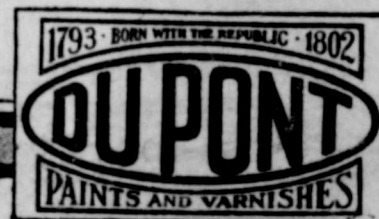

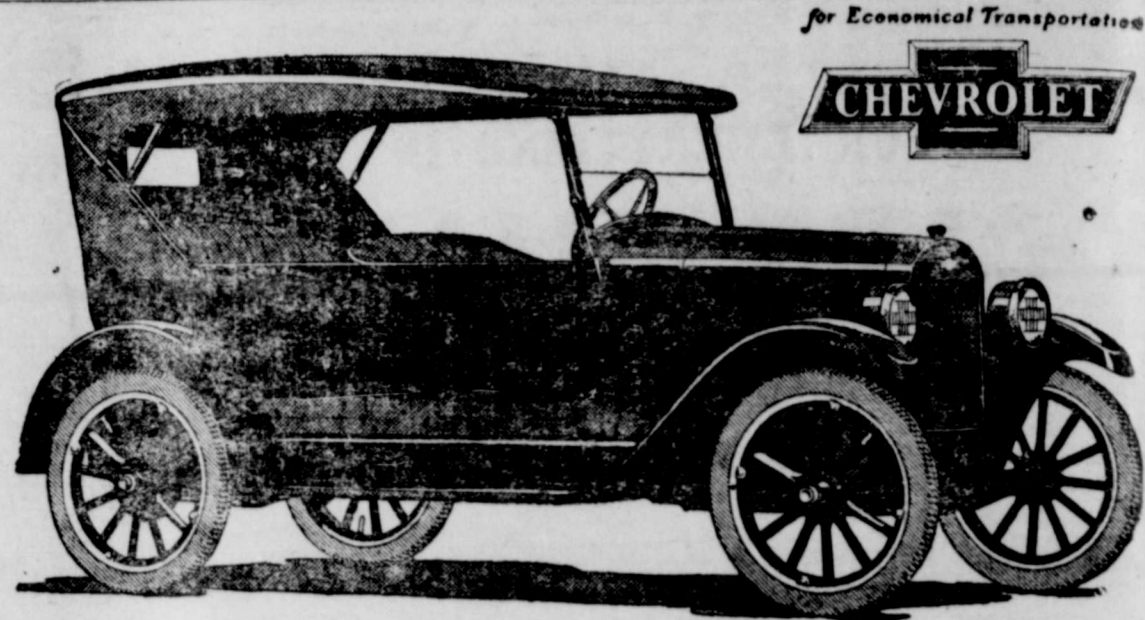

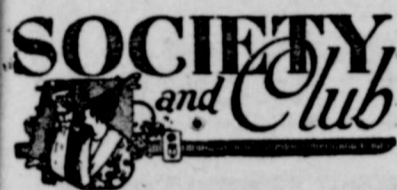

It has already happened. Much ran and plenty of mud. We will forget all this when we enter the next real dry spell. That leads me to say that memory more often behaves badly. Human memory in the main acts to disadvantage—it will hold or cling to many worthless things while letting slip things that are worthy and important.

The pupil in school has a hard time keeping in store rules applying to his English and some laws required in his lessons of mathematics, but all during after life he remembers how he and others competed in a game, the excitement, the place, the time, and how it all turned out. It is a fine thing to have ready memories but with all of us it must be worked into capacity for the best and highest things. Every one knows we remember the fitful scene at the movie, or the words of the clown at the circus, better than we remember the teaching of the strong lecturer who came to help us build good character. And his words were such as to elevate us to best type of manhood and womanhood, but how soon we forget. Many of us remember, I suppose, the illustrative story of the boy who saw a squirrel on his road. He was sent with an important message to the house of a neighbor. He soon forgot what the message was about but always after remembered the squirrel and even how the tree looked in which the squirrel romped. Such a loss that we have only squirrel memories.

When I was but a brat of a child my father had among other good neighbors a certain man who came off to Texas and drifted here and there to different parts of the state, then after two or three years returned home. He was a cheerful, clever young man and in relating his adventures to my father and family I was eager to catch every word. I felt that he had been almost in another world. In a very large sense he had been. He said: Stopping over night in a strange community, I learned there was a weekly prayer meeting which met that night near by. So I decided to go out to the meeting and get acquainted if the folks were not too distant. So he went out and in the midst of the meeting people were granted an opportunity to talk. After some had related and exorted, he said, a young man arose and began to talk about his prodigal life and also of his wanderings away from home. Am sure he was a match for our friend who was looking on and listening. He said soon the tears began to run down from the eyes of the speaker as he stated, "I remember well what my mother said to me when I was leaving home." No one else at the meeting knew just what those words were, but he remembered and that was a great and blessed act of the memory. It certainly caused our visiting friend in Texas to remember something back across the Mississippi for he soon returned.

It will do to remember that those weekly prayer meeting folk are the ones who in those days kept the moral light of the community burning and made stronger the fiber of civilization decoying other good people westward. Also it is good to remember helpful and needed things at such a meeting but why forget them between meetings? It is indeed blessed to have something to awake memory from its slumbers,

but that it slumbers is the pity. A crushing providence sometimes is required to recall an important vow—a blighting disaster speaks to us before we remember our neglect.

How peevish and how bad is memory to hold the evil deed of some one while letting go many good and faithful deeds of the same one. Memory will whisper to us the shame or sin of the long years gone by. It holds the trash and lets the golden grain drop thru.

Every one understands I am not charging memory to be universally bad—I am dealing with its unprofitable and hurtful nature. Why remember an injury or an unkindness when it makes like weaker and unhappy to do so? Why remember sin in another and take little account of it in one's self? Why remember the first money we had and forget religious obligations? The only answer is weak human nature.

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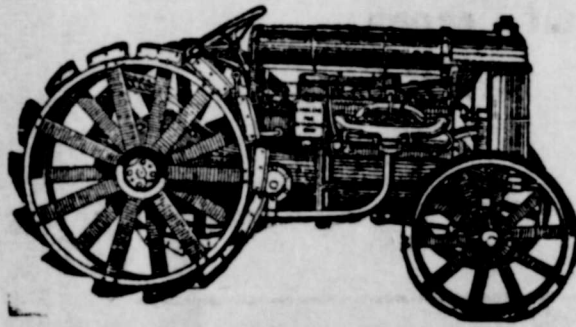
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
