May 18 and continue to May 25, in order to avoid a conflict with the Victory Liberty Loan campaign. One good way for Methodists and others friendly to the cause to "kill two birds with one stone" is to buy Liberty Loan bonds and donate them to the Centenary fund. These bonds are received same as cash.

The anti-woman suffragists are preparing for a hard battle against the amendment to be voted on in Texas. Mrs. Wadsworth, president of the national society opposed to woman suffrage, has come to Texas to confer with other opponents regarding the campaign. The Eagle's guesser is working mighty well and it says the amendment will be adopted by a larger majority than the prohibition amendment.

Governor Hobby has vetoed several of the enactments of the recent legislature, but in some instances he has agreed to submit the subject for further consideration by the called session of the legislature. He disapproved of an act forbidding foreigners owning and continuing to own real estate in this state without a declaration of citizenship and also vetoed the bill allowing the prison commissioners to lease the state land for oil development, but states he favors the state doing its own prospecting.

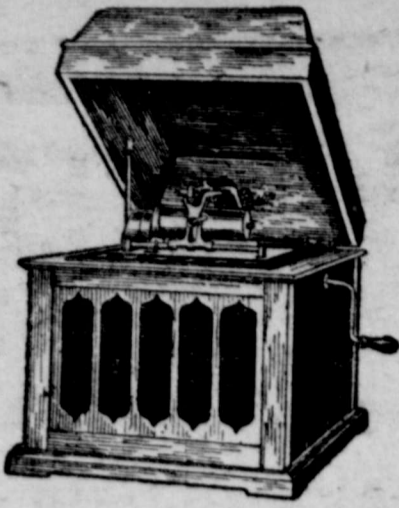

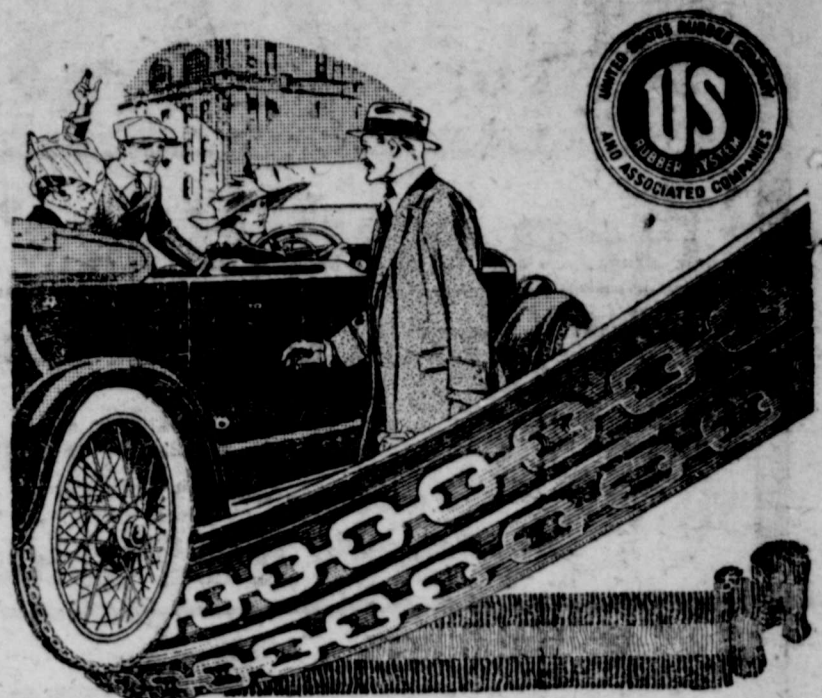

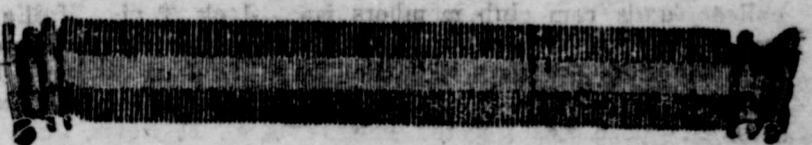
