Ready For the Rush

The Eagle is getting ready for the big influx of population, improved business conditions and increased patronage when the oil field develops and is bettering its equipment. This week a new Intertype was installed, to take the place of the Junior Linotype that served us faithfully and well when Goldthwaite was but a modest county seat town, but now that the town is advancing to the city class it is necessary for the Eagle to speed up to "high" in order to keep pace with the march of progress.

This new machine has the required speed and a capacity for a much wider range of work, all of which is necessary to handle the printing business in the new oil town. The business at present does not require the additional speed and range, but the Eagle expects great development in the next few months and is prepared to take care of any situation that may arise—the Eagle don't have to get ready, it is now prepared.

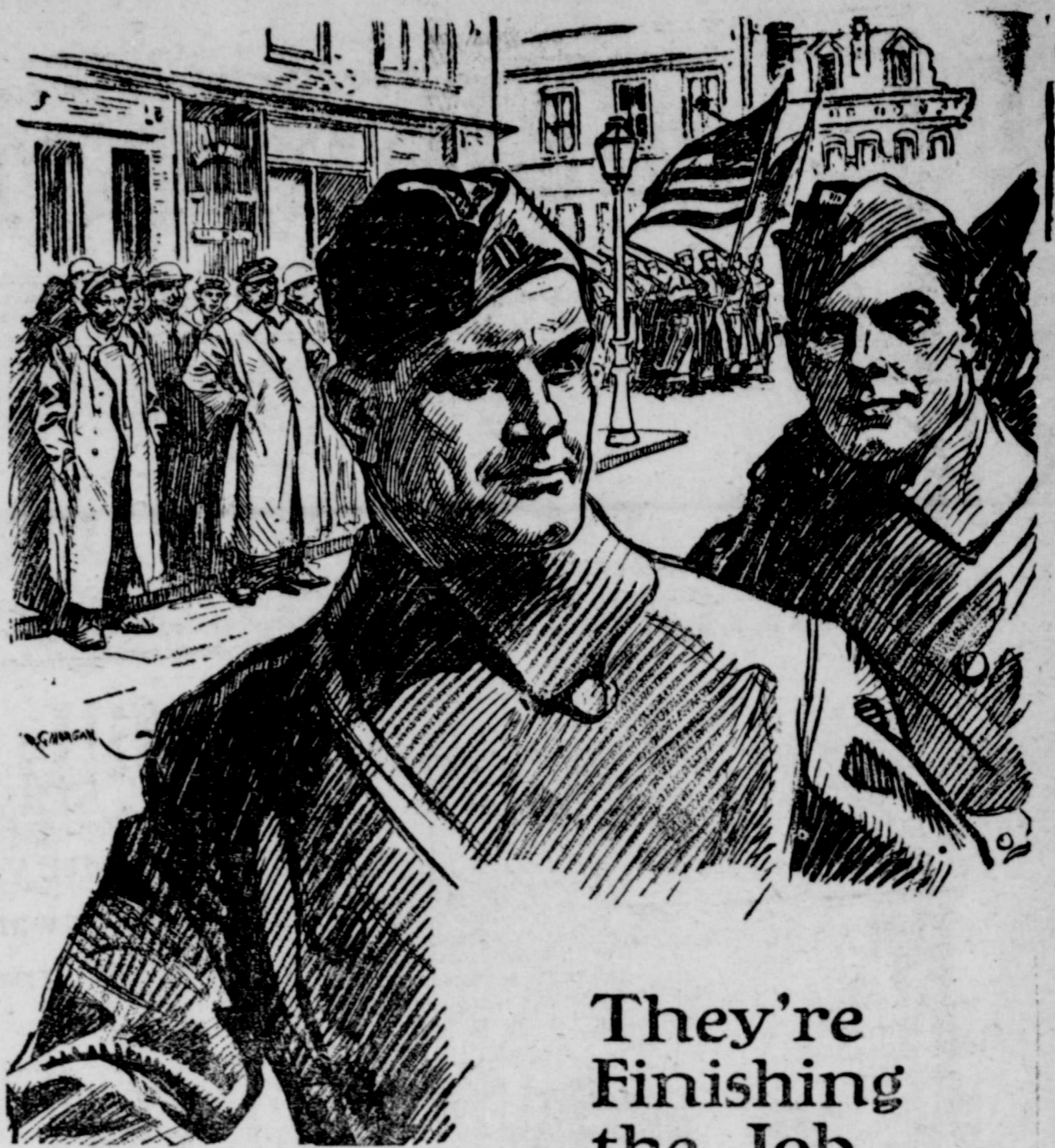

OIL DEVELOPMENT

Drilling Progressing and The Outlook Encouraging.

