#### OIL WELLS DRILLED AND DRILLING IN MILLS COUNTY

The Eagle promised its readers a detailed report of all the wells in the county last week. Up to date we have not been able to get very much authentic information about some of these wells, but will give what we have and some more next week. A list of the wells are as follows:

Nowell No. 1, about 7 miles south of town; went down 2441 feet and then plugged well. Reported dry hole.

Bisbee, 8 miles south of town; now closed down at 950 feet waiting for something.

Tyson, 5 miles north of Mullin; struck some oil. Closed for reasons unknown.

Timam, 4 miles east of Mullin; rig on ground, ready to spud in.

Ware, on Ware Ranch; closed down and pulled casing.

Fidelity; shut down for unknown reasons at 1804 feet.

Weston No. 1, 6 miles west of town; struck oil in paying quantities, but for some reason lost the well.

Slack, 10 miles west of town, just across the Bayou; struck artesian salt water and have about cased it off. Will resume operations as quickly as possible. The indications for this well are good. It is reported that the strata thus far struck in this well exactly coincides with those of Sipe Springs producers.

J. V. Cokrum has let a contract for a well to be drilled in Big Valley, beginning within the next few months.

W. C. Dew has let a contract for a 4000-foot well on the Sleepy Hollow Ranch, to begin operations in the near future.

There is very little trading in leases at present on account of the fact that no one will sell a lease. Every lease

that was gotten a year or two ago with the option of paying rental each year and holding has been held—the cash paid for them.

It is the opinion of some of the men who have watched and played the game from its beginning around here, that the big companies are doing everything possible to force the interest down and consequently make the leases go down. In order that they might get entire control of the field. In fact, several people have said that this section would not be developed until the big companies did get control of it.

The fact has been firmly established that there was oil struck in several wells in this county and, with the exception of possibly one or two, the original drillers are still holding on to what they have. And—that the big companies believe there is oil here is proven by the fact that THEY ARE STILL DRILLING, the ones who put down the first wells here.

The Eagle believes that, should there be oil here, the people should not remain idle and let the big companies grab all the land before bringing in the field, but should devise some means of forcing them to open what is believed to be the big oil field of Texas.

#### DATE SET FOR FIRST MEETING AND ORGANIZATION OF AN AMERICAN LEGION POST HERE

Meeting to Be Held in the Court House;  
A Large Crowd Assured—Information to Ex-Service Men Given Out.

The Eagle has authoritative information that the date has been set and it is an established fact that on Saturday, May 1, there will be a grand rally of all ex-service men of Mills county at the court house for the purpose of giving the men some valuable information on the proposed bonuses for soldiers, sailors and marines, which is now almost a certainty, and the organization of a post here.

It is to the interest of every ex-service man to be here at that time, as the information to be given out will be of great value to every one. The bonus, as now proposed, will give the boys about \$125 per day during their enlistment period. Details of this, the manner in which it will be conducted and the probable time of payment will be thoroughly discussed on that date and other matters of interest to the boys will be brought up.

Whether you contemplate joining or not, don't fail to be at this meeting. All the boys who have been advised of the plans are very enthusiastic about this meeting and a large crowd is assured, as well as a successful rally.

We wish to emphasize the fact that the American Legion does not in any way meddle in politics and it is for the sole purpose of helping the boys and the public in general. Don't forget the date, Saturday, May 1, at 8 o'clock p. m., and the place, at the court house.

The first three articles of the constitution of the American Legion, comprising the substance follows:

Article I—Name. The name of this

organization shall be Texas Branch, American Legion.

Article II—Purpose. The purpose of this organization is to foster and perpetuate a 100 per cent Americanism; to preserve the memories and incidents of our association in the Great War; to inculcate a sense of individual obligation to the community, state and nation; to combat the autocracy of both the classes and masses; to make Right the master of Might; to promote peace and good will on earth; to safeguard and transmit to posterity the principles of justice, freedom and democracy; to consecrate and sanctify our comradeship by our devotion to mutual helpfulness; to maintain law and order, a representative form of government and white supremacy, and to uphold and defend the Constitutions of the United States and of the State of Texas. This organization is absolutely non-partisan, and shall never be used for the dissemination of partisan propaganda, or for the promotion or destruction of any person's candidacy for public office or employment.

Article III—Membership. All white persons residing in the State of Texas shall be eligible to membership in this organization who were in the military or naval service of the United States during the period between April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918, both dates inclusive, and all persons who served in the military or naval service of any of the governments associated with the United States during the World War, provided they were citizens of the United States at the time of their enlistments and are again citizens at the time of application, except those persons who separated from the service under terms amounting to dishonorable discharge, and except also those persons who refused to perform their military duties on the ground of conscientious or political objection.

