### MILLS COUNTY GOOD ROADS CLUB

The meeting was called to order at 2 p. m. February 25, 1920.

Frank Hines nominated a temporary chairman. The Chair stated that the object of the meeting was to institute, or discuss the institution of some method of bettering road conditions in Mills county.

The question of what the gathering should be called, and whether or not it should become permanent, was then discussed. On motion and second, it was decided to effect a permanent organization, known as the "Mills County Good Roads Club."

On motion and second it was unanimously decided that the county needed a civil engineer to supervise road building, and the reduction of expenses in certain offices, only to go into effect, however, at the end of the present term of those now holding any office.

Judge E. B. Anderson, was then called upon to read to the club, the old law providing for a road superintendent, that was passed several years ago for the information of those present. All expressed themselves as in favor of the general principle of

the law, but suggested some changes and amendments.

E. J. Weatherby made a motion which was carried, that the salary of the civil engineer should not exceed \$2000.00 per year, payable monthly while in active service only.

A motion was then made and carried that the chair appoint a committee of five men to confer with Judge Anderson and assist him to re-draft the old road law to better apply to present conditions. The Chair appointed the following committee: Tom Graves, E. J. Weatherby, Bob Robertson, Frank Hines, and Tom Keese.

M. L. Jernigan, then suggested that this club originate "Good Roads Day" in Mills county. The suggestion was unanimously adopted, and on motion and second, March 10, 1920, was designated as "Good Roads Day" in Mills county. On that day it is urged that every place of business be closed, and every person spend the day working on the road in some part of the county.

A permanent Chairman and Secretary were then elected, and on motion and second it was decided to publish the minutes of the meeting in the county paper.

It was further decided, on motion and second, that the road law, as redrafted, be published in the Goldthwaite Eagle, for the benefit of all the voters of Mills county; and that after its publication, petitions be circulated over the county, to find out how many citizens desire to make the change in the road law, providing for the new system.

The meeting then adjourned. SECRETARY.

Snow slides along the Denver and Rio Grande railroad the early part of the week caused much delay in traffic and a number of accidents were reported in which there were several people killed.

Robbers smashed the door of the vault of the Troy, Bell county, bank Monday night and secured \$5000 in Liberty bonds and a few hundred dollars in money. It is believed three men were implicated in the robbery.

Internal revenue collections for this district for January totaled nearly \$4,000,000 and it is thought the February receipts will be much larger, as the end of the time in which income tax can be paid draws near.

Testimony in the prosecution of Senator Newberry of Michigan, who defeated Henry Ford in the last campaign, shows that he expended more than \$175,000 in his campaign. Maybe there was no corruption about it, but that was a lot of money to spend in a legitimate way to get an office.

No matter how one stands as to Joe Bailey and his candidacy for governor, it must be admitted that Pat Neff "took him down the line" in his speech at Hillsboro last Saturday. It is up to the "wonderful one" to offset the charges, assertions and records Mr. Neff gave out or his friends will not long be able to make a fight for him.

The return of the railroads to private ownership will be welcomed by the public who have to provide the billions of dollars of tax money for the annual deficit of railroad management under government control. The labor organizations are said to be strong against the public men and officials who are advocating or demanding the return of the railroads to their owners.

It may be that Herbert Hoover, the erstwhile food administrator, will be elected president of these United States, but his most ardent supporters, if he has any ardent supporters, must admit that the signs do not point toward his selection at this time. In fact, neither of the important political parties will claim him and he does not know where he belongs politically, hence his chances appear at this distance to be decidedly slim.

The supreme court of the United States has granted an injunction against the shipping board forbidding the sale of the twenty-nine former German liners. The sale of one of the ships, which had already been made was allowed to stand by the court. The proceedings were brought by William Randolph Hearst, who furnished an indemnity bond of \$10,000. He is certainly entitled to the gratitude of the American people, many of whom have already learned that he is not nearly so bad a man as his enemies and opponents would make believe.

This is a favorable time for farmers to get control of the marketing of their own products. The demand for all kinds of food and feed crops is unusually strong and there seems to be very little surplus of any products. This would seem to be the proper time to eliminate waste in unnecessary and expensive handling and reduce marketing to a business basis. There is no occasion for making city consumers suffer even if farmers had the inclination or the power. But producers are entitled to a greater share of the prosperity the entire country is getting from products raised on farms. They should make it their business to get what their own products are worth.—Exchange.

