### FARM LABOR LOST

The consuming public, in addition to paying for the city laborers' strikes, is paying for the farmer's labor that did not produce. Through no fault of their own farmers have labored from dawn till dusk that the people of the country might have plenty to eat. But "the rains came and the floods descended, and great was the loss." Much of what they produced could not be gathered because labor could not be had and the season was so unfavorable that crops spoiled in the fields.

What would laborers in mines who are trying to force the public to pay them more for less work say, if part of their work could not be paid for? What would salaried people in cities think if they were told that owing to unavoidable losses, caused by a coal strike or a railroad strike, a portion of their salary must be refused?

There is nothing farmers can do to collect for labor and expense lost on account of a disastrous season. But there are those who would advise them to practice unsafe planting and to take greater risk and incur more expense on larger crops under present labor conditions.

Farmers are entitled to better prices on what they produce. The risk of seasons and other uncertainties require labor and expense without assurance of returns. Labor lost on account of disastrous seasons cannot always be carried by farmers and their families. Sooner or later the consumer must bear his part of this loss.—Farm and Ranch.

**KNOWN AS BRAVE FIGHTER**

Mocking Bird Will Not Hesitate to Attack Dog or Cat in Defense of Its Home.

A tiny mocking bird will attack a dog or a cat, and is the only bird she has ever seen attack a cat, in defense of its home, writes Alice C. Dickinson, in the Springfield Republican. This bird is sometimes called the "robin of the South" because it takes the same place as the redbreast does in the North. It is very jealous of the safety of its home. No two mocking birds can build in the same tree. They fight it out, but once the question is settled, the defeated one never breaks the peace treaty. Once a mocking bird selects a tree for a home it thinks it owns that tree, and holds it against all intruders. It even drives away turkey buzzards that prowl near it, flying at them and pecking them vigorously.

The male mocking bird is a sweet singer, adding to its standing as a substitute for the robin for Northerners visiting in the South. It would much rather sing than work. It will choose the location of its home, and even start the foundation, when it will suddenly remember that it is a better singer than architect, and leave the housework to its mate.

**DEALING WITH MODELS.**

As regards the flying of a model plane, the beginner has much to learn. It should always be remembered that while it occurs to the average person that a model should be flown into the wind this in reality is not the case; a model should always be flown with the wind. Another point to remember is that a scale or reproduction model can never be a long-distance flyer as are types of stick models. Further, a reproduction model must necessarily have a propeller or tractor screw out of proportion, as a screw to scale is not capable of delivering the necessary thrust to fly a model which must necessarily be too heavy for the thrust developed.

