GOOD RAINS FELL OVER MILLS COUNTY DURING LAST WEEK

All Central Texas Receives Plenty of Rain; Crops in Good Condition; Some Damage Done by Hail.

During the past week Mills county has received three good rains, general over the county. With the bottom season already in the ground, the prospects were never better for a crop which will almost equal that of last

There seems to be no danger of losing this crop now, as the moisture is sufficient to mature it.

While very few of the farmers have been able to plant cotton on account of the dry weather, there is still sufficient time to make the fleecy staple. In fact, cotton planted now, under the conditions we now have, is said to make better than if planted earlier. Those few farmers who have their cotton up are in very good shape indeed. Indications are that the price for raw cotton will go even higher. By fall, it is said, the credit of the European countries which use large quantities of raw cotton will orm. This should create a short-Moreover, the labor shortage was so acute here last season, it is said, will be over and the farmers can by that time procure sufficient able foot of land this year should be

growing crops and buildings by the heavy rains, hall and winds. Several fuildings in Mullin were damaged. Brownwood also suffered her part of the damage.

It is the popular cry now-"If it would only stop raining"-while a few weeks ago it was-'Af it would only rain." If the farmers can only get their seed in the ground, they would say-"Let it rain, who cares?" But they would appreciate few days of dry weather right now.



EUROPE'S POVERTY FURTS US. Exchange rates existing with foreign countries at present are of direct interest to farmers, thinks Prof. E. L. Currier of the Montana State College. "It is of vital interest to every farmer in Mentana, or any other part of the country, that exchange rates with foreign countries have been going downward steadily since last July," says Professor Currier,

"The practical significance of this depreciation in the value of foreign money is found in the fact that at the present time it takes to buy a dollar's worth of American goods \$1.36 of English money, \$2.35 of French money, \$2.75 of Italian money, or \$18 of German money. This condition makes it extraordinarily difficult for European nations to trade with us, and leads to the conclusion that these countries will buy as little as possible, which will reduce the volume of our exports and tend to cause low prices for farm products in this country .- Farm and Fire-

The South for a long time produced cotton first with slave labor and then with free labor at starvation wages. We practically gave away the crop. Now cotton has at last reached a price | which offers the producer a chance for something better than a shanty to live in, side-meat to live on, and a crop-lien to live with. But because this price is higher than they used to pay, many nanufacturers both here and abroad declare that present prices are excessive.

The truth is that all farm products for a generation past have sold too low, and cotton lower than any other. Farmers are deciding that their women folks have as much right and duty in the home as the women folk of other classes have. Then, too, we have gotten over the idea that we must keep our children in the cotton fields this year in order to make an over-production of cotton which will in turn so beat down prices as to force these children back into the fields next year-and so on until they die in ignorance. The South is beginning to adopt compulsory attendance laws for its children just as practically all other civilized states and countries have had for a generation,

The meaning of all this is that the South is never again going to make cotton on the old starvation slave-labor basis on which it was made from 1880 to 1910. Nevertheless, it is going to take some time to drive these facts into the minds and consciousness of manufacturers and business men. If we can keep prices high through just one more season, we ought to be on a permanently higher level of cotton prices. On the other hand, if the bears win next fall and force prices down, all the work that has been done in educating the world to the necessity for permanently better cotton prices, will have to be done over again.

Thus a big cotton erop in 1920 will play into the hands of bear-speculators sure a regular movement of the bowels. and manufacturers. These facts indicate one thing in particular, and that is that the farming business must be made more attractive if people are to remain on the farms and production maintained or increaseed. The farmer goes to town mainly because wages in town are better than he can make farming, and so long as this is true we may expect the drift from the country to city to continue, with decreased farm production following in consequence.

Prices of farm products are high, of course, when compared with pre-war prices; but when compared with other commodity prices they are not high. Railing at a farmer as a profiteer will get the city consumer nowhere. In Drug Store. fact, any effort that unduly lowers the prices farmers receive for their produ-ucts is bound in the end to put prices higher than ever; because if the busi-ness of farming is made unprofitable enough farmers will quit it to so reduce production that the demand will automatically force prices up.


