AMERICAN LEGION RALLY SATURDAY WAS BIG SUCCESS

The meeting held by ex-service men at the court house last Saturday for the purpose of organizing a local post of the American Legion was well attended. Every one present was enthusiastically in favor of organizing the post; consequently, the details were completed and officers were elected. In selecting officers, the members present unanimously favored Mr. E. T. Fairman for post commander. Mr. Fairman has done more than any other person in creating interest in the establishment of an American Legion post here, giving both time and money to that effort, but said that it was impossible for him to serve in this capacity. The following officers were elected:

E. C. Scott, Local Commander and Chairman.
J. E. Venable, Vice Commander.
W. M. Roberts, Adjutant and Secretary.
W. A. Harris, Treasurer.

It is the custom of the local posts of the American Legion to name the post after the first man who was killed in active service who entered the service from the county. A committee consisting of the following was appointed to look into this matter and select a name for this post: Charles R. Robertson, J. L. Stewart and Leonard E. Jones. The committee has reported that they are unable to find authentic records showing which of the Mills county boys was killed first in action. They request that any one who knows the exact date of the death of a Mills county boy to report the matter to the Eagle, and, if possible, send proofs establishing this fact. The committee desires to name the post after the right hero, but should a mistake be made, it will be very hard to make the correction necessary.

A vote was taken for the purpose of ascertaining the sentiments of the men present concerning the proposed bonus for ex-service men. This matter will be discussed more fully at the next meeting.

Hon. J. C. Darroch was invited to address the members and responded with a short talk, which created much enthusiasm among those present and was much appreciated.

The Legion intends to give a banquet for all ex-service men of Mills county on the night of May 22. This will be a treat, indeed.

Saturday night, May 15, was set as the next meeting of the Legion, at which time it is hoped to have all ex-service men of the county present.

Great encouragement was accorded the members that this post will be almost a 100 per cent one by reports that a great many boys who could not attend this meeting desire to join, and a number have since done so. The application for the charter will be sent off Wednesday and it behooves every person who wants his name to appear on the charter to see one of the members, a list of their names appearing elsewhere in the Eagle.

LEGION INDORSES MOVEMENT TO REINSTATE INSURANCE

The American Legion and the Dallas Chamber of Commerce have been requested to aid in the drive to encourage the reinstatement of the Government war risk insurance for ex-service men, which is being launched by the Treasury Department at Washington. The John W. Law post of the American Legion has given its full endorsement to the movement and has signified its intention of giving its aid in the campaign.

Every ex-service man in the State of Texas may reinstate his insurance before July 1, 1920, according to advices received by W. H. Kemper of the Dallas Bureau of war risk insurance. Ex-service men may reinstate for \$1,000 or the full policy of \$10,000, or any sum between these amounts in multiples of \$500.

FORECAST OF DEMANDS TO BE MADE BY SOCIALISTS

New York, May 5.—A forecast of the issues that will figure in the campaign manifesto of the Socialist national convention, opening here next Saturday, made public tonight from socialist headquarters, include demands for recognition of Soviet Russia, the independence of Ireland and self-determination for small nationalities whose will is now being defeated by imperialistic powers.

"This manifesto," a statement said, "will be additional to the regular declaration of permanent Socialist principles and within the party is distinguished from that declaration by the name 'immediate demands.'"

Other features of the manifesto, according to the announcement, are:

"Condemnation of the dominant parties for their failure to meet the political, social and economic problems of the day.

"Arrest of the administration for the wiping out of civil liberties, a demand that oppression and violence cease and that constitutional rights be restored.

"A demand for release of all political prisoners.

"Condemnation of the League of Nations scheme and a demand for a treaty of peace which shall not be a breeder of war and a bulwark of oppression.

"A demand for the repeal of the espionage act, under which no spy, but hundreds of persons holding opinions differing from those of the administration at Washington, have been sent to prison.