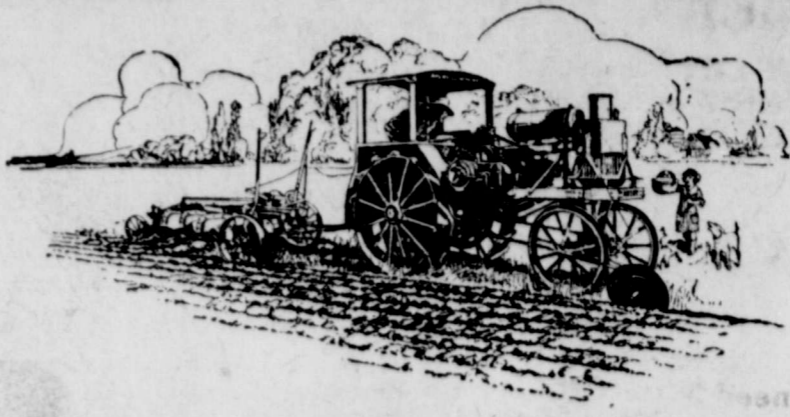
**INDIAN WOMEN WANT SUFFRAGE**

**MILLS COUNTY'S LOSS**

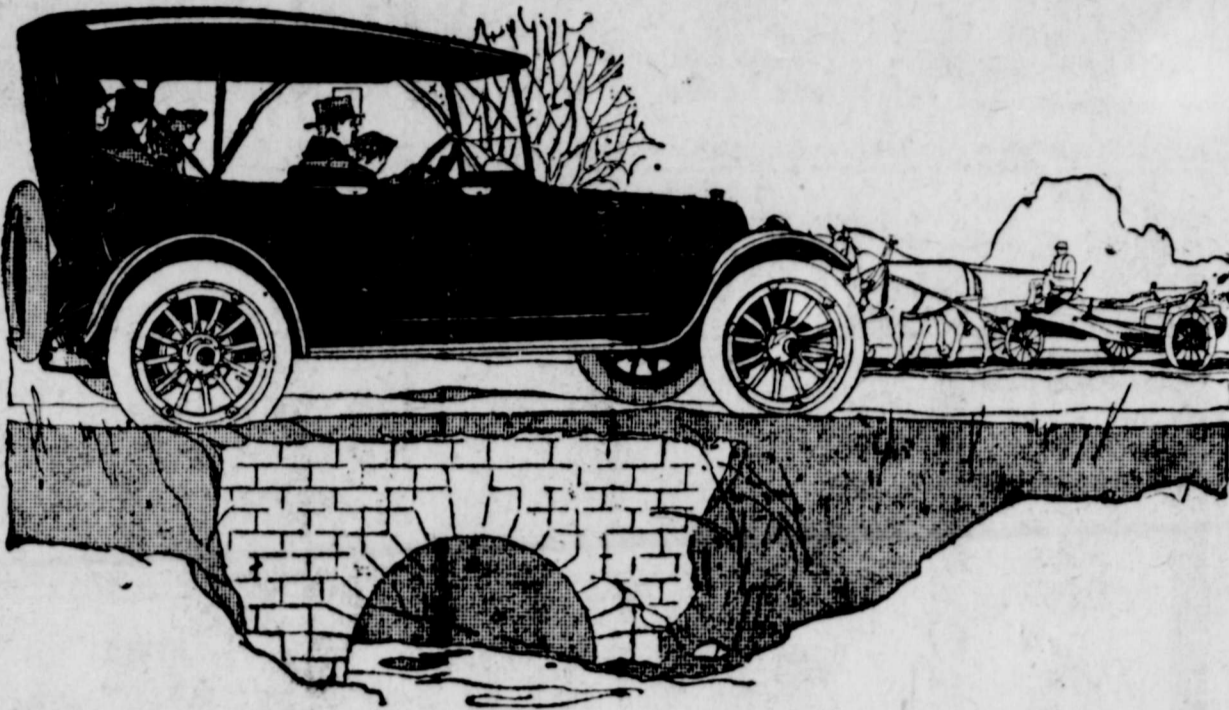

The marriage was quite a surprise to the many friends of the young couple, only a few close friends being present to witness the ceremony.

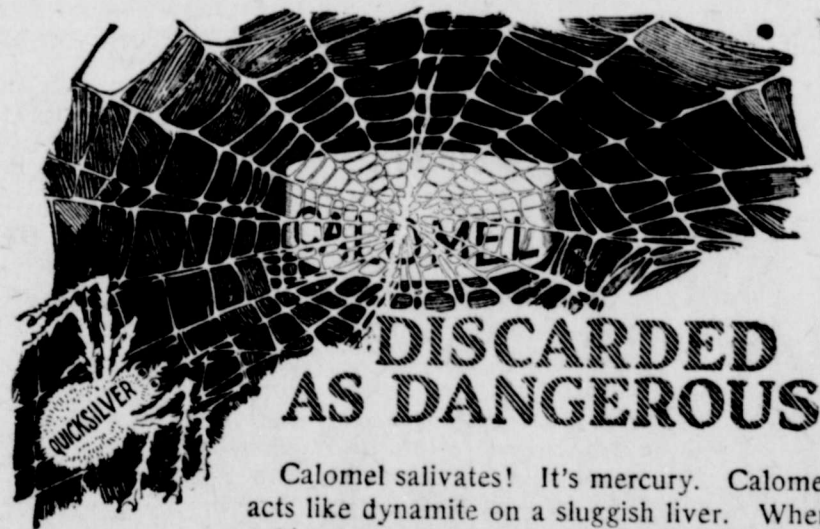
Mr. Faulkner grew to manhood in Mills County and stands high with all who know him. While his bride is not known here we congratulate him on winning the heart of this lovely young lady.

