## COMMISSIONERS' COURT

Commissioners Court met in regular session last Monday, and amongst the business transacted is the following:

The office of road supervisor was ordered discontinued after the 14th day of April, or today, the last session of the legislature having repealed the special road law for Mills county.

Canvass of the returns of Common School District No. 3 special 50c school tax election showed that the tax carried and the court ordered the amount assessed against the property in that district.

The special tax in district No. 24 was ordered abrogated, the result of an election there recently.

The bond of the Trent State Bank given as a depository of the county funds was examined and approved. The Trent State Bank will pay the county interest at 2 6-10% on daily balances, payable monthly.

## TEACHERS' EXAMINATIONS.

### County.

Examinations will be held in each county on the first Friday and Saturday following in each month except January, May, August and November.

### Registration.

Beginning with the April examination, all persons who intend to take teachers' examinations must register their names, post office addresses and the subject or subjects, and the grade or class of certificates on which or for which they proposed to be examined, prior to the twentieth day of the calendar month preceding the examination.

### Building on Certificates.

Persons desiring to build to first grade, permanent, or permanent primary certificates, under the old law, must begin building prior to September 1, 1923.

## WORLD'S NEWS IN BRIEF.

**Blackhand Wars**—Two men are dead and a third was believed dying in Chicago Tuesday as a result of a series of bombings and shooting, which police attribute to blackhand wars.

**Revolution?**—A plan for implanting revolutionary doctrines within the government departments at Washington was declared by police to have been disclosed in papers seized there Monday night in raids during which seven men were arrested.

## THE INFERTILE EGG CAMPAIGN.

By the Hen Man.

Much is being said and done to increase and improve our flocks. This is well and good. But this is not all. Better methods should go right along with better stock. Neither is better breeding and equipment sufficient. Success in poultry growing is not measured by large uniform flocks or needed equipment. It is shown in the profit side of the ledger.

The breeding season is closing. Chicks are not profitably raised after the middle of May. After this the roosters should be disposed of and infertile eggs produced. It is hard to conceive why a farmer will keep a 50c rooster on the yard to produce fertile eggs all summer, thereby losing from 7 to 10 cents on every dozen sold, besides having a large per cent "candled out."

Texas loses one and a half millions of dollars every summer by keeping roosters after the breeding season. They are certainly not worth that much to grow. An alarm clock would be more economical.

We are still waiting for some scientist in his laboratory to find some method of utilizing stale eggs. Why produce bad eggs? You don't want them. The produce man hates them as no one else can. It costs more to produce them and they sell for less than in fertile eggs.

We are offered a nice premium on infertile eggs and a good price for the roosters. It is planned to put on a rooster day May 1st, when our dealers will pay a nice premium for them. Then after about 20 days all who offer infertile eggs, properly stamped, will receive a nice premium on them.

The recent rains will prevent me holding meetings in every community. I am asking those interested to take this matter up with their neighbors and be ready to attend a meeting at Goldthwaite at an early date to make plans for putting this over. A number of communities are already at work.

## BAPTISTS COLLECT \$38,918,000 CASH

Growth of Denominational Activities in Every Direction is Indicated as Result of Forward Program

### LARGE ADVANCES ARE MADE

REPORT ON CONTRIBUTIONS TO 75 MILLION CAMPAIGN ISSUED BY HEADQUARTERS OFFICE



DR. EVERETT GILL European Representative Baptist Foreign Mission Board.

Up to January 1, 1923, Southern Baptists had paid in cash on the 75 Million Campaign, their five-year program for the advancement of the general missionary, educational and benevolent activities of the denomination; the sum of \$38,918,191.10, according to a report issued by the general headquarters office.

These contributions have come from the various states and other sources as follows: Alabama, \$1,652,739.40; Arkansas, \$1,145,153.35; District of Columbia, \$142,564.70; Florida, \$609,016.02; Georgia, \$3,669,516.70; Illinois, \$320,482.95; Kentucky, \$4,122,039.78; Louisiana, \$1,035,640.23; Maryland, \$489,494.29; Mississippi, \$1,591,011.34; Missouri, \$1,537,067.49; New Mexico, \$170,998.36; North Carolina, \$3,365,330.21; Oklahoma, \$1,052,438.20; South Carolina, \$3,300,252.60; Tennessee, \$2,240,766.77; Texas, \$5,002,785.32; Virginia, \$4,102,802.12. Special designated funds, Texas \$1,223,640.55; New Mexico, \$403,072.68; Louisiana, \$105,100; Illinois, \$148,591.11; Tennessee, \$192,852.25; Oklahoma, \$59,000; received direct by Home Mission Board, \$15,340; received from special sources by Foreign Mission Board, \$36,163; contributed by native churches on foreign field and expended by them directly on their work there, \$1,003,396.68.