Knowing ones say the oil field situation of Mills county is encouraging and that progress is being made in a satisfactory manner.

There are delays in drilling that are not understood by the general public, but they are undoubtedly necessary and are to be expected, therefore, there is no need to become discouraged because drilling ceases in some well for a few days.

The Ware-Heywood company has begun the erection of the derrick on the Ware tract, in the southern part of the county, and actual drilling is to begin there about May 1. Other contracts are to be made and perhaps have been made, while the wells heretofore drilling are showing good signs of being producers.

The citizens here feel sure the time is not far distant when Mills county will be a rich oil field.

The Texas pure food department has discovered that pecan hulls are being ground and used to adulterate coffee. The department had 20,000 pounds of this mixture destroyed this week.

It is reported from Paris that President Wilson purposes to return to America the latter part of this month and that Col. House will act as his representative in the peace conference.

The Kansas pure food law which compels the manufacturer of prepared food to state on the label the amount of each ingredient the package contains has been upheld by the supreme court of that state.

The American Lumbermen in session in Chicago this week expressed the opinion that lumber prices would go higher during the coming summer. They give as a reason for the advance that cost of production has increased 217 per cent as a result of the war and other conditions.

The Victory Loan campaign opens Monday and in several communities it has been planned to put over the quota in a single day. The treasury department announces that each county's quota can be figured safely on two-thirds of the quota of the same place in the last loan.

The national good roads convention has been in session in Mineral Wells this week with representatives from several states. The plan is to have each state co-operate with national highway department in securing a road system, the building of which is to be done by contract work.

In the suit seeking an injunction from the federal court to prevent the telephone company at Houston enforcing advanced rates prescribed by Postmaster General Burleson, the injunction was refused by the court and the telephone company authorized to proceed with collection of the higher rate.

A new flying record has been made by Major McAuley of Fort Worth aviation camp, who made the trip from San Diego, Cal., to Fort Worth, a distance of 1300 miles in ten hours and ten minutes. He made the trip to the Pacific coast Sunday, but did not make such good time as he made on the return trip Tuesday.

Bishop James Atkins, chairman of the Centenary Commission of his church, was recently in France in company with other representatives of the church. The Commission stopped at Lille and found the hotel overcrowded. The Bishop had his choice between a miserable little cubby-hole at the rear of the hotel and a commodious room at the front of the hostelry, which had been occupied by the Kaiser when he was in Lille. The Bishop hesitated, but finally declared in favor of the Kaiser's apartment. He says the apartment was beautifully furnished and its appointments were complete. However, he added that he did not sleep nearly as well as one would expect of a tired Bishop in a comfortable room.—Selected.

Jim Mason and family of Vista were week end visitors with Bud Waddill. "Aunt Mollie" Queen returned home with them for a prolonged stay.

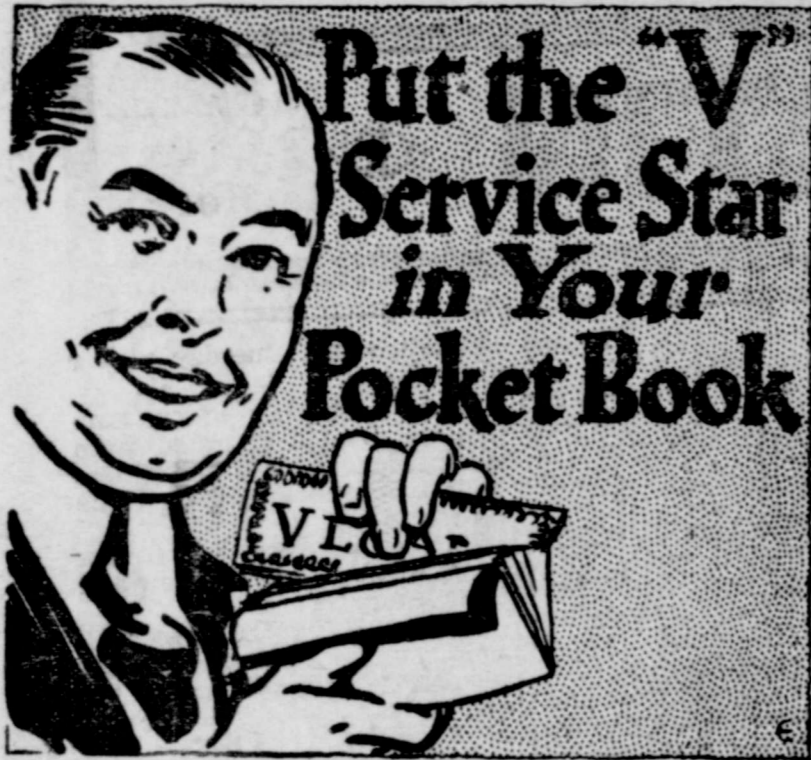
Ramsey Waddill has returned home from Sour Lake and will remain and take advantage of the fine crop prospects on the farm.

