REGISTER YOUR CAR

It is absolutely necessary that automobile owners procure the 1920 seal from the county tax collector, if they are to avoid violating the law and laying themselves liable to a fine. The law is plain and every operator of an automobile must have his car equipped with this seal. Some have the idea that they have thirty days from Jan. 1 in which to secure this seal, but in this they are mistaken. Every day a car is operated after the first of January without the seal the law is violated. Thirty days after the first of January the owner becomes liable for a 25 per cent increase in the highway tax, together with a fine for operating without the seal.

In registering the car to procure the seal the automobile owner should give the collector his 1919 card and all other information, such as highway number, engine number, etc.

A SMALL BLAZE

Early yesterday morning fire destroyed the office building in the yard of Jones Bros. gin. No one was about the place and it is not known how the fire originated. The loss was small, as the books were not in the office and the building was not large. 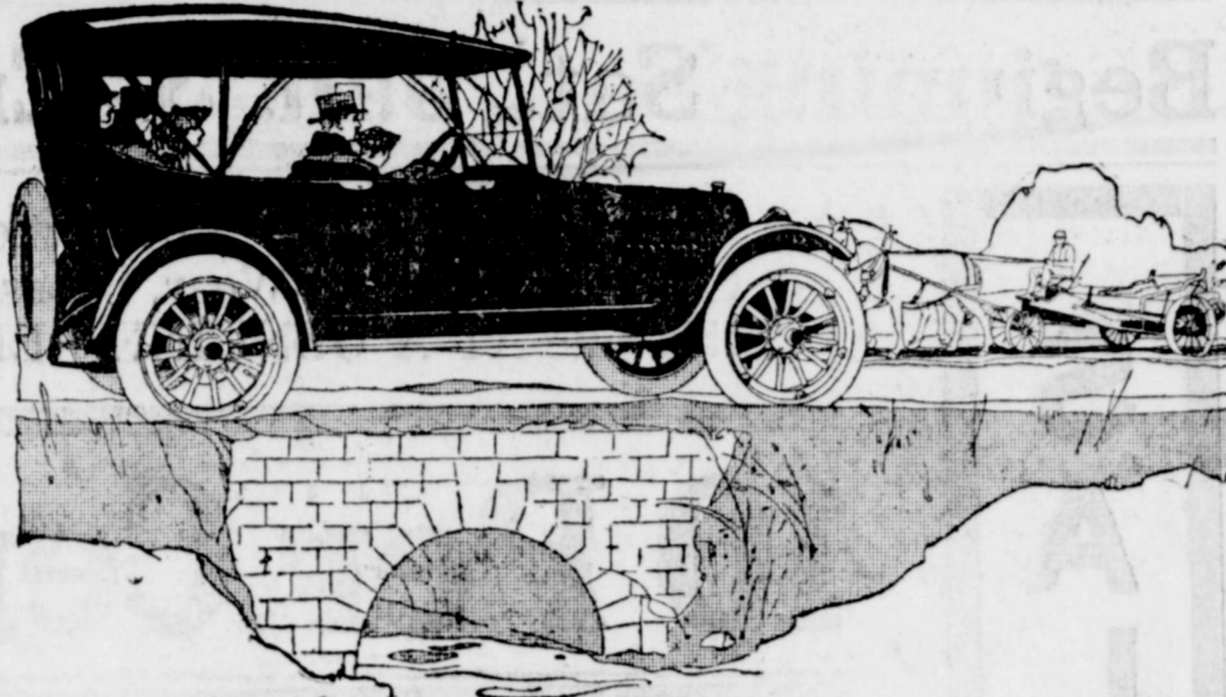

The problem of utilizing rubbish, the coarse and slowly decaying vegetation, such as may be found on many farms this year is not easy of solution. Very coarse and dense material turned late in the winter or early in the spring as will be required this year will not decay in such a manner as will enable farmers to plant this land in a crop to be cultivated. It is even doubtful if it would permit farmers to use harrows, cultivators, grain drills and other implements to advantage.

What must be done with this dense vegetation of weeds and stalks? Either it may be raked and burned, or it may be cut and turned under. Burning means waste of fertilizing materials and the loss of humus-forming vegetation which sooner or later will be needed. While it will be unfortunate to burn fertility and humus-making materials it will be nevertheless inadvisable in some instances to turn under this vegetation where a crop is to be planted before the vegetation has sufficient time to decay.