### DEMOCRATIC CALL.

Notice is hereby given and proclamation made that a precinct convention will be held in each voting precinct in Mills county on the first Saturday in May, 1920, the same being the first day of said month, for the purpose of selecting delegates to the county convention, which will in turn send delegates to the state convention to select delegates to the national convention. Said precinct conventions will be held at 2 o'clock p. m. at the usual voting place in said precinct and the Democratic chairman of said precinct shall preside. Governor Henry J. Allen of Kansas, in designating May 1 as American day for that state, said: "An organized group of radical agitators is threatening the foundations of organized society. Recently this group has transplanted in America the practice long in vogue in Europe of making May 1 the day of parades of irreconcilable radicals."

The Lufkin Chamber of Commerce will send a boy on the Texas Farm Boys' Special, which will tour 18 of the most progressive agricultural states of America between July 31 and August 21, under the joint management of the Texas Chamber of Commerce and Texas Agricultural college, says a dispatch from Lufkin, Texas. The \$300 covering all expenses of this boy will be borne by the Lufkin Chamber of Commerce. Plans are under way to take advantage of the permission which has been granted to each county to advertise its opportunities. Angelina county's boy will be provided with literature which will be distributed along the route.

Building materials are being placed on the ground at Kerrville for the erection of the Texas World War Memorial Hospital, which is to be built with funds raised by the Benevolent War Risk Society for the care and treatment of Texas World War Veterans who have become victims of tuberculosis. In a news dispatch from Austin, Dr. C. W. Goddard, State Health Officer and president of the Benevolent War Risk Society, said: "Less than half the funds needed for the completion of this sanatorium has been raised. We must have the remainder as soon as possible. Fifteen hundred dollars will build a bungalow which will take care of two patients. This is a very small amount to invest in saving the lives of two of our returned heroes, and we are making a special appeal to individuals and organizations throughout the state to contribute money for the building of these bungalows. Any individual, lodge, fraternal organization, woman's club, church, society business house, national guard unit, American Legion Post, or other similar organization which is willing to raise enough money to build a bungalow will be accorded the privilege of dedicating the same in some fitting and appropriate manner."

The Association of Advertising Clubs of Texas will endeavor to have a law passed by the next state legislature making it a punishable offense to insert misleading advertisements in newspapers.

A storm Tuesday struck in the rich farming belt near Jasper, Miss., and moved northwest across the remainder of that state and passed through the northwestern tier of counties of Alabama before entering Tennessee. The deaths as a result of the storm in Mississippi already total 118, with hundreds of injured needing aid, according to reports on Tuesday. The property loss will run into millions of dollars. The Red Cross has already sent a carload of tents.

The Associated Advertising Clubs of Texas opened their annual two-day convention at the St. Anthony Hotel in San Antonio Monday. "Honest Advertising" was the chief topic for discussion at the afternoon session, the first business meeting of the conference, and State Senator Harry Hertzberg of San Antonio was the principal speaker. Senator Hertzberg spoke on the subject, "An Honest Advertising Law," and pledged himself to introduce and support in the state senate a bill designed to eliminate misrepresentation in all forms of advertising.

Texas is the only state in the union which has the native resources for food, clothing, building materials, fuel, water, stone, lumber and oil sufficient to support itself says a bulletin from the Texas Chamber of Commerce Research Department. Many attractive industrial opportunities are afforded in the development and utilization of the natural resources and the raw materials produced in the state of Texas. Practically every kind of farm and garden crop common to the United States is grown here; about every known mineral of commercial value is found in workable deposits in some part of this, the Empire State.

Owing to the scarcity of news print paper the Eagle will be compelled to discontinue the paper to subscribers after their subscriptions have expired and after allowing a reasonable length of time for receiving their renewals. The Eagle will, upon the expiration of a subscription, send the subscriber a notice calling his attention to the matter. President R. E. Vinson of the University of Texas has expressed himself as being heartily in favor of the amendment to the state constitution, which, if adopted, will remove the present constitutional limit of the tax that may be assessed for school purposes, a dispatch from Austin reads. On May 1 a statewide tag day will be held for the purpose of raising funds with which to pay for the campaign to have such an amendment adopted. According to Dr. Vinson, two things are necessary to change the public school situation in Texas. One is to permit local communities in Texas to impose upon themselves such taxes as they see fit for educational purposes, and the other is to bring about a more equitable distribution of public funds so as to secure equality of educational opportunity for all the children of the state.

MUCH ACTIVITY IN SCHOOL MATTERS IN MILLS COUNTY

Several schools over the county are making decidedly progressive moves now. There is an election for consolidation in the Trigger Mountain and Bryant districts being held today. Little or no opposition is being made in either district. Their plan is a building program, locating the school to serve both the old districts and possibly a part of the Chappell Hill district should that district see fit to join in the move and if it does even a better school can be established than the present planned one.