"Denunciation of tyranny of the Postoffice Department, with a demand for the ending of practices which have prevailed in that department under Postmaster General Burleson.

"Demands for immediate and drastic steps to end profiteering.

"Demands for a drastic revision of taxation in order that the burden may not continue to fall on the worker and the consumer, but that war debts may be paid out of war profits of profiteers.

"The usual Socialist demand for the socialization of all basic industries."

BRIEFS.

"Feeding the Child."—Loss of life among soldiers in the trenches during the late war has been greatly exceeded by the death rate of our children, particularly among babies less than a year old, says a recent bulletin from the College of Industrial Arts, Denton, Texas. The enemies of babies' lives are dirt, flies and artificial feeding. Clear and concise directions for preparing infant foods are found in this bulletin. The United States has twenty-two million children, of whom 15 to 25 per cent are undernourished and 75 per cent have serious physical defects, largely due to faulty diet. A copy of this bulletin may be secured by writing to the Secretary, Department of Extension, College of Industrial Arts, Denton, Texas.

Soldier Bonus.—The House Ways and Means Committee, by a vote of 11 to 10, favorably reported the soldiers' bonus bill last Saturday. The provisions of the bill are: \$1.25 a day for each day in excess of sixty days of active service in the military or naval forces of the United States between April 5, 1917, and Jan. 1, 1920. It is to be paid in quarterly installments on personal application, beginning the 1st of April, 1921, to all men in the forces within these dates, up to and including the rank of captain in the army. The bill calls for five methods of payment: Compensation in cash at the rate of \$1.25 per day; in the form of an adjusted service certificate of a face value equal to the sum of his adjusted service pay, increased by 40 per cent plus interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum for twenty years; in the form of vocational training during the period of which he would receive his adjusted compensation at the rate of \$1.75 a day for each day of his attendance; in the form of adjusted service pay increased by 40 per cent if applied on the purchase of a city or suburban home, or a farm not selected under the land settlement provision; adjusted compensation at the rate of \$1.25 per day as a credit on the sums due by him on farm homes in land settlements to be made from time to time for this purpose. The amount of money necessary for this legislation is \$1,700,000,000, and is to be raised by tax on incomes over \$5,000 per year, tax on sale and transfer of stocks and bonds, increase on the present tax on tobacco, tax on transfer of real estate; tax of 1 per cent on final retail sales—tax to be paid by the seller and not including sales of an agricultural product by the producer, and tax not applying to amounts received which do not exceed \$1,000 during any one month.

Cost of Living.—Increases between July, 1914, and March, 1920, in the cost of each of the five major items making up the family budget were as follows: All items, 94.8 per cent; food, 100 per cent; shelter, 49 per cent; clothing, 177 per cent; fuel, heat, light, 49 per cent; sundries, 83 per cent. The cost of living rose 7 per cent between November, 1919, and March, 1920, according to the national industrial conference board.

A GOOD MAN GONE.

Mr. Wm. H. Leverett died at his home in the Midway community, a few miles northeast from Goldthwaite, Thursday morning, after a long illness, and his remains were interred in the Center City cemetery yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock, with Woodmen honors. The Woodmen lodge of this city, of which organization he was a member, conducted the funeral services.

Mr. Leverett was one of the foremost citizens of the county. He was a man of highest character, who was honored and esteemed by all who knew him. His place in the county as well as in his home community was one of importance and he will be sincerely missed by all.

Mr. Leverett spent most of his life in this county and ever proved himself worthy of the friendship of the people. During his long illness the hopes of his many friends were for his recovery and when the announcement came that he was dead there was universal sadness among those who knew him.

His bereaved wife, sons and daughters, as well as his other relatives, have the sympathy of all who know of the death of this good man.

GOOD RAINS FELL OVER COUNTY THIS WEEK

During the week good rains have fallen over almost every portion of Mills county. They came just in time to save the grain crop. The farmers think that they will make pretty good grain, whereas, if no rain had fallen for a couple of weeks more—goodbye, grain.