Indicating something of the progress which the impetus of the Campaign has brought to various phases of denominational effort in the South, it is reported that during the three years of the Campaign period that have expired, Southern Baptists have had 150,000 more baptisms than they did for the three years immediately preceding the Campaign; organized 2,600 more new Sunday schools with 400,000 new pupils; enhanced the value of their local church property by \$22,000,000; increased their contributions to local causes by \$22,000,000; gave \$18,933,562 more to missions and benevolences, and advanced their contributions to all causes by \$43,480,490 during the three years of the Campaign over what they gave to all causes for the three years immediately preceding the Campaign.

**Gains in Special Fields.** The Campaign has enabled the various state mission boards to greatly enlarge their programs of state and associational missions within their respective boundaries. It is pointed out; made it possible for the Home Mission Board to complete its \$1,000,000 Church Building Loan Fund, extend its work among the foreigners, Indians and Negroes, administer 134,352 baptisms, secure 218,371 additions to the local churches, provide larger equipment for its system of 35 mountain mission schools, establish the Southern Baptist Tuberculosis Sanatorium, and greatly increase its work in other directions.

Some other gains in the homeland include the better equipment and maintenance of the more than 80 academies, colleges and seminaries other than the mountain schools; increasing the number of Baptist hospitals from 18 to 20, and providing better equipment and maintenance for all of them; increasing the number of Baptist hospitals from 12 to 20 and beginning the erection of three others, at the same time all the older ones have been better equipped; while the number of aged ministers helped has been doubled and the stipend given each has been greatly increased.

**Mission Work Extended.** In the realm of foreign missions the Foreign Mission Board has been enabled to send out about 250 new missionaries, employ over 500 additional native workers, greatly increase the equipment in the way of church buildings, chapels, schools, hospitals, publishing houses and mission residences in the older fields of China, Japan,

To the Eagle:  
Prosperity smiles while the presidential pot for 1924 begins to simmer and sizzle and hiss the names of the respective party favorites for the coming campaign.

Daugherty throws Harding's hat in the ring and Harding says, "Not so fast, please."

Some one throws McAdoo's hat in and McAdoo keeps on saying nothing about taking it out, which signifies he is willing to go bareheaded if his friends want him to leave his hat there. But after all, political bosses don't select the presidential timber as often as they used to, so we are still hoping that the common people in both the old parties will have a say about who shall be their respective candidates.

It must be freely admitted that there are divisions in the Republican camp that seriously threaten a split in that party. That all is not harmonious in the Democratic camp is easily seen, yet not so apparent as in the Republican camp.

Mr Harding, however, is the logical candidate for the Republican party, according to a long line of precedents and will be a surer winner than any other man it could name.

Without attempting to discuss the merits of the two parties from their former political tenets but from the view of geographical interests, it would seem that the South and West have mutual political and economic interests that should draw them together. ...

The old Democratic doctrine of free raw material would be an insult to the intelligent voter of the South and West who produces 75 per cent of the raw material of our country, for free raw material implies protection for manufactured articles; if not, why specify free raw material.

Raw material in most instances, practically every instance, must be produced with manufactured implements. Asking the producer of the South and West to compete with the Mexican peon, the Chinese coolie, the Egyptian and East Indian and other inferior races, would be to him adding insult to injury when he knows that the producers of raw material are the poorest paid laborers in the world and to this, for him, must be added the protection he must pay on his implements of production.

Again, the production of raw material requires no particular skill and all labor, outside of skilled or semi-skilled labor, becomes, if they labor at all, producers of raw material. Hence the great hodge podge field of raw material production becomes the cheapest and greatest competitive field in the world and the self-respecting and ambitious citizen farmer of the South and West must enter this field and battle with every form of low class labor in the world in an effort to rear and educate his family to move in respected and intelligent society. His rights have too long been the stock in trade of the politicians and he is beginning to find it out. Verily, it is beginning to show up quite plainly, that the producer of raw material of the South and West has a better claim to protection against the pauper labor of other countries than the manufacturer has or ever has had, because the manufacturing laborer is a skilled laborer and competes only with skilled labor, while the producer of raw material has to meet and compete with every class of pauper and unskilled labor in the world.

That the Western Republican and Southern Democrat were fairly well agreed on this phase of southern and western economy was thoroughly demonstrated in their united support of the Emergency Tariff measure for which most of our Southern and Western Democrats joined the Republicans in supporting. That measure was aimed for the protection of the Southern and Western producer of raw material and saved thousands of them from going bankrupt.

The idea of protection for the producer of raw material in the South is growing very fast and the South and West should join

hands here as their interests are identical. The cry of the North and East for free raw material was likewise heard all over the country during the debate on the Emergency Tariff bill.

Some Southern or Western Democrat who stands for the protection of labor engaged in the production of raw material against the peon and pauper labor

of the world would be a mighty good political card to play against the North and East.

McAdoo for president looks to too many Southerners and Westerners just like agreeing in advance to turn the country over to Gompers and organized labor.

Who knows? We may have a Democratic president after next election. Give the voters a chance

at a Southern or Western Democrat for they are the biggest and best Democrats in the country. The South and West have been overlooked too long while selecting big men for big places.