Petitions are out for the formation of a school district comprising the territory of Miller Grove, Piekens Springs and a part of Williams Ranch districts, the remainder of Williams Ranch going either to Evans or Mullin or both. Should these plans carry a good school plant can be established for the children of that territory.

The Center City bonds have been approved for \$4500 and that district will maintain a first class state-aid school next year.

An election has been ordered for a 50 cent tax election in Pompey Mountain district, the present tax being inadequate to maintain a desirable school. Plans of remodeling for state aid have not been made, but may be later.

A petition is out for an election for a tax rate not exceeding 50 cents in the Kelly district, No. 25. Also in Pompey Creek district No. 15. The district will no doubt put on a campaign for the establishment of a better school and one to receive state aid.

Election is called for May 11 in the Ebony district for a tax rate of not exceeding 50 cents and should same carry plans will be made for state aid provisions.

Movement is on to establish a county line district comprising Merrill Creek district No. 50 of this county and an adjoining district in Hamilton county.

The Big Valley district No. 27 has a plan of transportation of children by motor trucks or school wagons which, if adopted, will result in great convenience to those being farthest from the school.

Plans are being perfected whereby the Midway district No. 51 will remodel and equip the present building to meet the state aid requirements.

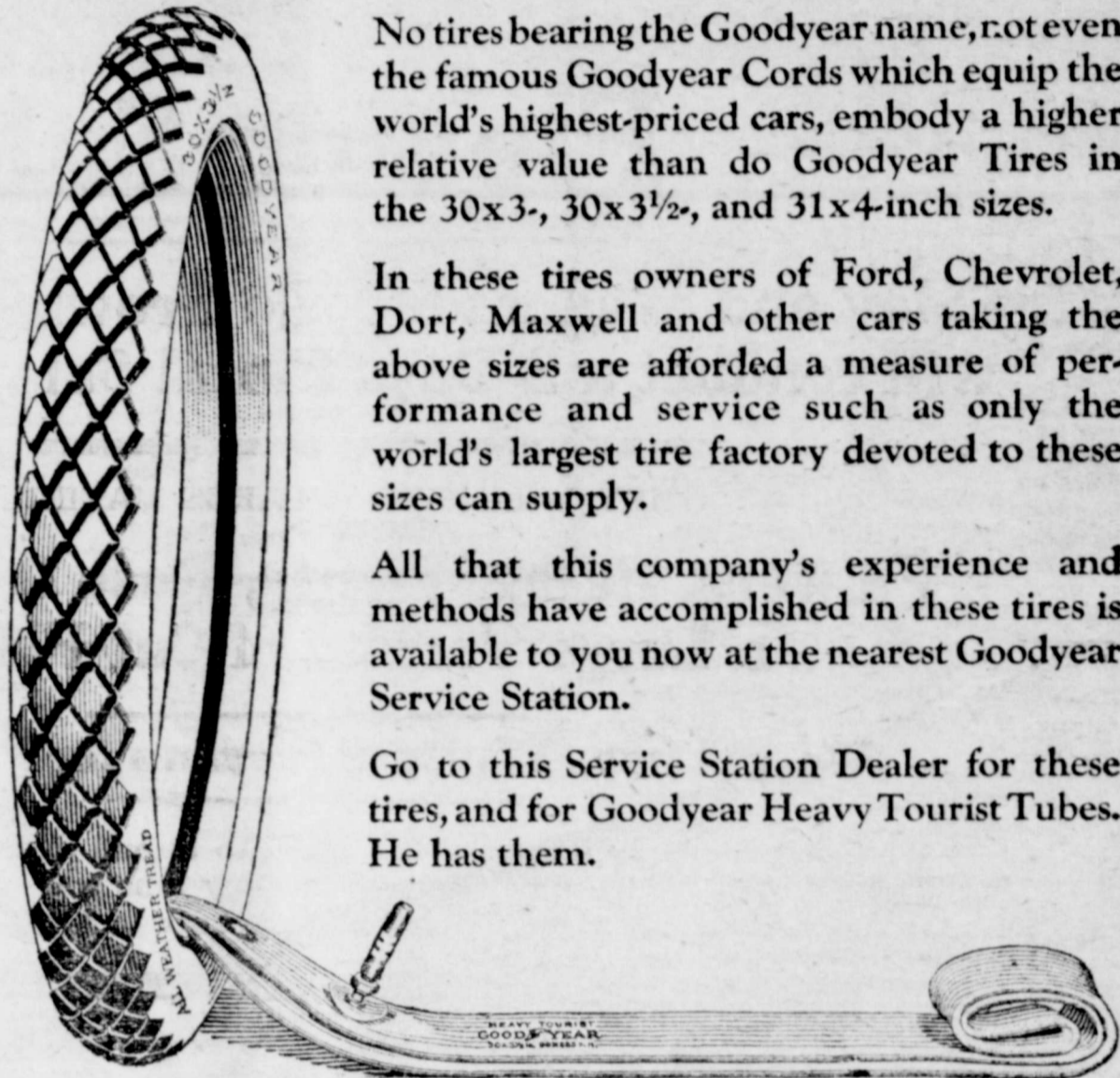

## FROM ALL SIDES

### FARMERS UNION PRESIDENT HAS ISSUED STATEMENT

Dallas, Texas, April 19.—President E. Lyday of the Farmers Union of Texas has issued the following signed statement on what the Wilson administration has done for the farmers and what former Senator Bailey has opposed measures that are of such great benefit to them:

Texas is at this time in the midst of a political campaign, and men are every day appealing to Texas farmers to repudiate and condemn the national economic administration of President Woodrow Wilson.

At this time, Texas farmers should carefully consider their position in the fight and what the result of such a fight would be should they heed these appeals.

For more than half a century farm organizations have demanded governmental reforms of the most sweeping character and most of the time their demands have been ignored or treated with contempt by the politicians in control of the national government.

It has not been the case with the Wilson administration and during the years that have elapsed since the first election, tremendous strides have been made in giving to the farmers the things they have so long asked for.

Among measures especially of interest to farmers, established by this administration, I quote the following:

1. The Federal Reserve Bank

This act authorized National banks to loan money on farm mortgages, relieving the special financial needs of the farmers by increasing the length of time for which they may borrow.

2. The act which set a special interest rate of three per cent was made by order of the Federal Reserve Board to local banks which were required to loan this money on bonded warehouse receipts of cotton in storage. Funds were deposited in Texas banks to enable them to loan to the farmers over the disastrous try-

years, and five millions of dollars loaned to the cattle men during the terrible drought of 1917 and 1918.

3. The Bureau of Markets, which carries information of market conditions, of supply and demand for farm products to every county, and aids the farmers in securing better prices for many of their products.

4. The Co-operative Agricultural Extension Act. Under this act agents have been furnished to the farmers in solving many difficult problems on the farm, and under the act fourteen million dollars are now being expended annually in this work. The present cotton classes stationed in the various counties have been of inestimable value to Texas farmers.

5. The Cotton Futures Act with amendments. Under this act government standards have been established for cotton, frauds and guess work eliminated, and the operation of future contracts regulated, and many reforms in the marketing of cotton have been effected.

6. The Grain Standard Act. This act established uniformity in the grading of grain, enables the farmers to get better prices, corrects many of the former prevailing, and encourages the production of better grades by increasing prices.

7. The Warehouse Act provided for bonded and warehouse receipts, uniform warehouse receipts under government supervision. The farmer who stores his cotton, uses these receipts as collateral for loans, and is thus enabled to hold his cotton until the market offers a demand and satisfactory prices can be secured.

8. The Federal Aid Act authorized the making available two hundred and forty-nine millions of dollars for cooperation between the Federal and State governments in the construction of rural roads. It has aided the construction of more effective high-ways in each state, and influenced the development of building along right lines. It stimulates larger production and satisfactory marketing, promotes active and satisfying rural life, and greatly to the convenience and economic welfare of our people and the national foundations.

9. The Vocational Educational Act, among other things, promotes co-operation with the states in training teachers of agriculture, and in giving agricultural instructions to secondary schools. This will largely increase the general knowledge on agricultural matters.

### NICKELS SAYS THE "HIGH TAX FACTION" REFUSES CHALLENGE

Dallas, Texas, April 19.—Luther Nickels, manager of the Bailey campaign, today gave out the following statement relative to the campaign now in progress in Texas:

The high tax faction of the party still refuses to answer our supplemental challenge for a primary election, instead of a convention, and we assume it will be necessary for the farmer to lay back the gear and come to town and for the merchant to leave his business, or else be deprived of an opportunity to express himself upon the issues; but the farmers who refuse to endorse the conduct of the government in depressing the price of cotton or that provision of the peace treaty and League of Nations covenant under which the special permission of France, England and Italy must be secured in each case before a bale of cotton can be sold in a large part of Europe, report that they will attend the conventions and take care of the town politicians in great shape.

Organization work is progressing at a highly satisfactory rate. The multitude of calls for speakers and literature indicates a livelier interest in the great issues now involved than ever before has been manifested in this state. People are beginning to realize that the politicians who are responsible for the national amendment which gives New York 45 votes and Texas 18 votes upon the question of whether beer joints may be operated in McKinney in defiance of the state constitution are now talking in terms of prohibition in order to divert attention from the real issues. For instance, one farmer writes that talk about prohibition does not answer the fact that we have the highest tax rate and the highest assessment in the history of the state due to extravagance in our state government.