MEXICAN SITUATION.

New York, May 5.—Six destroyers, accompanied by the tender Black Hawk left their anchorage with the Atlantic fleet in the Hudson River at 2 p. m. today and sailed for Key West for possible duty in Mexican waters.

Nogales, Ariz., May 5.—Francisco Villa with two hundred men joined the revolutionary forces today at San Romaen, Chihuahua, according to reports received at Nogales, Sonora. Villa, it is said, will bring ten thousand supporters to the side of Obregon.

The government has recognized that the power of Carranza is fast diminishing and has sent war ships to Mexican waters to preserve American neutrality.

Ten thousand troops are reported to be marching on Mexico City, and a desperate effort will be made by the revolutionists to capture that place, according to latest advices.

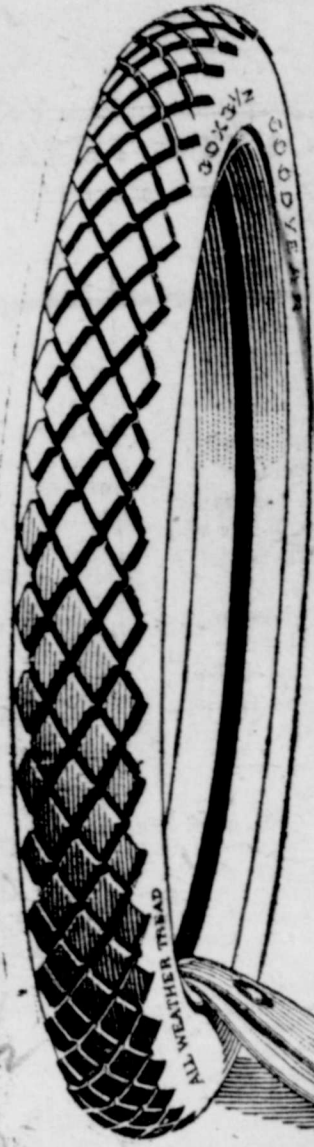

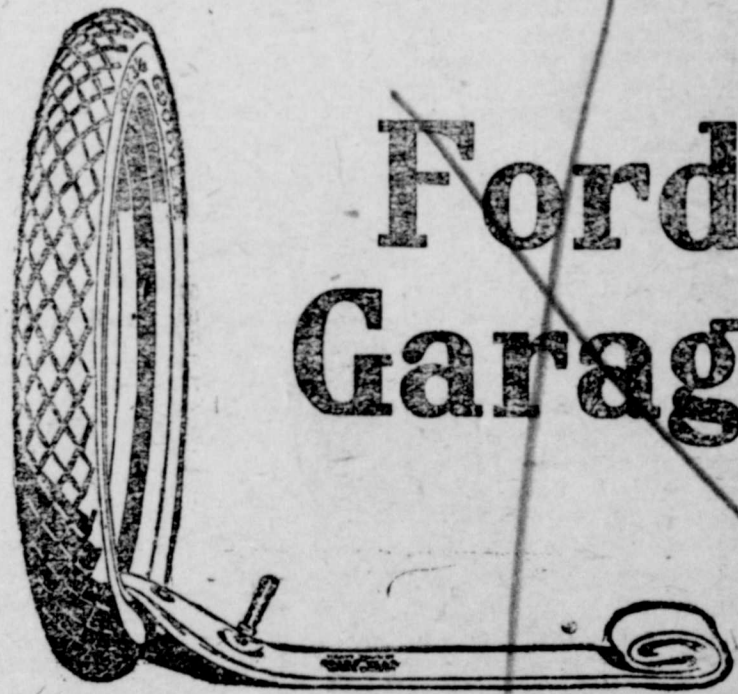

Austin, Texas, May 5.—Frank E. Cave and George H. Clements of Goldthwaite are charter members of Sigma Epsilon Gamma, an honorary geological fraternity recently established at the University of Texas. Mr. Cave was elected vice president of the new organization and Mr. Clements its editor. This fraternity was founded at the University of Kansas in 1915 and chapters have since been established at the University of Pittsburgh, Missouri, Nebraska and Texas. 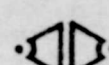

Three persons are known to be dead and several injured in a storm which swept over a portion of Dallas county Tuesday night. Thousands of dollars of damage to property resulted.