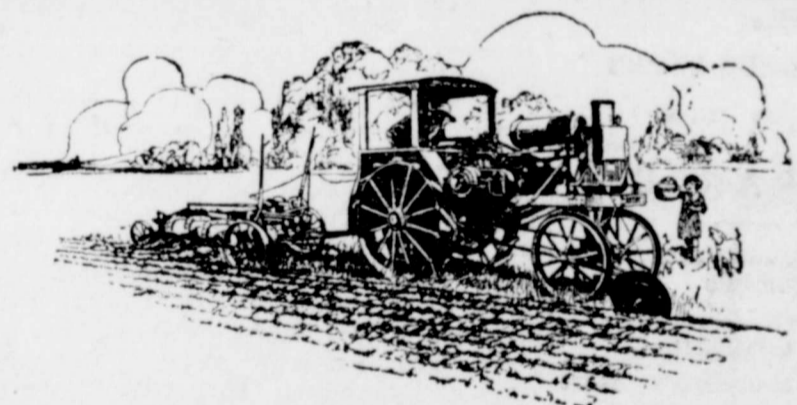

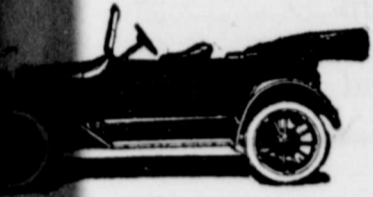

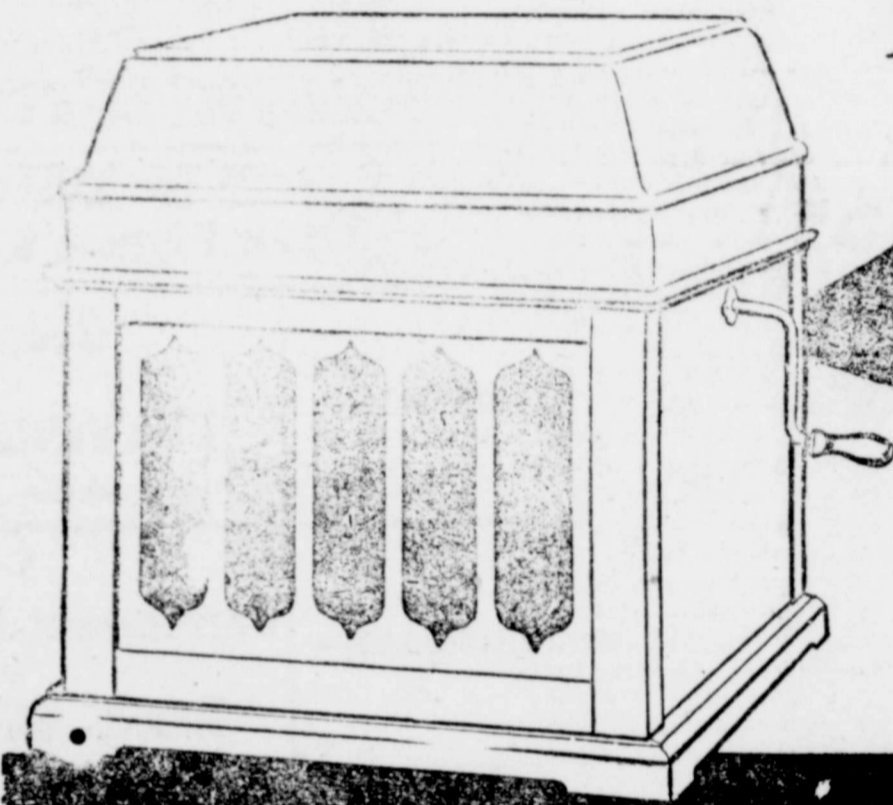

**Proposed Road Law  
For Mills County**

(The following proposed road law was adopted by the Texas Legislature in 1917 and was vetoed by Governor Ferguson under circumstances that are well remembered by the people of this county. It is published by authority of the Mills County Good Roads Club that the people of the county may not be misinformed as to its provisions.)

An act to create a more efficient road law in Mills County, creating the office of county road superintendent prescribing the methods of his appointment, defining his duties, fixing his salary, requiring bond, and taking oath of office, and declaring an emergency.

Be it enacted by the legislature of the state of Texas,

Section 1—The office of county Road Superintendent for the county of Mills is hereby authorized and established.

