FARMERS CALLED TO MEET

At the suggestion of the Execu-
tive Committee of the State Farm-
ers Institute, I am requested by
Honorable Fred W. Davis, State
Agricultural Commissioner, to
call a meeting of the farmers of
Texas, at the City Hall, Dallas,
Texas, on January 21-22, 1920.

The object of the meeting is to
discuss the various problems con-
fronting our farming interests,
including a continuation of the
fight for profitable prices for the
producer, and to voice protest
against the rail freight embargo,
which is so ruinously operating
against condition and value of
farm products in some portions of
our State.

The enormous loss to the farm-
ers of Texas the past season, by
undergrading and underpricing
of cotton, and closely associated
therewith, the activity of certain
Federal and other agencies, seem-
ingly not in sympathy with the
movement by the farmers to
secure profitable prices for their
products, will receive considera-
tion at the meeting.

I sincerely hope that officers
and members of farmers insti-
tutes all over the State, as well
as those who are not, will take
active interest in piling up at-
tendance at the meeting by
notices in the local press, and by
personal solicitation. The oc-
casion and its possible results in
good to the farmers, appear to
justify such action as sending
delegates, and "chipping in" on
their expenses, especially at
points remote from place of meet-
ing. All friends of the farmers
are invited. Let it be a farmers
meeting with no set program or
selected speakers, but a get-
together of farmers to express
their needs and wishes in their
own way. Everybody seems at
last to realize they are depending
upon the farmer and are ready
for him to speak. Respectfully,

RANCE RICHARDS DEAD

Rance Richards died at his home in Dallas last Sunday night at 11 o'clock, after ten days illness with pneumonia, and his remains were brought here on Wednesday morning's train and interred in the cemetery at this place, by the side of the grave of his mother, who died about a year ago. His brother Ivy and his sister, Mrs. Storbeck, together with his wife were at his bedside when the end came. His brother Will had been with him, but when his continued improvement appeared to place him out of danger came home and was summoned by wire when alarming indications were seen, but when he reached Temple another message gave him the distressing information that his brother was dead.

Rance Richards was about 38 years of age and was reared in this community, where he had a host of friends. He was a barber by trade and was one of the most skillful artists in his line. He left here about fourteen years ago and since that time had worked in some of the larger cities of this and other states. At the time of his death he was residing in Dallas, where he owned a nice home and was prospering. He was a genial, courteous and affable gentleman and had the friendship and good will of all who knew him. He leaves a wife, two brothers, one sister and other relatives to mourn his death and in their bereavement they have the sympathy of the people of Goldthwaite. The immense contributions of flowers at his grave proved the esteem in which he was held here and elsewhere.