J. E. Vines, manager of the Texas Implement Company of Ranger, was shot and instantly killed in that city Wednesday night when he interfered with holdup men who were robbing two boys.

"Bluebeard" Harvey, alias Watson and others, alleged murderers of five of his two dozen wives, was smuggled out of El Centro, Cal., in an automobile Wednesday when a crowd became menacing and shouts of "Shoot him," "lynch him," were heard. Harvey pointed out to officers the grave of Nina Lee DeLoey, one of his victims, without a tremor in his voice.

According to a report of the United States Geological Survey, made public this week, the Texas oil fields produced during March 7,231,000 barrels, an increase of 491,000 barrels, compared with February. Of the total 5,264,000 barrels of production is credited to Central and Northern Texas, an increase of about 200,000 barrels, and 1,867,000 barrels is shown in production for the coastal fields, an increase of 200,000 barrels.

Fifty-one bodies were taken from the ruins of the town of Peggs, Okla., by rescue parties from surrounding towns and over one hundred persons were injured, some seriously, the result of a tornado Sunday night. The town of Peggs was virtually destroyed and one-fifth of its people were killed. The injured were carried by train loads to Muskogee and other points in Oklahoma. The members of whole families were killed by the storm, seven bodies of the Littlefield family being found under the wreckage of one house. In one instance, a small frame building, uninhabited, was left standing in the heart of the town, while brick structures surrounding, which had housed many persons, were razed and most of the occupants killed.

Conditions in Mexico are again being displayed in big heads on the front page of the daily newspapers because of a "new" revolution in that country. The grangers have learned it is easier to "fight" than to work and they are endeavoring to make it hot for old Carranza. The state of Sonora has seceded from the Mexican federal government and many federal soldiers are reported to have mutinied. Reports indicate general mobilization of all rebel forces in Northern Mexico for a drive on Torreon in under way. The troops will be massed at Juarez, opposite El Paso, and contemplate a drive on Mexico City. Carranza is said to have plans ready for a quick get-away from Mexico. Reports received at the agency of the Sonora revolution in Washington state that General Pablo Gonzales, who has been regarded as the most staunch military supporter of President Carranza, is ready with a rebel army for an advance on Mexico City. Troops of several Mexican federal garrisons are reported to have deserted and gone over to the rebels. The state department at Washington has asked the navy department to hold six American destroyers in readiness at Key West for possible duty in Mexican waters.

MILLS COUNTY BOY WHO GAVE HIS LIFE FOR HIS COUNTRY

The Eagle is reproducing herewith a letter from ex-Captain T. Forrest Brown to Miss B. B. Leonard concerning the death of her brother, John Leonard, who gave his life in active service on the battlefields of France, October 18, 1918:

Amsterdam, N. Y., March 27, 1920.
Miss B. B. Leonard,
Goldthwaite, Texas.

My Dear Miss Leonard:

I am very glad indeed to get your letter regarding the death of your brother, John. I believe that I can tell you as much about his death as anyone, as he was killed within one foot of me, on my left side, and I was wounded by the same shell.