Sec. 2—The Commissioners Court of Mills County, shall upon the passage of this act appoint one road superintendent for Mills County, by an order made at a regular term thereof. Such order shall be entered on the minutes of such court, and shall not be void for want of form, but a substantial compliance with the provisions of this chapter shall be sufficient.

Sec. 3—Such Road Superintendent, shall within twenty days after his appointment take and subscribe the oath required by the constitution, and enter into a bond payable to the county judge and his successors in office, with good and sufficient sureties, to be approved by the county judge, in such sum as may be fixed by the commissioners court, conditioned that he will faithfully do and perform all the duties required of him by law, or the commissioners court, and that he will pay out and disburse the funds subject to his control as the law provides, or as the commissioners court may direct, which bond shall be filed and recorded as other official bonds, and shall not be void for the first recovery, but may be sued on from time to time until the full amount is exhausted.

Sec. 4—Such Road Superintendent shall hold his office until the first Regular Term of the Commissioners Court after the first day of January, after each general election, at which time the Commissioners Court shall appoint a Road Superintendent for Mills County, or until his successor is appointed and qualified, but in all cases where the condition of the public roads does not demand the continued service of the superintendent, his salary may, in the discretion of the commissioners court be suspended. The Commissioners court may for good cause remove any road superintendent, and in case of vacancy from any cause may appoint a successor, who shall hold his office for the unexpired term.

Sec. 5—Such Road Superintendent shall receive such salary as may be fixed by the commissioners court at the time of appointment, never to exceed \$166 and 66 one hundredths dollars per month, to be paid on the order of said court out of the road and bridge funds at stated intervals.

Sec. 6—The Road Superintendent, subject to the orders of the Commissioners court, shall have the general supervision of all public roads and highways in Mills County, and shall superintend the laying out of new

roads, the making and changing of roads therein, the building of bridges therein (except where otherwise contracted,) the working of the roads therein and all repairs to be made on the same, and over all county convicts worked on such roads, but this shall not prevent the commissioners court from employing a person to watch and manage such convicts and direct the work done by them. Said Road superintendent shall take charge of all tools, machinery, implements and teams placed under his control by the commissioners court, and execute receipts therefor, which shall be filed with the county clerk, and he shall be responsible for the safe keeping of all such machinery, tools, implements and teams and the proper expenditure and paying out of all moneys belonging to the road fund that may come into his hands, and shall be liable for the loss, injury or the destruction of any such tools, teams, implements or machinery, unless such loss occurred without his fault, and for the wrongful or improper expenditure of any such money, and upon the expiration of his term of office, or in case of his resignation or removal, he shall deliver all such money and property to his successor, or such other person as the commissioners court may direct.

Sec. 7—It shall be the duty of the Road Superintendent to see that all the roads and bridges of said county are kept in good repair, and he shall, under the direction of the commissioners court inaugurate and carry out a system of working, grading and draining the public roads in said county, and shall see that every person subject to road duty in said county performs the work to which he is liable under the law. He shall do and perform all such other services as may be required of him by the commissioners court.

Sec. 8—The Road Superintendent, as soon as practicable after his appointment shall divide the county into road districts, of convenient sizes to be approved by the commissioners court, and define the boundaries thereof and designate the same by number, which boundaries shall be recorded in the road minutes of the commissioners court, and he shall ascertain the names of all persons subject to road duty in each district and keep a record thereof and report the same to the commissioners court.

Sec. 9—The Road Superintendent shall have the power, and it shall be his duty to call out all persons liable to work on the public roads in their respective districts, at any time and in such numbers as he may deem necessary, to work the roads in their respective districts, and he shall utilize all such labor to the best advantage in connection with other labor on the roads. The call shall be by summons served in the manner and for the length of time prescribed by law regulating the calling out of the hands by overseers, but no person shall be compelled to work outside of his road district. The road superintendent may appoint any person subject to road duty in any district to summons the hands to work the road therein, and such person shall be exempt from road service for the number of days he was actually engaged in summoning hands, and in case of an emergency he may appoint

a deputy to supervise any particular work. He may contract with any person subject to road duty for the use of teams, and permit such person to discharge such road duty by the use of such double teams, but he shall never allow more than the compensation which shall be fixed by the commissioners court for any team, for any hand and double team.

Sec. 10.—The Road Superintendent shall make a report under oath to the commissioners court at each regular term thereof, showing an itemized account of all moneys belonging to the road fund he has received, from whom received, and what disposition he made of same, the condition of all roads and bridges in his county, and such other matters as the court may desire information upon, and shall make such other reports at such times as the court may require.

