PRODUCING AND SELLING

There are at least two fundamental objects in farming. These are to feed men and to feed animals.

The cultivation of the soil, the production of crops, the raising of animals and the manufacture of farm products, the preparation and use of human foods—all require a knowledge of Nature's laws. But when reduced to its final analysis farming is assisting the soil and the seasons to yield food for men and feed for animals.

It is one thing to produce the food and feed and quite a different thing to make a profit on one's labor in production. Here we have a problem in economics. How to use one's labor and capital in such a way that a fair and reasonable profit will be secured is the farmer's task.

Profitable farming is largely dependent upon marketing the crops and the animals, the food and feed products. Thus farmers are more than producers; they must see that their products are delivered and at prices that will pay the producer a reasonable price for the labor and capital required for the production of foods and feeds.

But the food required for the family, in so far as it may be produced, and the feed needed to raise and finish the animals need not be marketed. Thus all products needed at home require only the cost of production, leaving the producer the cost of marketing to add to his profit. It will thus be apparent that food for man and feed for animals are the most profitable products when used on the farm.—Farm and Ranch.

SOME WAR ACTIVITIES OF FORD MOTOR COMPANY.

400,000 Cylinders for Liberty Motors. Because of the superiority of the work on this article, the Government placed the order with the Ford Motor Company to make all the cylinders for all the Liberty Motors made in America. The original order was practically completed when the armistice was signed, and a new order for 300,000 had just been entered.

700,000 Bearings for the Liberty Motors. Here again the Government recognized the superior quality of the bearings made by this Company, and placed the order with us for all the Liberty Motors made in the United States. On this order over 400,000 bearings had been delivered.

700,000 Cylinder Forgings for Liberty Motors. Once again the Government recognized the superiority of Ford Work, and placed orders with the Company for all the cylinder forgings for all the Liberty Motors made in America. Over 400,000 had been delivered.

A large volume of experimental work was done in building three ton military tanks, and the Government had just placed orders for 15,000 of the small, two man, military tanks, and 3,000 of the six ton, military tanks. Cancellation came before more than a dozen or so tanks had been delivered. But the foundations had been laid and the superstructure almost completed for an enormous building in which we intended making tanks alone. We also did more than \$1,000,000 of work in the production of special devices for the Naval Department of the British Government.

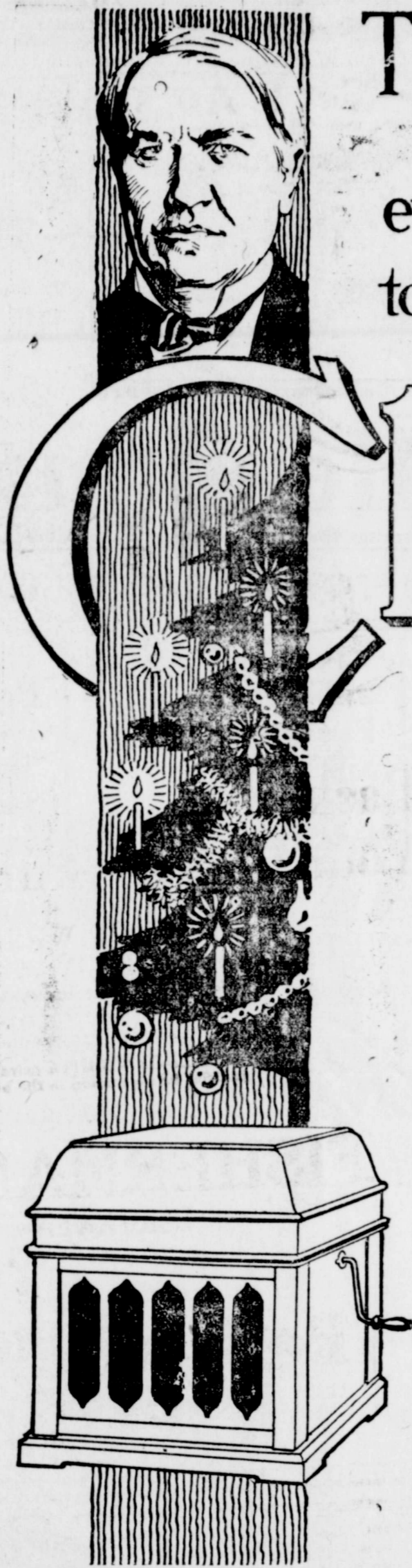

Dear Friends at Goldthwaite:

Whoever thinks it never rains in Arizona is very much mistaken for we are just recovering from a flood that came a week ago with an additional heavy rain and deep snow that fell Thanksgiving night. I believe now what I heard some one say when I was out here before—that no two winters are alike in Arizona. The weather here reminds me of some impetuous people who scold and storm and hurt the feelings of their loved ones, but soon they are ashamed and penitent and try to atone by being so kind, gentle and sweet that you soon forget. The weather today seems to say "I was just joking. I didn't mean it at all." There is not a cloud to be seen in the clear blue sky, while the sunshine against the snow sparkles like millions of diamonds. The snow covered Chiricahua Mountains, as I look out of my window just east of me, make a picture that any artist would delight to paint.

The flood a week ago rather upset my plans, for last week was teacher's institute week and the week near us which had been nothing but a dry bed for some time came down like a river and spread like the sea, so that the people with whom I was going to Douglas could not get across to me. I could not even get over to the little village of Light to go to Pearce with the mail carrier to take the train till a day of the institute had already passed. I felt better when I got there and explained to the county superintendent that I had been interbound and she excused my absence.

Tuesday night we thought there was to be a lecture at the institute which was conducted at the High School building, but finding that the program had been changed, we stayed and attended one of the many classes of the night school. The class we attended to visit was one in which a beautiful young woman was teaching English to a class of clean boys and men from the ages of sixteen to thirty-five. She taught them all by their given names and they were all as interested and responsive as a little group of primary children. She taught them by the conversational method, not speaking a word of Spanish to them nor allowing them to speak a word of Spanish. They came to her not wanting a word of English and these few weeks have acquired large enough vocabulary to carry on a pretty good conversation with their teacher.

With the excellent system of the schools in Arizona and the numerous night schools which are free, in which people of all ages can take almost any course including business, manufacturing and domestic science, it is certainly inexcusable in this state, for any person, whether old or young.

In the sessions I attended of the institute were great. The same demonstration teacher from Michigan, who was here when I was out here before and lectured and taught classes before the teachers. Hugh of the University of Arizona was also one of the speakers. My friends Mr. and Mrs. Edgar, formerly of Goldthwaite,

invited me to stay over for Thanksgiving dinner with them which I joyfully did. The boys took me out driving in the morning and among the places of interest that we visited were several nice rabbitries. Two of them must have had several hundred rabbits in them. I wondered how soon the people in general would find out how good rabbit meat is, and how easy they are to raise, so that they would at least try to raise enough for their own home use. The only way in which the hen is ahead of the rabbit is that she can lay eggs, but that advantage is overcome by the value of the rabbit furs, which are used on many of the garments made in the United States.

The Thanksgiving dinner was delightful with the good things that people usually have on such occasions and more.

In the afternoon I went out driving with Mrs. Martin and two of her friends. We went out to the aviation fields of Douglas and saw a number of aeroplanes. I really went up to one and touched its great wings and walked all around it. Now this may not seem like an experience worth telling about to you, but it was great for me because I had been looking forward to the opportunity a long time. Why one of our neighbor women actually went up in one at the Phoenix fair. She paid ten dollars for a fifteen minute ride and thought it was fine.

Mrs. Martin has several Mormon neighbors who often invite her out to their affairs, so we went to a Thanksgiving service at their church Thursday night. My letter is getting too long or I would tell you about that service and what I learned about the Mormons and their beliefs.

I was glad to see the evidences of prosperity in the Martin home and to see that all the members of the family are doing so well. Their oldest son, Amos, has a regular position at a good salary and attends the night school in which he is studying Spanish at present. The next son, Brown, attends school regularly and works an hour at night at a drug store.

I might have stayed another day and enjoyed the hospitality of the Martin home if I had known it, for I came back to Pearce on Friday and to my great disappointment the mail carrier failed to make it over the muddy roads and I had to stay in Pearce, which is the "Bummet" little town I know of in Arizona since their gold mine has been exhausted.