We attacked the LaSalle River trenches on Oct. 17, 1918. The battle was terrific and we had great opposition. We finally got over the river and advanced toward the town of Abre Guernon. The mission of taking the town was ours. We entered and captured the town, but when we tried to advance further on we were held up by machine gun fire of the heaviest kind. It was impossible to advance. During all this time, your brother had come thru O. K. and was right along with me. We stayed in Abre Guernon, fighting, thru the night and at 5:30 a. m. on the morning of the 18th we started to attack. We were placed in a road, which had a high bank and we had plenty of protection. But our own barrage fell on us, along with the German shells, and if I may be so frank, it was "Hell" on earth for a few minutes. But I made the men keep their heads and moved them back behind a fence made of heavy stones. I had lost by this time over half of my company in the two days' battle and had only 18 men left, including your brother. About six of the men, including John, were grouped around me, as I was explaining what I was going to do to get out and get ahead. Just then a shell came over and landed right in the midst of us. It was a chance shot and not one of those aimed ones, and it was our luck to get it. When the smoke cleared away, I found that we were pretty badly shot up. Within a few inches of where I lay was your brother, and I can safely say that he never knew what hit him, as the shell evidently landed right at his feet. He was not badly torn up, and easily recognizable. We carefully examined him to see if there wasn't even a spark of life, but his end had come suddenly.

As I told your parents in a letter I wrote them from France, he had only been in my company a few days, but during that time he always showed himself a true blue man, with the real American red blood. He did himself proud in that battle, and met the fate that every real soldier expects some time.

I can assure you that he was well thought of by the boys and myself, and that his loss was keenly felt. As hardened as I am after two active campaigns and the deaths that I had seen, it certainly seemed a pity to me that that such a young loveable life should be taken away. But we must be proud of him and feel that he did his duty and did it well. Please accept my sympathy and regret that it was not my privilege to bring him safely back to his loving family. If there is anything more that I can tell you, I am your servant, and please call on me.

"The Best for Texas" is the slogan for the "Texas Farm Boys' Special" train which will take from 150 to 200 selected farmer boys of this state over the middle West, the East and the South under the management of the Texas Chamber of Commerce and the Extension Service of A. and M. College, Walton Petee, manager of the Chamber's agricultural department, announces. To secure the best agriculturally for Texas, these boys will be selected from every part of the state and shown the best agricultural methods and practices in the United States and introduce them into Texas. A further purpose will be to give Texas farmer boys a broad and comprehensive view of the agricultural sources of their country so as to make farming attractive and profitable, thereby stopping the exodus from the farm.

PRINT PAPER PRICES.

Further advances in print paper prices are to be made by the International Paper Company on July 1, said a telegram from Chester W. Lyman, vice president of the company, which has been presented to the senate committee investigating the paper shortage. The telegram said the only remedy for the present trouble is rigid economy in the use of news print.

HIGH RENTS.

SUMMARY OF LIVE STOCK AND AGRICULTURAL CONDITIONS IN TEXAS FOR APRIL

Dallas, Texas, May 5.—Reports from 20 counties, well distributed over the state on agricultural conditions show that farmers are getting a late start with their work, according to a bulletin from the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, issued by the Texas Industrial Congress. An excessively wet winter, with rains continuing well into March in many parts of the state, including the heaviest producing portions, accompanied by continued cold weather, has delayed preparation of the soil and planting of crops. These conditions will be reflected later on, as in the haste to make up for lost time many of the crops will be planted in soil but poorly prepared. Another factor entering into the lateness of planting and lack of proper preparation is the general scarcity of farm labor. 134 counties report a supply of labor available for farm work of only 87 per cent as compared with last year. A few report an excess compared with last year, while the percentage in others sinks as low as 50 per cent. This shortage of labor is reflected not only in lateness of preparation and planting but in the amount of land compared with last year that is expected to be uncultivated. This is reported by 94 counties to average 14.7 per cent.

Cotton: The shortage in acreage of small grains is reflected in the proposed acreage to be planted in cotton. One hundred and eleven counties report an average increase of 9 per cent over last year. Many of the heaviest cotton producing counties, however, have not yet reported their acreage, and it is as yet too early for a correct estimate of them. Included in the counties reporting are many counties that practically produce no cotton, and also a number of the counties affected by the pink boll worm, many of them reporting a probable average shortage of 50 per cent or more.