No one is better qualified to answer the question as to what is expedient under such conditions than the farmer who is to solve the problem, whose experience for years is his guide as to the soil and its needs. It is a problem for each farmer calling for an individual solution.—Exchange.

Ten of the Mexican states were shaken by an earthquake Saturday night and several villages were destroyed. The center of the disturbance seemed to have been about 70 miles west of Vera Cruz.

The attorney general of the United States has asked the war trade commission to investigate the newsprint trust to ascertain if there is a combination to force up the price of paper or to work an injury to the smaller publications.

The senate sub-committee on foreign relations has been in San Antonio a part of the week holding public hearings on the Mexican situation. A number of prominent citizens have been summoned to give testimony on the various phases of the conditions.

The supreme court of the United States ruled this week that the war time prohibition act was constitutional and stated that congress had not only the implied right to enact such a law, but was given the explicit authority to govern liquor manufacture and sales.

The department of justice has begun a vigorous and what is hoped will be a ceaseless campaign against the communists, anarchists and other dangerous and disloyal elements in America. Deportation proceedings have been commenced in various places against those who are well known as dangerous to the well-being of the government and the public.

A press dispatch from Paris, France, brings the information that the French government has granted permission for the removal of the bodies of 20,000 United States soldiers from France to this country. The bodies to be removed are those buried in cemeteries outside the zone of the armies and do not include those gathered into big American cemeteries in the army zone.

The report published by the Hurst papers that a representative of England had secured from President Wilson the promise of an immense loan to that government by the United States is strenuously denied by administration officials who are supposed to be in position to know about such matters. They even say that no such proposition has been received or discussed.

The visit of Wm. G. McAdoo to the oil districts of Texas this week is said to have nothing to do with politics, yet it is very likely the son-in-law to the president wants all the political light he can get at this time, for it is not unreasonable to believe that he has his "ear to the ground" and if he hears the slightest sound that would seem to mean a call for his candidacy for the presidency he wants to be in an attitude to give prompt and enthusiastic answer. It is certain he should be able to count on the organized labor vote, should he enter the race, for while he was railroad administrator he gave the unions more than they asked for.