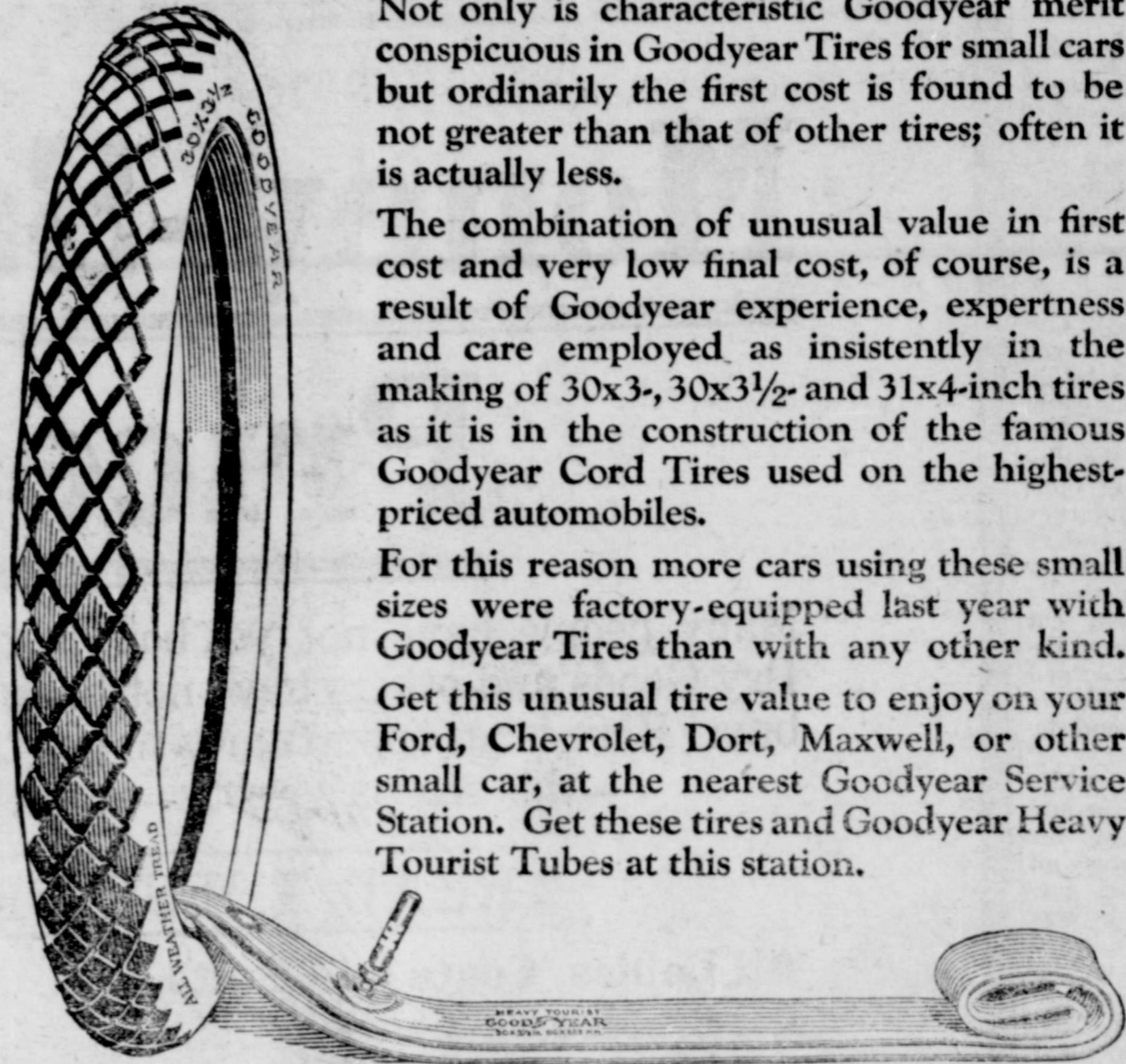

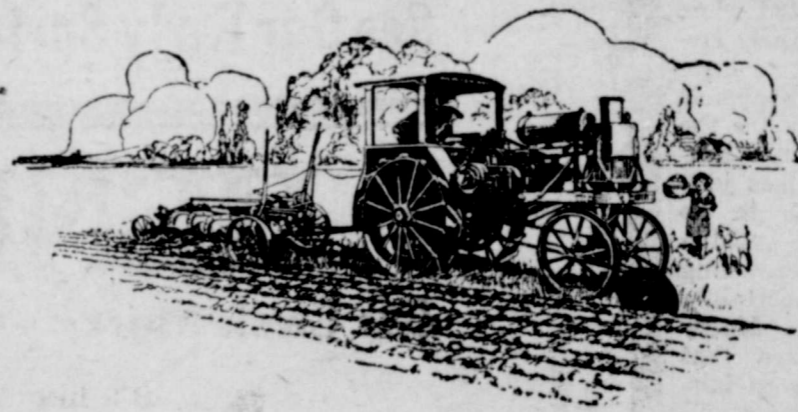

KANE DECLARES HE IS POWERLESS TO CHECK GOUGERS

Handicapped by Cooke's Refusal to Reorganize Wartime Fair-Price Board, He Says

ATTORNEY'S DUTY TO STOP PROFITEERING, SAYS HEINZ

Prosecutor Has No Time to Answer Questions Concerning Action in Other Cities

With the housewives of this city clamoring for direct, vigorous action against the food gougers, whom they hold responsible for the undernourishment of their children, Francis B. Kane, United States district attorney, declared yesterday he was powerless to check profiteering.

Mr. Kane complained he was handicapped by the refusal of Jay Cooke, formerly food administrator of Philadelphia, to reorganize the fair-price board. That of publicity, ought to be given to profiteers, he said.

But Howard Heinz, attorney for Pennsylvania, told Mr. Kane on that point.

In a view with the PUBLIC LEADER, Mr. Kane said last night Mr. Heinz, although he was making every effort to have fair-price boards re-established, that would not relieve the federal authorities from their duty to stop profiteering.

The district attorney said that the Lever food-control act proved to be effective in cases of profiteering as distinct from profiteering, reiterated that it would be extremely difficult to prove violations.