Corn: One hundred and twenty-three counties report an average either planted or planned of 98 per cent of last year, though it is almost certain that the cold wet spring will injure stands to such an extent that a very appreciable amount of this will have to be replanted, and this will cause some of it to be replaced by cotton.

Livestock: Though some few counties report a decrease of some kinds of livestock, yet, on the whole, the average number of livestock of all kinds shows an increase of three per cent over last year. 122 counties show an increase of 1 per cent in cattle; 116 an increase of 2 per cent in horses and mules; 115 a gain of 6 per cent in hogs, and 192 a gain of 4 per cent in sheep and goats. Twenty counties report no sheep or goats at all. Reports are nearly unanimous in stating that livestock is in better condition than at this time last year.

Farm Labor Shortage: The per cent of available labor is 87, as compared with last year, according to reports from 134 counties, and 94 counties report that 14.7 per cent of the land under cultivation in 1919 will not be cultivated this year.

RUSSELLITES FREED AFTER SERVING NINE MONTHS

New York, May 5.—Joseph F. Ruthford, head of the "Russellite" faith, and eight of his church officers were freed today in the federal court in Brooklyn. It seems that at break-neck speed the people are doing their best to crowd every moment of time into pleasure and money-making. So much greater are these than the one thing needful and the great aim of Him who created us, that the numbers are great on every hand whether pay or free, while on the other side there seems to be but few. The picture shows are in full blast on Sundays while most of the time preachers are facing many empty pews. We have had a fine chataqua; the manager is a preacher and a first class one. The great tent was filled to overflowing at all the meetings except two, which were thrown in by the manager but advertised beforehand as religious occasions. At one of these there were not two dozen people, at the other perhaps about one-tenth of the congregation that attended the other entertainments. Prior to the chataqua a meeting was in progress that was largely advertised from day to day all over the city as Bible lectures. The largest crowd they succeeded in getting out would not have exceeded 100. Young men attended the Sunday School and when dismissed the majority of them walk out leaving the church services as though they were not at all interested. A meeting was advertised to be held in the interest of the great world movement of the churches and the three services perhaps averaged fifty people. The day before it began a crowd of over 500 farmers came into town, rented a hall, for which they paid \$35.00 rent for one day in which they met to discuss the cotton handling situation. Their applause at times were so great as to almost shake the building. Money being the great question the rich and poor alike share in the good news of how the dollar can be made and saved. An organization was effected without a dissenting voice, which they propose to present as fast as possible, to every county where cotton is raised. Their plans are good, so good that when called on for indorsement over 500 men rose to their feet and went down into their pockets to contribute funds to push the organization in every cotton growing county. The originator of the plan is a farmer and they have already acknowledged him as the Moses to lead the poor cotton raiser from the bondage of oppression out into the sunlight of a free people, and our honest conviction is, he will succeed if his brother farmer will only fall into ranks and each and every one do his part. The proposition is to keep the cotton out of the hands of the gamblers and the farmer through his own organization will sell his cotton direct to the spinner, never allowing the sales cut for sample but compelling the gin man to sample every bale at the gin, thus saving the farmer a great deal of trouble in handling dilapidated, damaged-looking bales when he gets ready to sell. Farmers can get ready to accept or neglect; you will get a chance. As I have always been in favor of farmers organizing and having been in this meeting, I am conscientiously ready to recommend the plan to every cotton raiser.