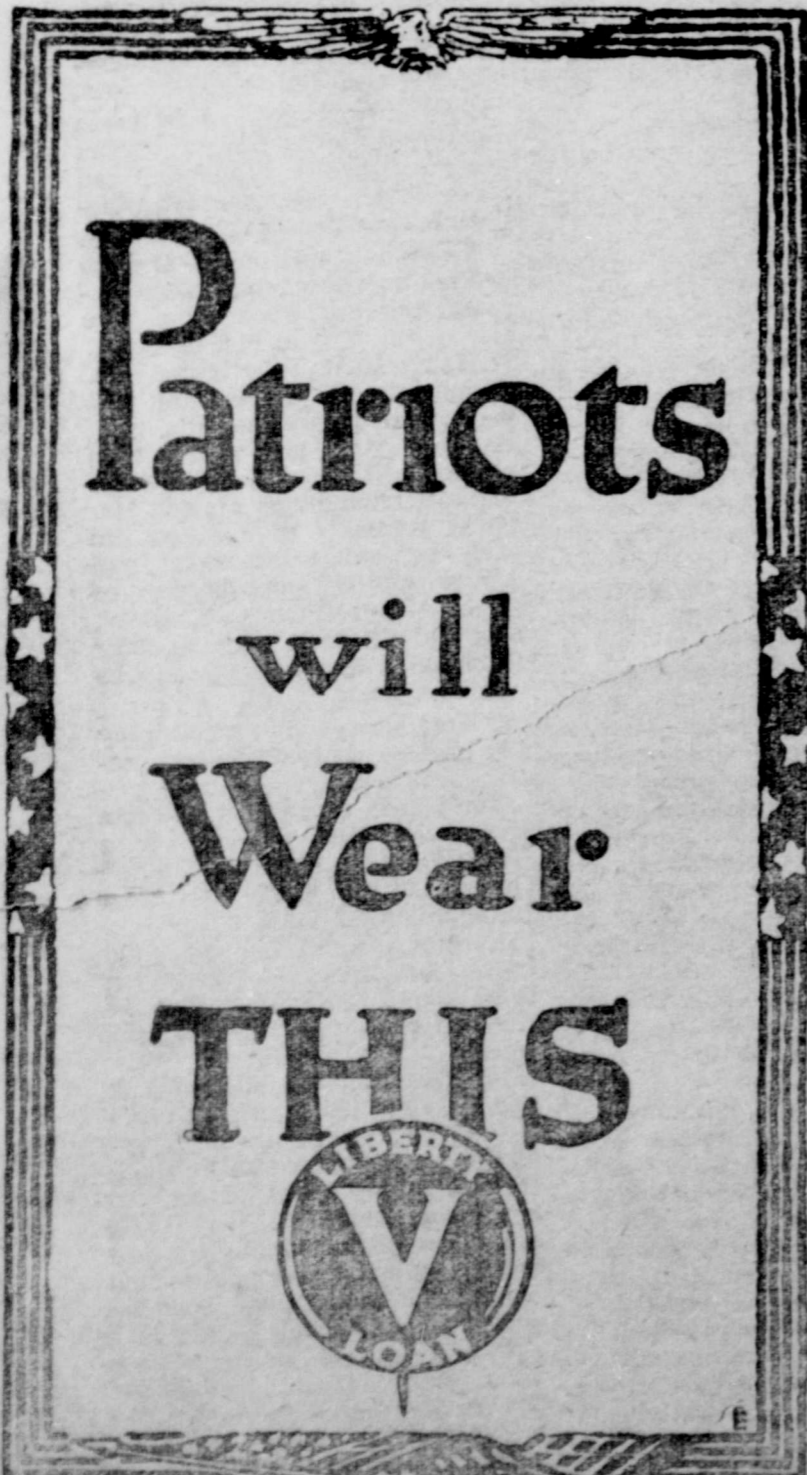

CITATION.