Mr. Kane acknowledges that prices are inordinately high. Ignoring the price of meats, regarding which Robert M. Simmers, agent of the State Food and Dairy Department and government food and drug inspector, has given him a mass of evidence, he said, that "the prices of green vegetables are terrible."

Great Quantities of Food Seized by Federal Agents in Big Cities

INDICATIONS of the real punch behind the high cost of living were given in a campaign to reduce profiteering in many cities.

While Attorney General Palmer's committee that he intended to prosecute higher prices than those listed by word came from Chicago, St. Louis quantities of foodstuffs by federal process under the food control act.

Fair-Price Boards Will Solve H. C. L. Problem, Says Administrator

HEINZ TO AID PALMER

Cooke Reiterates Refusal to Return for Food Fight

Howard Heinz, food administrator for Pennsylvania, in an interview with the PUBLIC LEADER, over the long-continued food fight, last night, said he is in his power to induce administrators to reorganize fair-price boards, as requested by the States attorney general, Heinz, as his opinion, that these boards will be set up upon the high cost of living, that it rests with the States to assume regulatory power over the entire system of food.

Heinz's refusal of Jay Cooke, food administrator for Philadelphia, to return to this city from his post, and reorganize the fair-price board here, Mr. Heinz expressed that Mr. Cooke may yet be induced to assume that burden.

Mr. Cooke, in a talk over the telephone last night said he was in his determination not to resign his duties as food administrator.

War Is Over, Says Cooke

The war is over," said Mr. Cooke. "I don't see why I should come back to the job of food administrator. I agreed for that office during the war. The present situation may be an improvement, but I can't see how I should get mixed up in it. If I would return and ask me to do the work that would be a matter."

Horace Webb and family have moved into the rock house on Mr. J. S. Waddill's lower farm.

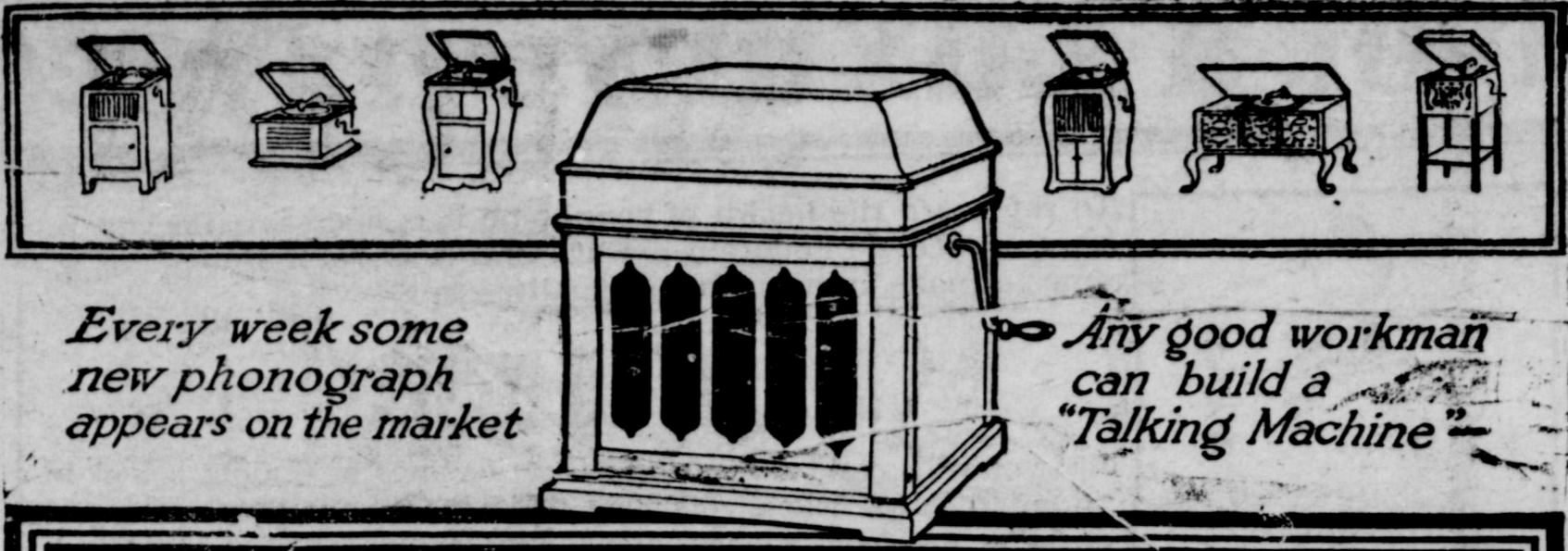
