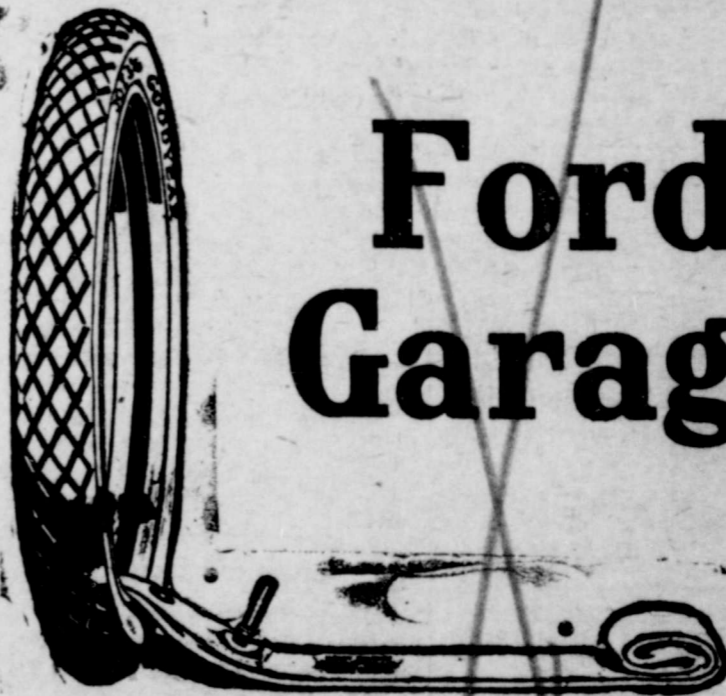

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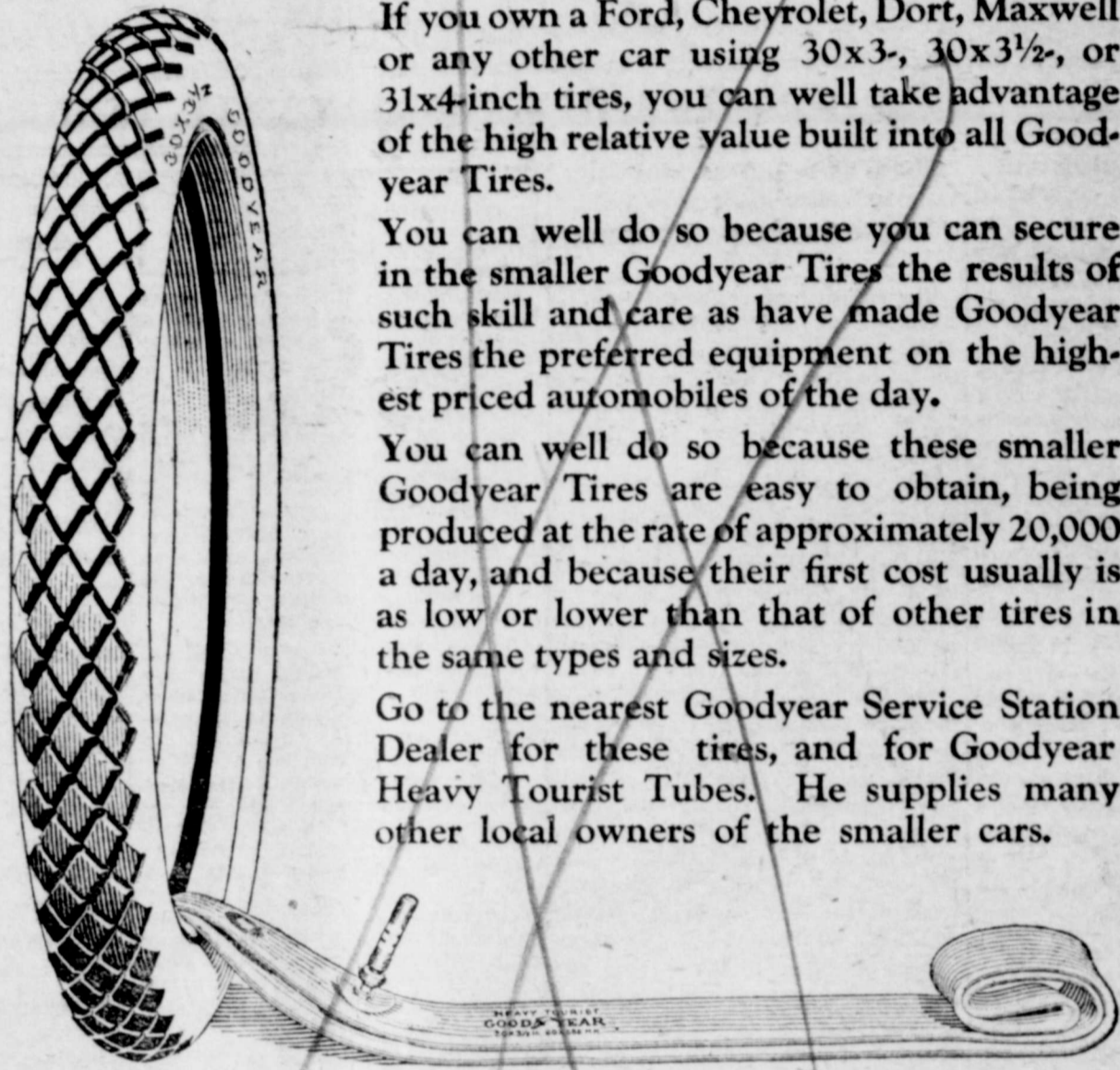
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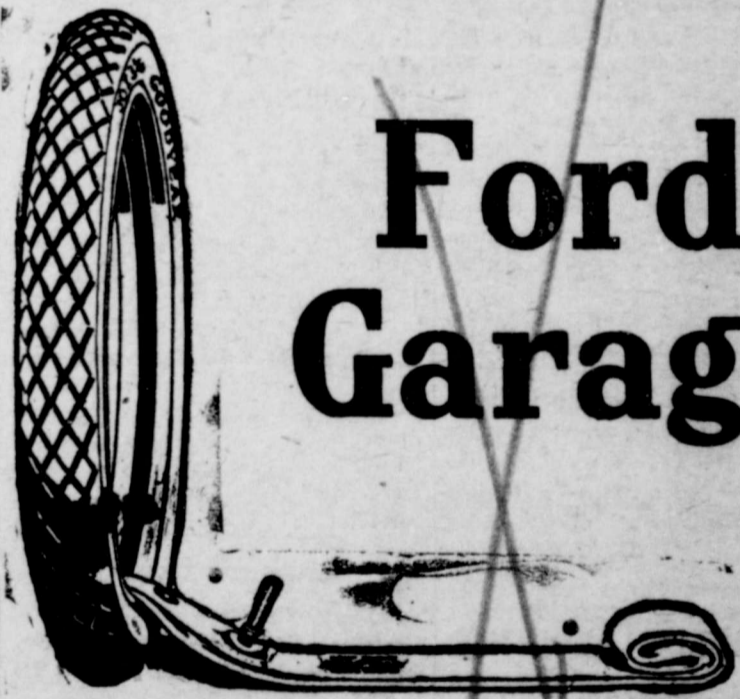

