is not only an attorney of ability  
and an orator of power, but he  
is a polished gentleman whose  
pleasing personality wins for  
him the esteem and confidence  
of all who know him.

The flu epidemic has been spreading rapidly the past few days and there has been a considerable increase in the death rate.

The unprecedented prosperity in western Texas has enabled many more to repay the drouth relief fund received last year and the year before than was expected.

An earthquake shock of unusual severity and lasting more than two hours was registered on the seismograph at Washington, Chicago and elsewhere Monday.

The Texas bank and insurance commissioner announces that hereafter commissions are not to be issued to insurance agents until said agent makes affidavit that he will not write a policy on his own life or on the life of any member of his family.

It has been thought for some time that Governor Hobby would likely call a special session of the legislature early in the spring, but his expression to a committee of school teachers this week indicates that he has no such idea or intention.

Every few days congress orders another investigation of one kind or another, but if anything ever comes of these investigations nobody ever hears of it. One of the latest orders is to investigate the statement that the navy was unprepared for war in 1917.

A bank president in Chicago was arrested Saturday night for carrying and dispensing liquor at a cabaret. He is charged with carrying the liquor in his hip pocket and a question has been raised as to whether or not the trousers shall be confiscated as a "vehicle" in which liquor was carried.

One victim of the flu in Fort Worth was a freak woman in a show at that place. She was a Filipino by birth and had four lower limbs, two performing the usual functions and the other two reaching only to her knees. She became ill Saturday and died Monday. Her remains are to be returned to the Philippines for interment.


Three men recently died at Memphis, Texas, from what was alleged to be wood alcohol poisoning caused by drinking toilet water. Officers of the state and county are investigating the affair and it is reported that 100 empty bottles which are supposed to have contained the toilet water have been found at the scene of the tragedy.

Arrangements have been perfected whereby the federal government and the Red Cross will co-operate in maintaining the hospital for tubercular soldiers to be established at Carlsbad. The state health department announces that this arrangement will bring from \$200,000 to \$400,000 to the institution from outside the state each month.

The newspaper people are used to receiving their monthly price quotations on paper containing an increase from 10 to 100 per cent, but one wholesale firm rather over-did the thing this month when the price list was sent out carrying with it a statement that prices had advanced another 10 per cent since the price list was printed. Just where the end of this price raising is to be we can not tell.

The world is now guessing just what the allied powers will finally do with the ex-kaiser. The refusal of the Dutch to deliver him for trial amounts to very little, as ample means can be found to force his delivery to the powers. #### INTELLIGENT FEEDING

Farm animals are more than merely cows, horses, pigs, calves and lambs. They are complex beings, representing considerable wealth and requiring careful attention.

An authority estimates that a farm animal is more efficient than a steam engine. The steam engine, he says, gives only 10 units of energy for every 100 units of coal it consumes; the animal gives 20 units for every 100 units of feed. Lost motion with the engine goes off in smoke and in friction, the rubbing of parts. In the animal, "part of the lost power runs the heart and other organs and makes the wear and tear of the nerves and muscles; the rest passes off in breath and sweat."

But in raising animals efficiency in power and in production as in milk, meat, wool and other animal products can be gained only by correct feeding and patient and intelligent care. The time has arrived when animals must be properly fed and carefully handled if they are to be profitable in farming or serviceable in farm management.—Farm and Ranch.





Oath having been made as required by law, you are hereby commanded to summon Mrs. Emma Townsley to appear at the next regular term of the District Court of Mills county, Texas, to be held at the court house thereof, in the city of Goldthwaite on the 9th Monday after the first Monday in March, the same being the 3rd day of May, A. D. 1920, in a cause numbered No. 1900, wherein W. C. Townsley is plaintiff and Mrs. Emma Townsley is defendant.

Plaintiff is and has been a bona fide inhabitant of the state of Texas for a period of more than twelve months preceding the filing of this suit and has resided in Mills county, Texas, for more than six months prior hereto, and the defendant is a non-resident of the state of Texas.

That plaintiff was married to the defendant, then Miss Emma R. Ross, on the 3rd day of July, 1913, in Lampasas county, Texas, and they lived together as husband and wife until October 15, 1916, when the defendant, without the consent or procurement of plaintiff and over his objections, left and abandoned him, with the intention of never living with him again as his wife, and since said time has never resided with him as his wife, but has resided in the state of New York.