Please understand that when I say I am for farmers organizing, I don't mean that I am against any other class of people organizing in order to honestly better their condition without encroaching on the rights of others. Farmers could and can be the most independent on earth if we will quit growling and get down to business in a business way like those of other occupations and professions who by their organizations where properly and fairly are succeeding. We need bankers,

merchants, doctors, mechanics and all other legitimate occupations and professions, all of whom are organized and having their conventions and meetings to get all the best and most economical and profitable ways of doing business. As the farmer has to feed the world why not they, too, organize to improve their method and cultivate that sociability and fellow brotherly, helpful principle so much needed to make us a prosperous, more intelligent, happy, useful people. We want to organize to help ourselves and not to fight any others doing a legitimate business. If we by organizing make more efficient farmers and better understand each other, why should any one else object when these efforts of ours are to better feed the rest of creation? The test is going to be made and the farmers are going to have a chance to show their loyalty to home and the country at large. Get ready to do your part.

DEMOCRATIC STATE CONVEN- TION TO HAVE 1,409 MEMBERS; LARGEST IN STATE'S HISTORY

There will be 1,409 members in the
Democratic State convention which
will be held in Dallas May 25. This
represents an increase from 885 votes
to 1,409 and it will be the largest
State convention in the history of Texas
and probably the largest that will
be convened in a number of years to
come. The largeness of the member-
ship is due to the fact that representa-
tion is based on the number of votes
polled in the last primary, in which wo-
men voted without the payment of poll
taxes.

The basis is one vote in the conven-
tion for each 500 votes cast in the last
primary.

The county primary vote for Mills
County is 2,016, and convention repre-
sentation, 4.

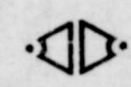

ABOUT PARTY CONVENTIONS.

By Texas League of Women Voters, Georgetown, Texas.

Qualifications For Voters: Qualified voters in precinct conventions are American men and women who have lived in the state one year and the county six months, and who hold poll tax or exemption receipts for the year 1919. In towns of less than 10,000 inhabitants, American men and women over sixty years of age or crippled are entitled to vote in the convention of the precinct in which they reside provided they have lived in the state a year and the county six months. Soldiers and sailors vote upon the presentation of their discharge papers. Full American citizenship is a qualification for voters in precinct conventions. Foreigners who have "declared their intention" to become citizens and who hold poll tax receipts can vote in the general elections in November but are debarred from party conventions.

Precinct Conventions: Precinct conventions are called for Saturday, May 1, between the hours of ten a. m. and eight p. m., and will be held in the precincts at or near the polling place.

Holding a Precinct Convention: A chairman appointed in advance by the county chairman of the party presides. The first business is to check up those present with the poll tax list for the precinct and see that only qualified voters as outlined above are seated. Insist on this being done as it is the only way to insure the legality of the proceedings of the convention. After a secretary is elected a committee on delegates is appointed. A precinct is entitled to one vote in the county convention for every twenty-five votes cast for the democratic candidate for governor in the last gubernatorial race. The record of the convention including the list of delegates kept by the secretary constitutes the "returns." The returns are signed, sealed and transmitted to the chairman of the county executive committee to be used in making up the roll of delegates to the county convention. In case any chairman refuses to hold the convention the voters should publish a call announcing the place and the hour set by the county chairman, giving as a reason for the call the chairman's statement that he will not hold the convention and so by his failure to act, disfranchise the citizens of that precinct. This call should be signed by

as many voters as possible and published in the papers and posted at the usual polling places. At the designated time the voters should assemble, elect a chairman, make the list of qualified voters and proceed with the convention.

Attention Precinct Chairmen: As the precinct convention is the place of origin of the power of the individual voter to decide the destiny of the national convention it is of the utmost importance that due attention be given to them. Find out the exact hour at which the convention is to be held and notify each woman in your precinct. Select a central meeting place for all, and go in body to the place of holding the convention at least a half hour before the hour for convening.

County Conventions: These are called in each county at the county court house May 14th and the delegates elected the preceding Saturday compose the membership. The committees of the convention are important and are usually a committee on permanent organization, credentials, resolutions and delegates. The temporary chairman ordinarily appoints these or there may be nominations from the floor. Any one intending to nominate from the floor should have plans well laid and act quickly. A county is entitled to one vote at the state convention for every three hundred votes cast for the democratic candidate for governor in the last gubernatorial election.