The State Of Texas
 To the Sheriff or Any Constable of Mills County—Greeting:

You are hereby commanded to summon Mrs. Ida Hearne by making publication of this Citation once in each week for four consecutive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your County, to appear at the next regular term of the district Court of Mills County, to be holden at the Court House thereof, in Goldthwaite, Texas, on the first Monday in May, A. D. 1919, the same being the 5th day of May, A. D. 1919, then and there to answer a petition filed in said Court on the 9th day of April, A. D. 1919, in a suit numbered on the docket of said Court No. 1858, wherein W. F. Hearne is Plaintiff, and Mrs. Ida Hearne is defendant and said petition alleging substantially as follows: That the plaintiff, W. F. Hearne, resides in Mills County, Texas, and that the defendant, Mrs. Ida Hearne, is a transient person whose residence is unknown to plaintiff.

And for cause of action herein the plaintiff represents to the court, that he is and has been for a period of more than twelve months prior to exhibiting the petition herein, an actual bona fide inhabitant of the State of Texas, and has resided in Mills County, Texas, for a period of more than six months next preceding the filing of this suit.

For further cause of action herein the plaintiff represents to the court, that he was lawfully married to defendant, a widow, then Mrs. Ida Cornelius, on Sept. 23, 1910, at Lampasas, Texas; that they continued to live together as husband and wife until on or about October, 1911, when she upon her own volition and without any cause known to plaintiff, without his consent, and against his persuasion voluntarily left and abandoned the bed and abode of the plaintiff with the intention of finally separating and living apart from him, and that she has continued so to do up to the filing of this suit.

Plaintiff further represents to the court that no children have been born to them as the fruits of said marriage; that no community property was acquired between them during their marriage; that all of the property owned by him, both real and personal, was acquired and fully paid for by him long before his marriage to defendant, and that said property was and is his personal property.

Plaintiff further alleges that during the time he and defendant lived together as aforesaid, he was kind and affectionate to her and always provided for her support and maintenance, but that the defendant, unmindful of the duties and obligations of her marital vows, voluntarily left him as above stated.

Wherefore, plaintiff prays that defendant be cited to appear and answer this petition, and that said marriage between plaintiff and defendant be dissolved and declared null and void; that he be quieted in the title to his property; and the same be vested in him as his separate property; and for such other and further relief as he may be justly entitled to in law or equity.

Herein fail not, but have before said Court, at its aforesaid next regular term, this writ with your return thereon, showing how you have executed the same.

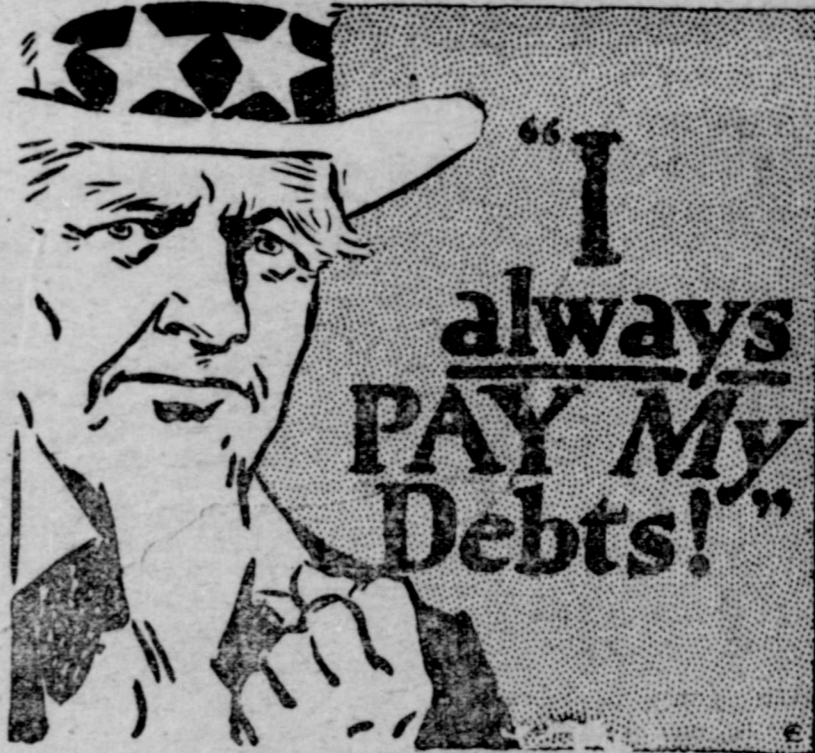