THE NATURE AND METHODS OF THE HUMAN MIND.

Mr. Editor:

Having been invited by you to express in a somewhat more extended manner the ideas which I have from time to time given out before you, as to nature and methods of the human mind, I take this opportunity of gratifying in a more or less imperfect way your request. I thank you heartily for the compliment which you have paid me, and I assure you that you can ask nothing of me, in reason, which I would not make every effort to grant. My relations with you have been so pleasant that I have come to regard it as a recreation. I always anticipate such association with delight and feel confident that I draw as much inspiration from you as you do from me. During our association I have yet to suffer the first heart-ache caused by your conduct toward myself.

The wise and good of every age have speculated on the nature of the human mind. No man lives or ever did live who has not marveled at its phenomena. The most ignorant asks whence he came, and the most learned whether he is tending. The youngest child, able to talk, inquires where the baby was obtained and the venerable sage declared that one of the questions past finding out was "How the bones do grow in the womb of her that is with child." Infinity stretches out before us on every hand, infinity of magnitude, infinity of distance, infinity of weight, infinity of number, infinity of time, infinity of personal identity, and last of all and greatest of all, infinity of thought and imagination, and through it all and around it all force acts upon matter and matter stores up and generates force, both unspent, both unincreased, both indestructible and both subject to the unchangeable laws of natural symmetry and order.

When at night we behold the ethereal concave of the heavens besprinkled with an infinitude of other worlds, more or less like this on which we reside, whirling through endless space, each on its own errand, we must needs be persuaded of the insignificant and unimportant part earthly man is destined to play in the great drama of the universe, but we have only to turn to our microscopes to behold living things, without number, like the sands of the sea, that grow, breed, die and decay, even as notes, that float ephemeral, in the subbeams. So under the broadening influence of science, the human mind expands in its own estimation and becomes worthy of study.

The evidence of the existence of mind and its nature is the evidence of its phenomena, as exhibited through the body. What the evidence of so-called spiritualism is worth to those who are able to perceive such evidences, I know not, but to us who can have but little if any experimental knowledge of such evidences, the question resolves itself into one of faith and confidence in the judgment and integrity of those who profess to have perceived and experienced them. All statements of this sort must be relegated to a class of narratives, which may at times convince by weight of testimony, but which certainly cannot be considered demonstrative. I would not underestimate the influence of these narratives on the prevalent beliefs of people in general, as to the nature of the human mind and its probable continued existence after it has left the body, but for purposes of deductive reasoning, they are worthless.