We now have on file communications from several hundred places asking that Senator Bailey be billed to speak there. It will, of course, be impossible for Senator Bailey to speak at anything like all of the places which are calling for him. There are at present four candidates for governor running against him and it will therefore be necessary for him to make a long and strenuous campaign. In order to conserve his strength to make the most effective campaign it will be necessary, so far as possible, to prevent Senator Bailey from making more than one speech a day, and we trust that all local committees will assist us in bringing this about.

It is the policy of the state committee headquarters not to attempt to instruct local organizations in the conduct of the campaign to be waged in the various counties, but we are endeavoring to co-operate with local organizations to the full extent of our ability. Attention is also called to the fact that the four district headquarters are to a large measure supplying speakers and literature for the various sections under their immediate jurisdiction. These district headquarters are located at El Paso, San Antonio, Houston and Amarillo.

Our campaign has reached such an effective state that the Extravagant Faction of the party has already sent a well known emissary to Washington with an S. O. S. call for help. He is there now dickering with various congressmen in an effort to get some of them to unite in the campaign against Mr. Bailey. Within the very near future the people may expect from Washington a great deal of interference in our state politics.

### BAILEY SAYS IN RACE TILL THE LAST VOTE IS COUNTED

Dallas, Texas, April 19.—Senator Joseph W. Bailey is in the race for the nomination of Governor of Texas until the last vote is counted, he declared in a statement issued here from his headquarters. This sets at rest his critics who had declared that he had no intention of remaining in the race for governor but merely wanted to control the Democratic conventions. Coincident with this statement he declared in a Houston speech that he would endorse a resolution reading as follows:

"We, the Democratic convention, endorse the administration of President Wilson, so far as it is in accord with Democratic principles."

The general comment on the streets of Dallas is that in these two declarations Senator Bailey has removed all question of doubt as to his exact position in regard to both the national administration and the race for governor.

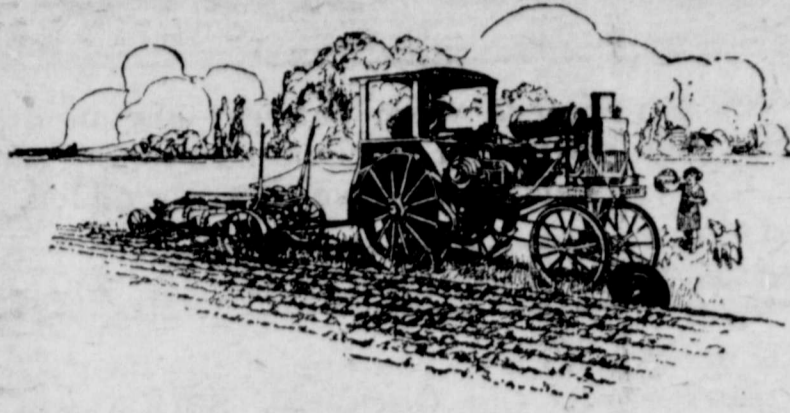

MILLS COUNTY FISHING CLUB HAS MEETING TUESDAY NIGHT

The Mills County Hunting and Fishing Club held a meeting in the district court room Tuesday night, with Dr. J. M. Campbell acting as chairman. Ninety-one members were present in person or by proxy out of a total membership of 125. The purpose of the meeting, as explained by Dr. Campbell, was to place before the stockholders a proposition for increasing the membership of the club and doubling the capital stock in order to build a bath house and install electric lights at Lake Merritt. A motion put before the house to assess each stockholder \$15 and not increase the membership of the club was defeated. A motion put to a vote to ascertain whether the stockholders desired to increase the membership received 65 votes of the 91 present, but failed to carry owing to the fact that the club's charter calls for a two-thirds vote of the entire membership—or 83 votes—to amend the charter and issue more stock. Several other motions for increasing the membership failed to receive the necessary two-thirds vote. Several speakers before the club advocated opening the lake to the general public on occasions during the summer. The by-laws of the club were read before the members present by L. B. Walters.

ASSISTANT STATE ENTOMOLOGIST INSPECTS MILLS COUNTY'S BEES

Mills county has not paid much attention to bees heretofore and it will rather surprise the people to know that this is one of the best paying side lines in which the average man can engage. However, some knowledge must be had of how to care for bees and some little trouble in caring for them becomes necessary for the best results. This week C. S. Rude, assistant state entomologist from College Station, accompanied by Mills county's bee man, A. M. Hunt, has made the rounds of the bee colonies of this county, inspecting for diseases, etc. They examined over four hundred colonies and announce that every one of them is clear of all disease, foul brood, and in fact, in first-class condition. This is a record that few counties in Texas can boast of and an enviable one. Mr. Hunt, himself an expert bee man, has 221 colonies of bees of the pure Italian strain. Quite a few of these averaged two hundred pounds of honey last year. This honey was sold for an average of twenty cents per pound, netting Mr. Hunt something like forty dollars per hive. It seems highly desirable that every farmer should have a few hives—eight or ten—of good bees. The cost of upkeep is nothing; they will make that portion of the plants that is going to waste pay good money and—should it be used for home consumption—the honey will cut quite a hole in the sugar bill.