I am glad enough to be back in my own little domicile, gladder to be here right now than any where except at my own home in Goldthwaite, Texas. Your friend,

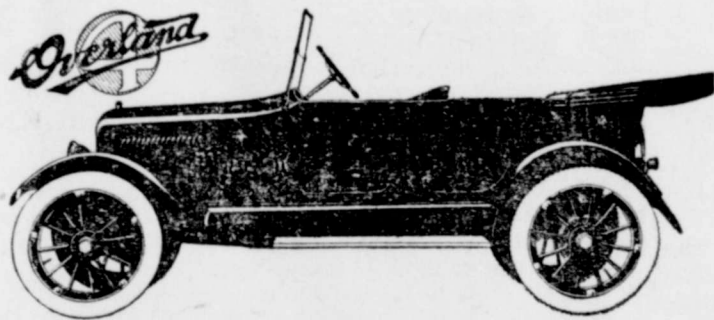

Daily papers of Chicago have announced a voluntary reduction in number of pages, as a means to relieve the shortage in news print paper. If all the large dailies will follow the lead of the Chicago publishers there will be hope of relief for the publishers of weekly papers.

In the federal court at Brownsville a few days ago several Mexican women were convicted of violation of a federal statute and given the choice of going to prison for one year or being returned to Mexico. They all chose to go to prison and were sentenced to the women's reformatory prison at Kansas City.

The release of W. O. Jenkins, the American representative at Puebla, Mexico, who was held by the greasers on a charge of participating in the kidnapping himself, has relieved the tension of the relations between this country and Mexico, but the relief is only temporary. Few days pass without the cactus republic giving just cause for hostile action by this government!

One who reads the report of the Western Newspaper Union on the condition of the paper market can but feel alarm over the situation. Many wholesalers and jobbers will not quote prices on newspaper and others say they can only hope to supply their regular customers with a reduced supply. The big dailies are blamed for the shortage and increased demand, in that they have increased the number of pages issued and being in position to take the entire output are crowding the smaller publications out. Prices are higher than were ever known and those in position to know are confident the price will continue to rise.

The sentence of the court martial in the case of Capt. Edmund Chamberlain of San Antonio, which carries the dismissal from service, has been approved by Secretary Daniels and is now to go to President Wilson for final disposition. The charges against Chamberlain, who was a member of the American aviation corps on the western front in France, grew out of his claim that he defeated a vastly superior force of German flyers, killing some and taking others prisoners, at the same time rescuing a French soldier from a dangerous position. These acts of heroism were denied by the British flyers, with whom he was supposed to have been co-operating.

Attorney General Palmer declared the growth of radicalism in the country is to be met by the lack of adequate laws against the preaching of the overthrow of the government. He said that the kindred and the matter is a matter of special importance which should be given the highest consideration.

