## LITTLE CHILD BURNED TO DEATH LAST SATURDAY

Lolo, the little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Will Griffin, who live 18 miles northeast of Goldthwaite in the Merrill Creek community, was burned so badly at the Griffin farm last Saturday that she died the following Sunday night.

The little girl was in the field with her father and mother, who were burning corn stalks. When first discovered on fire by her father, flames were completely covering her body. The little girl at first started running toward her mother, who was closer to her than her father, but changed her mind and then started toward Mr. Griffin. He ran to her and succeeded in putting out the flames, but not before she was so badly burned that death resulted Sunday night at 11 o'clock.

The parents do not know exactly how the clothes were caught.

Revs. Bynum and C. H. Miles conducted the funeral services Monday. Interment was at Look-out cemetery Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Lolo Griffin was a granddaughter of John Harris of the Merrill Creek community.

The entire community will sympathize with Mr. and Mrs. Griffin on account of their great bereavement.

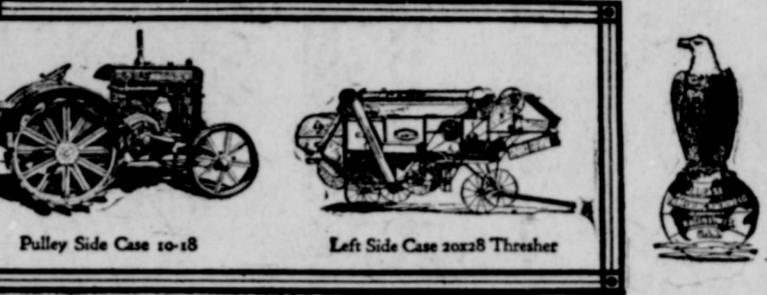

The trial of George F. Hornsby, alias G. H. Scott, charged by indictment with the murder of J. N. Weatherby at Brownwood on the night of October 18, 1920, came up according to schedule at Belton Monday morning at 10 o'clock, Judge Blair in the chair. The court house was packed with spectators and veniremen summoned in this case. Judge Blair called the court to order, after Hornsby, accompanied by four heavily armed deputies, had entered the court room. A glance at the lineup of legal counsel showed both sides ably represented. Defending Hornsby was Mark McGee and Judge Rice of Brownwood, the original lawyers appointed by Judge Woodward of the Brownwood district, and Judge Snodgrass, an able lawyer of Belton. Helping the prosecution were District Attorney Jones, district attorney of this district, Judge Wilkerson of Brownwood and Judges W. W. Hair and R. L. Curtis of Belton.

After the veniremen had taken the oath, Judge Blair called the case and asked the state if it was ready. Judge Snodgrass for the defense, with the permission of the state, had the case postponed until 1:30 Monday afternoon.

Snodgrass for the defense made a motion, based along the same lines as the motion at Brownwood during the first part of the trial; namely, that the deposition made by the witness in Alabama, purporting to prove that Hornsby was at Birmingham on the day after the crime was committed, be used as evidence. And that if it should not be used, that time be allowed the defense to re-secure depositions. Judge Blair overruled the first part of the motion on account of the fact that accredited proof of the supposed witnesses had not been given, and squashed the depositions.

Then after arguments by Snodgrass for the defense and Curtis for the prosecution, Judge Blair overruled the motion for continuance, to which the defense took exception.

After that the defense tried to squash the special venire on the grounds that about 50 of the 150 men called had failed to report and charged negligence on the part of officials whose duties it was to summon them. Quite a bit of time was consumed discussing this point with the result that court was dismissed at 3 o'clock for one hour until it could be threshed out. Witnesses were used in this connection and their testimony follows:

Dallas, Texas, March 18.—The action of the agricultural committee of the Texas Bankers Association and the second annual Farmer-Banker conference at College Station is the greatest step yet taken toward the success of the Farm Bureau movement in Texas, officials of the organization declare.

"The Farm Bureau has stood the acid test of study and analysis by the bankers of Texas," Walton Peet, director of commodity organization of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, said. "The Farm Bureau was the chief topic of discussion at the conference and the agricultural committee of the Texas Bankers Association, together with other bankers present, including Eldred McKimmon, president of the association, spent several days in studying the Farm Bureau and its marketing plan, after which they adopted resolutions endorsing it."

"The endorsement of the Farm Bureau by the bankers' committee and the conference is a long step," President J. T. Orr commented, "and when it is passed upon by the May convention of the Texas Bankers Association we shall have placed the bankers of the state behind this movement of the farmers."