Haynes has been appointed presiding officer for said election and he shall select two judges and two clerks to assist him in holding the same, and he shall within five days after said election has been held make due return thereof to the commissioners court of this county as is required by law for holding a general election.

All persons who are legally qualified voters of this State and county and who are resident property tax payers in said district shall be entitled to vote at said election and all voters who favor taxation for school purposes shall have printed on their ballots the words: "For School Tax."

And those opposed to such taxation shall have printed on their ballots the words: "Against School Tax."

Said election was ordered by the County Judge of this county by order made on the 15th day of April, 1920, and this notice is given in pursuance of said order.

## WHY CARRY YOUR MAIL TO A FARMER OR WHY USE A "SENSELESS MACHINE"?

Texas is an agricultural state. Texas farmers produced a billion dollars' worth of products in 1919. Texas farmers favor rural free delivery. Texas farmers are tax payers as well as wealth makers. Former Senator Joseph Weldon Bailey is appealing to the farmers of Texas to join hands with him in a campaign for the repudiation of President Wilson, the national administration, the laws enacted by Democratic congresses and all the war-time achievements of the party. Speaking of rural free delivery, on Feb. 25, 1904, Senator Bailey took the floor in opposition and among other things said:

"We started out with a small appropriation to experiment with rural free delivery, and we have not only suffered the burden of the expenditure, but we have added to it the infinitely worse effect of scandalizing the postal service. Twenty million dollars now, for what? To carry the mail to the people who would prefer to go after it. I live in a very excellent town of 8,000 and everybody prefers to go to the postoffice once a day. Yet you have carriers to carry it to them, though they prefer to go after it. Why carry your mail to a farmer? It is not half so important as his medicine. Why carry mail? It is not half so important as food and drink. They will be carrying almost every kind of merchandise in the rural free delivery before very long. Already in this and in the other house we have the postal parcels bills extended to allow the government to become a common carrier on a somewhat moderate scale; and under the enlarged postal facilities, coupled with the free delivery, it will not be ten years before the representative of the federal government will be delivering to the senator from Wyoming the shoes and hats which he must buy."

Rural free delivery is an institution now—a government service highly prized by the farmers of America. In addition to this the parcels post system is an institution and not an experiment. The former senator was opposed to rural free delivery. He was opposed to the parcels post. "WHY CARRY YOUR MAIL TO A FARMER?" It is for the farmer to answer the first Saturday in May in the election of delegates in the precinct convention, to attend the county convention where the county delegates will be elected to attend the state convention. Again, "Why carry your mail to a farmer?" The former senator asked the question when he was a senator. Why not answer it May 1, 1920?

The former senator believes in "slow travel." This is what he said shortly before he retired from the senate of the United States:

"If I had my way I would make it a crime to use these automobiles on the public highways because no man has a right to use a vehicle on a public highway that is dangerous to the safety and lives of other people, and an automobile is dangerous. Probably the time will come when horses will be educated to the point where they will not be afraid of automobiles, but I doubt that, for I have not seen the time yet when I was not afraid of them. I do not believe that any man ought to be permitted to use that kind of a vehicle upon the public thoroughfares where everybody has a right to travel. Consequently, if the senator from Idaho will join me I think we will strike the words 'or other vehicle' out, and we will confine the Vice President to horses and carriages or make him walk."

(See Congressional Record for Jan. 13, 1909, page 1037.)

Again in debating the same matter on the following day, Mr. Bailey said:

"The senator from Texas (Mr. Bailey) believes that next to the dog the horse is man's best friend. The senator from Texas believes that the horse is the noblest of God's dumb creatures, and he does not want to see him supplanted with a senseless machine. As far as I am concerned, I think the people had better travel a little slower and go the old way rather than travel so fast and not go the safe way."

Again on the same day Mr. Bailey said:

"If the senator (Warren of Wyoming) or a citizen chooses to use them (automobiles) on his own premises I would be the last man to interfere with him; but I do not think he has a right to go on the public highway and endanger the lives of men, women and children by the use of a machine that frightens the means of locomotion employed for 1,000 years. The horse has an ancient and a prescriptive right to the highway, and I do not think he ought to be driven from it by those machines. I know more than one man who has been compelled to sell his horses and carriages because their wives were afraid to use them on the highways where these machines are used. I have read one of the articles in one of the magazines which seems to be devoted to advertising automobiles that they are going to emancipate the horse from the drudgery of the great cities. It may be that they will, but when they do it will increase the drudgery of the farmer in the country. When the farmer has no market for the horse which he has raised and has no market for his corn and his oats and his hay to feed them, the horse may be emancipated from drudgery, but what is to become of the American farmer? I believe that at least the government ought to set the example of traveling the old way, and let us travel by things that breathe and feel rather than by machines that neither breathe nor feel and yet produce much mischief in the world." (See Congressional Record of January 19, 1909, page 1085.)