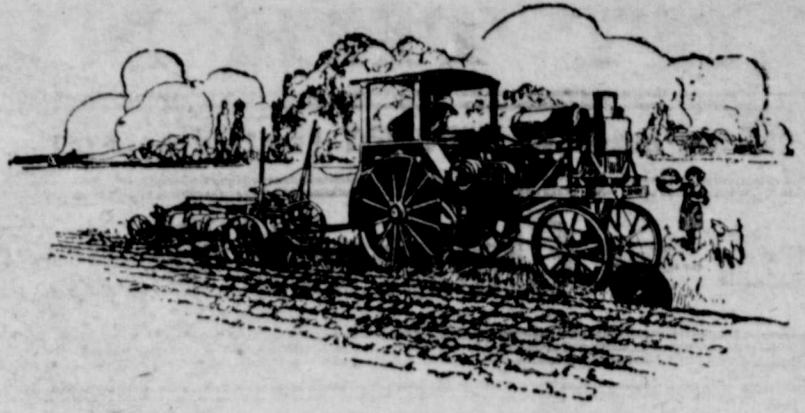

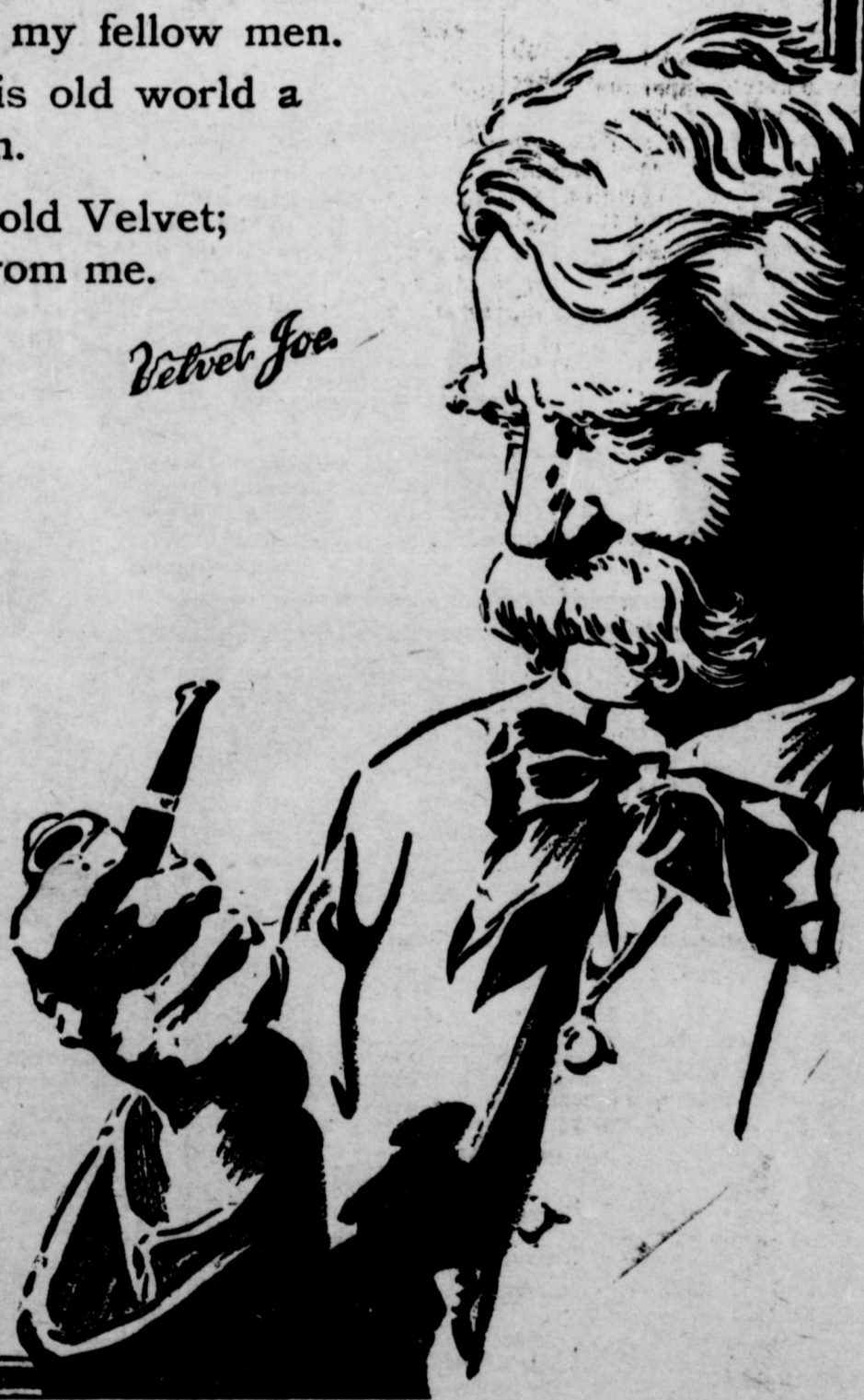

The supreme court of the United States ruled this week that the way time prohibition act was constitutional and stated that congress had not only the implied right to enact such a law, but was given the explicit authority to govern liquor manufacture and sales.

The department of justice has begun a vigorous and what is hoped will be a ceaseless campaign against the communists, anarchists and other dangerous and disloyal elements in America. Deportation proceedings have been commenced in various places against those who are well known as dangerous to the well-being of the government and the public.

A press dispatch from Paris, France, brings the information that the French government has granted permission for the removal of the bodies of 20,000 United States soldiers from France to this country. The bodies to be removed are those buried in cemeteries outside the zone of the armies and do not include those gathered into big American cemeteries in the army zone.

The report published by the Hurst papers that a representative of England had secured from President Wilson the promise of an immense loan to that government by the United States is strenuously denied by administration officials who are supposed to be in position to know about such matters. They even say that no such proposition has been received or discussed.

The visit of Wm. G. McAdoo to the oil districts of Texas this week is said to have nothing to do with politics, yet it is very likely the son-in-law to the president wants all the political light he can get at this time, for it is not unreasonable to believe that he has his "ear to the ground" and if he hears the slightest sound that would seem to mean a call for his candidacy for the presidency he wants to be in an attitude to give prompt and enthusiastic answer. It is certain he should be able to count on the organized labor vote, should he enter the race, for while he was railroad administrator he gave the unions more than they asked for.

To be sure, a citizen is responsible and liable for the tax at any time until it is paid, but a receipt for such payment dated after January will not give the holder the right to vote in any election during the year. Most people know this and many have already secured the necessary receipt, but there are still many more who have not yet secured such certificate. There is going to be a mighty interesting campaign and the citizen who does not hold a poll tax receipt will feel mighty bad about it before the end of July.