The state campaign is likely to be interesting this year, if all the proposed candidates enter the various races.

Dispatches tell of a preacher at Paris, Texas, giving each of his three daughters \$10,000 as a Christmas present. Seems the "wave of prosperity" has reached all lines and professions.

Many deaths were reported during the Christmas time from drinking home made whiskey or intoxicating drinks containing wood alcohol. New York headed the list in the number of deaths, but there were some fatalities in a dozen or more of the states.

Passengers on a Pullman car between Sweetwater and Cisco on the Texas and Pacific road were robbed of an aggregate \$600 in money, besides a number of watches and some other articles of jewelry. The robbery was committed last Sunday night while the passengers were sleeping and a search of all suspects failed to locate the loot.

President Wilson has announced that government control of the railroads will continue until March 1. This was indeed glad tidings to the railroad employes, who had given up hope of a continuation of the happy days under government supervision, when every man is a law unto himself and manages his department to his own liking, whether he be a depot porter or a general superintendent.

In a demurrer filed in the district court at Grand Rapids, Mich., by attorneys in defense of Senator Newberry and others indicted for election frauds, the constitutionality of the United States election laws is attacked. It is claimed that congress had no authority to constitute as a crime the acts alleged to have been committed by the Senator and his friends in his campaign against Henry Ford for the position in the upper house of congress.

If congress is sincere in the effort to relieve the paper situation a proof of that fact could be made by an order discontinuing the publication of the Congressional Record, or at least reducing the number of copies of such publication by thousands. There are also millions of tons of reports and other printed matter sent out by the various departments that can be of no earthly benefit. These reports and documents require paper that is badly needed in useful lines.

Some months ago a young married man at Fort Worth was convicted for blowing the safe of his employers and appropriating a large amount of bonds and other valuables, all of which were recovered. After he had served four months in the penitentiary Governor Hobby pardoned him. This week a man identified as the same individual who committed the Fort Worth robbery was killed by a man he was attempting to rob in Oklahoma. He had in his pocket the pardon issued by the governor.

Unless some error of considerable consequence is discovered in re-checking the returns from the recent constitutional amendment election the report of the election board will be that all amendments were defeated. It has been believed since the election that the amendment increasing Confederate pensions and the one allowing Galveston to vote bonds received majorities, but the official count reveals a contrary condition. The people of Texas certainly are not favorable to amending the constitution to any considerable extent.

## JOINT INTERVENTION

H. Grahame Richards, former British consul general in Mexico, has suggested joint intervention under a commission, on which Great Britain and the United States would occupy chief places, as the best possible solution of the Mexican problem.

The idea is by no means new, but this is the most tangible and authoritative form in which it has yet been put forward.

Many people have felt that joint intervention presented advantages superior to those of any other method.

Many people have surmised that the policy of "watchful waiting" was largely predicated on the assumption that joint intervention might be arranged after the European war had ended.

There has been a general feeling that while intervention seemed inevitable, it would be a false move for the United States to undertake it alone at a time when international co-operation was being sought by all the world.

The Munroe Doctrine, of course, constitutes the greatest difficulty, but if we could assist Europe without its infringement, there seems no reason why European nations could not combine with us, under proper arrangements, for the establishment of better order in the western world.

Mr. Richards points out that Mexico's general default in the payment of her obligations has become something of a world affair, and that it is working a real hardship on those nations which have made large investments in Mexican securities and are now laboring under heavy war debts.

He says that something more than a billion dollars of British capital is tied up in Mexico on which there has been practically no return since the downfall of Porfirio Diaz.

He says that investments of American capital in Mexico amount to more than a billion and a half, and that the United States and Great Britain probably hold more than 70 per cent of all foreign investments in Mexico.

He says that this makes the United States and Great Britain largely responsible for the stabilizing of conditions in Mexico, and that joint action by them is no more than logical.

He says that Carranza is both anti-American and pro-German, which has been widely believed in this country for a long time.

On the whole, his observations are very pertinent and should be given serious consideration.—Houston Chronicle.