Every phenomenon in nature has its cause and every cause produces its adequate effect, but the causes of a cause and the effects of an effect are infinite and indeterminable, and it is not necessary to trace either of them further than to demonstrate and exhibit a good and sufficient motive for their existence. Force and matter are subject to known laws, that hold good at all times and places. The question naturally arises early in our investigation, whether the mind is also subject to laws of a kindred nature.

The body presents itself to us as an intricate machine, adapted to the performance of certain mechanical functions. Evidence of an almost indisputable character is also presented that such adaptability has been perfected, through a long period of evolution, change upon change taking place both in structure and function, as it has come in contact with the other forces and materials in nature; change upon change taking place as the mind within has driven it to battle with these forces and materials, to preserve its own existence and produce its kind. POPULATION DRIFT TOWARD THE CITIES.

"Where are all the people coming from?" is a question frequently heard in our cities. Almost every town in the country, from the largest to the smallest, is experiencing an acute shortage of houses. In places where three or four years ago a large percentage of the houses were vacant, a place to live can now hardly be had for love or money. Preliminary census figures are showing heavy gains in population for many of our cities during the past ten years. Figures for the rural districts have not yet been given out, but we would not be surprised to see decreases in many farming sections.

These facts indicate one thing in particular, and that is that the farming business must be made more attractive if people are to remain on the farms and production maintained or increased. The farmer goes to town mainly because wages in town are better than he can make farming, and so long as this is true we may expect the drift from the country to city to continue, with decreased farm production following in consequence.

Prices of farm products are high, of course, when compared with pre-war prices; but when compared with other commodity prices they are not high. Railing at a farmer as a profiteer will get the city consumer nowhere. In fact, any effort that unduly lowers the prices farmers receive for their products is bound in the end to put prices higher than ever; because if the business of farming is made unprofitable enough farmers will quit it to so reduce production that the demand will automatically force prices up.

The country and the world need more food and clothing, but to get them a fair price to the farmer—a price that will insure him a wage in line with what urban workers receive—will be necessary.—The Progressive Farmer.

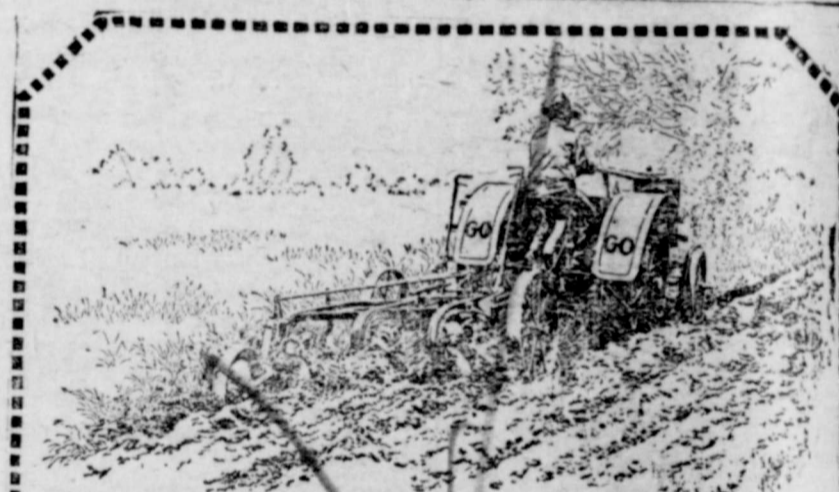

PECAN GROWERS TO MEET.

May 20 and 21, Brownwood, Texas, is to honor the pecan growers of Texas and other states who are to meet in that city and render a program. The main purpose of the meeting is to complete the organization of the Texas Pecan Growers' Association. It is announced that almost every phase of the pecan industry will be considered and much good is expected to come from the meeting.

WHEAT SHORTAGE PREDICTED.

The American Agricultural Trade Commissioner at London, England, predicts a wheat shortage this year, and a world-wide increase in demand. Regarding conditions in England at the present time, he states that wheat is now selling in London at the highest price the workingman could tolerate without serious disorders and grave disturbances, and that the present condition offers no hope as yet in this respect, but rather serious, discouraging conditions.

It was cited that Russia, being in a chaotic, semi-war state, could not be expected to export very much wheat and naturally Europe would necessarily turn to other sources, namely: United States, Australia, Canada, Argentina, and India. And whether these countries will be able to export a very large amount above consumption remains yet to be seen. But even with a fairly good crop it is doubtful if these countries could export enough beyond their own consumption to appease the hunger of all Europe.

Although Russia has at the present time, reports say, between 35,000,000 and 140,000,000 bushels available for export, her internal conditions and a shortage of railroad facilities to move this wheat cannot be expected to have very much effect to relieve the wheat shortage in other countries under present conditions.

It is said that the British government has announced the maximum price of wheat to not exceed \$2.89 per bushel, and that this would be the average price of imported wheat. According to the Commissioner, United States imports were ranging on an average of \$3.46 per bushel.—Farm and Ranch.