Formal complaint was made October 20, 1919, to the commission that the trade name "Good Wear Tire & Tube Company" so closely resembled that of Goodyear that the public was misled. It was further set forth that Cohn and Counselbaum, owners of the "Good Wear" company, adopted in their advertisements a style and general type of copy used extensively for many years by Goodyear for the benefit of securing the benefits of world wide advertising costing Goodyear millions of dollars.

The order is sweeping and gives victory to Goodyear on every point upon which complaint was made.

Should you see a spider or other poisonous insect crawling over the face of your child how quick would be your action, and yet the common housefly kills its thousands where few deaths occur from poisonous insects. And yet we go on in seeming indifference, unwittingly responsible for the death of our own loved ones.

But with the cause of disease we are not so much concerned as should we be with the ways and means of removing these causes. A few questions will stand forth for answer. What steps shall we take to remove the greatest cause?

- 1st--Prepare a sanitary closet.
- 2nd--Remove every source of filth.
- 3rd--Buy food that is protected from the fly.
- 4th--Destroy all excretions from the sick.
- 5th--See that no FLY gets into your home and if it should see that it lives not.

A few dollars expended for paint and disinfectants and lumber when necessary for repairing, will make the county healthier, wealthier--and, if the people do it--sooner. Progress will have to go on and now is the time. We must not let this county fall behind while our neighbors are going forward.

I want to make a special appeal to the people to do these things now in order to keep down the diseases which flourish in the summer time.

Statistics prove that a community can enjoy good roads, good schools, good churches and good public buildings and still be the winner in dollars and cents. Representative Aswell of Louisiana has warned the New Eng-

landers to be satisfied with the progress they are making, according to D. C. McCord, city building inspector. The completion of most of these projects within the current year will result in a substantial addition to the population of Dallas when manufacturing plants and distributing houses assemble their office, plant and sales forces. In Mr. McCord's estimation at least one year will elapse before there is a sufficient supply of labor and material to proceed without interruption on all classes of construction, both large and small. Under existing conditions some of the smaller projects are carried forward with difficulty, owing to the preference of workmen to identify themselves with the larger buildings, which offer a longer period of employment and more overtime. The fact that Texas produces within its borders all of the building materials required for construction of business buildings with the exception of steel and iron products, which includes nails, is cited by Mr. McCord as a reason for Dallas' ability to carry forward its building program with a minimum of delay. Lumber, plaster, cement, roofing materials, stone for foundation, marble, granite for buildings, sand, brick, glass and other materials are to be had in Texas in abundance.

Allied occupation of the Ruhr basin in Western Germany is being considered by the inter-allied supreme council this week. The United States has no representative in the council.

Seventeen persons were killed and probably a score seriously injured during a storm which swept through the northwestern part of Arkansas Sunday night. The dead included six members of one family.

Thirty-five thousand bushels of new potatoes still in the ground were sold at Brownsville this week for 8 3/4 cents per pound, f. o. b. Brownsville. It was said to be a record price for growers in the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

House Republican leaders tentatively agreed this week to raise funds for soldiers' relief by a gross sales tax of not more than one per cent. Under this plan the cash payment would be in quarterly installments, beginning January 1, 1921.

The cases of James E. Ferguson, former governor of Texas, against the Houston Printing Company, publishers of the Houston Post, which have been pending in the Bell County District court, have been settled out of court on compromise payment of \$8,000, according to dispatches from Temple. The cases grew out of articles published during the campaign two years ago in which it is alleged the loyalty of the former governor was impugned. The first case tried last summer resulted in a verdict for \$10,000 for the plaintiff. By the last action all the cases are dismissed.

Iron ore, lignite, coal, clay products, silica sand, cement, cotton mills, wool mills, corn products, farm implements and machinery, rice mills, canning and preserving fruits and vegetables, crops, developed farm lands, cheap agricultural lands, golf coast lands and irrigated lands have been surveyed by the Texas Chamber of Commerce. The announced purpose is to develop Texas' manufacturing and mining industries just as rapidly as feasible. As soon as connection can be made with organizations that might become interested in establishing plants in Texas, information will be passed on to the 246 local commercial bodies of this state, thus giving each community opportunity to get more factories.

### CHILDREN'S HABITS.

Habits formed in childhood are very difficult to break. The younger the child the more quickly a habit is formed. Their experience having been so limited, they quickly become accustomed to almost any new diversion that may come their way. Many little things that, at the time, seem trivial will have a severe effect in after years.