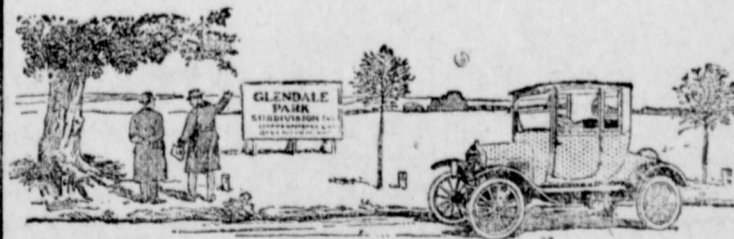

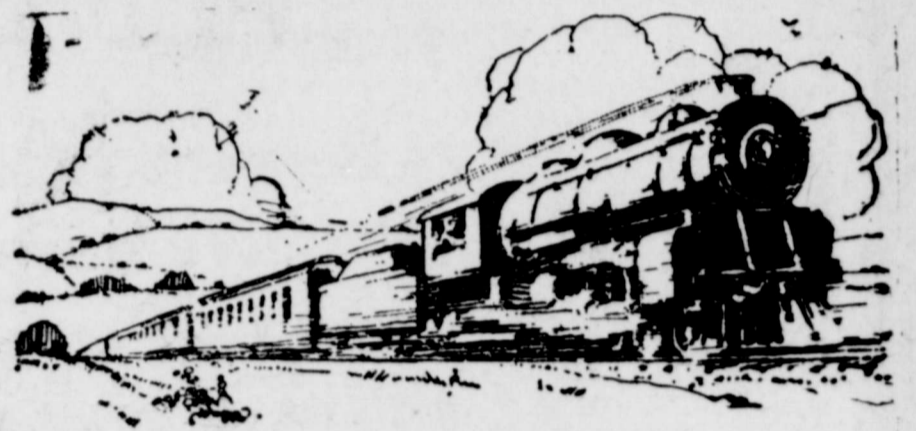

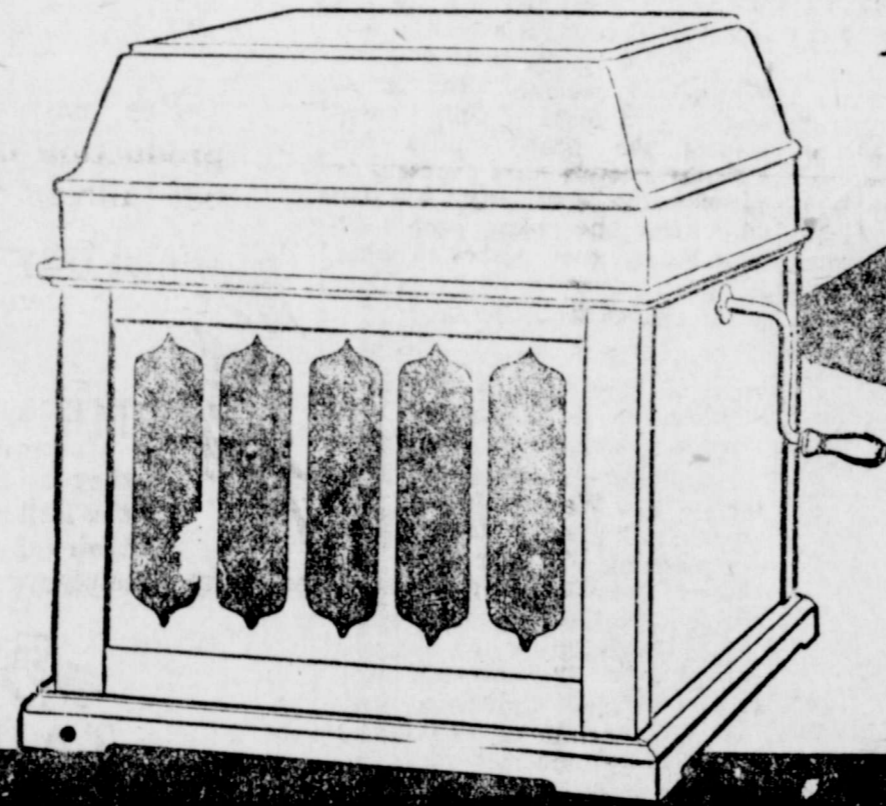