Sec. 11.—The Road Superintendent shall employ sufficient force to enable him to do the necessary work in the county, having due regard for the county road and bridge fund, and the quality and durability of the work to be done, and shall buy or hire such labor, tools, implements, and machinery that he is authorized to hire or purchase, and in payment thereof he shall issue to the person entitled thereto his certificate, showing the amount due and the purpose for which it is given, and upon approval of the commissioners court, a warrant shall issue therefor by the county clerk to the holder, on the county treasurer to be paid by him out of the proper funds as other warrants. All such certificates shall be numbered, dated and signed by the road superintendent, and he shall keep a record thereof, and he and his sureties on his official bond shall be liable for all damages caused by the wrongful issuance of any such certificate, or any extravagance in the amount thereof. No certificate shall be issued, except for funds then in the county treasury, except in case of an actual emergency to be determined by the commissioners court by an order entered on the minutes of said court, and then for not exceeding one thousand dollars in any one year. No laborer shall be paid exceeding twenty cents per hour for labor performed, nor shall any one be paid exceeding thirty five cents per hour for double team and driver, and then for only the time engaged in actual work on the roads.

Sec. 12.—The Road Superintendent shall keep an accurate account of all moneys received by him, on account of the road and bridge fund, and pay the same over to the county treasurer within ten days after its collection, taking his receipt for the same.

Sec. 13.—The County Road Superintendent shall obtain from the tax collector of Mills county as soon after the first day of January of each year as practicable, and before the first day of May thereafter, a full list of the delinquent poll tax payers of such county for the previous year, and the persons so appearing on said list and who are such delinquent poll tax payers shall be subjected to road duty

for a period of three days during each year, and they shall be summoned, as in other cases, to work the roads in the road district or precinct in which such person may reside; and the performance of the road service provided for in this article shall not exonerate from any other road duty to which the persons performing the same may be subject, but this shall be taken as cumulative. The persons required to do road duty under the provisions of this article shall be subject to prosecution as provided in this chapter or other law of this state, and subject to the same liabilities and punishments provided for in other cases for failing to appear or do good work, when summoned so to do, as provided for by this chapter and other law of this state, and all such laws shall apply to parties required to work under the provisions of this article. And when they are convicted for so failing to work the roads, shall satisfy the fine and costs as in other misdemeanor convictions. But any person summoned to work on the road under the provisions of this article may satisfy such summons and be relieved from such duty by paying to the county road superintendent, Three Dollars.

Sec. 14.—Each county commissioner, when acting as road commissioner shall be entitled to Three Dollars per day for services actually performed; provided, that he shall not receive more than Eighteen Dollars per quarter. Said per diem shall be paid out of the road and bridge fund of his precinct after the account thereof shall have been approved by the commissioners court; provided, that said court shall not approve said account unless the commissioner presenting it shall make oath that the account is just, due and unpaid. Said account shall specify the number of days' work actually performed by him, when and where performed, and that it was necessary to be done, and if he worked only a part of a day the number of hours worked shall be stated, and no commissioner shall be entitled to pay as road commissioner while he is performing the duties of county commissioner, nor shall he receive any other pay than that provided for in this section for the inspection or supervision of the roads in his precinct, or for any other road service.

Sec. 15.—The Commissioners Court, shall, by an order entered on its minutes, fix the maximum amount that the road superintendent shall be authorized to pay for teams, wagons and laborers per day, on said roads, not to exceed the local market price therefor, and shall from time to time as the market shall justify and appear to the best interest of the county, increase or diminish such price, or pay, for teams, wagons or laborers or either.

Sec. 16.—This act shall be taken by all courts in the same manner as the General Laws of this state, and it shall be construed to be cumulative of the general laws of the state on the subject of roads and bridges, when not in conflict therewith, but in case of conflict this act shall control in Mills County.

Sec. 17.—Chapter \_\_\_\_\_ of the Local and Special laws of the acts of the Regular Session of the 34th Legislature approved March 15, 1915, relating to roads and bridges in Mills county is hereby expressly repealed.

Sec. 18.—The near approach of the close of the present Legislature and the large amount of business now before the Legislature for its consideration, and the immediate need of Mills County for a more efficient road law, creates an emergency for an imperative public necessity that the constitutional rule requiring bills to be read on three several days be suspended and the said rule is so suspended, and this Act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and it is so enacted.