One of the worst habits that a young child forms is that of thumb-sucking. Many mothers would rather have the baby quiet and happy and sucking its thumb, than dissatisfied with life in general and raising Cain. But the pacifying of the youngster by this method will cause a great deal of difficulty.

When a child sucks its thumb it pushes the roof of the mouth upward so that it makes a very high arch; and as the roof of the mouth is the floor of the nose, the nasal space is reduced and the septum of the nose is pushed over either to the right or to the left. The upper teeth in front, along with the bone in which they are imbedded, are pushed forward and upward, and the lower front teeth and the surrounding bone are pushed inward and downward so that the arrangement of the teeth, that was intended by nature, is very seriously interfered with. The constant drawing of the suction of the thumb extends to the accessory cavities and there is almost a certainty that adenoids will be developed if this habit is continued for any considerable period.

Thumb-sucking interferes with the shape of the face, the mouth, the nose, the position of the teeth, the ability to masticate, and changes the tone of the voice. Don't you think it is rather an expensive method of amusing a child? Those who have allowed their children to keep up this undesirable habit for a number of years have been the indirect cause of inconvenience, disease and disfigurement to the children. The time to stop a child from sucking its thumb is the first time you see it do the act. Start right then and don't let up until the habit is broken.—Ex.

### LAST CITY ADMINISTRATION GREATLY BENEFITED CITY

The efficient service rendered the city by our retiring mayor, Honorable Will H. Trent, who has been mayor for six years, and his capable board of aldermen has brought Goldthwaite to the front and the good fire record of the city, together with the fine water works system recently installed, has reduced the key rate of fire insurance from about ninety cents to forty-one cents on the hundred dollars valuation.

The last five years' improvements for the city have made a great change in the looks of Goldthwaite, and fundamental building has progressed so far that it is just taken for granted that it grew spontaneously by the average citizen of the progressive little city.

A few years ago our streets were mudholes when it rained and the town had no water works and very little street work was done. Now nice and expensive cottages have taken the place of what were once shacks.

Civic pride was given a start when the town voted bonds for waterworks about four years ago. A fine system of water-works has been installed with sufficient pressure to throw water over the highest building in town. A voluntary fire company was quickly organized and a good fire truck purchased with all necessary fire equipment to fight fire.

Fire insurance at that time was almost prohibitive with a key rate of 90 cents, which has been reduced until it is now 41 cents. This has been accomplished with a small tax of 25 cents on the hundred dollars valuation to pay interest and provide a sinking fund to pay off bonds as they mature.

The city has a tax of 25 cents general fund and 15 cents street fund, a total of 40 cents on the hundred. From this small tax the streets have been graded and oiled until they compare favorably with the streets of any town in Texas.

The streets did not work themselves or just happen so—but it was the judicious expenditure of the city officials in equipment that brought about the present results. They purchased a tractor, concrete mixer, plows, cement, street roller and other grading instruments of a minor character—all the tools necessary to build streets. The wonder is how the city officials did what they have done on such a tax. The entire tax for grading the streets and running the city government is 40 cents on the hundred dollars.

The untiring efforts of the mayor and aldermen in building wisely and economically has wrought what to the uninitiated is seemingly a miracle in transforming a dirty, dingy, ill-built village into a thriving city as clean as the cleanest. Goldthwaite has no vice, but a clean, moral citizenship that any place might be proud of. The city has a good electric light system, good streets, many rock buildings and as fine a court house as there is in West Texas bar none, and a jail to rent as it has not had a tenant in so long the door hinges are getting rusty—in fact we could very well sell the thing and get it off the public square.

Reviewing the growth of Goldthwaite it is self evident that the people cooperated with the officials to the limit in putting through their suggestions in every respect. For instance, when clean up week is proclaimed, you can see nearly every woman in town out with the rake cleaning premises, burning trash and in many ways adding to the civic attractiveness of the city. The men, of course, had other business, and should have them.

which accounts for their absence from the rake-handle.

Watch Goldthwaite when this clean-up campaign is over—and a fly will be a curiosity and the town will be so clean that it will require a sand storm to soil it again.

### CITY RECORDER L. R. CONRO OFFERS PARKING SUGGESTION

City Recorder L. R. Conro made a suggestion to the Eagle the first of the week for the city officials to pass an ordinance prohibiting people from parking their cars alongside the sidewalks. Mr. Conro said that last Saturday he counted 135 cars parked against the sidewalk around the square and that every foot of the space was taken. Under these conditions it becomes impossible for the farmers desiring to deliver produce or to purchase goods to get their vehicles to a place convenient for loading.

There is plenty of room on the street around the court house to park all the cars, and the Eagle believes that only a suggestion to the car owners will be necessary in order to get them to change their parking places. Towns this size and smaller have ordinances covering this and Goldthwaite needs them and should have them.