State Convention: This is to be held Tuesday, May 25, at Dallas. Only properly accredited delegates elected in the county conventions will be entitled to participate in the proceedings of the state convention. Here are elected delegates to the national convention for every congressman and senator that state sends to the congress of the United States; each state sends two senators; Texas sends eighteen congressmen which gives us twenty votes in the national convention.

TODAY WILL BE TAG DAY OVER ENTIRE STATE OF TEXAS

Austin, April 28.—County and local organizations for conducting "Tag Day" for the "Better Schools Campaign" are being rapidly completed; names of chairmen will be announced soon. Funds collected from Tag Day, May 1, will be used for conducting the campaign for better schools, one-half of the funds are to be used within the county in which they are raised and the remainder to be used in the state campaign.

Three purposes for which the money will be used are: To inform parents of Texas as to school conditions; to arouse pride and determination to have better schools, and third, to inform the public of the nature of the amendment to be voted upon at the November election.

NOTICE.

But there are "that are decidedly in the build- "factor," we are told; they include present market price for building material will not suddenly recede; he will be assured of high returns upon his enterprise for at least two years after the supply of building material and their prices return to approximate normal, and he will get probably a better constructed building because less reliable contractors are now out of the market. Discussing the whole building situation Mr. Beals notes that "since an armistice a year ago the building interests have passed through a vale of paradoxes that has no parallel in war or in any other era in the memory of business men" and he continues:

The building-material man, whether he be manufacturer, distributor, dealer, contractor, or consumer is today confronted with a potential demand far beyond the plant capacities of the entire country to meet for the next five years at least, even operating at 80 per cent of maximum plant output, which, with the shortened work-week and scarcity of common labor, restricts actual production of building commodities in the basic departments at least to barely more than 50 per cent.

To the prospective builder of homes, factories, commercial buildings, or the investor designing and contemplating the construction of hotels, theatres, apartment houses or tenements, this looks like a forbidden outlook. In the last year it has checked actual building construction to about 40 per cent of normal for New York and vicinity.

In the Middle West there was more forest, coupled with the advantage of having close at hand the centers of building material supply. It accepted the alternative of paying higher prices instead of waiting for them to recede, and went ahead with building. New York preferred to wait in the expectancy that prices would drop. "This policy," quoting Mr. Beales, "is to be a costly experiment in procrastination."

Labor disturbances have so absorbed the attention of prospective builders that no artificial means were applied to revive construction. Contractors were obliged to refuse tenders to estimate on building projects. Recently many of these most important trade problems have been ironed out and once more the steel skeletons of buildings poke their black angles above the neighboring housetops. The lumbering girder truck, absent from the city's streets for nearly two years, is once more adding to the problems of the traffic policemen at busy corners, and houses by the hundreds are being started at a time of the year when building construction normally is retarded to wait for more auspicious weather conditions in the spring.

The small builder, the man of modest means, will be blocked out of the building program. He will find that credits have been tightened against him. For- Building construction today and for the next ten years will be on a cash basis. New York is now 33 per cent short of buildings and, therefore, uncertain credits are crucial liabilities when a demand like that exists.

Because the market is only open to the financially strong, the question of building-material purchase is no longer one solely of price, but of delivery. The

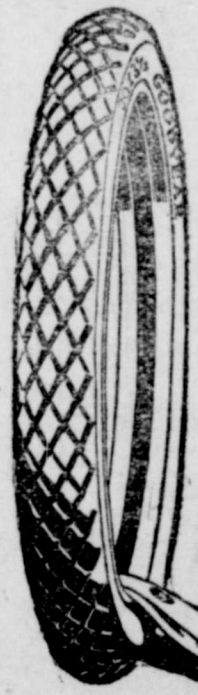

A great many plans have been presented to the people but thus far nothing has been done to relieve the condition of the roads, other than what the commissioners have been able to do under the present handicaps.
