#### TREATMENT OF WATERMELONS FOR STEM END ROT

(M. E. Hays, Hort eulturist, Extension Service, A. and M. College of Texas.)

The stem end rot is one of the most serious troubles that the shipper has to contend with. This disease can be pre vented by stem end treatment, this, ac cording to the work of the United States Department of Agriculture. The importance of this disease should be of special interest to the growers, growers associations and shippers.

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

SECTION 1. That Section 3 of Ar ticle VII of the Constitution be so amended as hereafter to read as follows: (Creating a new Section 3.)

Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and a poll tax of one (\$1.00) dollar on eve v inhabitant of this state between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem state tax of such an amount not to exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred (\$100,00) dollars valua-tion, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of this state for a period year, and it shall be the duty of State Board of Education to set aside a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for the use children attending the public ever, that should the limit of taxatio herein named be insufficient the deficispecial law without the local tion; and all such school districts, whether created by general or special are composed of territory wholly with And the legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and the erection and equipment of school buildings therein: provided, that a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of the district voting at an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation supon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts. A. J. HARRISON WRITES OF TRIP. Editor Eagle:

I will try now to give you a brief description of my trip and redeem my promise to you. It has been over a week since we started from Gold thwaite; it took us three and a half days to make the trip and since reaching here I have been too busy shaking hands with cousins to redeem my promise to write the Eagle.

In this swamp and about three or four miles from the main body of the Mississippi river we crossed long. our first delta of the Father of Waters. 
