A disastrous fire, the third in ten days, destroyed a large area of the business district of Desdemona Sunday. The loss was estimated at \$100,000.

Influenza appears to be increasing throughout the country and while the fatalities have not been as many, nor the number of cases so great as last year, the increase is alarming and is causing serious consideration in all sections.

The disloyal and dangerous gang deported by the United States government and returned to Russia was given a hearty and enthusiastic reception by the anarchists and revolutionists when they reached the port where they were unloaded among the reds of Russia.

Senator Newberry and 123 other leading politicians of Michigan are now on trial in Grand Rapids, charged with conspiracy and corruption in an election in which the senator defeated Henry Ford, the automobile manufacturer, for a place in the upper house of the American congress.

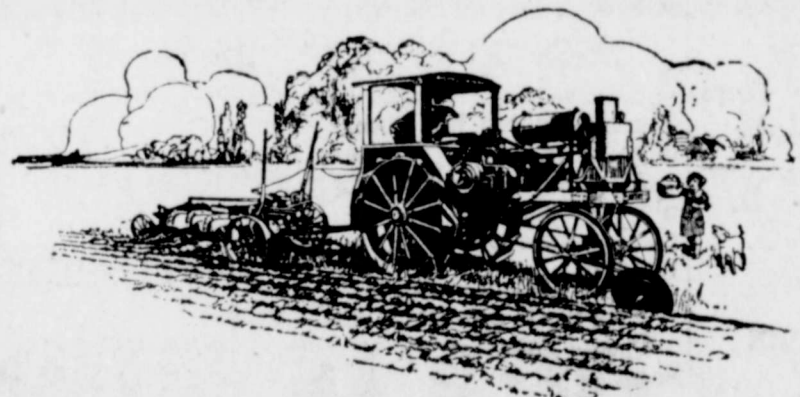

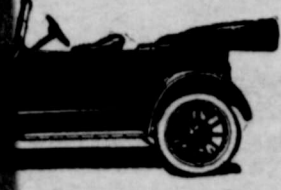

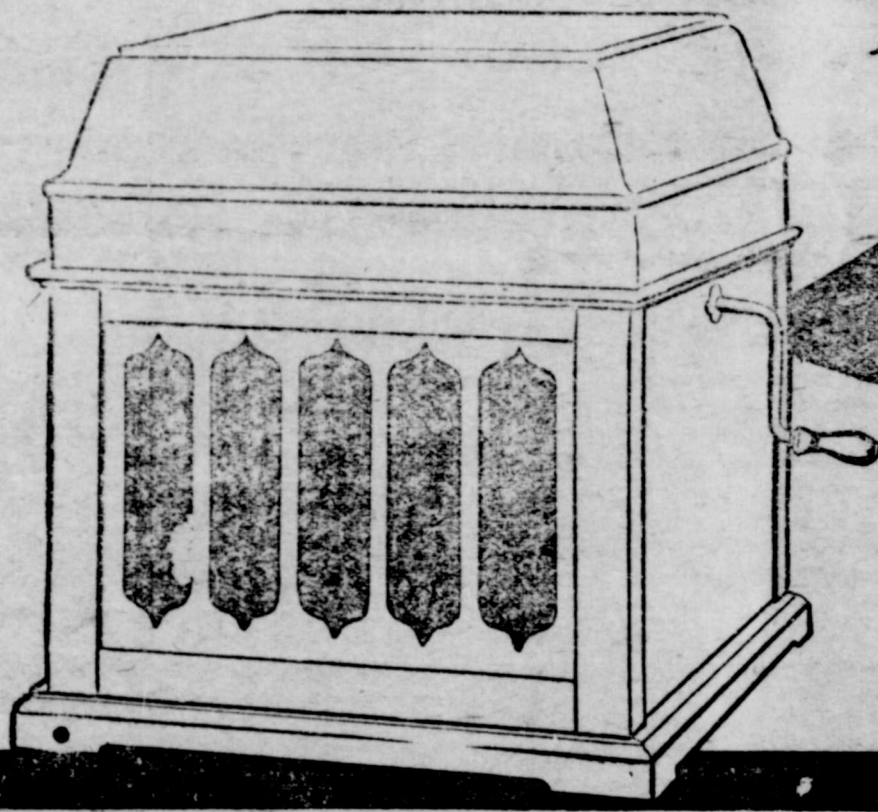

Oath having been made as required by law, you are hereby commanded to summon Mrs. Emma Townsley to appear at the next regular term of the District Court of Mills county, Texas, to be held at the court house thereof, in the city of Goldthwaite on the 9th Monday after the first Monday in March, the same being the 3rd day of May, A. D. 1920, in a cause numbered No. 1900, wherein W. C. Townsley is plaintiff and Mrs. Emma Townsley is defendant.

Boulter et al. by deed dated Jan. 14, 1917, recorded in Vol. 43 page 193 of the deed records of Mills County, to which deed and the record thereof reference is here made for more particular description of said land. That the defendant has no right, title or interest in the said land or any of the personal property now in the possession of the plaintiff whatever.