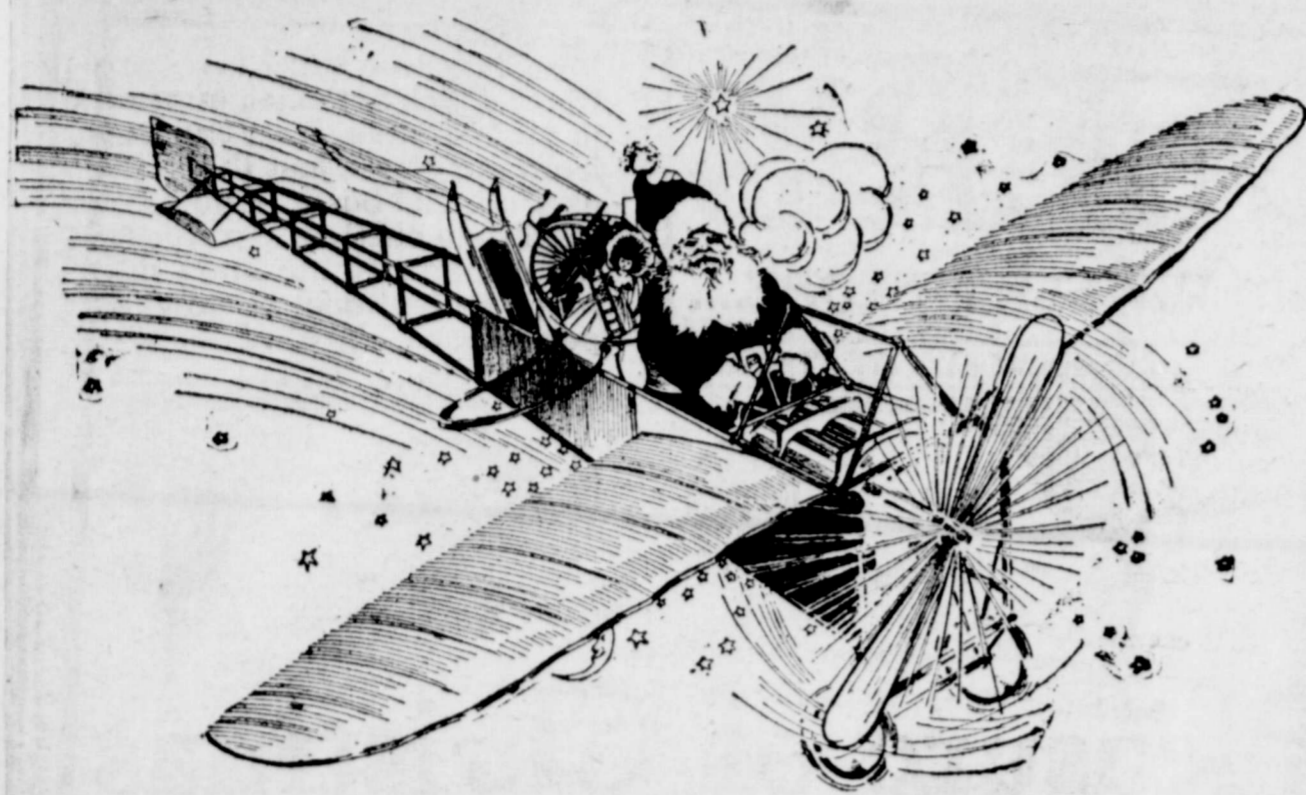

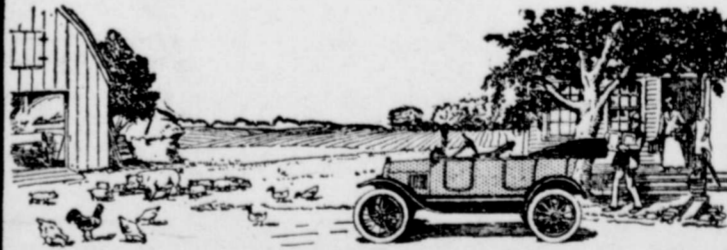

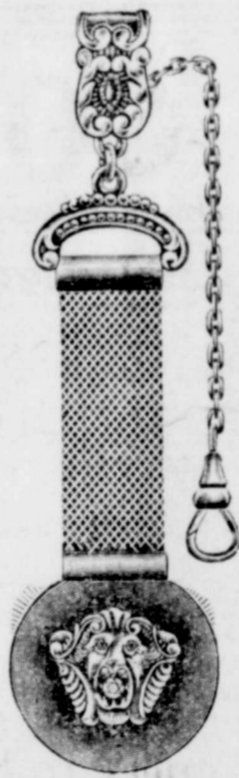

EGGS \$1.00 A DOZEN European Demand Sends Price of Eggs and Poultry to Top Notch Figure

At no time in the history of the country, since the Civil War, have eggs and poultry been in such demand. It is reported by all the large cities that the cold storage supply has been just about exhausted by the enormous demands made by the European powers. It is estimated that a million cases of eggs have been exported and unless dealers in cold storage can get immediate supplies it is predicted eggs will bring a dollar a dozen within two months, and that fattened poultry will bring from 40c to 60c per pound killed.

These top notch prices have excited a great deal of activity, not alone in the markets, but among the small poultry raisers and farmers wives who raise fowls. One man who raises poultry on a large scale has contracted to supply a New York hotel with guaranteed fresh eggs for the entire season at 60c per dozen and fattened fowls at 35c per pound, dressed. He says these prices will be obtained very easily and that the ordinary poultry raiser could double and treble his profits if he would keep his fowls toned up with a good laying tonic and keep roop out of the flock. These are two simple precautions and with the present outlook any one who neglects these things is simply robbing himself of just so many dollars per week.

It is also stated on authority that cold storage dealers as well as all large buyers are now demanding fowls that are in perfect condition, on account of the huge export trade in these stocks, and when they are barreled and sent abroad they have to be in prime health and those eggs are also in heavy demand which are being sold on a guarantee of being fresh. This is going to be a great year for the poultry raiser, both large and small, and various sources already report more scientific care and study of fowls, due to the above mentioned rigid demand and the enormous call at big prices for perfectly fresh eggs and fattened fowls. With the advent of colder weather there will be a loud call for fresh eggs at fancy prices.—Poultry Journal.

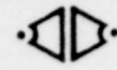
